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CHORAL FESTIVAL SERVICE 1981

On the 4th June, at 8.00 p.m., there will be a Kew and East Kew Inter-Church and Church Affiliated Schools Choral Festival Service which will be held at Holy Trinity Church (Cnr. High & Pakington Streets). This service is being held under the patronage of the Kew Clergy Fraternal and "Music 81" (a special project of the Ministry of the Arts which aims to promote music in Victoria).

The object of the service is to mark the Victorian Council of Churches' Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Choirs, together with some instrumentalists from churches and church affiliated schools in the Kew area have combined to form a mass choir (of over one hundred voices) for the occasion.

The conductor of the mass choir and instrumentalists will be Dr. Malcolm John (Director of Music at Geelong Church of England Grammar School and the organist will be Mr. Mark Joyner (a Teacher of Music at Essendon and Penleigh

Grammar School as well as Organist and Choirmaster of Holy Trinity, Kew).

The guest preacher will be His Grace, The Most Reverend Sir Frank Woods, formerly Anglican Archbishop of Melbourne, Metropolitan of Victoria and Primate of Australia.

This is the first time such an Ecumenical Choral Festival Service has been organized for the whole of the Kew area and it promises to be most exciting. MOUSE

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The "Mouse House" as it was known locally, can be found at 104 Peel Street, Kew. Although it stands right on the pavement, with no garden at all, it appears not of the scene, but derives its appearance straight from the realms of faerie. It looks like the work of a "do-it-yourself" leprechaun. No well-known architect planned the diminutive second-storey iron lace balcony or the round tower with a French Gothic peaked roof. It could be the tower of Rapunzel. There is a similar diminutive abode in Malmsbury Street, also with a peak-roofed tower, this time on a single storey house, but it certainly does not look as old as the Mouse House, which is constructed of old handmade bricks and covered with stucco, and backed with a one-storey dwelling of weatherboards.

There was a demolition order for eight years on this property because of its position right on the footpath, but Mr. Mitchell, an Architect, believed it to be worthy of restoration and accordingly approached Kew Historical Society and the National Trust.

An early owner at the turn of the century was Mr. S. Wills, a prominent Collins Street Dentist of early Melbourne. Later the two front rooms facing the street were let as a grocery store. It is thought that the house is well over 100 years old, possibly dating from the 1860's or early 1870's, but so far no research has shown any dating. It is known that handmade clay bricks were made in the 1850's on the premises of a pioneer family, the Dannock family, whose property extended between Cobden and Denby Streets, and it is possible that some of these bricks were used in the construction of the Mouse House.

The end of the story is a happy one. The demolition order by the Council has been revoked, and this unique old house is being restored. From the bay windows of the front room, which give an open panorama of the green Yarra Valley and blue hills in the distance, the new owners will be able to enjoy the scenery from one of the very early and most unusual homes of Kew.

JULTICULTUR

AFTER FIFTY YEARS in East Kew, the Baptist Church seems to have become the centre of interest for several different ethnic groups.

Rev. Stan Simmons says, "We have a fine Chinese lady who regularly assists as organist, our Church Secretary is an Indian who once was an English University lecturer and we have eight Indians in membership or who attend regularly, along with their several children in the Sunday School. Recently a Japanese Christian lady has become part of this fine fellowship."

"This seems fitting," Mr. Simmons said, "since the church supports ten missionaries in Nepal, Thailand, Africa, Central Australia, as well as work among Melbourne's ethnic people and in the Nurses Christian Fellowship."

At present, there are five young people - formerly teachers, who are studying for diplomas and degrees at the Bible College of Victoria. "These young people" said Mr.

Simmons, "have either the 'fulltime' ministry in mind or missionary work."

An All-Indian Service will be conducted on Sunday 7th June at 10.30 a.m. by Rev. Conrad Halyburton who was ordained in India. He will be assisted in the service by other Indians and with special musical items presented by his own family.

Mr. Simmons mentions that a similar service was presented last year when many Indian friends came from other suburbs to share in this unique service.

After the service on the 7th June, everyone is invited to enjoy an Indian Luncheon. "That" says Mr. Simmons, "is one of the most popular events in the church year!"

A highlight of this service will be the reception of eight new members. "The 'right hand of fellowship' will be given by our Indian Secretary, Mr. Bill Baker and among the eight new members, three will be Indians."

VICTORIA WELCOME GROUP

The Victoria Welcome Group is a volunteer service which plays an important role in the settlement of newly arrived migrants to Victoria.

Volunteers

- Visit newly arrived migrants who live in their area.
- Welcome new settlers to Victoria.
- Inform the migrants of the local and community services which are available.
- Answer questions on various topics of interest to the newly arrived migrant.

It can be a confusing time for new settlers in the beginning.

"Where do I take my baby when she's sick?"

"How do I find an interpreter and where can I learn more English?"

"What does a Community Advice Bureau do?"

"Do I have to enrol my children at school this year or next?"

"Can I still drive with my International Driver's Licence?"

"Where do I go to get help?"
Volunteers of the Victoria Welcome Group are trained to give this type of information to new settlers.

Training courses are held before volunteers begin visiting.

The Victoria Welcome Group is a community service operating at a local level. Volunteers visit only within their own municipality.

The Victoria Welcome Group has volunteers throughout Victoria – in suburbs and country areas.

The major aim of the Victoria Welcome Group is to ensure the smooth settlement of the migrants in their new environment.

Volunteers provide a vital community service for the State of Victoria.

The Victoria Welcome Group is sponsored by the Victorian Ministry of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs.

MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

The Minister of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs said that the Victoria Welcome Group was a good example of private endeavour in the public interest.

"These volunteers provide an invaluable service to newly arrived migrants", Mr. Kennett said.

"At a local level the Victoria Welcome Group assists these migrants at a time when they are most in need. Questions on available services and local resources are able to be answered when the information is of most value, that is soon after arrival."
