CAMPAIGN ON "THE FAMILY"

APRIL — DECEMBER

This Campaign marks a most important development in our Movement.

The most important task youth has to tackle right now is the rebuilding of our nation after the war. Our first step must be to rebuild Family Life.

The Campaign follows the proposal set out in the official Statement on Social Justice for 1944, which strongly urged our Catholic Action Movements to follow up the definite policy laid down there by a vigorous campaign on this theme.

This is a nation-wide effort on a big subject into which we are throwing everything we have.

It is our first combined operation in which both official Catholic Action youth organisations — the N.C.G.M. and the Y.C.W. — are planning and working together on matters which are soon going to concern us both very closely.

THE GENERAL PLAN.

The Campaign covers nine months. It provides for 28 Leaders' Group Meetings. The following are the main sections:—

MANNERS BETWEEN BOYS AND GIRLS.

MORAL RELATIONS BETWEEN BOYS AND GIRLS.

COMPANY KEEPING.

MARRIAGE IN GENERAL. PREPARING FOR MARRIAGE. MARRIAGE AND CHILDREN. THE CATHOLIC HOME.

THE IDEAL HOME LIFE.

HOUSING.

We expect this Programme to carry through until the end of the year. This will allow for THREE Leaders' Group Meetings per month—except in April, in which there will be four leaders' meetings.

We leave one week free each month. The leaders' group may use this spare week as they wish — either to catch up if they have missed a meeting, or to conduct a Local Enquiry. The Gospel Discussion for this meeting could be based on the previous Sunday's Gospel.

PLEASE REMEMBER -

- 1. The Programme assumes Leaders' Groups will meet WEEKLY. We shall not do anything efficiently or worth while otherwise.
- 2. All Groups should start together in THE FIRST WEEK IN APRIL, and keep together. This is an essential condition for success and for Headquarters being able to help you. Section members should also meet weekly and the plan you have already caters for three Activity Meetings and one General Meeting for the girls each month.
- Combined GENERAL RALLIES should be held every two months. We suggest these to be held at the end of May, July, September, November, and a monster Rally for Christmas, 1945. These should be bigger, more dynamic, spectacular, ambitious than the monthly gatherings. We shall send you ideas and suggestions in advance.

ENQUIRIES. It is essential, if your Group has not already a copy, to purchase "THE ENQUIRY" (by Rev. C. Mayne, S.J., and K. W. Mitchell, Esq.), which gives the best and latest explanation.

In general, remember-

- ENQUIRIES are not just "talking" or "discussing." They are our way of digging down to find out WHAT is wrong, WHY it is wrong, HOW we can make it better
- We can only solve many of these problems by using the whole National Movement. So PLEASE, Secretaries, SEND IN A REPORT ON EACH ENQUIRY as soon as you have done it. If you haven't time yourself, see that someone else does it.

If you all back us up we can get information on these vital topics from over 300 groups of youth leaders in Australia and put it together....

Then we can really start to do big things.

READING. We make suggestions throughout. Every leader should have and read very carefully the Social Justice Statement on "The Family" (price 3d. Copies available at Headquarters).

This is your Programme. It is drawn up by the girls and boys themselves and merely polished by the experts. The girls and boys have selected the topics for investigation. We realise that many important questions have been left out; others have perhaps not been framed in the best way. But it is always quite impossible to draw up enquiries which perfectly suit everyone. You must go through them, alter what is not clear, omit what is unsuitable, and add what concerns you locally.

As to methods of ACTION we have been purposely very general in our suggestions. Groups are not obliged to follow any of them; they are encouraged to decide themselves what is most effective. All we ask is this: don't at all costs, let your Enquiry peter out without definite plans being made to do something. An Enquiry which does not result in precise action is an Enquiry badly done. . . .

GENERAL MEMBERS. The Campaign-is for all of them — not the Leaders only. The Leaders find out the problems and plan to overcome them, but they cannot succeed unless the mass of members back them up. So you must keep them informed at every stage of what is doing and give them every chance to be apostles too. How can you do this?

- By getting a Leader to give a short but accurate Report of each Enquiry to members at General Meetings. The report would be on these lines: "We were told that this was an important matter. We looked into it, got the views of a whole lot of people and they told us such and such. This was clearly a serious problem the Church says so-and-so about it, we have to do something. This is what we have drawn up now, you must help us to carry it out."
- By bringing the ideas of the Campaign into Activity Groups, and even into Services wherever possible. Ask each such group to suggest ways in which they can join and do something: work for a demonstration, run a function, organise some publicity, put on a play, do posters, etc.
- Find the most capable members and put them in charge of some task. Many who are not Leaders may handle some service or activity splendidly.
- If a Leader has a job to do it is most important wherever possible, to collect a TEAM of collaborators—not only to lighten the burden but to make all feel that they have a really important, active role to play. We must do everything to avoid our having a dead mass of passive members who come along to be amused. The spirit and method of the "team" is our most effective weapon here.

THE LEADERS' MEETING.

Leaders should meet each week. Priests who have had experience of this work regard this as essential. These meetings will not be mere committee meetings. They have in view the formation of the leaders. In the Gospel Discussion and the Priest's Talk there is given a powerful stimulus to the formation of their spiritual life; through the General Enquiry and reports their apostolic work among their companions is ensured.

N.B.—It cannot be stressed sufficiently that this order should be strictly adhered to at all Leaders' Meetings. It is essential for the efficient working of the meetings that no more than the time allotted be given to each section of the meeting, even though some work pertaining to that section must be left undone.

COMBINED RALLY COMMITTEE.

During our current Campaign on "The Family" it is planned to hold five Combined General Rallies. These are scheduled for the end of May, July, September, November, with a Monster Rally in December.

To ensure the success these functions should merit, we suggest that you form a Combined Rally Committee with your local branch of the Y.C.W.

This Committee will meet independently, and its duties will be to organise and produce the abovementioned Rallies.

All Scripts will be supplied from a Central Combined Rally Committee which has been authorised by the controlling bodies of both Movements.

There will appear regularly special Rally publications for the use of the Combined Rally Committees in Parishes, which will contain hints on how to conduct rallies as well as the current Rally Scripts.

St. Luke, Chap. 1, V. 26-38.

And in the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God into a city of Galilee, called Nazareth.

To a virgin espoused to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David; and the virgin's name was Mary.

And the angel being come in, said unto her: Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with thee: Blessed are thou among women.

Who having heard, was troubled at his saying, and thought with herself what manner of salutation this should be.

And the angel said to her: Fear not, Mary, for thou hast found grace with

Behold thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and shalt bring forth a son; and thou shalt call his name Jesus.

He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the most High; and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of David his father; and he shall reign in the house of Jacob for ever.

And of his kingdom there shall be no end.

"THE 'QUISLING.'"

St. Luke, Chap. 5, V. 27-32.

This scene took place towards the end of the first year of Our Lord's public life at Capharnaum. Levi is the apostle and evangelist Mathew.

TEXT.

And after these things he went forth, and saw a publican named Levi, sitting at the receipt of custom, and he said to him: Follow me.

And leaving all things he rose up and followed him.

And Levi made him a great feast in his own house; and there was a great company of publicans, and of others, that were at table with them.

But the Pharisees and scribes murmured saying to his disciples: Why do you eat and drink with publicans and sinners?

And JESUS answering said to them: They that are whole, need not the physician: but they that are sick.

I came not to call the just, but they that are sick.



That he might present it to himself a glorious church, not having spot or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish. So also ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself.

For no man ever hated his own flesh; but nourisheth and cherisheth it, as also Christ doth the Church:

Because we are members of his body, of his flesh, and of his bones.

For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife, and they shall be two in one flesh.

This is a great sacrament; but I speak in Christ and in the Church.

Nevertheless let every one of you in particular love his wife as himself and let the wife fear her husband.
