FOR SALE 'BOROONDARA-PLACE OF SHADE'

The 31 acres of land on which the Kew Cemetary stands was called Boroondara by the aboriginal tribe in the area, meaning 'a place of shade', signifying the large red gums and wattle tree groves which originally grew there.

There are many interesting pioneer graves in Kew Cemetery and some outstanding memorial tombs such as the angel sculpture of the Springthorpe Memorial and the Egyptian temple design of the David Syme Memorial, both of which are classified by the National Trust.

There is the grave of Louis Buvelot, the artist, whose colonial landscapes of Victorian scenery tinged in sunset glow or the delicate tints of early morning can be seen in the National Gallery; there is the grave of the Georgina McCrae, beautiful famous for her diary reflecting the social life of the colony after her arrival in the Port Phillip District in 1841; there are the graves of prominent pioneers, including the Henty family, Victoria's first permanent settlers, who lived in mansion houses in Kew at one time, which are now part of the school buildings at Ruyton Girls' School and Trinity Grammar School.

Two of our members, our secretary Joy Stewart, the artist, and Mrs. Juanita Green have compiled a history of the Cemetary, beautifully illustrated with pen drawings, which is available for sale at \$1.50 per copy. It also contains a very comprehensive map showing where the graves can be located.

This attractive booklet would make an interesting Christmas present for the historically minded and can be purchased by writing to Kew Historical Society C/o Box 175, Post Office, Kew, or by calling at The Copy Shop in Walpole Street on a Friday between 10.30 a.m. and 2 p.m.

KEW JUNCTION DEVELOPMENT PLANNING

BACKGROUND

In August 1978, the Kew Junction Community Consultative Committee (consisting of representatives from the Council, Chamber of Commerce and the general public), was established to assess public response to suggestions for improving and re-vitalising the Kew Junction Business Centreparticularly its retail services to the community.

The Council later asked the Committee to examine development planning options

aimed to:

- Improve the way the Centre operates (particularly pedestrian and vehicular access and links to various parts of it);
- Improve the level of services and range of goods provided;
- Provide the facilities needed ed by the community (especially those dependant on the Centre);
- Build on and more fully use existing facilities and investment;
- Develop and improve the Centre without encroachment into adjoining residential areas.

On 30th. September 1980, the Council adopted the Consultative Committee's report and recommendations as Interim Development policy — i.e. informal guidelines for the control of development in the Centre to preserve existing opportunities for improvement and to promote and achieve desirable improvement, pending:

- Immediate public discussion of the Committee's conclusions and recommended development plans;
- The completion of traffic studies (in conjunction with the Road Safety & Traffic Authority RoSTA) to assess the impact of the recommended plans and proposals;
- The finalisation (by the Council) and the approval (by State Authorities) of STATUTORY PLANN-ING SCHEME for the Centre.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PROGRAMME

Before any proposed statutory planning scheme is approved, it must undergo a process of public scrutiny. Plans and ordinance controls are exhibited to give the public an opportunity to make submissions either supporting or opposing the proposals or suggesting alternatives. This process does not occur, however, until plans are finalised for approval by State Authorities.

The Council believes, however, that opportunity for public discussion ought to take place before a plan is finalised. (The plans and proposals now recommended by the Consultative Committee have been influenced by an earlier participation programme.)

Therefore, during November and December 1980, the Council proposed to:-

- Mount an exhibition of the Consultative Committee's proposals in the Municipal Offices (which are open to 8.00 p.m. on Tuesdays), from 24/11/80 to 19/12/80.
- Make available a number of copies of the Consultative Committee's proposal in the Library for reference or for loan from 3/11/80.
- Provide copies of a simplified version of the Consultative Committee's report (from 24/11/80) to members of the public upon request to the Town Planning Department.

Interested members of the public will therefore have every opportunity to inform themselves of details of the proposals.

Comments or submissions on the proposals or other suggestions for improvement of the Kew Junction Centre should be forwarded to the City Manager or Town Planner, P.O. Box 42, Kew, 3101 by 16/1/81, or placed in ballot boxes to be located in the Shopping Centre (Copy Shop), Kew Library, or City Offices foyer. Submissions will be considered by the Council (together with results of traffic studies and comments from other Authorities) as it works towards finalisation of a statutory planning scheme proposal.
