FIRST CAULFIELD ARBOR DAY

480 TREES PLANTED . . .

A total of four hundred and eighty students from various local state and private schools helped plant trees during the City of Caulfield's first-ever Arbor Day held on Wednesday August 18, 1976.

Trees were planted by students at Caulfield Park, Duncan McKinnon Reserve, and at Murrumbeena High School during separate ceremonies.

SCHOOL STUDENTS HELP OUT...

The aim of Arbor Day was to give school students a greater awareness and appreciation of the need to have trees growing within built-up suburbs.

By allowing students to participate directly in the planting of trees the aim was to give them a sense of involvement and pride in the future development of the parks and gardens within the City of Caulfield.

Caulfield Park

The first ceremony saw a total of 240 students from seven schools take part in the planting of trees at Caulfield Park.

Council staff from the Parks and Gardens Department had already prepared the holes in readiness for planting.

The schools represented were Beth Rivkah Ladies College, Yeshiva College, O'Neill College, Holy Redeemer Regional College, Caulfield North Central State School, and Ripponlea State School.

Buses were provided freeof-charge by Caulfield Council to transport forty students from each of the schools, to and from Caulfield Park.

Duncan MacKinnon Reserve

There were five schools represented at the second tree-planting ceremony, held at Duncan Mackinnon Reserve later the same day.

A total of 200 students attended the ceremony, and the schools represented were Caulfield Junior Technical School, Caulfield State School, Caulfield South State School, Glenhuntly State School and

Murrumbeena State School (40 students were invited from each school).

Buses were once again provided free-of-charge to ferry students to and from the

Murrumbeena High School

A special third ceremony was held at Murrumbeena High School to plant trees around the perimeter of the School grounds.

Approximately 40 students from Murrumbeena High each planted a tree in the holes previously prepared by staff from the Parks and Gardens Department of the City of Caulfield.

Gift of Native Plant

Each student taking part in the tree-planting ceremony at Caulfield, Park and at Duncan Mackinnon Reserve was given a gift of a small native plant to take home to commemorate the occasion.

WEDDING BELLS IN HOPETOUN GARDENS


Janet Payne and Derek Parkinson (below) have a vested interest in Hopetoun Gardens.

THE MULTI-USES OF CAULFIELD'S PARKS ...

The Parks and Gardens within the City of Caulfield provide facilities for many varied recreational activities.

There are barbecue facilities at Glenhuntly Reserve, Seymour/Allison Road Park, and at the East End of Caulfield Park.

With the exception of some of the smaller gardens such as Riley Reserve and Springthorpe Reserve, the majority of Caulfield's Parks and Gardens have playground facilities for children.


The larger parks and reserves such as Caulfield Park, Glenhuntly Reserve, Koornang & Lords Reserve, and Princes Park offer many sporting facilities for such sports as football, cricket, hockey and La Crosse.

Caulfield Park is another favourite spot for outdoor weddings, especially after the completion of the lake and fountain.

For those who like the quiet and peace of the outdoors, the gardens and reserves such as Greenmeadows Gardens, Marara/Curraweena Road Park, Hopetoun Gardens, Seymour/Allison Road Park, and Riley Reserve offer the chance for passive recreation.

The staff of the Parks and Gardens Department, headed by the Superintendent, Andy Reynolds are responsible for the all-year round maintenance and up-keep of the parks, gardens and reserves within the City.

Including the Caulfield Racecourse, the City of Caulfield has a total of approximately 339 acres of open recreational space.

The entrance to the tip is in Estelle Street, which runs off Huntingdale Road, between Ferntree Gully Road and Waverley Road.



CHILD-MINDING IN CAULFIELD

One of the most successful developments in services offered by Caulfield Council during the last twelve months has been in the area of child-minding.

There are now a total of 91 children under daily care, and a further 48 children are on the waiting lists.

PRACTICE WICKETS FOR GLENHUNTLY

The Glenhuntly Recreation Reserve Committee of Management requested permission from Caulfield Council to erect practice wickets on the reserve.

This was considered at the Physical Environment Committee meeting held on the 17th August, and permission was given for the erection of three practice wickets adjacent to the perimeter of the oval. (This decision was ratified by a meeting of the whole Council on the 24th August, 1976).

\$2,000.00 GRANT TO C.A.B

Mr Les Fell, the Deputy City Manager of Administration for the City of Caulfield has resigned after two years of service to take up the position of City Manager for the City of Kew.

Kew City Council has recently decided to adopt the City Manager administrative structure as part of a plan to improve its administrative efficiency and operation.

THE TOWN HALL IS TO STAY

After the circulation of the first "Caulfield Contact" which had as its lead story an article on a Council decision to retain the Town Hall, there still appeared to be confusion on the part of some residents as to the future of the Town Hall.

At this stage, Caulfield Council has definitely resolved that the Town Hall will remain.

Caulfield Council is aware of the need for improved administrative facilities and has sought information on various alternatives to meet this need, prior to taking any further action.

Caulfield residents will be kept fully informed of future developments, and plans are also underway to involve residents in submitting their ideas on how the Town Hall can better be utilised to provide the necessary community facilities.

EVERYONE IS WELCOME

THOSE EARLY DAYS

In June 1905, Council discussed for some time the destiny of one Elsternwick celebrity, "Finger" by name. Finally Council asked the Metropolitan Fire Brigade Board to have "Finger" removed ... and this was done with great alacrity. It seems that "Finger" was a "jibber" — not the sort of horse to draw a flashing fire cart.

One task Council set Constable Eagleson in 1880 was to discover the owner of stray cattle wandering near the racecourse. Some months later Eagleson reported that they belonged to one Charles Chapman, better known to the Councillors as their

poundkeeper.

October 1894, was a black month for Frank Power, Rate Collector and Former Valuer of the Shire. A search revealed that he had embezzled 12.4.2 and the Secretary was ordered to see to warrant for his arrest. A month later he admitted in court the amount was about 470 — some return on in-

vestment. For some months Mr Justice Webb, owner of Crotonhurst, and Mr H. J. Langdon, owner of Rosecraddock, had a battle about the condition of Webb's drain. Subsequently, Council charged Webb who rather arrogantly asked under what section of the Local Government Act was he being charged. Council replied not under the Act, but under the Local Health By-Laws. Mr Justice Webb had forgotten apparently that as a Councillor 30 years before hand he moved, that the Seal of the Roads Board be placed on the first Health By-Laws of Caulfield.

I remember the Caulfield Town Hall at its early stage.
I am now 79 and the years travel on. We lived in Hawthorn Road, at the nursery near the Town Hall. My father sold it to the Police Station.

When we lived there, no electric lights, only gas, no trams, no sewerage for the use of lavatories.

Down Hawthorn Road was trees between the road and gutters.

Opposite the Hall, at the corner of Hawthorn and Glen Eira Roads, on the east side was vegetable grown cauliflowers up to the front path.

Northside, on the west side of Hawthorn Road, was an orchard, high fence, you could see only a bit of the house.

On the other corner, was high gum trees, right up to the footpath, behind them, was a large lake not deep; but a lot of frogs, on a section of it we played.

In those days were two policemen, their section was upstairs, looking through the window, they spotted us getting into the orchard, the owner said let them off, the trees were old.

When not on duty, they rode their bikes home.

The Town Hall on the east side was the Post Office, only managed by a lady, the boy drove his horse and cart to the Elsternwick Railway Station to collect what letters the train left.

On the south door was the Judges room, on the side of Glen Eira Road was a shed, inside was a fire cart ready to pull out with your hands.

The Town Hall, well, it was ordinary bricks with creepers over the bricks up to the top. Never-the-less we liked it.

Where the hospitals are now in Kooyong Road was a vagrant house, the owners left it and went to England, and we spent a lot of time there chasing rabbits.

The footpath in front of our place was only sand.

On going to school we hid in the maize crops at Thomsons Dairy place.

Over to land to school, on the corner was the lolly shop, the only other shop over Hawthorn Road was Mr Wood's fruit shop.

On going home we went over the land to Bambra Road, was the mental home for females, high tin fences, we mucked around. At school the teachers were excellent.

I drove a horse and cart down to Flinders Street, Melbourne, with seedlings, back home to Caulfield, and had the road to myself.

If you walked along at night you would see a lot of squirrels crossing the roads, And the birds were lovely sorts, not what you see now.

\$4000 RAISED —IN HEART APPEAL.—

HOLIDAY CARE FOR ELDERLY

Families who care for elderly relatives have to face the problem of what to do when holiday time comes round.

Often the aged people they care for are too old to go on holidays, and too frail to leave unsupervised.

Caulfield City Council has made available all year round self-contained accommodation at both Camden Court and Heathlands Hostel to help families in just this position.

Families can leave their elderly relatives for a minimum of one to a maximum of four weeks in supervised accommodation whilst they go on holidays.

Those persons who are eligible for such accommodation are required to be residents of the City of Caulfield, over the age of 60 living with relatives, and able to walk and carry out basic tasks such as dressing and undressing themselves.

The charge will be \$45 per week, and a deposit of one weeks' rental (\$45) will be required to confirm a booking. The weekly tariff will be required to be paid in advance.

The Hostels were built by Caulfield City Council and provide good quality accommodation, and high quality care for older residents, who each live in "motel" type units. Pleasant communal lounge and dining rooms are provided.

Staff are available to help residents with such activities as dressing, bathing, supervising medication, as well as ensuring the general happiness and well-being of all the residents.

An agency nurse is available to help as required, whilst an occupational therapist and a chiropodist also provide services if re-

Residents have a choice of either preparing their own breakfast and evening meal, or having these in the dining room. All residents have the mid-day meal served in the dining-room.

"OWNING A DOG IS NO JOKE"

Another 40 dogs were impounded during August, which indicates that there are many owners of dogs who fail to realise their moral and legal responsibility in ensuring that their animals do not roam the streets and inconvenience others.

It is becoming apparent that further consideration will have to be given to instituting legal proceedings against the owner of any dog impounded in the future. This will be in addition to the owner having to pay a release fee of \$10 when claiming the dog.

Only recently the Council instituted proceedings against the owner of a dog which attacked another person and the owner was fined \$15 plus \$54 costs and in default of payment, to be imprisoned 14 days.





She' ... Needs Your Help

'She' finds even the simplest task difficult. Going shopping, or travelling on public transport becomes a big obstacle.

Apart from her own family and friends, "she" often is unable to communicate with the outside world.

'She' is a non-English speaking migrant, who spends most of her time at home isolated because she can't speak our language.

But now, for 'she' there is a chance. A Home Tutor Scheme, organised and financed by the Education Department, aims to teach English to migrants in their own home.

The scheme will be based on the use of volunteers, who will fulfill the role of the missing link in the migrant's life, by being a friend, instructor, and by providing her with direct contact with the Australian Community.

The Quota Club of Caulfield is giving its full support to the scheme and is assisting in the gathering of the necessary volunteers to get the scheme off-the-ground in Caulfield.

Mrs Audrey Cunningham, Publicity Officer for the Quota Club said that she would recom-mend the Home Tutor Scheme to all women, especially to those women who have not participated in community service work before.

Volunteers do not have to be qualified teachers, the main requisite is a willingness to spend time with migrant women in their own homes, teaching them basic English, so that they gain enough confidence to complete every day tasks, independent of help from others.
