Kew Council is to set up a consultative committee to review Road Traffic Authority (R.T.A.) proposals for the High Street/Cotham Road intersection.

The R.T.A. has asked Council to

Council has appointed the consulting firm of D. T. Grogan and Associates to undertake a Traffic Management Study of the area bounded by Cotham Road, Burke Road, Harp Road, High Street and Charles Street — Area 6

The object of this study is to identify and propose solutions to traffic related problems within this area.

The Consultant will involve interested residents in both the problem identification and solution processes. Watch your letterbox for the first pamphlet outlining the study program.

respond to plans for the intersection involving:

- signalisation of the High Street / Walpole Street intersection;
- pedestrian operated signals in Cotham Road opposite the Post Office;
- construction of safety zones in High Street and Cotham Road;
- widening of High Street and Cotham Road;
- diversion of morning peak buses along Charles Street and Cotham Road.

It is important that groups and individuals affected by the proposals have the opportunity to express their views. Only when Council is aware of

those views will a considered response be made to the R.T.A.

The process will commence with a public meeting in the City Hall (No. 3 hall) at 7.30 pm on Thursday, November 10th.

Plans will be explained by R.T.A. representatives and groups will be asked to arrange the appointment of representatives to a consultative committee. The committee will meet at least twice after the public meeting to identify areas of concern and, where appropriate, develop alternative suggestions.

NOT AN ELEPHANT JOKE

Did you hear the story about six blind men and an elephant. With their hands they each felt a different part of the animal, and came to widely different conclusions.

One said, "An elephant is like a wall". Another said, "No, it's like a spear", another said "a snake". The others all disagreed too, saying, "a tree", "a fan", and even "a piece of rope".

After much discussion, they discovered that each was right and each was wrong. Gradually, the full picture emerged as they shared their experiences with each other, and learned from each other.

There is a great variety of clubs, organizations, schools and institutions in Kew, but each, to some extent, is working in isolation from each other, and the wider community. Like the blind men in the story, the experiences and insights of each of our community groups need to be shared with the whole community, just as each group needs to be responsive to community requirements.

Community depends upon communication.

No collection of people can be said to make up a community unless there is the sort of communication which encourages honest sharing, and the enrichment of belonging to a larger "whole".

As the present avenues of communication in Kew tend to be limited and therefore inadequate, the suggestion is that we in Kew follow the example of many other municipalities and have our own community paper delivered regularly to every residence in Kew.


Such a paper would provide information about coming events, groups available, Council activities, services available etc.

The paper would also be a forum for ideas and may highlight current issues. All this in order to build up a greater sense of neighbourhood within Kew so that our lives may be supported, strengthened and enriched as we, even in small ways, encourage a greater sharing of ideas, plans, abilities, hopes and resources.


In order to discuss the idea of a community paper for Kew with a wide distribution, a public meeting will be called early next year.

In the meantime all interested community minded people including those who would like to promote



KEW-HAWTHORN C.A.B.

You have perhaps noticed a new sign in Cotham Road, just on the city side of Charles Street — a white question mark on a blue background.

This shows the way to the Kew branch of the Kew-Hawthorn Citizens' Advice Bureau, which operates in two offices just across from the Library.

As the question-mark suggests, the Citizens' Advice Bureau is a starting-off point for anyone with any enquiry about anything at all, from the simplest matter to the most involved. We have very comprehensive files, and we can give useful information about practically any subject.

Don't misunderstand the name of our organisation, one of 66 in Victoria doing similar work. Some people — young people for instance — don't regard themselves as "citizens" because they don't vote or pay rates or income tax; but they are of course "citizens", everyone is, and all are

welcome. Also, "advice" is what we don't give; we give information about possible sources of assistance, but leave people free to choose any — or none — of them. And "bureau" suggests something more official than what we hope is our warm and friendly atmosphere. No one is asked for a name or address; and confidentiality is completely respected.

We are staffed by trained volunteers, and are open Monday to Friday 10 am to 3 pm, with a free legal service on Tuesday 7.30 pm to 9 pm. The phone number is 861 5244.

The Hawthorn branch is on the corner of Glenferrie and Manningtree Roads, and is open 10 am to 3 pm Monday to Friday, with a free legal service on Wednesday, 7.30 pm to 9 pm. The phone number is 819 2772.

New volunteers are always welcome.

FAMILY TREES

For those interested in constructing their family trees, Kew Library has an extensive range of genealogical sources and family histories, and also subscribes to two relevant journals, **Ancestor** and **The Genealogist**. This is part of a Victoria-wide Subject Specialization scheme; of this, one of Kew's special subjects is Genealogy.

New acquisitions include copies — on microfiche — of the N.S.W. Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages and of the Queensland Registry of Marriages and Deaths for the nineteenth century. Records for the twentieth century are not yet available, except by direct application to the Registrars. Kew is the only Municipal Library in Melbourne to hold these; they are available for use in the Library, and it is possible to order photocopies of any relevant pages if required.

ASTHMA EDUCATION

Asthma Education sessions are conducted regularly in Kew at the Asthma Foundation Education Centre, 2 Highfield Grove, Kew.

During November there will be both day and evening sessions conducted by a specialist physician. During the presentation, asthma is explained in layman's language with the assistance of audio-visuals, films, and other teaching aids; the medications used in the treatment of an asthma attack, and in the maintenance of stable asthma, are detailed — how they work and why they are often used in conjunction; the various mechanical aids in asthma management are

demonstrated, and general guidance on how to avoid/minimise the onset of asthma are given. Questions and answers at the conclusion of the session are a popular feature, although it must be emphasised that the Foundation does NOT diagnose or treat — that is the role for the family doctor or specialist.

A telephone call to 861 5666 will allow you to find out when the next community Asthma Education sessions will be held. Remember: Asthma is a matter of "life and breath" and its key is "understanding".

A Place of Shades

Visitors to a new place often find themselves strolling through the cemetery, pondering over history as read in gravestones. A young man in his twenties, was that appendicitis, or a fall from his horse? A mother and her day-old babe, a difficult birth? A whole family of children, wiped out in an epidemic? Two young wives dead, the third outlasts her husband, all this bears mute testimony to some causes of death medical science has reduced to a minimum.

Even when names are unknown to history, headstones record events that shaped their lives, migration from a far Scottish isle, from the time of famine in Ireland, retirement from Indian Army service to Australia's mild climate and wide opportunities.

Boroondara Cemetery in Kew (the name means a place of shade) has beside all these many names that history records. The first burial there was in 1859, and the earlier graves are those of residents of Boroondara (Kew, Hawthorn and Camberwell) only.

Buvelot the artist who first illustrated with truth the Australian scene might be one among these, Georgiana McCrae another. Her interesting diary recalls Melbourne in its earliest days. She was a gifted artist, and could have kept her family comfortably by her commissions for portraits, but her husband, though not at all well off, would not allow it. Society of the day would have frowned on the idea of a gentlewoman doing so.

The angel on Nellie Stewart's grave depicts the actress herself, on her arm is the Nellie Stewart bangle she made so popular. There is a memorial to a faithful dog, which refused to leave its master's grave, and the Syme Memorial to the Editor of the 'Age', which like the Springthorpe Memorial is classified by the National Trust. John Wren is buried at Kew, and several Hentys, also Thomas Wills, one of the first landowners in Kew.

A guide to the Cemetery, with map and notes, which was drawn up by members of the Kew Historical Society, is obtainable from them, and at the cemetery too.

MORE THAN A SCHOOL

The Villa Maria Society for the Blind established St. Paul's School for the Blind and Visually Handicapped in 1957. Today, it performs a vital role in the provision of the Society's services to the blind community of Victoria.

Having for many years used old residences, the school operates from recently completed buildings at the corner of Studley Park Road and Fernhurst Grove, Kew. Three other buildings on the site are registered nursing homes, which are staffed twenty-four hours per day by trained nursing staff. A fourth nursing home is located at Austin Street, Alphington — four kilometres away.

The School is presently tending to the needs of over sixty children, many of whom are multi-handicapped. The new school complex is capable of meeting the educational needs of one hundred children.

POLICY

St. Paul's School is a Catholic non-systemic school and its policy is one of integration into mainstream schools where possible and as soon as possible. Approximately six students are integrated each year. The only criteria for enrolment is a visual impairment, regardless of religion, race or additional handicap.

SERVICES PROVIDED

St. Paul's caters for children with a functional visual disability regardless of additional disabilities, provided that the administration of the school considers that attendance at St. Paul's would be beneficial to the particular pupil. In order to cater for the wide range of pupils such a philosophy encompasses, the school operates as a residential school, a day school, a resource centre and a withdrawal area for specialist subjects,

e.g. braille and touch typing, mobility and daily living skills. As the school operates without a definite age range or prescribed level of intellectual ability the following services are provided:—

1. Kindergarten
2. Primary School
3. Junior Secondary School
4. Special Education Unit
5. Production/lending library service in braille, large print, cassette.
6. Residential facilities
7. Visiting teacher service
8. Loan Equipment
9. Orientation and Mobility
10. Physiotherapy

THE KINDERGARTEN is staffed by trained kindergarten teachers and assistants. It is approved by the Health Commission in its present location, for twenty children, most of whom are severely multi-handicapped. When the need arises, the kindergarten also provides facilities for a toddler play group and parent guidance with regard to visual-

ly handicapped children. The Health Department has given special permission for children in this kindergarten to continue to ten years of age where necessary.

CAN YOU HELP?

The staff of the kindergarten are looking for volunteers who are able to give some of their free time to help within the kindergarten programme.

Firstly, they need volunteers to help dress young children aged from two to eight years, for their swimming classes. This will involve approximately two hours on a Wednesday afternoon from 1 pm.

Volunteers are also required to help out during lunch time and craft activities on Tuesday and Friday afternoons from 12 noon to 3 pm.

The type of person they are looking for needs to be physically fit, as working with multi-handicapped children is very demanding.

WHO IS SHE?

You may well ask what does a Community Education Officer do? Nancy describes her work as varied. She has over recent months been involved in a large number of projects, which have included organizing a

group of Kew residents who are working to set up a Community House, assisting with a Newsletter for people working in the area of youth needs in the region. Helping to organize a combined schools folk dance festival which was so successful that the committee has now decided that it shall become an annual event.

Nancy sees herself as a person to go to if you need information about what is happening in the Kew/Deepdene area, or information on how to get resources. She is also available to people who want help in setting-up discussion/support groups, classes etc.

Nancy would make most welcome and appreciate any volunteers to help with the organization of groups, or who can offer any spare time to assist with general office work, such as typing, answering the phone etc.

KEW CRICKET UNDERWAY

The 1983/84 Cricket season is now underway and the Kew Cricket Club is again fielding four senior eleven turf sides. The 1st and 2nd elevens are competing in the Victorian Sub-District Cricket Association, this being the sixty-second season that the Club has been represented in this association. The 3rd eleven and Club eleven represent Kew in the Eastern Suburbs Cricket Association turf competition and all sides play at Victoria Park, High Street, Kew.

The Club, which is one of the oldest sporting bodies in Kew, has been in existence for over 100 years and in that time has had considerable success in the various cricket competitions in which it has been represented. Over the years Kew has produced many excellent cricketers some of whom have gone on to represent both their State and Australia.

Last season was a very successful one with all senior elevens reaching the finals. The Club eleven, under the leadership of Jack Carr, was the only side to eventually take out a pennant. This was a fine accomplishment for this side which was reconstituted at the start of the season to provide op-

portunities for some of the older players and also to provide a forum by which younger players could gain invaluable experience.

Neil Kilpatrick (ex-North Melbourne) has again been reappointed as coach of the Club and together with John Kilgour (ex-Hawthorn) and other experienced senior players, will provide expert coaching assistance to any new players coming to the Club. Training is held at the ground every Tuesday and Thursday evening.

The policy of the Club is to assist promising younger players to maximize their abilities. Last season Michael Dimattina was captain of the successful Victorian Under 19 Carnival side in Perth and each year Kew have had several representatives in the Sub-District Under 19 side which plays against sides from the VCA, Schools and Country Cricket League.

For the younger player there is an Under 14 competition held during January each year with expert coaching provided by senior players.

The surroundings of the ground and the new social facilities provided by the Kew council make Victoria Park a most attractive location for players and spectators alike on a Saturday. There are a number of playground attractions for children whilst at the same time adults of any age can enjoy a pleasant afternoon watching a high standard of turf cricket.



SHELF POSITIONS

Borrowers have expressed curiosity recently over small white strips of paper placed in the pockets of some library books. These were a part of a research project on Library use conducted by an R.M.I.T. student. The purpose of the survey was to discover whether shelf position had any effect on whether or not a book was borrowed. Results showed that Adult Fiction books on the top and two bottom shelves were less likely to be taken out than those on the middle shelves; in all other areas of the Library the shelf height made no difference.
