
HISTORIC BOOKLETS

Every second Friday morning from 10.30 a.m. till 2 p.m., on the second and fourth Friday of each month, Kew Historical Society have an open invitation for the public to drop into the sittingroom at The Copy Shop, 3 Walpole Street, Kew, to discuss any historic queries about our interesting district (Phone number 861 6281).

There is literature for sale on the history of our city - "Touring Round Kew" - a car tour of historic buildings and sites full of information about pioneer families and historic homes - priced at \$2 a copy; and "The Artists of Kew" - priced \$2.50, with a cover sketch of historic "Swinton", home of the artistic Colquohoun family. This book lists biographies, art styles and artistic influences of all the artists who have resided in Kew from Colonial times to the present day.

There are also several copies left of the 1875 map of Kew priced at \$8.

These booklets will be of interest to students studying the history of Kew and anyone else who is concerned about our historic heritage.

KEW'S RAILWAY

Who remembers when Kew had trains? Or even a railway station?

It was a case of too little, and too late for Kew's railway. The competition of the trams and the poor situation of the station proved too much for the short branch line, and services were gradually scaled down till the line had to close.

The station was demolished in 1959 and the land on which it stood is now occupied by the Country Roads Board building. The line itself is today the C.R.B. private road, which emerges opposite the California Motel, which is on the site of the Barker Station.

I remember driving past Kew Station in the war years or a little later and seeing the platforms beflagged with washing. Emergency housing, said someone. "Squatters", said another. I never found out the facts of the case. And by the time I came to live in Kew the station had gone.

Proposals were first made for a railway to Kew in the 1860's, surveys were made for a more easterly line to link up with the Outer Circle. Costs defeated the project, as deep cuttings would have been needed. Kew station was never, as some people claim, linked with the Outer Circle, which was planned to run much further north, then south to East Camberwell.

In 1886 the Suburban Railway Company bought a strip of land from Zavier for \$5,000 and the line, built on this land, opened in late 1887.

Except in peak hours, the train ran only to Hawthorn, where passengers must change, and as the line lost passengers to the trams, the Railways replaced the train by a bus to Hawthorn before the final closure of the line. Many were the complaints about just missed connections, and one passenger wrote a Kew version of the Ramsbottom poem, which included the lines

'.... Father got real excited I'm dahnright disgusted, said he You can keep ruddy trains into

Melbourne

It's a tram to the city for me.'

The unfortunate 'Mickey Mouse' railway, as it was latterly called, seemed to have anticipated the experience of many country rail users in our own day.

However, when it first opened, it must have seemed like real progress for Kew. I like to think of Bowler-hatted gentlemen, and long-skirted ladies, alighting near their homes at Kew Station, taking a cab if the distance was great, or the weather inclement, and feeling themselves citizens of modern times, of the great Railway Age.
