A country friend, helping me garden, said, 'I've never seen such soil. just like sea sand.'

My friend was right. The geological map shows sand and gravel from river or sea shore, where a very ancient ancestor of the Yarra once met the sea, in the higher parts of Kew.

In time the land rose; the surface of the earth is never at rest; and the river cut deep into the sands which cap our hills, and that part of Hawthorn near St. James' Park. A bank of pebbles at the Wood Street end of the park shows river or sea shore in far off times.

Some day weather will strip all the sand from our hills, leaving the ancient Silurian rock, hundreds of millions years old, exposed as it is in the slopes going down to the Yarra in the north part of Kew.

The ancient Yarra cut itself a broad valley, and then, a mere instant in time, less than 60,000,000 years ago, volcanoes to the north and northwest of us erupted, and filled part of this valley with lava. What a hissing and steaming there must have been as the Yarra met lava pouring down the old valleys of the Darebin and Merri creeks.

The river ran along the eastern edge of this lava flow, hard up against the heights of Kew, Hawthorn and Toorak, as far as Melbourne city. Falls used to mark the furthest point, near Queen Street, they were blasted

away to allow boats to go up the Yarra. Dight's Falls marks the end of a further flow.

No one can say now exactly where the volcanoes that invaded the Yarra were, there is basalt right across the western suburbs, and some small volcanoes can be recognised NW of Melbourne, like Mount Fraser.

Kew's golf courses are in a part of the river valley that was above the lava flow.

The hilliness of Kew ensured that it remained a residential suburb. In the days when hills were a problem for horse drawn vehicles, industry looked for level ground to build on.

Not many people in Kew have a river view today. But if you live in the high parts of Kew you can be sure you are situated on river or sea shore of over 60,000,000 years ago, and it doesn't add anything to the rates.

One thing more. I was told by a man of 85, who worked for the S.E.C. when power was being put on in the area south of FitzWilliam St., that the holes they dug filled up with water. In the old says, last century that is, there were springs on the slope down to Barkers Road. Rain falling on the porous sandy hill top seeped down to the hard Silurian, and formed a reservoir for these springs, which haven't quite disappeared yet, but bubble up in lanes, in spite of drainage, in the winter.

NATIVE PIAI GROU

He will give a slide presentation and discussion of plants suitable for Kew, Hawthorn, and Camberwell gardens and will also comment on plants indigenous to this locality.
