## KEW IN THAT OTHER DEPRESSION

In the thirties the population of Kew was almost as large as it is today. The number of houses was much smaller, families were larger, and for some of those families life must have been a battle during 'The' Depression. Kew being a 'better' suburb, many must have lived on savings for a while, but a time came when there were so many desperate victims of hard times that the unemployed in Kew called a meeting in Brougham Street and sent a deputation from the meeting to the Council.

No doubt they were more sympathetically received than had been similar deputations to Government in the Depression of the Nineties (Sir Edmund Barton, then Prime Minister, told a deputation that Government could not and should not interfere with the laws of political economy) for not long after, in 1931, the Council engaged itself to find work for citizens under the Unemployment Relief Scheme.

When the depression hit, which it did with unprecedented swiftness, there was no official scheme for aid to the unemployed. Food orders were given at first, and then some relief was given, but at a very low rate, and if more than a certain low figure was already coming into the household - none, so that we have picture, a not uncommon one, of a couple of teenagers supporting a whole family, and those same young people losing their jobs when it was necessary to pay them something approaching an adult wage. Women were then, of course, receiving only two-thirds of the male wage, so that the wife was often the bread-winner.

Relief work was designed to provide employment on works of public value, those scheduled as suitable in Kew were road works, paths, channels, drains, etc., the largest of these being the Yarra Boulevard, which unfortunately could not quite link up with the sections in Richmond and Heidelberg, but is none the less a much appreciated feature of our city. Visitors are taken to see its views, and it continues to give pleasure, that monument to unemployment.

All these works were done with pick and shovel, white collar, blue collar workers were, so the Hon. Wilfred Kent Hughes said, "glad to be earning". I've heard some of those who worked as "Sussos" talk of those times without much gladness, their feeling seems to have been rather one of humiliation, rather that they worked like the pyramid builders for far from sufficient wage.

This was the first time, however, that government had ever assumed responsibility for the unemployed, the rate of unemployment was much higher than today, and the government faced a desperate situation. The work was designed to be 75% labour costed at least, before it would be approved. These costs did not come out of the rates, but out of the pockets of all workers, no matter how small the pay-packet, a portion of it went to Unemployment Relief.

Something was added to the rates, however, for our Council raised special loans to pay for other relief works, and made grants to charitable groups such as the Ladies Benevolent Society to meet the calls for help which their resources could not stretch to cover.

A project mooted which was not approved was the excavation of a tunnel from the Kew Railway Station to join up with the Outer Circle Railway. In view of later developments that was a project wisely discarded.

The principle of public assistance to the unemployed had been established. We are still far from understanding market forces and many other influences, however people are not found dead in our streets from hunger, (the rate in London in 1870 was one hundred per annum).
