ALL DAY AND LONG-TERM PARKING FOR THE FENTON AVE. CAR PARK – KEW JUNCTION SHOPPING CENTRE

Long term parking in streets around the Kew Junction has been of concern to the Council for some time now.

Two and three hour restrictions which were introduced in 1974 in streets in and around the Junction Shopping Centre relieved the situation from the residents' viewpoint, but created difficulties for people employed in the Centre. In an effort to overcome the inconvenience to workers in the area, the Council is planning to convert a section of the Fenton Avenue Car Park into long-term and all day parking.

Some 64 car spaces will be set aside in the south/western corner of the car park for this purpose which are to be controlled by ticket-issuing machines. To park in this area for a four (4) hour period, the charge is to be 20 cents and for an all day ticket, a charge of 40 cents is to be levied.

This action by the Council has received the full support of the Kew Chamber of Commerce and it is hoped it will relieve the shortage of long-term parking in the vicinity of the Junction.

THE FRIENDLY STRANGER

Inform your child that strangers come in all shapes and sizes.

Instruct them to report to you any suspicious person, or attempts to approach them by unknown adults.

Warn your child to ignore requests from strangers for assistance.

Do not allow children to accept rides or gifts from strangers, even ones who tell them that they are friends of the family.

A search for a lost animal, help with a ladder or broken down car, holding a piece of timber — could lead to trouble.

Train your children to check with you before going anywhere with anyone.

They should report any suspicious actions of adults or other children in the vicinity of schools or playing areas.

Make sure that you take the time to check on all these things, do not leave it to the child and hope that he or she will do it automatically.

SWIMMING - even in the Winter!

If you are lucky enough to own a heated swimming pool then you can swim every day, and after the effort of getting dry and dressed again, you can say with certainty that life is worth living.

Throughout the metropolitan area of Melbourne there are a number of heated pools, and a larger number of people who believe that swimming is necessary for their own well-being. Swimming is a most beneficial form of exercise that improves the circulation of the body and this is why most people feel better after even a short time in the pool. However there are people who go into swimming pools for another reason to relieve aches and pains, or to exercise muscles that have not been functioning as well as they might. People who have arthritis often choose to avoid all kinds of physical exercise as much as possible, but if they are willing to try swimming and/or other exercises at a heated pool, then they will find that there is great relief from the physical disabilities they experience every day.

The Rheumatism and Arthritis Association of Victoria has recently commenced a Self Help Group which meets on the 4th Tuesday of each month, at 10.30 a.m. in the Auxiliary Room, Kew Civic Centre. One of the projects to be undertaken by this Group is to be a swimming group which will commence following their meeting on June 24th. If you would like to join this swimming group, which will be supervised by a physiotherapist, and organised particularly for the benefit of people who have arthritis, then we invite you to phone Mrs. Dorothy Turner 862 2021, and give her your name, address and phone number so that you can be informed when the group is about to commence.

COUNCIL NEWS

KEW TRAFFIC SCHOOL

Since the re-opening of the Kew Traffic School in October last year, many people have asked for the School to be open on weekends, particularly on Sundays, for informal activities.

The Council is presently contacting local clubs and organisations in the municipality to provide the necessary supervision on a roster basis; however, we would like to hear from parents who would be interested in assisting in this way.

Supervision would basically involve opening the School, activating the traffic signals, removing equipment, bicycles, etc. from the storage area, generally supervising activities and locking the gates at the conclusion of the day.

ELDERLY PERSONS HOSTEL

Kew Council recently received confirmation from the Department of Social Security that funds will be made available to develop a hostel for elderly people.

A thirty-bed hostel will be developed as an extension of the exisiting Elder Citizens Club, providing individual accommodation with ensuite bathroom. Points for television and telephone and a Nurse Call System are to be installed in each room which will be carpeted and provided with basic furniture. Provision can be made for married couples to share inter-connecting suites.

A small dining-room adjacent to the lounge will be provided for meals not taken at the Club rooms. The hostel will also have a resident supervisor.

The hostel will accommodate women aged 60 years and over and men aged 65 years and over; however, in the case of a married couple, it will be necessary only for one partner to have reached qualifying age.

Funds will be made available for construction from the 1981/82 Federal Budget. Any enquiries can be made to Mr. Jim Fyfe, Social Development Co-Ordinator at the Kew Council Offices.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS Are you Eligible to Vote?

Under the provisions of the Local Government Act, the next annual election of Councillors will be held on Saturday, 9th August, 1980.

Complete details of the 1980 elections will appear in the August edition of Kews lews; however, ratepayers and residents should at this time ensure that they are recorded on the voters roll.

A draft copy of the list will be open for inspection from 21-27 June to enable you to request an alteration before the rolls are finalised. Full details of the places where the lists may be inspected and the manner in which a claim or objec 1 may be lodged will be published in the local papers on 11th June.

All persons who have attained the age of 18 years as at 20th May, 1980, who own or occupy rateable property, are entitled to be enrolled.

A recent amendment to the Local Government Act also provides that a husband and wife shall be deemed to be in joint occupation of their matrimonial home, and the spouse of a husband or wife can therefore have their names included on the roll. NOMINATIONS FOR COUNCIL

The City is divided into five Wards, each Ward being represented by three Councillors, one of whom completes a three year term in August of each year. Those Councillors whose terms expire this year are:—

Central Ward: Cr. Robert Pritchard
College Ward: Cr. Phyllis Hore
North Ward: Cr. Jack Gervasoni
Prospect Ward: Cr. Jack Ryan
Studley Park Ward: Cr. Walter Haldun

Those Councillors are eligible to seek re-election and any resident whose name appears on the Rolls is also able to stand for election. Each nomination must be signed by ten other residents whose names appear on the Rolls and must be lodged with a \$50 deposit with the City Manager prior to 4 p.m. on 17th July, 1980.

APPOINTMENT OF TRAFFIC ENGINEERING CONSULTANT

The volume of traffic passing through Kew has been of long standing concern to Council. While construction of the Eastern Freeway has resulted in reduced volumes on some streets, some problem areas remain.

Traffic flows are also expected to continue to increase in the foreseeable future, although the rate of growth will probably be slowed by the effects of increasing fuel costs.

The Council considers that the satisfactory resolution of both existing and likely future traffic problems can only be achieved if undertaken in conformity with an overall traffic management strategy that is accepted by the community.

To this end, the Council has appointed the specialist firm of D.T. Grogan and Associates to study the existing traffic situation and to propose to the Council a traffic management strategy for the City as a whole. This strategy will define the desirable function for all roads in the City and enable further more detailed investigation to be undertaken in areas when streets are performing functions incompatible with the overall strategy.

Public comment will be invited prior to any action being taken to implement the strategy.
