

Dialysis Gen

In a bid to avoid congestion and reduce costs, Prince Henry's Hospital has established a kidney dialysis satellite centre at Caulfield.

It was officially opened by the Minister of Health, Mr Borthwick and is situated at 261 Kooyong Road. The centre is a first for the south eastern suburbs and will service a population of 400,000.

Buslines Face Difficulties

With the increasing use of private cars, buslines are constantly facing financial problems.

In an endeavour to support private bus companies and to assist them in continuing their services, the Government adopted a policy of providing a subsidy to the companies to make up the difference between what it cost to run the service and the return from fares received.

Bus services which run at a loss used this subsidy to cover that loss.

This policy operated for six changed. Bus owners now operate under what is known as a contract scheme where the bus operator is paid a flat rate per bus for each hour of operation.

This is currently \$6.28 per hour. The industry average cost is \$14.00 per hour. Therefore the difference has to be obtained from fares col-

Recently residents have been faced with the reduction of bus services. The two main complaints concern the curtailment of services in Bambra Road and the lack of a service in Kooyong Road between Glenhuntly Road and Clarence Street.

Due to lack of patronage and because of the new Contract Scheme, it is no longer possible to produce a total service that is financially self sustaining. Accordingly the bus

proprietors have reduced the number of times a bus will cover a particular route.

By comparing old and new metables it can be seen that there has been a great reduction in a number of services throughout Caulfield.
Operators in the City of

Caulfield are not as well off as those in many other areas. A large proportion of fares received are concession fares from children in a morning and evening peak period and from pen-sioners during the day. This means that they must carry more people to receive the same return as operators in other areas

who take full fares.

The Caulfield City Council recognises this problem and appreciates the need for community transport facilities within the City. To this end they will approach the Minister for Transport, to seek to have the subsidy system of payments to bus line proprietors reinstated in the case of disadvantaged bus

The Minister for Health Mr Borthwick chats with patient Alex Haupt and Sr. Angela Lo. Alex has been on dialysis for 22 months and attends the Centre for 4½ hours, three times a week.

Equipment worth \$58,000 has been installed at the centre to treat kidney patients requiring haemodialysis, a process in which toxins are extracted from

It includes a bank of 11 kidney machines, modified by techni-cians from Prince Henry's Department of Nephrology for quiet operation.

The building is owned by the Royal Southern Memorial Hospital and is administered and funded by the Royal Southern Memorial Community Care Centre.

Cost of establishing the centre was \$85,000 paid through the Health Commission of Victoria under its community health program.

"Twenty years ago there were no kidney dialysis machines available. Ten years ago dialysis treatment at home was not available and four years ago, there were no community kidney dialysis centres," said Mr Hoadley, President of the Prince Henry's Hospital Board of Management.

The establishment of community dialysis centres, such as the one at Caulfield allows many patients to lead more normal lives. The centres offer the most modern "do-it-yourself" dialysis treatment in a warm and friendly environment" he said.

Over the past month the Caulfield Community Caravan has been set

up in various shopping centres around the City to give people the opportunity of discussing the new garbage system proposed by Council.

Residents have been able to handle the 240 litre garbage bins and discuss with Council staff, any problems they may face if the system is ap-

Reaction to the bins has been assessed and whilst most residents who live in houses welcome the new bins, many people who live in flats or units could face some problems.


Consequently, Caulfield is recognised through Melbourne and probably Victoria as an

innovative Council. However, I feel that many problems still exist; the need to provide special accommodation for the aged has to be balanced with the requirements of the younger population. Traffic through the City is causing more residents to ex-press concern that suburban streets are being press concern that suburban streets are being treated, by motorists, as main thoroughfares. Local residents need to be encouraged to patronise local shopping centres. Planning codes require constant review to ensure that balanced development is achieved. The library service which has become a substantial financial burden, needs review by Council. With the decision to utilise the large plastic bins pending, garbage collection may become a topic of debate and rate levels will need to have particular regard to the ability of the residents to pay.

Caulfield offers many attractions to many people and in the end it is the people who must, and do decide the direction in which the City

and do decide the direction in which the City moves. I believe that achievements within the City, over recent years, have been significant. Some of these achievements have resulted in a more cohesive community and I hope that this trend will be permanent and that Caulfield continues to provide the balanced society which is surely the objective of the average resident.

HELP FOR YOUNG OFFENDERS.

Probation Officers Needed

There is an urgent need for part time volunteers to assist the Department of Community Welfare Services in supervising young people on probation. A number of people, mostly in the 17-25 age group, come into conflict with the law and are placed on probation by the Courts.

Volunteers, called Honorary Probation Officers are needed to assist these young people. There is an element of authority involved in the work, as the probationer is expected to report to his or her probation officer. The emphasis is, however, on as-

Probation is an alternative to imprisonment, and the cost to the community is far less than the cost involved in keeping people in prison.

It is important that Honorary Probation Officers are able to demonstrate flexibility in their general attitudes and have the capacity to see other people's actions in terms of cause, rather

than right or wrong.


A background in welfare is not

necessary as training programs are provided by the Department of Community Welfare Services.

Most important are understanding, sensitivity and empathy with people and a sincere desire to help. Volunteers are required in Caulfield, Malvern and Oakleigh. A training course will commence in September and will run one evening a week over 10 weeks. It will cover such areas as the court system, counselling skills and report writing.



Diabetics to new System

The changeover to decimal currency and then to the metric system was fraught with confusion and misapprehension as well as resistance.

All of this could occur with the changeover to the uniform strength of insulin U-100, which is insulin of 100 units per ml, and the new U-100 syringe. With this conversion there is the added danger which could culminate in death — the danger of wrongly administering the new U-100 insulin.

From Friday August 1st, insulin dependent diabetics have four months only to become accustomed to this new strength insulin and the new syringe that must be used. On Monday December 1st there will be only U-100 Insulin and U-100 syringes.

In both U.S.A. and Canada where U-100 Insulin has already been introduced there was some initial confusion. To avoid confusion and panic during the four months conversion, the Community Care Centre has initiated activities which will help insulin dependent diabetics.

The Community Care Centre in Kooyong Road, Caulfield is establishing an Advisory Service to operate from Friday August 1st to Monday December 1st during which time especially trained sisters will be available to help with instruction of patients.

A mystery surrounds the prized treasure of the Caulfield Institute of Technology — a neat replica of a Floating Rail Cart.

Apart from a detailed descrip-Apart from a detailed description of its dimensions and its construction, and the fact that it was a gift to Mr R. J. Dorey on his retirement by the boys of the blacksmiths' shop, nothing is known of it. Mr Dorey, the first Principal of Caulfield Technical School retired in 1946.

But Archivist Martin Merchant is not satisfied with just having a beautiful item in the collection. He needs to know more. Who made it? How many took part in the project? Are there any around who recall the circumstances under which the cart was made? Why this type of cart? And so on. Indeed, this is not the only area of information Mr Merchant needs filled.

Mr Merchant, sometime Archivist at the Public Library, Melbourne, is part-time Archivist at CIT, and is hoping


to fill all the gaps that exist with the help of part students and staff who may have information or items to add to the Archives; old letters, photographs, reports and so on.

Already in the collection are the original Minutes of the Caulfield Technical School covering the years 1922-1932, one of the original letters relating to the establishment of the school dated 21st July, 1915, the com-puter invented in the 1940's by Dr Trevor Pearcey, now Dean of

The Alma Doepel Supporter's Club is a member of Sail and Adventure Ltd. Its aim is to support in all ways possible the restoration and operation of the "Alma Doepel" as a sail training and adventure vessel.

membership inch ple from all walks of life and now numbers over 1000 members. A voluntary Committee, at present ten members, is elected at the Annual General Meeting. The Club's principal objective

to date has been to broaden its base by increasing the membership, to assist the restoration, and provide a continual income by organising a variety of fund raising activities.

The wind and the sea are challenging elements, it takes skill and courage to live with them. The self discovery which comes from training under sail and experience gained from sea adven-ture, furthers the development of character in a way which could prove lasting and useful.

The basic purpose of this non-profit organisation is to provide teenage girls and boys (15 years and over) with an outlet for their spirit of adventure and an opportunity to develop a sense of responsibility, self-confidence and above all an ability to work as a member of a team; all of which will help them throughout their lives. The emphasis is on social experience rather than producing yachtsmen, let alone professional seamen. To this end the "Alma Doepel" is being restored.

Once restored, the "Alma Doepel", an Australian built schooner, will operate as a sail training and adventure vessel for the youth of Australia. Her masts will carry 6,000 sq. ft. of sail. Accommodation will provide for forty young people and a professional crew of seven. She will remain operational aided by twin screws powered by Gardiner diesels while restoration is in progress

A voyage will usually be of 8 days duration and sea experience will be gained by crewing aboard "Alma Doepel" as well as partaking in activities such as scuba diving, canoeing, small boat handling and exploring areas not

easily accessible by land.

Restoration and refitting is taking place in Melbourne at present No. 12 North Wharf, visitors are welcome at weekends.

History

The three masted fore and aft topsail schooner "Alma Doepel" was built at Bellingen, N.S.W. in 1903 by Frederick Doepel and named after his daughter, Alma. Her timbers were cut from forests in the area and are mainly spotted gum, tallow wood and iron bark.

Dimensions: Length 118 ft., bow sprit 36 ft., overall length 150 ft., beam 26 ft., draught 7 ft. 6 ins. She is fitted fore and aft with centre boards — this shallow draught permitted her to cross the sand bar at the mouth of the Bellinger river of the Bellinger river.

She was launched on October 10th, 1903 and sailed to Sydney on her maiden voyage in 1904. In her first year she plied the Tasman and established a record for the fastest voyage by a sailing

In 1905 she traded along the

In 1905 she traded along the N.S.W. coast after the wreck of her sister ship "Violet Doepel". She was sold to Henry Jones IXL Ltd. in 1917 and traded from the company's jam factory in Hobart to the Australian mainland, forming part of the mosquito fleet. Alma Doepel established another record for the fastest time from Hobart to Melbourne Heads in 58 and a half hours.

She was flag ship twice to the Hobart Regatta and was the last surviving sailing ship in Australian waters to carry square sails; these were removed

"Alma Doepel" was commis-sioned in 1942 by the American Army for use by the Australian Army. Derigged and transformed she served in New Guinea as AK82.

After the war she was rerigged as a three masted bald headed schooner and resumed trade between Tasmania and Melbourne.

Eventually in the 1960's she became a limestone carrier between Southport and Electrona in the D'Entrecasteux

Channel, Tasmania.
In 1976 she lay idle at Electrona and was taken over by Sail and Adventure Ltd., for

Ex C.I.T. Student Seeks Refuge



Tran Manh Heip, a Vietnamese Engineer who qualified at C.I.T. in 1969 is in grave danger in a refugee camp in Kampuchea. The Institute is lodging formal sponsorship with the Immigration Department and Director, Ron Cumming, is seeking actively to obtain Hiep's release.

Hiep, who is described as stateless and destitute, is 'in the dubious sanctuary of a fenced-off compound for Vietnamese at

Nong Chan camp.'
Hiep quit his home and his country on April 3rd, 1980 after two abortive attempts to escape by boat. He bluffed, bribed and took every conceivable chance as he plunged through Kampuchea in a group with nine other Viet-

Because of the dangers, Hiep's wife Vinh and two young daughters were forced to remain in Ho Chi Minh City.

The four Khmer escorts who had been paid in gold to act as escorts turned on Hiep and his companions, terrorised them with knives and grenades and robbed them of every last

They then stumbled into a "Free Khmer" guerrilla base on the fringe of Nong Chan camp near the Thai border. Stripped of everything but the crumpled of fatigues he was wearing Hiep had managed to cling to a small plastic bag of papers containing photocopies from the pages of an expired passport and his original diploma sealed by the Caulfield Institute of Technology.

His plight was uncovered by a

His plight was uncovered by a journalist whose report was first published in the Bangkok Post on April 27th. The account was reprinted in the National Times,

His cause was then taken up

with Immigration authorities in Canberra and has been assured that with sponsorship, Hiep would be favourably considered

for entry into Australia.

Formal sponsorship includes the offer of accommodation and assistance in seeking a job.

To get Hiep to Australia, he has first to make it across the

Thai border. It appears that it is impossible to help as long as he remains within Kampuchea.

One means would be if he were to be transferred to a U.N. High Commission for Refugees camp. Once there formal arrangements for his exit could begin. Another appears to be some means by which Hiep may bribe his way across the Thai border. But there appears to be no way of sending him money for this purpose — it would never get to him.

While it is believed he is in the

Nong Chan camp to which the Red Cross has access, it is neces-sary to locate him if the plans for his release from his predicament and his coming to Australia are to be implemented.

Kampuchean hostility towards Vietnamese is traditional, and no provocation is really needed for violence to

According to the Bangkok Post article, the dangers for refugees seeking flight from Vietnam across Kampuchea can be more daunting than those faced by the boat refugees striking out across the South China Sea.

on the property to remove the need for bees to move outside for

The swarms will only be allowed to be stored for a maximum of two weeks prior to relocation, and it appears that, in practice, professional bee keeping in residential areas does not constitute a hazard to surrounding areas.


