The Evening Mission Group will meet at 8.00 p.m. on Wednesday 25th. May. Guest Speaker – Matron Coombes, Bodalla Nursing Home Kew. Readers of the Kewriosity Sheet who read the article about the March Program of the Historical Society, may have wondered about the chosen subject of discussion. What was there to say about a postcard photograph of Kew High Street early this century, that could keep members attentive and interested for an hour or more?

Mr. Lawrie Koelmeyer not only told us a lot about a little known hobby, cartophily, but set us thinking about the light old cards can throw on the past, a society where a 'Disaster' series, showing, for example, railway smashes at Richmond and Beaufort, could be a big seller.

Even today postcards are prominently displayed at every tourist spot, slides have not ousted them, for you can't write, 'Wish you were here,' on a slide. Cards help to raise funds for museums, and art galleries, and in doing so spread not a little knowledge of art and culture.

In the days when newspapers were sparsely illustrated, if at all, 'Picture' post cards, (the first postcards, plain, for sending without an envelope, at a cheap rate, were a Post Office idea) offered a visual impression of many events and personalities, which today we would expect to see reproduced everywhere by the media.

Series like the 'Disasters' were a facet of the trade, historical, sporting and political events, the Anzacs going into action, an early visit from the American Fleet, arrival of the Royals of the day, all these went on to postcards. The faces of Prime Ministers, actresses, beauties, sportsmen, bright and vulgar comic cards, local scenes, plus reproductions of works of art, 'fancy cards, tinselled, embroidered, printed on satin', there was endless variety.



KEW Garden Club

The telephone probably has reduced the number of postcards sent as mini-letters, but tourism serves today to keep them in favor, it may very well be that the actual numbers are not lessening, though their subjects are more exotic. No one would rush to buy a picture of Kew High Street today, but once you could buy a series of forty-two photographs of Kew, the Post Office with its tree that stood where the War Memorial is now, the Alexandra Gardens with tiny trees, the Horse Tram that ran in High Street among their number. Only forty of these series are still in existence, Mr. Koelmeyer has sixteen himself. Perhaps hidden in someone's souvenirs the remaining two are to be found.

Old cards, particularly those printed before 1920, have value. One, drawn by Norman Lindsay, is worth \$500, the arrival of the American fleet in 1909 \$50. So, don't consign old cards to the flames.

The Cartophilic Society meets monthly, and holds an auction of cards four times a year. Mr. Richard Berry, Antiques, of Flinders Lane, deals in old cards. But before you rush to sell, make sure that you have an original, and not a reproduction. Reproductions are sold for their historical interest and can be quite fascinating as such, but you are not going to see antique cards on sale cheaply, unless perhaps they turn up at a fete, abandoned by someone not knowing their true worth.

And last, though not least, the painting reproduced in the Kewriosity Sheet, an accurate and pleasing work executed by Mrs. Edmunds, Mr. Koelmeyer's niece, is the first in a series on Melbourne suburbs planned by the artist.
