Rising costs have greatly affected the costs of conducting amateur sport and each of the sports represented on the Bingo committee have found it increasingly difficult to provide reasonably cheap sport and incidentally healthy exercise for the sporting youth of the community. Similarly the Kew Starlight Theatre provides sparkling entertainment at relatively low cost at the Kew High School Theatre, despite the increased cost of royalties, musical scores and scenery, etc. Again the theatre group provides opportunities for talented young people to gain further experience.

Despite the assistance; funds from Bingo on Tuesday nights, which have been provided to these worthy organisations, escalating costs are still a worry. To this end the Bingo Committee recently commenced Bingo on Wednesday afternoons, with play starting at 12.45 p.m. This is not going well and may have to be discontinued if patronage does not increase soon. The Kew City Council has provided realistic help to the Bingo Committee in permitting use of the Civic Centre.

Founded in June 1976 by the Kew Recreation Council, Kew Chess Club is now the most rapidly expanding and third largest club in Victoria with over 70 members.

During 1980, the Club will continue to meet on Friday evenings at 7.30 p.m. in the Auxiliary Room, Kew Civic Centre, Corner of Charles St. and Cotham Road, Kew.

A varied and interesting calendar of events is under way this year, including coaching nights, inter-club matches, lightning and skittles tournaments, social games and the club championships.

This year for the second time, the Club is running a tournament for schools in Kew to foster an interest in chess amongst young people.

The Club also expects to participate again in the Victorian Chess Association's Winter Inter-Club Competition, which attracted 70 team entries from 35 clubs in 1979. Kew entered 3 teams in this event in 1979, scoring second place in B Reserve and third place in

The Club's main event is the Club Championship which will run from June - September, 1980. Highlight of the year is the Annual Presentation Night in December when prizes are presented to the top players in all grades

Club membership includes many children and teenagers as well as adults and senior citizens. Ability levels range from beginners to seasoned tournament players and competitions are arranged into several grades to cater for differing levels of ability.

KEW HISTORICAL SOCIETY

On April 20th, the Historical Society members are hoping for a fine day for their drive over the river to visit "Banyule" and the old Court House Museum in Heidelberg. "Banyule", built in 1846 for pioneer and overlander Joseph Hawdon, on a rural bend of the Yarra is a beautifully proportioned 2 storey-building in the Romantic Gothic Victorian tradition. It houses a magnificent collection of paintings, the Manton Collection of Heidelberg Painters, McCubbin, Roberts and Streeton; as well as Post Impressionist and expatriate artists who moved to France, such as Rupert Bunny and John Russell. Upstairs are collections of Victoriana, dolls, children's toys, embroideries, etc. a fascinating display.

Kew lacks a public art gallery and although there are many old buildings in Kew there is no museum of our historic past. Perhaps one day we may achieve something valuable for our city of Kew through the efforts of both the Historical Society and the public citizens of our district, who are interested in preserving our heritage and retaining the character of our suburb.

CAN YOU HELP KEW HIGH SCHOOL?

In an effort to make education more relevant and in order to assist students with career selection, Kew High School has introduced the practice of Work Experience into the School Curriculum at the year 10 (Form 4 level). This year the dates are from July 7th-July 18th. I am writing this letter as an introduction to the scheme seeking your co-operation.

Work Experience Programs are schemes whereby students are employed in the community for a short period (up to twelve days per term). The programs are governed by the Education (Work Experience) Act of 1974. Teachers must fulfill several obligations under this Act and the employer is required to place the students on the payroll and to pay them a minimum wage of \$3 per day, thus covering them under Workers Compensation which is covered by the State Government.

The student will be required to attend work punctually and regularly as an employee. Written parental consent will also be required. The students will be briefed before leaving the school about the responsibilities they are taking on and teachers will endeavour to visit or telephone the student during their work experience period. A pre-work experience interview can be arranged with the student if you so desire.

The experiences the student gains in the work force can be many faceted. For one, it provides a basis on which future decisions about careers and employment can be made. While on the job, the students may also come to realise the relevance of some school subjects to working life while he still has the opportunity to follow them up. There are aspects of work which encourage responsibility, independence and selfdiscipline. Also, in experiencing a variety of jobs a student may gain greater knowledge of parts of his community with which he would otherwise rarely come into contact.

If you are able to offer assistance by keeping a place for a student for the above dates, or would like further details, please contact the Careers Teacher by telephoning or in writing.
