# KEW GARDEN CLUB


Many gardeners find themselves particularly drawn to small plants and ground covers with which they can create a landscape in a restricted area.

Waiting to cross Cotham Road while home-coming traffic made illegal third lines and trams dammed back impatient motorists, I thought of that same road in the sixties of last century.

Herds of bullocks were driven down it from the rich grazing lands further out, on their way to the Melbourne markets, having been perhaps rested overnight in paddocks where 'Tarring' was later built. Flocks of sheep travelled that same road to market, and later huge vats and casks of wine were carried in wagons drawn by bullock teams, from vineyards in the Lilydale hills.

In the late sixties Diggers making for the Wood's Point gold field passed through Kew with packhorses laden with gear, some made their way on foot with minimum equipment on their backs. What they could not carry they could buy, at a price,

on the field, for wagons, drawn by up to a dozen horses, took there a varied assortment of merchandise, back-loading split palings cut from the magnificent mountain ash of the ranges.

In 1864 a three horse coach ran from Kew to Lilydale, as the road improved it ran twice daily. There was for a time a frightful patch in Whitehorse Road, nicknamed the 'Bay of Biscay' because of its dangers, it lay between Balwyn and Union Roads. High Street had its horror spot earlier, tales were told of bullock wagons stuck there for two days in the mud.

Traffic of lime from Lilydale began in the seventies, soon four horse wagons loaded with sacks of lime reached Melbourne every day.

We see Kew's problem, that of being a major artery to serve a vast area beyond, is not therefore a new one. In earlier and slower days there is no doubt that passers-through brought considerable trade to its shop and inn keepers, and goods were sent from Kew to customers further out. Now pollution and congestion is almost our sole gift from the huge volume of motor traffic that goes through.

The advent of the railway decreased the amount of heavy traffic through Kew, a trend reversed this century, but while there were orchards in Doncaster, and market gardens nearby, wheels rumbled through Kew at night taking produce to market. Indeed it is only lately that the clop of hoofs has ceased to be heard, the milkman and his horse the last of our street traders, victims of refrigeration and packaged milk.

Omnibuses carried Kewites citywards from as early as 1856, and if you think public transport costs too much take note that the fare at first was 2/6 each way. Obviously the

NATIVE PLANT GROUP working man walked, or more probably, lived near his work, as transport at that price would swallow a week's wages. It was many years before the fare fell to sixpence.

There were numerous cabs on the road – remember those shown waiting at the station, these were often shared.

From the eighties the bicycle became a common means of transport after the invention of the 'safety' bicycle. The earliest bike riders, on boneshakers or the more easily pedalled tall 'Spider', were often abused for riding on the footpath, which they did not so much for safety, as for a smooth path. The opposite is true of our young path pedallers today.

The spider, or as it was later nick-named, the penny-farthing, was a sporting machine, and not ridden by ladies, but when the safety bicycle arrived men, women and children took to the wheel.

A shop opposite the Kew P. O. built and sold the 'Kew Flyer' which was not, however, one of the fifty top brands. Cycle clubs at weekends pedalled off for picnics, or to race, far beyond the tram tracks, delivery boys peddled goods on tricycles, many people rode to work. The horseman had virtually disappeared in the city.

The hey-day of the bicycle was barely fifty years, on its heels, or wheels rather, came the inexpensive automobiles, and we are here into the streets of living memory.

Will we see a serious return to the bicycle – not an all weather form of transport? We are a long way from the days when it was considered that a man with a red flag should precede powered vehicles – who knows what next will appear in the streets of Kew, when even prams continue to evolve new forms.

Is your leucoxylon listless or your correa causing concern? Maybe you've heard of neither but are worried about the army of grubs gobbling up the gum leaves in your garden. This question and others surrounding the subject of Diseases and Insect Pests of Native Plants will be discussed at 8 p.m. on Wednesday 25th. August at the home of Jack Lyons, 8 Barnard Grove, Kew.
