Councillor J. Tutt

James Tutt graduated as a Civil Engineer from the Caulfield Institute of Technology. Before this he received an Education Department – Victoria scholarship which required him to complete the C.I.T. course then work for two years in industry before studying one year at the Technical College of Victoria. This work experience was with the Port of Melbourne Authority.

After qualifying as a Technical Instructor he taught at several metropolitan technical schools before becoming an engineer with the Ports and Harbours Division of the Public Works Department.

During this period his involvement and interest in education of managers (engineering) emerged, and after three years with the Public Works Department he joined the Australian Institute of Management – Victoria. For some eight years he developed and organised management education and training programmes over a wide range of areas including finance, marketing, production and personnel.

To further his knowledge and expertise in manpower development he applied for and was awarded a Federal Government scholarship of one year's duration for completion of the National Training Council's course for Manpower Development Executives. He then became Training and Education Manager at the Melbourne Chamber of Commerce.

Councillor R. Saunders

The new Councillor for Studley Park Ward, Robin Saunders, has lived in the ward for 14 years. He and his wife Kate have three daughters, aged 4, 2 and 9 months. The eldest, Anne, attends Stawell Street Kindergarten. Robin is a Civil Engineer, and has worked for engineering contractors and consultants in Australia and overseas. He is now working with the Country Roads Board, and has just completed an eighteeen month secondment to the Department of the Premier as a policy analyst. His re-creational activites include squash, carpentry and the gradual renovation of his home.

"A number of planning issues are confronting Kew residents, issues which will require careful management" says Councillor Saunders. They include:

- * the Kew Junction planning proposals
- * the MMBW's plans for higher density living in inner suburbs
- * the fomulation of a Local Development Scheme
- the new Victorian Government's policy for giving Councils more responsibility
- * the proposed 220 kV SEC transmission line across Studley Park
- * the next stage of the Kew "Forward Plan".

Referring to discussions with residents during his election campaign, he said: "Several themes were repeatedly mentioned –

- concern at the intrusion and speed of traffic in residential streets
- confusion about who is eligible to vote in Council elections
- a need for better communication about the problems and work of Council."

I hope to be able to contribute to the solution of these problems during my term as a Councillor.

He is a member of the Institution of Engineers – Australia, the Australian Institute of Management and the Australian Institute of Training and Development.

His particular interests are the identification of training and education needs for commerce and industry and the development of programmes and courses to suit.

CAREGIVERS NEEDED!

Family Day Care is a co-ordinated child care scheme in Kew and Hawthorn where babies and young children are cared for individually or in small groups, in the homes of selected caregivers. Being a caregiver may be a way for you to earn a little extra money while providing a happy, warm and homely environment for children in need of care for all or part of the day.

Funds are limited. Projects eligible for funding by other State Government Departments will not be considered.

HIGHBURY GROVE KEW UNITING CHURCH History of Church


Barnard's History states that the first Christian service in Kew took place at the home of Mr. J. V. Morgan, under the auspices of the Primitive Methodist Church. A wooden building was erected in 1857 and afternoon services were held. Owing to people leaving the district the Society lapsed.

In 1880 a few members of the Wesleyan Methodist connection met to worship in Mr. Eyre's home, and a link was established with Hawthorn, the minister there being Dr. W. H. Fitchett who shortly afterwards became founder and president of Methodist Ladies College.

The Richmond circuit invited Rev. John Harcourt, a retired minister, to care for the little church and services were transferred to the Town Hall in Walpole Street. A class meeting was established, a Sunday School started, and land was purchased in Highbury Grove at a cost of 350 pounds. In October 1882 the foundation stone of the church was laid, and the centenary of this event will shortly be celebrated.

At first only part of the nave was built, but in 1889 the transcepts, tower, and spire were added, and after the appointment of Rev. P. R. Usher, the parsonage was erected. Even before this the Sunday School hall had been built, the stone having been laid by Mrs. Henry Berry of "Otira", the Berry family being generous supporters. In 1911 the two vestries were added and the pipe organ installed. Twenty years ago the church was remodelled and a narthex provided.

Music has always been a feature of the worship at Highbury Grove. Also provision has been made for young people, commencing with a Mutual Improvement Society, and continuing today with two fine tennis courts.



Members of the congregation have been active in community service and have given strong support to the missionary causes.

Ten years ago an approach was made to the Presbyterian and Congregational churches, resulting in the formation of the Combining Church in Kew. This meant that Church Union Day was celebrated by an already integrated congregation and much appreciation is due to Rev. W. Hargreaves and his wife for the gracious way in which they have fostered the family spirit amongst their people.

The Congregational and Presbyterian churches celebrated centenaries some years ago, and all sections of the Uniting Church are gladly cooperating in a service of thanksgiving for one hundred years of Christian witness in this place. The preacher will be the Moderator, Rev. G. L. Turner, who has had a long association with Highbury Grove, beginning when as an "Otira" student he was recommended as a candidate for the ministry by the Kew Quarterly Meeting.

The service at 2.30 p.m. on Sunday September 26th.. will be followed by afternoon tea, and all interested people will be welcome, especially former worshippers of the Presbyterian, Congregational and Methodist churches. On the following Saturday evening there will be a concert featuring pipe organ, the Tudor Choristers, and the Arnold Trio of cello, clarinet and piano. Tickets cost \$5, with concession at \$2.50, and proceeds will be donated to the Bourke Presbytery appeal for the manse at East Doncaster.

On the 2nd. October at 8 p.m., a concert will be held in the Kew Uniting Church, 23 Highbury Grove, Kew.

The concert will be presented by the "Tudor Choristers" conducted by Mr. David Carolane, and the "Arnold Trio" – cello, Miss Audrey Turner; clarinet, Mr. Len Reiper; and piano, Mrs. Nora Bremner.

The soloists will be Mr. Reiper, with Mr. Ken Falconer at the organ.

The proceeds are in aid of the East Doncaster Parish Development Fund. Tickets may be obtained from Mr. Reg. George, Flat 1, 92 Princess Street, Kew 3101 – or by telephoning 861 9193.
