

RESIDENT'S PROPOSAL FOR WARD BOUNDARY CHANGES ACCEPTED BY COUNCIL FREE LEGAL ADVICE FOR CAULFIELD

A proposed plan for the re-subdivision of the City of Caulfield's ward boundaries submitted by Mr George Brown of Glenhuntly, has been adopted by Caulfield Council.

Mr Brown's proposal came as a result of a two-month display of a proposed ward resubdivision plan prepared by Council.

During the display period, residents were invited to forward their comments to the City of Caulfield.

The original proposed plan, prepared by Council, was also displayed in the very first issue of "Caulfield Contact" which was distributed to residents at the end of July.

Mr Brown, along with three other residents, submitted an alternative proposal to the one tentatively agreed upon by Council.

After giving all proposals very serious consideration,

Caulfield Council selected Mr Brown's proposal as the most practical plan.

His proposal resubdivides the municipality in the most equitable manner, and allows for further expected flat development in both the South and East Wards within the next few years.

The proposal also retains at least the majority of the existing wards in the proposed wards, with the West Ward being added to quite considerably.

The boundaries proposed are also readily and easily definable which is a requirement of the Local Government Act.

Following Council's decision to adopt Mr Brown's proposed re-subdivision plan, application was lodged with the Minister for Local Government to resubdivide the municipality in accordance with this plan.

The Minister has since advised Council that the proposal has been given to his Advisory Committee for a report. This committee will hold a Public Hearing on a date yet to be fixed.

It is hoped that the new subdivision will be finally decided upon by the Minister, and become operative in time for the 1977 Council elections.

Turn to Page 2 to read the letter submitted by Mr Brown outlining his proposed re-subdivision plan. A meeting, organised by the Caulfield Community Service and sponsored by the City of Caulfield, was held on Thursday the 11th November to discuss the setting up of a free legal advice service in Caulfield.

Representatives from the Caulfield Community Service, the Citizens' Advice Bureau, the Law Institute, and Caulfield Council met with twentyone solicitors either residing or practising law in Caulfield.

Thirteen of the solicitors present at the meeting volunteered to be included on a roster system to provide free legal advice for the residents of Caulfield.

A Steering Committee was formed, comprising two solicitors, two members of C.C.S., and a representative from the C.A.B. and the Social Development Deparment of the City of Caulfield with the aim of opening the service in the first week of February, 1977.

It is anticipated that the free Legal Aid Service will initially be for two hours a week.

The City of Caulfield will be making an establishment grant to the Caulfield Community Service to cover the financial costs involved in setting up the free legal aid service. 16-Page Supplement on Carols By Candlelight Program — See Middle Pages.

MR BROWN'S LETTER TO CAULFIELD COUNCIL

- Proposing ward boundary changes

City Manager, Dear Sir,

I wish to congratulate you for proposing re-subdivision of wards plans to correct the great imbalance that has occurred due to population movements over the years.

^f Having noted the proposed subdivision plan I wish to draw attention to the following points:

It would appear from the above table that the variation in the West Ward of 11.2 per cent under the average population per ward is too great a variation if equal representation is to be achieved and it is suggested this imbalance could be alleviated if the east boundary of the West Ward was Kooyong Road.

To correct the loss of population in the South Ward the East Boundary could be altered to Koornang Road. An adjustment of the boundary between the East and North Wards using Glenhuntly Road as the Southern Boundary and perhaps Grange Road as the dividing boundary would appear to be correct. However this boundary could be varied so that each of these wards would have approximately 20,270 population.

It is also suggested that re-subdivision of boundaries should occur if results in any census taken indicate that population swings have occurred within the wards.

Representatives from over fifty organizations gathered together at a seminar organised by the **Caulfield** Community Service to discuss the Welfare Scene in Caulfield.

The seminar, which was sponsored by Caulfield Council, was held at the Caulfield Town Hall on Thursday the 18th of November.

One of the most significant points to arise from the discussions held, was the concensus of opinion that agreed that there was a need for closer communication and consultation between organizations active in social welfare.

It was agreed at the meeting that the Caulfield Community Service should play a more positive role in co-ordinating communication and consultation amongst the various welfare groups who share common goals and activities, so that these groups can learn from one another and be more effective in their activities.

The meeting was chaired by His Worship the Mayor of Caulfield, Cr Max Blair, and guest speaker was Mr John Wise, the Manager for Social Development at the City of Caulfield, who spoke on "Welfare Co-ordination and Co-operation in Caulfield.'

The Chairman of the Caulfield Community Ser-vice, Mr Jack Campbell reiterated his statement made prior to the seminar being held, by agreeing that the seminar had been a significant step towards obtaining a wider understanding, and a more effective approach to meeting social welfare needs in Caulfield.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

I believe most of us would agree that for a community to remain homogenous and vibrant, it is essential that there are regular opportunities for citizens of that community to mix and mingle on common ground.

With this thought in mind, I am pleased that over the next two months Caulfield Council is responsible for the organisation of three such ventures, each of which is substantially different in character.

And although each function is given separate publicity in this paper, I feel it is appropriate for me to briefly deal with each one.

Firstly, on the 11th of December at Koornang Park we are conducting a Community Day where citizens will be able to enjoy a variety of activities and at the same time gain a better appreciation of the range of service organisations which operate within the City.

Secondly, on Sunday December 19th we are conducting at the Caulfield Arts Centre, our annual Carols by Candlelight evening commencing at 8 p.m. Father Christmas will be there to welcome children with a small gift.

And, thirdly, on Wednesday the 26th of January 1977, the City Hall will be the venue for an Australia Day Breakfast from 7.30 a.m. to 9 a.m. which will provide citizens with the opportunity of celebrating the discovery of Australia and listening to a most entertaining speaker.

I hope that at least one of these events will appeal to your individual interests.

Additionally, may I say how happy my colleagues and I are that following what has been described in some quarters as a long overdue decision to seek ministerial approval to revise ward boundaries, a number of citizens showed deep interest by devoting considerable time and effort to develop proposals on the most appropriate boundaries.

Each submission had its merits, but as only one could be put forward, Council adopted the proposal lodged by Mr G. Brown of 11 Hawson Avenue in Glenhuntly, in preference to the one tentatively agreed upon by Council previously.

Again, on behalf of my colleagues may I record our appreciation of this example of community interest and input, and extend congratulations to Mr Brown for compiling what we hope will be an acceptable formula for new ward boundaries.

Finally, let me, on behalf of the Mayoress and myself extend to all, the very best wishes for a happy festive season and a healthy and prosperous New Year.

Caulfield Council plans to introduce a Home Maintenance Scheme early in 1977.

An experienced handyman will be employed by the City of Caulfield to carry out minor repairs in the homes of people who are unable through physical disabilities to carry out the repairs themselves.

This would cover such maintenance work as replacing light globes, changing tap washers, and fitting safety bars in bathrooms and toilets.

A small charge of 50c an hour plus the costs of materials will be made for the aged and invalid pensioners using the scheme.

Those residents who are not on a pension but who suffer from physical disabilities can also use the service, but at an increased cost of \$3 an hour. Caulfield Council has

introduced the Home Maintenance Scheme in order to help out those people who are unable to carry out minor repairs themselves, and who find it difficult to meet the costs of bringing in a professional tradesman to do the work.

AUSTRALIA DAY BREAKFAST — YOU'RE INVITED

The Mayor of Caulfield, Cr Max Blair, has officially announced the date of the City of Caulfield's Australia Day Breakfast.

It will be held on the morning of Wednesday, January 26th, 1977, between 7.30 a.m. and 9.00 a.m. at the Caulfield Town Hall, cnr. Glen Eira and Hawthorn Roads, Caulfield.

The Mayor has extended an invitation to the residents of Caulfield to attend the Champagne breakfast which is intended to be a community celebration of "Australia Day" and will also raise money for charity at the same time.

Costs of the Breakfast are paid for by Caulfield Council but guests are required to donate \$5 per head to the Mayor's Charity Fund, which this year will go to the Caulfield Hospital Special Appeal for Sheltered Workshops and Special Accommodation. The function held in January of 1976 raised \$2,000 for this appeal.

It is expected that between 250 and 300 residents will attend the Australia Day Breakfast, and guests are likely to include local Councillors and their wives, neighboring Mayors and Town Clerks, and some Members of Parliament.

On Friday, 19th November, a meeting was held at Caulfield Institute of Technology to discuss the setting-up of an Active Retirement Program designed to enable retired people to become actively involved in using their prior working skills in beneficial work for the community.

The Directors of the Program, Mr Peter Cutter, Head of School of Orientation and Dena Flannigan, Recreation Officer, Caulfield City Council, met a group of interested people — Lucy Alford, Keith Patterson, Dick Musgrave, Doug McConchie, Rene Jolly, Bob Burnett, Helen Rickards and Jillian Bolton.

Those present represented a wide range of life experience including public service administration, home duties, plumbing and home heating specialisation, newspaper administration, social work, and education. Typical remarks were; "I

Typical remarks were; "I have been very active all my life and I want to continue to be active"; "I do not want to be tied down in a paid occupation again"; "I would like to study some things I did not have time for before"; "I would like to give younger people the benefit of my experience." The Active Retirement

The Active Retirement group has as its charter, community service, its objective being to pass on to the community the various and almost unlimited experience its members have gained in their working lives.

The meeting saw likely areas of involvement including work with teacher aides, community centres, social enquiries and research projects, assisting handicapped groups, providing vocational advice, as well as offering administrative and technical advice to community groups.

The group is seeking: Retired people to become participating members; and, Community groups who could use the service.

COMMENT PERIOD EXTENDED ON CAR PARKING POLICY

The period set aside for public comment on the Interim Car Parking Policy drawn up by the City of Caulfield has now been extended until the 15th February, 1977.

The extension was decided upon by Caulfield Council after there had been a lack of response, over a two-month period, to Council's invitation to residents and various community organizations to make constructive comments on the Interim Policy on Car Parking.

Despite the fact that a copy of the policy was sent to seventeen organizations, and residents were notified both in the local press and the last issue of "Caulfield Contact" that copies were available at the Town Hall, only one resident has forwarded his comments. It is hoped by extending the original 2 months allowed for public comment that organizations and individual residents who had planned to make comments, will now have sufficient time to finalise their submissions. It is also hoped that other interested organizations and individuals may be encouraged through the extension in time, to make their comments known.

The Interim Car Parking Policy has been drawn up by the City of Caulfield to guide the future development of Car Parks within this City.

Copies of the Interim Policy can be obtained from the Caulfield City Offices, corner of Hawthorn and Glen Eira Roads, Caulfield. Comments are invited from the public, so that they can be taken into consideration, prior to the car parking policy being finalised.

Know Your Councillors



CR BERT CALDWELL (SOUTH WARD)

Deputy Chairman: Planning and Community Development Committee.

Member: General Purposes Committee

Council Representative: Caulfield High School Council. President of Princes Park Committee of Management, South Eastern Weights & Measures Union.

First elected to Council: April, 1975.

Occupation: Advanced Dental Technician (practising in Caulfield)

Married, wife Pat, two sons and a daughter.

Q. How did you become interested in Local Government?

A. For the past eighteen years I have taken an active interest in all levels of politics, and I have been involved in many fundraising acitivities for local charities.

My activities brought me into contact with Caulfield Council on many occassions, and over the years I got to know quite a few of the local Councillors, and started to develop a keener interest in local government.

Since I was born in Caulfield, and spent most of my life in Caulfield, it seemed a natural step for me to take a more active role in Caulfield's future development.

I was asked by Councillors and ex-Councillors if I would offer my services to the City of Caulfield as a Councillor, and I decided that the time was right in 1975 for me to stand for election.

I stood for office in the South Ward mainly because I was born in the South Ward and I felt I had an affinity with the area. Q. What area of local government interested you in your first year in office?

A. Well, over the years I have observed the need for many social welfare services in Caulfield, particularly the need to provide a Home Handyman Service for the aged and handicapped. I have been vitally interested in the Home Handyman Scheme and I have supported it fully. Now, I'm pleased to say that Council has approved of this scheme and the scheme will take effect early in 1977.

Many other social welfare services are needed, and the government provides many subsidies for such services which means that ratepayers do not have to bear the main costs. Part of the role of Caulfield Council, as I see it, is to initiate these welfare services and get them working efficiently in order to make use of the State and Federal government subsidies available.

Q. What do you see as the future for the City of Caulfield?

A. Having lived here for most of my life, I have a strong feeling for the City. I see Caulfield as a prime residential area, and I see one of my main functions as a Councillor is to work to maintain Caulfield's residential nature in the interest of the tens of thousands of residents who have chosen to live in this city.

This is the second in a six-part series planned to introduce to you the twelve elected councillors who serve the residents of the City of Caulfield.

> As Vice-Chairman of the Planning and Community Development Committee, I feel I am in a position to keep actively working towards this end.

Q. What do you see as the main role of a Councillor?

A. To represent the people of their ward, and I believe as part of that representation, it is essential that a Councillor be approachable and available to the people he represents.

That is why I have concentrated on making myself available to residents of my ward as much as possible during my first nineteen months in office.



CR STAN HUNTER (EAST WARD)

Q. How did you become interested in Local Government?

A. Having lived in the East Ward for most of my life, I have taken a keen interest in the affairs of this City, especially over the last five or six years.

or six years. When I was informed that ex-Councillor E. E. Gunn was to retire as Councillor for the East Ward, I decided to stand for office with the intention of carrying on the high standard set by ex. Cr Gunn during his many years of service for the ratepayers and residents of the City of Caulfield.

- Q. When you became a Councillor, did you have any particular areas of Council activity that you wanted to concentrate on?
- A. No, not at first. At the time I became a Councillor I was not fully aware of the full extent of the activities

centrated on the Physical Environment Committee, which was previously known as the Works Committee.

This Committee deals with most matters that may have a direct physical effect on the environment of our City, and covers such areas as upkeep of parks and gardens, garbage disposal, roadworks and street signs, etc. And because of my keen

And because of my keen interest in this area, in my 2nd year as a Councillor, I have been elected by my fellow Councillors as Chairman of the Physical Environment Committee.

Q. What do you see as the main responsibility of Council?

A. Quite clearly, Council's main responsibility is to serve the needs of the ratepayers and residents of all ages, and not their wants.

I say not their wants because if you ask a hundred people what they want, I'm sure you would get a hundred different answers. But when it comes to needs, I believe a Council can identify quite clearly what the needs are in a community whether it be the need for more accommodation hostels for the elderly, or a simple matter of improving the garbage collection in the City. In other words, it is possible that the wants of people can be far in excess of their actual needs.

In receiving Rate Money from the ratepayers of this City, I believe this Council has an obligation and a responsibility to ensure that the money is spent wisely and carefully.

And in accepting this responsibility, I am committed to doing my part to ensure that this Council provides the necessary services that meet the established needs of the people in this City.

Let's clear up the confusion on dog registrations

For the majority of Caulfield residents who have notified the City of Caulfield of their ownership of dogs, a registration renewal form for their dogs has been included along with the rate notices sent out during November: Some dog owners, who have paid registration fees since the 10th April this year, believe that they are being asked to register the same dog twice.

The registration renewal form is in fact to cover the period from the 10th April 1977 to the 10th April 1978.

The 10th April next year is

the common expiry date for all dogs currently registered.

(For those residents who have not yet registered their dog, any payments made prior to the 10th April next year would only register the dog until that date, when the full amount would then be due to register the dog for the following twelve months up to the 10th April 1978). The renewal forms have been sent out early, along with rate notices, merely to economise on expensive postal costs, and also to give dog owners plenty of time in which to make payment.

For those owners who have kept the registration of their dogs up-to-date the form can be kept and payment made at anytime up until the 10th

April next year.

It is important to realise that the registration renewal notices, in a majority of cases, mean that upon payment you will be registering your dog from the 10th April 1977 to the 10th April 1978. (The only exceptions are those residents whose dog registrations are not up-todate).

ACCESS PAGE

TO RECOGNIZE HANDICAPPED AS FIRST-CLASS PEOPLE

A research project into the needs of handicapped people in the Caulfield Area has recently been conducted by three welfare studies students from the Caulfield Institute of Technology.

The students are working on the project on behalf of Caulfield Community Service, and have been talking to as many handicapped people as possible in Caulfield, in an attempt to establish what the needs of these people are.

One of the most significant points to come to light from the research work done so far, is a general concensus of opinion amongst handicapped people that the general community is not sufficiently aware of what the needs and capabilities of handicapped people are.

Most handicapped people felt that there was a lack of contact between themselves and the community at large, and this tended to create a situation where, in the extreme, they felt they were being treated as second-class citizens.

It was agreed that many

societies, hospitals and institutions do a wonderful job in enabling handicapped people to best overcome their actual physical limitations. However, most handicapped people spoken to agreed that the community in general were ignorant of the physical and emotional needs of the handicapped.

As a solution to this problem, a videotape film has been made of eight handicapped people speaking candidly about their needs and their place in the community.

The film has been shown to groups in the Caulfield area and has raised many important issues, stimulating interesting and worthwhile discussions.
