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#### FESTIVAL ISSUE

At 11.30 a.m. on the 21st. March the parade begins and with it eight days of festivities in our fair city in which thousands of citizens will be included one way or another.

How can you share? How can you be in it? All you really need do is look up the programme and go somewhere. Would you like to tour our stately old homes of Kew and perhaps have tea in one of their gardens . . . Go to a philharmonic concert or hear a magnificent mandolin ensemble playing the beautiful music of Handel and Mozart. You might like to play bridge or scrabble or try your hand at firing an arrow with one of those long graceful bows. On Saturday you could watch the Greek Dancers on the Portico at the Civic Centre while the children try their hands at the pavement art. But then the children would be fascinated by the magician and he is on just after the Ruyton Junior Choir. Have you heard the Madrigal singers? They are magnificent and they are on at 3.15. Look up the paper and come along. Join in the fun of the boat races on Cotham Road. Put together your own crew and you might win the Henley on Cotham Regatta and the children would love to see the Soap Box Derby. Give them a ride in the Stage Coach or encourage them with the project competition being run through the primary schools and one of them might become the Prince or Princess of Kew for the duration of the Festival. Your child can make a kite, watch the skateboard demonstration, be fascinated by the Dog Obedience School, spellbound by the Martial Arts or lost to the world among the exquisite dolls of the Doll Display. Have you ever heard of the Polygot Puppets? Don't miss them. They are on at 2.30 in the Alexandra Gardens and you will surely have heard by now of the Colonial Art and Craft Village to be set up in the Gardens.

Having come to see the parade and Paul Cronin open the festivities you can have lunch in the park as a bar-be-que lunch and other food and refreshments will be available. Watch out for Philip Brady with his roving microphone or you could become part of the official Festival Film. The film, by the way, will be available to interested parties from the Municipal Library.



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Why have a Festival and who is behind it you might well ask. The Festival is for you and behind it are hundreds of people helping other people and gaining enjoyment and satisfaction as they do so. The Scouts alone will involve approximately 150 members and supporting them will be some 150 leaders, parents and others. The Foster Parents will involve people of twenty nationalities in the cast of over 100 people in their Multicultural concert. schools, kindergartens, churches, service groups and the many, many clubs are providing hundreds of other contributors. The City Manager and his staff readily provide their indispensable support. The Mayor and each Councillor enthusiastically gives his or her patronage and full support. At the very apex of this inverted pyramid of people is the small Festival Committee. It is truly a people helping situation and it involves you. All that is asked of you is to come along and share in some activity that takes your fancy.

A reconstructed Colonial Tent Town in the Alexandra Gardens will be a special event on the opening day of the 1981 Kew Festival.

#### THE **ALEXANDRA** GARDENS

The Alexandra Gardens form an oasis of green in busy Cotham Road. At Christmastime the gardens flicker with candles for the Carols by Candlelight Service first inaugurated by the Inter-Church Council of Kew in 1966. During March 1981 the gardens will be a central meeting place for the Kew Festival.

In 1905 the land in Cotham Road was purchased from Mrs. King for two thousand five hundred pounds, and the site was named after Queen Alexandra. On April 8th. 1908 the gardens were officially opened to the public by His Excellency the Gover-nor, Sir Reginald Talbot. They contain many fine botanical specimens including an impressive Himalayan Pine, and in the spring the gardens are decorated with the claret and white petals of the ornamental magnolias. The gold fish pond and bridge is also a feature of the garden. At the western entrance there is an ornate Victorian drinking fountain carved in white marble, which was erected to celebrate Queen Victoria's Jubilee in 1887.

In times gone by the gardens were more frequented than they are today. Young girls and boys used to meet there after Sunday School classes to see their friends, and many residents promenaded in the gardens on a fine Sunday afternoon. In 1911 Moon-light Concerts were held, when the City Band played in the Rotunda (now demolished). The 1960 Cen-tenary Celebrations for the citizens of Kew were held in the specially tended gardens, a colourful and spectacular scene. To mark the occasion, the Mayor of Kew, Councillor Dickenson O.B.E., the founder and former president of our Kew Historical Society, planted a blue cedar pine tree adjacent to the City Hall. The Alexandra Gardens have remained a focal point for the people in Kew.

## ENGLISH CLASSES for MIGRANT WOMEN

Baby Health Centre, Cnr. Denmark & Wellington Streets



The class has been running at the Health Centre for six years, and is held on Mondays (except School Holidays) from 9.45 — 11.45 a.m. commencing Monday 16th. February. The lessons are free, and are sponsored by the Adult Migrant Education Branch, who provide the text books. It is one of a number of similar classes held throughout the suburbs.

The class caters for a particular group, women who for many reasons have not had the opportunity to learn English elsewhere. The emphasis is on the needs of this group, and topics requested by the students include a visit to the doctor, filling in forms, answering the telephone, notes from school, and even writing out school lunch orders, as well as the normal course.

The lessons are quite informal, and the students learn by the 'Situational Method', in which the teacher creates a situation, then teaches the language appropriate to that situation. This allows students of many nationalities to learn together, and the class last year included Greek, Italian, Chinese,

Japanese, Vietnamese, Armenian and Indian students. The ages of the students varies from the early twenties to the seventies. The emphasis is on usable conversational English.

The fact that the class is held at the Health Centre is a great advantage as the women are confident about going to a familiar and reputable place.

Many migrant women are very lonely, and because of language difficulties, lack the confidence to become involved in kindergarten, school or other activities. Their children often suffer because notes sent home from school, party invitations, etc. are not understood and therefore ignored. The classes themselves also offer the chance of forming new friendships.

During the six years the class has been running, approximately seventy students have attended, many of whom have now gained enough confidence to find jobs.
