

At the National Council held in Adelaide from 11-16th August, hundreds of girls gathered from many parts of Australia. Some of these girls travelled thousands of miles to be present at Council. Many problems facing youth were discussed in open Council, or in small discussion groups.

Two of the biggest problems concerning young girls were how she spends her leisure time and the difficulties involved in her work.

Many girls are working at jobs for which they are not suited, because of inadequate vocational guidance and a shortage of suitable jobs. Many suggestions were made to try to overcome these problems and it was found that the Y.C.W. is not in touch with all girls and there is a great need for the Movement in Nth. Queensland and the rural areas.

About 30 chaplains attended the Council and also Bishop Goody of Bunbury & Bishop Gleeson from Adelaide who showed great interest in Council & what was being done.

There was a friendly spirit among the girls & by the end of Council, many new friendships had been formed and each girl felt that she had learned something by hearing problems which had been discussed by delegates and observers from each State throughout the Council.
