50 YEARS Half a century



HALF A CENTURY OF SERVICE -- THE BABY HEALTH CENTRE, PEEL STREET by Elizabeth Mackie (Kew Historical Society)

On Saturday, 21st June, 1980 the Baby Health Centre at Peel Street will hold a celebration and re-inactment of the founding of the Centre 50 years ago.

The history of post-natal child care in Kew goes back to November 11th, 1919, when a deputation waited on Council to ask for a Baby Health Centre in Kew. A room in the Town Hall was set aside for the purpose and Sister Barnard was appointed, and commenced her duties on November 5th, 1920. Later her place was taken by Sister Turner who retired over 45 years later, a well-known adviser to the mothers of Kew. and fund raising in order to furnish the Centres and helped to supervise their management, giving valuable support and service from the community.

Statistics will show the great decline in infant mortality rate since 1919, due in great measure to the principles of care, hygiene, diet, identification of illness and general nurture of the mother and child in the Baby Health Centres of Kew. There are fashions in child upbringing – The Truby King Method, Dr. Spock and many others, but the basic good care taught in the Centres has encouraged and given confidence to many young mothers uncertain how to look after their first baby. Tribute must be paid to the excellent nursing staff of the Centres, many of whom have stayed for long periods of service and seen generations of children grow up.

Kew is a wide area and to accommodate the mothers in the district of East Kew, the Council opened another Centre in Strathalbyn Street, which was officially opened by the Countess of Stradbroke, O.B.E., on December 16th, 1925.

A third Centre at North Kew was also planned and a house at 50 Willsmere Road was leased for the purpose. Later the Council erected a new building in Peel Street, and the cost of construction was 1,240 Pounds.

In 1939 the Council built another Centre at Denmark Street and the service at the Town Hall was discontinued. In all these Centres Committees of ladies engaged in social events Sister Costello is at present at the Peel Street Baby Health Centre and has been there 2 years. Many mothers of Kew will remember Sister Bewshes who was at Peel Street for 15 years, before transferring to Denmark Street. She has only recently retired.

In concluding this tribute, we would like to say "Well done" to the Kew Council and the nursing staff for providing this very important service to the mothers and babies of Kew over the last 50 years.

SUCCESSFUL FUN DAY AT KEW

It was all fun and games at the recent community get-together organized by the Kew Citizens Association. Even an overcast sky, a cool breeze and intermittent showers did not prevent some four hundred people from turning up at Victoria Park to socialise with their neighbours and have fun.

For the children, there were treasure hunts, foot races, sack races and to fill in time between the organized activities, the Kew Council provided a selection of Life-be-in-it Games. Add to this, appearances by the B.P. 'Smurf' and the 'Wombles', courtesy of the Actors Theatre in Richmond, and it's not hard to see why a great time was had by all.

The President of the Kew Citizens Association, Mr. Grant Archibald, was enthusiastic about the success of the afternoon. "The main purpose of the Fun Day was to encourage families to meet with other families from the neighbourhood and generally have a good time. I believe that these aims were achieved and hopefully we can organize similar gettogethers on a regular basis".

OVERTON

In the middle years of this century, Methodist people in Victoria were concerned that although the church had excellent homes for babies and children, little had been done for the care of the aged (apart from small homes administered by the Central Mission). When the Conference decided to take action, the thoughts of the Home Mission Committee turned to "Overton", 19 Pakington Street, Kew, an old mansion purchased for development as a Home Missionaries' Training College with the thank offering of the Home Mission Jubilee. Before it could be prepared for this purpose, Mr. Howard Berry offered his family home "Otua" at a gift price, feeling that it would be more suitable and in 1925 the College in Walpole Street was opened. "Overton" was let, some sections of the land being sold and from time to time consideration was given as to the best use of the building.

The offer of the Home Mission Department to commence geriatric care was accepted by the 1954 Conference and plans were prepared for the old home to be renovated, although it had strict limitations and had fallen into disrepair. Under the Aged Persons Homes Act, the Federal Government made a grant of 20,000 Pounds, the cheque being presented by the Prime Minister, Hon. R.G. Menzies, at a gathering in the Highbury Grove Church, this being the first of many such grants to church and charitable institutions. This, together with an unexpected legacy of 46,000 Pounds made possible the demolition of the old house and the construction of the present building which was opened by Sir Dallas Brooks in July, 1956, Professor Norman Lade being President of the Conference. Since then, loving care has been given to many aged people, including returned ministers and home and overseas missionary workers.

KEW PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY

At first, all the residents were ambulatory although there was a hospital wing with six beds for the temporarily indisposed. The furnishing and equipment of this section being donated by the Women's Home Mission League in memory of a loved President, Mrs. Robert Williams. "Overton" was originally a hostel, but needs change, and the middle wing has been taken for nursing home beds, with plans to construct a new section to accommodate 23 confused elderly patients.

The home has been ably administered since 1964 by Rev. W.J. Johnson who recently retired and now, with other homes in the Moorfields Community it has come under the sponsorship of Bourke Presbytery. After twenty-five years, modern improvements are needed and the Matron recently called a meeting to discuss the possibility of a fair. The present ceiling lights are not adequate for those residents whose sight is deteriorating and financial help is needed to provide a new system of lighting. Those present agreed to organise a fair for this purpose to be held at the home on Saturday, May 3rd, from 11.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. Cakes, sweets, work, plants, art, craft and new clothing will be on sale and afternoon tea will be available.
