My Dear Leaders:



## CAMPAIGN ON "WORK."

## APRIL-DECEMBER, 1946.

This year all our endeavours are to be directed towards this campaign on "Work." Last year we had a successful Campaign on "The Family," in conjunction with the Y.C.W. Once again we are having a joint campaign with the boys, and may this one be even more successful than the last.

#### GENERAL PLAN.

The Campaign is scheduled to open on the week-ending 6th April, and conclude on the week-ending 21st December. The programme has been drawn up on the assumption that all groups will be meeting weekly, and it is strongly recommended that wherever possible groups should meet weekly. In the few cases where only a fortnightly meeting is held, groups should do every alternate meeting, and do a full enquiry at each meeting. It is important that Groups adhere as closely as possible to the dates suggested throughout the programme. Try to remember that it is a National Campaign, and that unity of action is most desirable.

The campaign is drawn up to provide for 38 meetings. The main sections into which Work has been divided are:—

- A. Proper Outlook on Work.
- B. Honesty at Work.
- C. Morals at Work.
- D. General Conditions.
- E. Assistance to Young Working Girls.

A detachable report form is included in the programme at the conclusion of each of these sections. The co-operation of each Leaders' Group in forwarding completed report forms to National Headquarters promptly is essential for the general success of the Campaign.

General Rallies.

It is suggested to groups that they should hold a Rally as soon as possible after the completion of the Enquiries on each Section of the Campaign. Months in which Rallies would be held according to this suggestion would be April, June, August and November in relation to Sections A to D of the Campaign respectively.

A special rally with Christmas as the central theme could be conducted in December, and the final general rally on the Work Campaign could be produced in January, 1947.

As the N.C.G.M. and Y.C.W. are undertaking the same campaign this year, dioceses and branches should elect joint N.C.G.M.-Y.C.W. General Rally Committees to ensure proper co-ordination between both Movements.

Specific meetings have not been set down for preparation for Rallies. With complete enquiries being done only at every second meeting, it is considered that Groups will have ample time to discuss Rally plans at appropriate alternate meetings. Enquiries.

Groups please note that in accordance with the decision of the National Executive last year, each enquiry in this programme is scheduled to occupy two weeks. Reports will be taken at every meeting, of facts gathered in answer to the SEE part of an Enquiry. A judgement and a decision on action will be made only at every second meeting. The SEE

section of Enquiry No. 1 should be read at the end of the last Leaders' Group meeting in Part 1 of the programme.

It is possible, in some cases, that Groups when reading the SEE part of an Enquiry may consider it unsuitable for their leaders and members. In such cases the Group with the approval of its Chaplain may substitute suitable questions, provided they subsequently advise National Headquarters of any variations made.

If groups have any criticisms of the enquiries set out in the programme, they should advise National Headquarters so that the criticism can be considered in drawing up any future enquiries.

We all know that enquiries are not just "talking" or "discussing." They are our way of digging down to find out WHAT is wrong, WHY it is wrong, HOW we can make it better. . . .

Many of these problems can best be solved when we know that the whole National Movement is with us. Secretaries please send in those periodical report forms to enable National Headquarters to co-ordinate any National action necessary.

An individual and group action is of course essential, too. We must be ambitious to establish as quickly as possible any services our Work Campaign finds necessary.

## Reading and Judgement.

In every enquiry we Leaders are called upon to make Judgement on Facts we have gathered. We should understand the reasons for every Judgement our Group makes.

To assist our thinking and judgement on these matters, it is really essential that we do some good reading around the subject. Suitable books and pamphlets are recommended throughout the programme. Secretaries should see early in the Campaign that all recommended books are obtained in ample time. Group Chaplains may be able to suggest other reading to you.

There is no need to fear that the N.C.G.M. is going to ask you to devote a terrific amount of time to reading. But the fact is there—we must do some Reading.

We can start in easy stages on easy pamphlets. We may be able to fill in some of our idle moments with a book. At any rate, we should give it a try.

# General Members.

The Campaign is for all of them as well as for Leaders. We Leaders find out the problems and plan to overcome them, but we cannot succeed unless the mass of members backs us up. So we must keep them informed regularly of what is doing, and give them every chance to be apostles, too.

How can we do this?

- By getting a Leader to give a short but accurate Report of each Enquiry to members at General Meetings. The report would be on these lines: "We were told that this was an important matter. We looked into it, got the views of a whole lot of people, and they told us such and such. This was clearly a serious problem. . . . this is the Christian attitude towards it, we have to do something. This is what we have drawn up—now, you can help us to carry it out."
- Find the most capable members, and put them in charge of some task. Many who are not Leaders may handle some service or activity splendidly. Through their added responsibilities will come a pride in their Movement, and with that a desire to do more for it.
- By bringing the ideas of the Campaign into Activity Groups, and even into Services wherever possible. Ask each such group to suggest ways in

which they can join and do something; work for a demonstration, run a function, organise some publicity, put on a play, do posters, etc.

• If a Leader has a job to do it is most important, wherever possible, to collect a TEAM of collaborators—not only to lighten the burden, but to make all feel that they have a really important and active role to play. We must do everything to avoid our having a dead mass of passive members who come along to be amused. The spirit and method of the "team" is our most effective weapon here. Let us read the article in the March Leaders' Bulletins for more information on teams in the N.C.G.M. They have vast possibilities.

## GOSPEL DISCUSSIONS.

It has been recommended that the Gospel Discussions for 1946 should follow the Liturgical Cycle as far as possible. This has been attempted, and not only with the more important Feasts, but also with many of the Sundays. To benefit from this, it will be necessary to keep up to time with the Meetings. Some Chaplains have stated that they would prefer to see the discussions consist of a planned unfolding of various aspects of thought best to follow it for the year.

The Discussions were prepared by 15 Priests from 6 Dioceses. Certain differences of method of treatment are evident, and this is all to the good. It is still uncertain as to which is the best way of presenting these Gospel texts to Leaders so that they will gain the greatest benefit from them—practical and helpful, it will give us most useful information for prefew changes as possible were made on the copies sent in.

Several Chaplains recommended the inclusion of a Resolution at the end of each Discussion; a few disagreed. It was decided to include them as an experiment, that can do no harm, and may prove extremely helpful.

The text used is the Australian Edition of the American Revision. This has been done with the express approval of the Episcopal Chairman

#### THE LEADERS' MEETING.

Leaders should meet each week. Priests who have had experience of this work regard this as essential. These meetings will not be mere committee meetings. They have in view the formation of the leaders. In the Gospel Discussion and the Priest's Talk there is given a powerful stimulus to the formation of their spiritual life; through the General Enquiry and reports their apostolic work among their companions is ensured.

- N.B.—It cannot be stressed sufficiently that this order should be strictly adhered to at all Leaders' Meetings. It is essential for the efficient working of the meetings that no more than the time allotted be given to each section of the meeting; even though some work pertaining to that section must be left undone.
- A. 1. CRUCIFIX AND STATUE OF OUR LADY IN PROMINENT POSITION.—The Crucifix: We work under the sign of man's redemption, because we wish that redemption to be shared in by our girl companions; because it is on the help of Him Who hung upon the Cross that everything depends; and because the Crucifix is the standard that must replace hammer and sickle or swastika, or any other raised in defiance of Christ. Statue of Our Lady: Why have the statue of Our Lady, Because our aim as leaders is to become holy. Only if we are holy shall we be successful apostles. But then we shall be holy only in the measure in which we know Christ and are united to Him. And Pius X has said: "We cannot doubt that it is through Mary we approach to the knowledge of Christ." Mary must be at all our meetings, standing at the foot of the Cross to show us Christ.
- A. 2. ROSARY.—The Movement has adopted the recitation of the Rosary because it feels that it is not enough to have Mary presiding over its meetings and teaching its leaders about her Son. It wishes, too, as every grace comes through Mary, to obtain her powerful intercession, which will surely be given in answer to the fervent recital of her favourite prayer.

#### PRAYER OF THE N.C.G.M.

This beautiful prayer—the official prayer of the Movement—was composed by the great Cardinal Newman. It expresses what should be the aim of every leader — to become "another Christ," radiating His love and gentleness and sympathy on all about her, and so winning them, too, as she has been won, to the love and service of Our Lord.

A. 3. GOSPEL DISCUSSION.—Instead of reading other people's views about Christ, we go to the Gospels and see for ourselves what manner of Man Christ really was—what He thought, what He said, how He reacted in this or that set of circumstances. Each reading and discussion of the Gospel should outline more sharply the Figure of Christ—His character, virtues, etc. Gradually, then, we should come to think like Him and act like Him—in a word, to be more Christ-like.

The chapter and verse to be discussed at any meeting should have been set at the previous meeting. Each member should read it, and indeed read it more than once, during the week. One of the group should have been selected to conduct the discussion.

This Leader prepares the Gospel, then contacts the Chaplain, and goes over the questions with him before the Leaders' meeting takes place.

At the actual meeting the Gospel passage will be read aloud before the discussion is begun. It is suggested that the reading be divided one could read the narrative, another the words of Our Lord, a third the words of other characters.

B. 4. SUMMARY OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING will be read by the Secretary. This record will be brief, but orderly and business-like, including all the facts and a detailed list of work, together with the summary of the enquiry.

#### MODEL SUMMARY OF MEETING.

(The following will give Leaders some idea of what is expected of a group Secretary in writing up a summary of the Leaders' meeting.)

Summary of Leaders' Meeting held etc. (place, time and date).

Present: Secretary notes those present and apologies.

Gospel Discussion: A brief summary of the Gospel is given here: e.g., Mary Jones conducted the Gospel Discussion, which was on "The Call of the Apostles." The story of "The Call of the Apostles" made us realise that Christ wants us to follow Him and help Him in His work. Christ is depending upon us to help Him to save the young girls of Australia. Our answer is the same as the Apostles; and we shall fight for Christ and His cause.

Summary of previous meeting was read and approved.

Report on Contacts: Census: Action: Each Leader reported in turn on those whom they were allotted at the previous meeting: e.g., Pat. Smith reported on Betty Robinson, Joan Kelly, Anne Brown. Pat. reported that she contacted Betty and Joan at the local dance, both of whom would be at the next General Meeting. Anne at the moment was adverse to the Movement, but Pat. reported that at present she is building up a good friendship with Anne.

(Each Leader's report is recorded in the same manner.)

All additional information for the census was handed to Helen Burke, who is in charge of the census records.

All Leaders reported on the action carried out by them. This action was planned as a result of the previous enquiry. (Here quote action carried out.)

Appointment of Work: The President, with the aid of the Chaplain, allotted the contacts to be made before the next meeting. (In some cases Leaders are requested to follow up on a contact, and, therefore, are not burdened with new tasks.)

Chaplain's Talk: A few lines outlining the Chaplain's talk are included here.

General Enquiry: The General Enquiry was on "Company Keeping." The report on same is as follows. (Secretaries are urged to study the model report contained in "The Enquiry," written by Rev. C. Mayne, S.J.)

General Business: Any items of general business discussed at meetings are recorded here.

Each Leader gave an individual statement of her duties, after which the final prayers of the meeting were recited and the blessing of the Chaplain received.

B. 5. THE REPORT ON CONTACTS will be given by each of the group in turn. Contact is quite distinct from influence. A person may have to be contacted many times before the Leader's influence begins to work. So the reports on contact will generally be quite a prosaic and ordinary statement: "I met Nancy Jones and Eileen Smith; I just talked of everyday affairs." But the important fact is there—that now Nancy Jones and Eileen Smith are less strangers to that particular Leader. The possibility of influence is less remote.

The report on Census, again, is important. This work is continuous. (See First Meeting.)

The report on Action. This may be either group action or individual. Again, it will be concise, and noted by the Secretary.

- B. 6. FROM ALL THESE REPORTS, THERE MAY BE LEFT SOME WORK to be done, someone to be seen, etc. This will be attended to immediately, and the appointment of work arising from reports made.
- C. 7. PRIEST'S TALKS.—It is strongly advised that, particularly at the beginning of a new year of work, the meetings should include some explanation of the principles of Catholic Action as laid down by the Popes. This is of vital importance, as many girls who have been in the Movement for some time are still ignorant of the very fundamentals. In preparing these talks, Priests are recommended to use Lelotte's work: "Fundamental Principles of Catholic Action" (copies available at National Headquarters, prieed 2/6 each).
- D. 8. THE GENERAL ENQUIRY.
- D. 9. AFPOINTMENT OF WORK arising from Enquiry.
- D. 16. GENERAL BUSINESS.—This should not include the sporting or Section Committee work.
- D. 11. STATEMENT OF DUTIES BY EACH LEADER.—Each Leader makes a statement of the duties to be executed by her before the next Leaders' meeting. These are noted by the group Secretary.
- D. 12. FINAL PRAYERS. There are two closing prayers: The short prayer to Gur Loid, asking for generosity of heart, and courage and strength to do the work of the Apostolate. The other, the Prayer for the Conversion of Australia. The meeting closes with the priest's blessing.

## "CHRIST TRIUMPHS."

St. Matthew XXI (1-9).

## TEXT.

- 1. And when they drew near to Jerusalem, and came to Bethphage, on the Mount of Olives, then Jesus sent two disciples,
- saying to them, "Go into the village opposite you, and immediately you shall find an ass tied, and a colt with her;
- 3. loose them and bring them to me. And if anyone say anything to you, you shall say that the Lord has need of them,
- 4. and immediately he will send them." Now this was done that thereby might be fulfilled what was spoken through the prophet, saying,

5. "Tell the daughter of Sion:

Behold, thy king comes to thee,

Meek and seated upon an ass,

and upon a colt, the foal of

a beast of burden."

So the disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them.
 And they brought the ass and the colt, laid their cloaks on

- 8. them, and made him sit thereon. And most of the crowd spread their cloaks upon the road, while others began to cut branches from the trees, and strewed them on the road.
- 9. And the crowds that went before him, and those that followed, kept crying out, saying,

"Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest!"

Introduction: The scene here describes the events associated with Palm Sunday. After spending the night in Bethania, which is a village to the east of the city, Our Lord takes a by-path to Bethphage, where He gives the instruction about obtaining the ass, thence to Mt. Olivet, and from there into the City. The selection of the ass is significant, as it was "the very animal of old devoted to the service of the Royal House of Israel!"

#### QUESTIONS:

- 1. Did Our Lord expect the people to give Him a royal welcome on this occasion?
- 2. What was their intention? Was it praiseworthy?
- 3. If the Pharisees scowled and the people were fickle in the light of future events, should we try to fill up what is wanting in this triumph?
- 4. How can we renew Christ's real triumph during this coming week?

Resolution: On Good Friday, to do something special for Christ, in reparation for the sins of youth.

The President of Group repeats the "SEE" Section—Leaders give detailed information, which is recorded by Secretary. The "JUDGE" and "ACT" Sections are then proceeded with.

#### JUDGE:

- 1. Should girls regard their job as their career.
- 2. Are some jobs worthy of the title "Vocation."
- Why would it be good for girls to choose jobs such as dressmaking, nursing, etc.

## ACT (Suggested Action):

- 1. Spread these ideas at a General Meeting.
- 2. Arrange for some Mother to speak to our general members on this subject.

Reading Recommended: See Appendix at back of programme.

- D. (9a) Appointment of work arising out of the Enquiry is made and noted.

  9. he began to write on the ground. But hearing this, they
  went away, one by one, beginning with the eldest. And

Introduction: This scene took place in Jerusalem in the last year of Our Lord's life at the Feast of Tabernacles. This feast, commemorating the 40 years wandering in the desert, was kept up by an annual "camping" week in October. Probably this mode of life brought about the temptation into which this poor woman fell.

- 1. Can a girl get very discouraged through serious sexual sin? Does she often enough think it is all up with her as far as God is concerned? Is this true?
- 2. What is the attitude of ordinary Catholics to a boy or girl in trouble? Are they kind and sympathethic; or do they despise them?
- 3. What is Our Lord's answer to these Catholics, as well as to the Pharisees?
- 4. Does Our Lord neglect a girl when she is being tempted? Our Lord wants her to help herself though—How?
- 5. Who has the most courage—the girl who crashes and stays down; or the girl who crashes and struggles to her feet again?

Resolution: At our Masses and Communions, to pray for Purity for ourselves and others.

# "SHEPHERD OF SOULS." St. John X (11-16).

#### TEXT.

- 11. "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down

Place: Jerusalem.

Introduction: The discourse from which the following was taken was given by Our Lord at the conclusion of the Feast of the Tabernacles, referred to previously. It was autumn, and the example which He took would be familiar to the hearers; the Middle East is essentially a land of shepherds. (Cfr. Goodier, Vol. 2, p. 139).

#### QUESTIONS:

- 1. What attribute of Christ does this passage illustrate? Did he prove the sincerity of His words?
- 2. Can N.C.G.M. Leaders be called shepherds in any sense? What are our tasks as such? There are two qualities stressed by the Master, which we must bear in mind. Why?
- 3. Christ proved by sacrificing His Life that He is the Good Shepherd. How can we, Leaders, imitate Him in this?
- 4. What do you think is the full meaning of "Know"? Do we "know" our Parish Members? Do we "know our Leader, Christ?"
- 5. Could we gather more into the Fold? How? Have we any definite person or persons in mind?

## "WILFUL BLINDNESS."

St. Matthew XIII (54-58).

#### TEXT.

- 54. And coming to his own country, he began to teach them in their synagogues, so that they were astonished, and said,
- 55. "Where did he get this wisdom and these miracles? Is not this the carpenter's son? Is not his mother called Mary, and
- 56. his brethren James and Joseph and Simon and Jude? And his sisters, are they not all with us? Then where did he

57. get all this?" And they took offence at him. But Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honour except in

58. his own country, and in his own house." And because of their unbelief, he did not work many miracles there.

Time: The first year of His Public Life.

Place: In or near Nazareth.

Introduction: Here we have an example of that wilful spiritual blindness which is so prevalent to-day. Many who want "a good time" try to justify their failure to live up to Christian standards by specious excuses. Virtue diminishes, and faith grows cold in consequence. The brethren referred to are the sons of Cleophas and his wife, Mary, who was a first cousin of the Blessed Virgin.

#### QUESTIONS:

- Does this part of the Gospel tell us what kind of a life Christ lived prior to His Public Life?
- 2. Why did they refer to His early life? Was their reasoning sincere?
- 3. Are the excuses given for the non-practice of religion usually sincere?

  Are there other causes? What are the real ones?
- 4. What warning must we take for ourselves from this passage?
- 5. Can we make non-Catholics better disposed to belief? Could we foster better dispositions in others so that they may accept God's Grace?

Resolution: We should not be discouraged if we do not meet with 100 per cent, success in our work for Christ.

Here He tells them that He will send the Holy Ghost who will teach them all truth and help them withstand all trials.

- 2. Does this warning apply to the Church to-day?
- 3. What is the reason for such persecution?
- 4. How could the N.C.G.M. help to save the Church from greater persecution? What can you do?
- 5. How did the Apostles re-act to persecutions and trials?
- 6. Is the Paraclete very intimately connected with N.C.G.M. work? With your work? How could you obtain His assistance?

Resolution: To say daily a prayer for courage in our Apostolate.

## "THE PEACE OF CHRIST."

St. John XIV (23-31).

#### TEXT.

- 23. Jesus answered and said to him, "If anyone love me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our abode with him.
- 24. He who does not love me does not keep my words. And the word that you have heard is not mine, but the Father's who sent me.
- 25. "These things I have spoken to you while yet dwelling 26. with you. But the Paraclete, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring to your mind whatever I have said to you.
- 27. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be
- 28. troubled, or be afraid. You have heard me say to you, 'I go away and I am coming to you.' If you loved me, you would indeed rejoice that I am going to the Father, for
- 29. the Father is greater than I. And now I have told you before it comes to pass, that when it has come to pass you
- 30. may believe. I will no longer speak much with you, for the prince of the world is coming, and in me he has nothing.
- 31. But he comes that the world may know that I love the Father, and that I do as the Father has commanded me. Arise, let us go from here.

Introduction: This text is part of Our Lord's beautiful discourse to His Apostles after the Last Supper. It would be well to read for yourself the whole discourse, and to see how Christ's love for the Apostles consoles them and promises them strength in the sufferings they will have to undergo for Him.

## QUESTIONS:

- Doesn't Christ tell us elsewhere (Matt. X, 34) that He came "not to send peace but the sword?"—What, then, is the "peace" of which He speaks here?
- 2. Does this peace exclude suffering and persecution?
- 3. Did the Apostles enjoy the peace of Christ even when they were persecuted and killed for spreading His teaching?
- 4. What part did the Holy Ghost play in giving the Apostles this "peace of Christ?"

- 5. Will we meet with opposition in our work for our Leader as the Apostles did?
- 6. Can we expect the Holy Ghost to help us as He helped the Apostles? How?

Resolution: Each day this week, to say a special prayer to the Holy Ghost for the Church.

St. Luke XV (1-10).

  - 6. it, he lays it upon his shoulders rejoicing. And on coming home he calls together his friends and neighbours, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, because I have found my sheep

- 4. boat. And when he had ceased speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep, and lower your nets for a catch."
- And Simon answered and said to him, "Master, the whole night through we have toiled and have taken nothing; but
- at thy word I will lower the net." And when they had done so, they enclosed a great number of fishes, and their net
- 7. was breaking. And they beckoned to their comrades in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they were sinking.
- 8. But when Simon Peter saw this, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man,

9. O Lord." For he and all who were with him were amazed

 at the catch of fish they had made; and so were also James and John, the sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; hence-

11. forth thou shalt catch men." And when they had brought their boats to land, they left all and followed him.

Introduction: The miracle narrated in the text took place at Bethsaida, on the lake of Genesareth. On account of the huge crowd which was pushing and shoving around Him, Christ got into Simon's boat, told him to draw back from the land a little, and using the boat as a sort of pulpit, preached to the multitude. Afterwards, He commanded Simon to launch out into the deep, and Simon, in spite of an unsuccessful night's fishing, obeyed without question.

- 6. And he bade the crowd recline on the ground. Then taking the seven loaves, he gave thanks, broke them and gave them to his disciples to distribute; and they set them before the
- 7. crowd. And they had a few little fishes; and he blessed 8. them, and ordered them to be distributed. And they ate
- and were satisfied; and they took up what was left of the 9. fragments, seven baskets. Now those who had eaten were
- 9. fragments, seven baskets. Now those who had eaten were about four thousand. And he dismissed them.

He had gone along by the Sea of Galilee and up the mountain side, "and great crowds came to Him bringing with them the dumb, the blind, the lame, the maimed, and many others — and He cured them."



# "GOD SEES OUR HEARTS."

St. Luke XVIII (9-14).

#### TEXT.

- 40. word. But Martha was over-busy about much serving. And she came up and said, "Lord, is it no concern of thine that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her therefore to help me."
- 41. But the Lord answered and said to her, "Martha, Martha,
- 42. thou art anxious and troubled about many things; | and yet only one thing is needful. Mary has chosen the best part, and it shall not be taken away from her."

Introduction: Mary and Martha were sisters of Lazarus, living at Bethany, near the Mount of Olives. Their respectful familiarity indicates this was not their first meeting with Christ. A better reading of v. 42 "one thing is needful" would be "few are needed or only one and Mary hath chosen the good portion" (West Version); or Christ quietly answers Martha, "there is no need of many dishes, few or even one would suffice."

#### QUESTIONS:

- 1. What was Martha doing? Was her work good? Was it pleasing to Christ?
- 2. Do you think Martha—an energetic woman—was intolerant towards her less energetic sister? Do you see here a pitfall for other "energetic" people?

- 38. Jesus therefore, again groaning in himself, came to the tomb. Now it was a cave, and a stone was laid against it.
- 39. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of him who was dead, said to him, "Lord, by this time he is 40. already fetid, for he is dead four days." Jesus said to her,
- "Have I not told thee that if thou believe thou shalt behold
- 41. the glory of God?" They therefore removed the stone. And Jesus, raising his eyes, said, "Father, I give thee thanks42. that thou hast heard me. But I knew that thou always
- 42. that thou hast heard me. But I knew that thou always hearest me; yet because of the people who stand round, I spoke, that they may believe that thou hast sent me."
- 43. When he had said this, he cried out with a loud voice,
- 44. "Lazarus, come forth!" And at once he who had been dead came forth, bound feet and hands with bandages, and his face was tied about with a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."
- 45. Many therefore of the Jews who had come to Mary, and had
- 46. seen what he did, believed in him. But some of them went away to the Pharisees, and told them the things that Jesus had done.
- 47. The chief priests and the Pharisees therefore gathered together a council, and said, "What are we doing? for this48. man is working many signs. If we let him alone as he is,
- 48. man is working many signs. If we let him alone as he is, all will believe in him, and the Romans will come and take away both our place and our nation."
- 49. But one of them, Caiphas, being high priest that year, said 50. to them, "You know nothing at all; | nor do you reflect that

- 53. the children of God who were scattered abroad. So from that day forth their plan was to put him to death.

Introduction: This scene, the raising of Lazarus from the dead, took place only a short time before the Crucifixion. Occurring in Bethany just three miles from Jerusalem along the Jericho road in circumstances that could not be contradicted, it was the last straw to the Pharisees. From that time they were determined to kill Our Lord at the first opportunity.

### QUESTIONS:

- 2. When a girl's father or mother, brother or sister dies, do you say a word of sympathy to her, perhaps get a Mass said; or do you avoid her until things have passed on?
- 3. Is a girl in need of a friend when the bottom is knocked out of life by the loss of someone near and dear? Would a remark like: "Anything I can do to help," do much for a girl with whom you never really "clicked" before?
- 4. From the text can you work out why Our Lord's death was planned?
  Did His very kindness bring it about? Can kindness therefore bring you trouble as well as success?
- 5. In a smaller way is the same likely to happen us in life as happened to Our Lord; How can it happen to a Leader in particular?

Introduction: Capharnaum was the meeting place of the three main highways of Palestine—the Damascus road from the North, the road from the rich coastal towns of Tyre and Sidon, and the double route South either through the Jordon Valley or Samaria that led through Jerusalem to distant Egypt. It was a real bottle-neck; and there in particular the "quislings" of the Jewish people, the publicians, collected taxes for the Romans on all passing traffic. Matthew was one of them.

#### QUESTIONS:

- 1. Is Our Lord just interested in the "decent" people around the district?
- 2. How did He get on with Matthew's friends? Do you think they were "tough?" What can we learn from Him?
- 3. Do you think Our Lord had anything else in mind besides just being friendly to them?
- 4. How did He do these men a good turn when the Pharisees started talking? What's the lesson for us?
- 5. Are there many Pharisees around—People who desert a girl when she needs a friend; talk about her when she gets into trouble; never do anything to give her a hand if she's in bad company—People who have a smug satisfaction that they are in "the band-wagon for heaven," and not interested whether anyone else wants helping or not?

# "JESUS CHRIST-PHYSICIAN OF SOUL AND BODY."

- 8. But when the crowds saw it, they were struck with fear, and glorified God who had given such power to men.

Introduction: The cure of the paralytic man took place at the end of the first year of His public life. The place was Capharnaum on the shores of Lake Genezareth. It had become His Headquarters in Galilee, and came to be called "His own town." The people of Nazareth would not accept Him, and as a consequence He adopted Capharnaum.

The paralytic had been forgotten the last time Christ came, but on this occasion four of his friends carry him to the house where Christ is. Owing to the crowd assembled inside and outside the house where Christ is, they are unable to get the poor man through the door. They climb the stone stairs up the outside of the building to the flat roof, when in summer the family would sleep. Removing the tiled section for letting light and air in, they tied four ropes to a rug and lowered the paralytic

down right at the very feet of Our Lord. The crowd in the room press back, and four eager faces peer eagerly down to watch the result of their action.

- 2. Who had faith in Christ—the four men or the paralytic? Can you see here a picture of Leaders doing contact work?
- 3. Which is the worse, the bodily affliction or the state of sin the man was in? What did Christ think?

John XI (21-27).

#### TEXT.

- 21. Martha therefore said to Jesus, "Lord, if thou hadst been

- 23-24. Jesus said to her, "Thy brother shall rise." Martha said to him, "I know that he shall rise at the resurrection,
- 25. on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in me, even if he die, shall
- 26. live; and whoever lives and believes in me, shall never die.
- 27. Dost thou believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that thou art the Christ, the Son of God, who hast come into the world."

Introduction: Lazarus, a very dear friend of Jesus, had taken ill, and his sisters sent word to Our Lord to come to him. He waited two days before beginning the journey. When He finally arrived at Bethania, Lazarus had been buried four days.

Resolution: To have more faith and patience in my prayers.

St. Luke II (1-7).

- 5. What sort of people leave no room for Our Lord to-day?
