KEW HISTORICAL SOCIETY

On June 6th, 1835, John Batman made his treaty for the land at Port Phillip District on the Merri Creek with the rising hills of Kew in the distance covered with wattle trees and fine eucalypts. Good land was to be found along the banks of the Yarra for grazing herds of cattle and sheep, and in December 1836, eighteen months later, the first mob of cattle driven across from New South Wales crossed the Yarra at Dight's Falls.

Settlers moved in, buying land in the first Land Sales in blocks of anything from 35½ acres to large holdings of 196 acres. For years dairying, grazing and market gardening were the chief occupations and old residents in their eighties still remember mushrooming in the paddocks from Princess Street down to

The little village of Kew sprang up with hay and corn stores for the horses, and small shops. On December 18th, 1860, Kew was proclaimed a municipality. It was not until December 1910 that it was large enough to be a town, and eleven years later, in 1921, it became a city.

Some of the original bushland still remains around the winding bends and banks of the Yarra, a rural retreat only a short distance from the busy city, and the river still froths and slides over Dight's Falls on its way to the ocean.

Membership is currently about 250 people from all ages, groups and walks of life and classes are held regularly to initiate new mem-

Table fees are charged for each session of play and tuition fees are charged for people wishing to discover Bridge as a recreation.

Last year the Club raised \$800.00 for the Red Cross and this year Kew Rotary will benefit from a Bridge Luncheon.

COUNCIL NEWS

"KEW PLANS FOR JUNCTION"

In early 1977, the Kew Council began its investigations into problems associated with the Kew Junction Shopping Centre in an attempt to isolate the causes and processes of the centre's decline in its retailing strength and its function as a community focus.

Following the release of some development ideas, a Kew Junction Community Consultative Committee was established at a public meeting in 1978, and in December of that year the Committee presented Council with a set of recommendations which rejected the idea of a pedestrian mall in High Street, and suggested that the following matters should be further investigated.

- Encouraging the provision of rear access to shops from car parks and general improvement to shops;
- Provision for additional community facilities, including public toilets, green areas and facilities for the aged and children;
- Better utilisation of the Fenton Way car park and its improved (c) integration with the Junction Centre;
- (d) Improved pedestrian circulation within the Junction Centre, possibly including arcades and pedestrian access; (e)
- Improved access to car parking areas, including improved and more prominent directional signs;
- (f) Possible introduction of a "theme" or "character" for the Junction Centre;
- Limited development to provide additional specialist shops and (g) additional car parking north of High Street generally within the existing commercial zone, and in the area bounded by High Street, Cotham Road and Derrick Street to meet the broad spectrum of community needs;
- The setting aside of an area for future office development.

The Committee also stressed the need to protect residential streets from heavy through traffic.

The Committee, which is once again meeting on a regular basis under the Chairmanship of Councillor Ivan Wade, also has as its members Cr. Rob Pritchard, Messrs. Peter Harkin, Bob Thwaites, Andrew Fry and Doug McLaren (Kew Chamber of Commerce), and Mrs. Jill O'Brien and Messrs. Tom Schreiber, Doug Hocking, Peter Davies (resident representatives).

Councillor Wade said the Committee now has before it some detailed development options and strategies which aim to:

- Improve the physical, social and economic environment of retailing in Kew.
- (b) Actively promote the modernisation, redevelopment and restructuring of retailing and retail premises in Kew, so that
 - the increasing leakages of retail expenditure by Kew residents to shopping centres outside the City are halted;
 - most of the everyday food, clothing and household needs ii) of Kew residents can be satisfied in Kew most of the time.
 - Kew shopping centres are revitalised and strengthened to effectively counter the attractions of other centres and to adequately satisfy the needs of the less mobile proportion of Kew residents.

To assist a achieving these goals, the Council will:

- Oppose further retail growth in regional centres.
- Actively promote the concept of balanced retail development in the Melbourne Metropolitan Area under a Metropolitan Retail
- Actively encourage retail development which might have otherwise (c) occurred in regional centres to take place in local centres.
- Actively encourage the physical redevelopment of local centres to meet modern needs.
- (e) Resist changes of use or development which, in the opinion of the Council, will detrimentally affect the retailing functions of a shopping centre and reduce the viability of remaining or existing retailers.

Councillor Wade said, "The earlier public participation and consultation programme which the Committee conducted has enabled it to proceed to its further investigations with a knowledge of the sort of development that is favoured both by traders and the community".

"The Committee", Cr. Wade continued, "is now in the process of deciding the broad directions that centre development should take, and I hope that we will be in a position to recommend a preferred strategy to the Council before the end of March.'

Cr. Wade pointed out that adoption of a stratgey will not see the end of the consultative processes. "The Committee will certainly want to see a period of public exhibition and comment on any proposals before they are implemented, and will certainly recommend this course of action to the Council".
