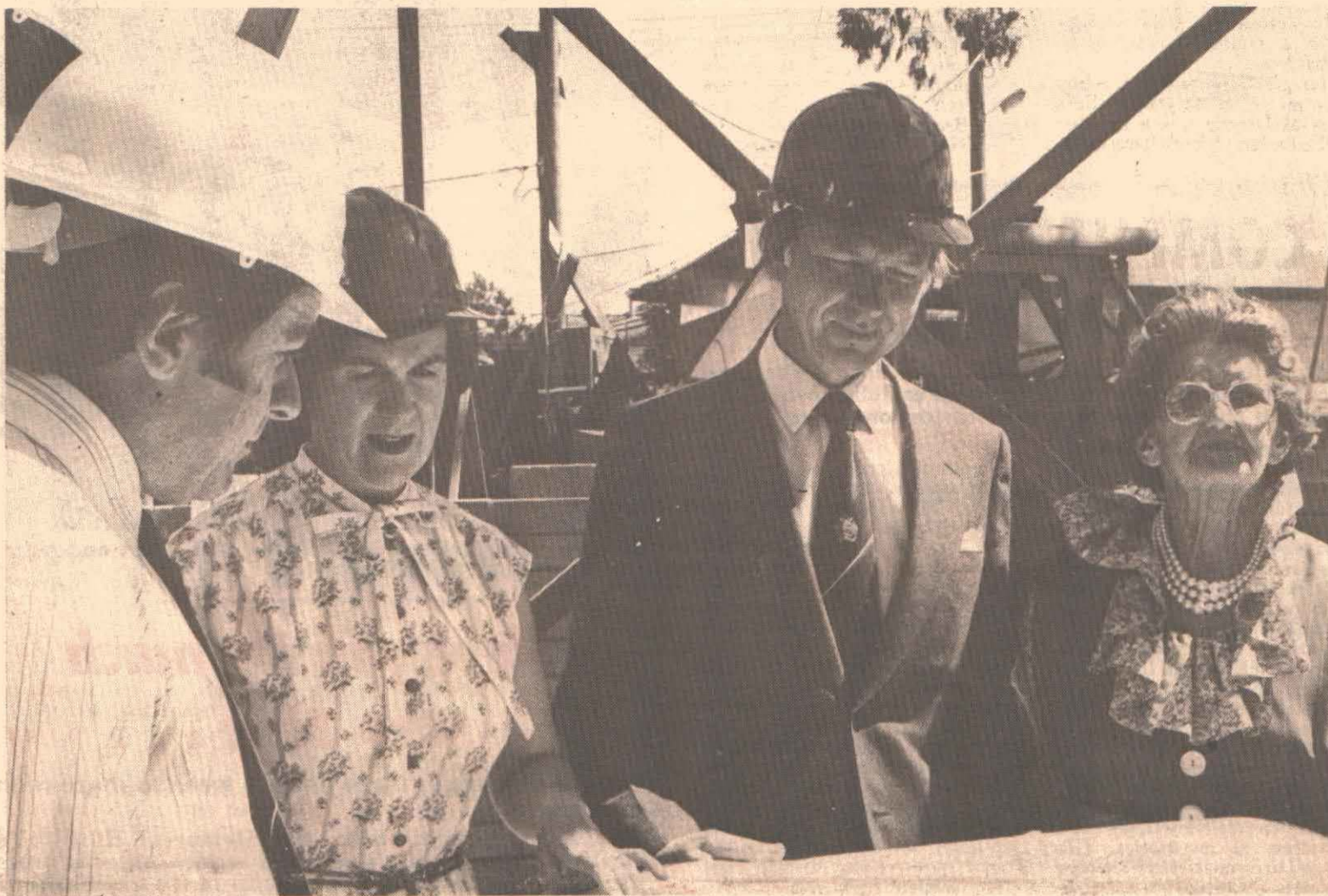

NEW HOSTEL INSPECTED



The Minister for Social Security, Senator, Dame Margaret Guilfoyle inspected the progress of work on the Rosstown Court Hostel for the Aged.

Accompanying the Senator were the Mayor and Members of the Caulfield City Council and many ingoing residents.

The Rosstown Court Hostel is a project of the Caulfield City Council, aimed at providing supportive residential care for elderly residents of Caulfield who are unable to cope with independent living.

Work on the Hostel in Ames Avenue is proceeding well. Almost all of the units have been allocated, but anyone still wanting to enter the Hostel in March can contact the Social

Development Department at the Town Hall.

It was recently announced by the Commonwealth Government that a grant be provided, for development at the Hostel, under the Aged Disabled Persons Homes Act. A sum of \$743,000 has been allocated; made up of a construction grant of \$641,000 and a land grant of \$102,000.

Pending receipt of the Commonwealth Subsidy an overdraft has been arranged. This, together with resident contributions (\$9,500 each), funds

from the Elderly Citizens Housing Reserve and other donations, will be sufficient to fund the project.

If you have been a resident of Caulfield for 5 years or more, either recently or in the past, you are eligible, to apply for residence at the Hostel. Ingoing residents must be over 60 years of age, and keep reasonably good health. Many social activities and outings will be organised and families can be sure that their people are being well catered for.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT — option for HSC Students

Starting in 1981 students studying the Higher School Certificate will be able to study local government.

The Victorian Institute of Secondary Education has accepted that 'local government' should be one of the optional units for HSC students who undertake the subject of 'politics'.

Local government appears at the top of a list of optional subjects which include:

- The Mass Media in Australia
- People, Power and Politics
- The Learning of Politics in Childhood and Youth
- Women and Politics
- Australia and the Third World
- Superpower relations since 1940
- China and Japan

This is a significant breakthrough. For years people have been advocating that citizen apathy would be reduced if local government was taught in schools.

Certainly there have been some advances made in recent years. Students being involved in social studies subjects had generated a demand for school classes to visit the local municipal offices, see a council meeting in progress and acquire whatever written material there is available.

But this move to put local government into the HSC cur-

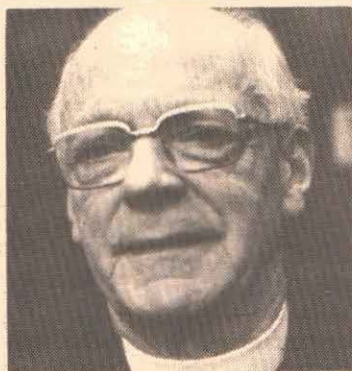
riculum puts it on a level of importance with the other optional units already mentioned.

If this education move goes just a small way towards producing citizens who understand the local government system well enough to work through it rather than against it, then it will be a very worthwhile endeavour.

Effective citizens are not only needed in the Council, they are needed to lead and participate in community groups. In recent years citizen effectiveness has often been equated with the ability to stop the local Council from doing something.

The greatest hope, in the long term of course, is that it will help to breed a group of educated people who can be effective, involved citizens and also provide a pool of potential councillors.

Giving students in their last year of secondary education the chance to study local government does give scope for practical application and hopefully local government will respond in a positive way right from the beginning.

A well loved and happy person, Miss McDonald was still singing at the age of 70.

She recently spent 5 months, on her back, in hospital, laying completely still. Many people would ask why there were always so many people around her bed.

COMPUTERS MEAN BUSINESS

According to Don Hayward, M.L.C. for Monash Province, good opportunities are emerging for the establishment, in the Caulfield area, of new computer service companies.

Mr Hayward told a seminar on "Employment and Technological Change" at the Lauriston Girls' School on October 6th, that Caulfield is strategically located for industries using new technology. It has the advantage of high levels of education and skills in the area as well as the presence of important tertiary institutions such as the Caulfield Institute of Technology.

The demand for computer service companies flowed from the increasing use of new technology in Victorian industries in an effort to achieve better quality control, lower energy use, more competitive delivery times and a reduction in inventories. This has led to dramatically increased business opportunities for com-

panies developing "software" or programs for the computers.

Mr Hayward said that other opportunities in new technology for the area stemmed from the new information industries, which are probably the fastest growing industries in the world. These information industries develop and store data electronically for rapid access by the medical profession, the legal profession and a wide variety of commercial and industrial users.

Major technological change is already underway in Australian industry and an active program to attract these new industries, which are based upon growing market opportunities, is the most positive way to help local employment problems.

New Project for C.A.A.

Following the success of its last project, the Ormond Community Aid Abroad has begun another self-help project.

Inspired by the visit of Mrs Bedi, C.A.A. Field Director for India, the group has decided to raise \$700 towards helping the "untouchables" of that Country.

Although the term "untouchables" was declared illegal in both India and Pakistan in the '50's, traditional divisions between the "pure" and "polluted" caste groups still exist.

This group of the poor are usually referred to as Harijans, the name Gandhi gave them and are still oppressed and exploited.

Mrs Bedi has a degree in Economics and speaks fluent English as well as Hindi, Punjabi and Marathi. For four days

in every month she travels extensively throughout India, observing projects and determining fund allocation.

With C.A.A. support, Mrs Bedi has helped to establish four collective farms where Harijans are learning farming techniques and other skills, along with a confidence in themselves.

This project is being used as a model for other Harijan communities.

Enrolment Time for Caulfield North School

Parents or Guardians intending to enrol children in the Preparatory (Beginners) classes for 1981, are requested to call at the school as soon as possible any school day, between the hours of 10 a.m.-2.30 p.m.

Entry is restricted to children who will reach five years of age on or before June 30th, 1981. Children who have reached the age of six years or children who will reach the age of six years at any time during next year.

Evidence of Date of Birth is necessary for enrolment.

Ceramic Award

The Fourth Annual Walker Ceramic Award will be held at the City of Caulfield Arts Centre from December 8th to December 21st, and an Official Opening will be held on Sunday December 7th at 3 p.m.

This innovative project offers the substantial Award of \$1,000 with a further \$1,000 or more allocated towards the purchase of selected commended pieces.

It is open to all full-time final year students majoring in ceramics in an established ceramic design or pottery course. The Award provides encouragement for students, by providing an opportunity for the public to recognize the talent displayed by these young Australian artists and, in many cases, to help launch careers.

The Award has attracted many interstate entries in the first two years of the event and an even greater interstate participation is anticipated for 1980.

Students are required to submit four entries for the Award. Judgement will be made on an

assessment of the submissions as a group.

Apart from the Award Section, an Open Section will be exhibited so that students can offer for sale other examples of their work.

ABORIGINAL ART

An exhibition of Aboriginal and Oceanic Decorative Art will be held at the Caulfield Arts Centre from Friday November 7th to Sunday November 16th.

Included in the exhibition will be bark paintings from Arnhem Land similar to that being worked on in the picture above.

FREE LECTURE

3 p.m., 16th November, at the Arts Centre. "Aboriginal Bark Paintings from Arnhem Land", everybody welcome.

Bark paintings are significant to clan members in many different ways. In the clan design the patterns are interwoven with the ownership of chants, dances and mythology, some are stylized maps of sacred sites whilst others are associated with mortuary rites.

The designs are also regarded as permission from the supernatural world to occupy clan lands. They establish a link between the spiritual world of the ancestral beings who created the land, and the living clan member.

The designs on the paintings in this exhibition are the exclusive property of the Manggalili Clan and Narritjin Maymuru is the 'Keeper'. His permission must be obtained before another member of the clan may create a painting and this he is entitled to do only if he has completed the requisite number of ceremonies. Even though Nanyin is Narritjin's brother, he always has to ask permission before painting a bark.

Narritjin says 'the paintings are the Manggalili law, they tell us who we are and where we are going'.



Help for Playgroups

For Mothers, and often Fathers, playgroups provide an opportunity for meeting people and forming friendships.

The social and work aspects of belonging to a playgroup involve parents and others in a network of support and friendship that often out-last the families association with the playgroup.

This, in a municipality like Caulfield, which is considered by most to be an older area, is therefore an added bonus.

The organisation and running of playgroups however, requires hard work and effort by many people and this is not without problems. At a recent meeting of

the Children's Services Resource Group it was decided that it would be valuable for people involved in running playgroups to come together to share their ideas and to discuss any difficulties they may be encountering.

A meeting such as this would also allow an opportunity to plan for future groups or to support the smaller groups struggle to get going.

If you are involved in a playgroup, be it large or small, or even if you are holding an informal one in your own home and would like to share with others involved in playgroups, you are invited to attend a meeting to be held on Wednesday November 12th at 7.30 p.m. in the Staff House, next to the Town Hall. Everyone interested in playgroups is welcome.

Playgroups have become an important part of the life of young children and their families. For children they provide an opportunity to mix with others in an informal atmosphere where mother's presence provides the security necessary at this stage of development.

Independent Living Centre

The Independent Living Centre is an aids display and information service for handicapped people.

The Centre can assist —

- Handicapped people and their families.

- Medical Practitioners.
- Nursing Sisters.
- Occupational Therapists.
- Physiotherapists.
- Social Workers.
- Hospital Administrators.
- Architects.
- Students in the relevant fields.

- Home Visiting Nursing Service.

- Community Health Service.
- These are some of the areas in which they can be of assistance: Bathroom; Toileting; Dressing; Eating; Mobility; Communication; Household & Kitchen; Chairs and Wheelchairs and Lifting Equipment.

Free Service

The free services of the Independent Living Centre are two-fold: an Aids Display Centre and an Aids Information Service. The primary aim of the Centre is to enable handicapped people to achieve independence in daily living tasks.

Aids Display Centre

The Centre provides a permanent display of an extensive range of aids and equipment. The Centre's therapists assist every visitor, by explaining and demonstrating the aids on display.

Aids Information Service

An Appointment is necessary to visit so that there is free time to assist you. The Centre is open each week day from 9 a.m.—4.30 p.m. and in addition is open one evening until 8.30 p.m.

The Centre is located close to the city and public transport. There is off-street parking facilities for the handicapped only. The address is 69 Pelham Street, Carlton and Telephone No. 347 5566.

Canine Criminal Apprehended

This friendly old St Bernard was among many dogs and other animals recently impounded by the Council's Animal Control Officer. But not all the dogs in Caulfield are this friendly.

A Caulfield resident was recently fined \$200 in the Elsternwick Court for having an unregistered dog which had attacked a person.

This court case was the latest of five Council prosecutions this year. Fines and costs totalling \$480 have been

imposed by the court.

In addition to this, over 50 on-the-spot infringement notices have been issued against owners of unregistered and wandering dogs.

Fortunately, the majority of dog owners do register their dogs and ensure that they are

kept under proper control at all times.

But for those who fail to do so the on-the-spot fine for an unregistered dog is twice the amount of the appropriate registration fee. Where the dog is found wandering, the penalty is \$25.

Community Arts Seminar

In an effort to determine a productive, creative and exciting arts program in Caulfield, the City Council will be hosting a Community Arts Seminar on Monday, December 8th from 1.30 p.m.-8.30 p.m. at the Caulfield Town Hall.

This Seminar is expected to involve representatives of schools, existing arts/crafts groups and other recreation-oriented organisations in the municipality. It will include Council officers, churches, lay persons and others. The seminar will attempt to discover answers to these questions:

- What is 'art'?
- How is 'art' relevant to Caulfield?
- What elements ought to be included in a comprehensive community arts program?
- How can such elements be provided, and by whom?
- What arts programs exist at present?
- What funding is necessary, and where/how can this be obtained?
- What venues and other resources are necessary?
- What co-ordination or support or information networks are necessary?
- What changes need to be made in order to bring about such a program?

The Seminar is also expected to achieve a strategy for actually creating a viable community arts program. In this strategy, the emphasis will be on community: What is relevant and needed in Caulfield. Therefore, it is hoped that a wide variety of local persons interested in their community will participate.

The program is basically as follows: 1.30 Registration then coffee. 2.00 Speaker (to be determined). 2.30 Questions and discussion time. 3.00 Speaker or film. 3.30 Questions and discussion time. 4.00 Afternoon tea. 4.15 Workshops (oriented toward specific areas of discussion). 5.45 Sherries. 6.30 Dinner. 7.30 Workshop wrap-up conclusions. 8.30 Close.

Everything is provided, but there will be a \$3.00 fee to partially defer the costs of sherries, dinner etc.

This is your opportunity to determine precisely how, where, when and for whom an arts program will occur in Caulfield.

As a result of the recent Federal Elections these people have been elected to represent you.

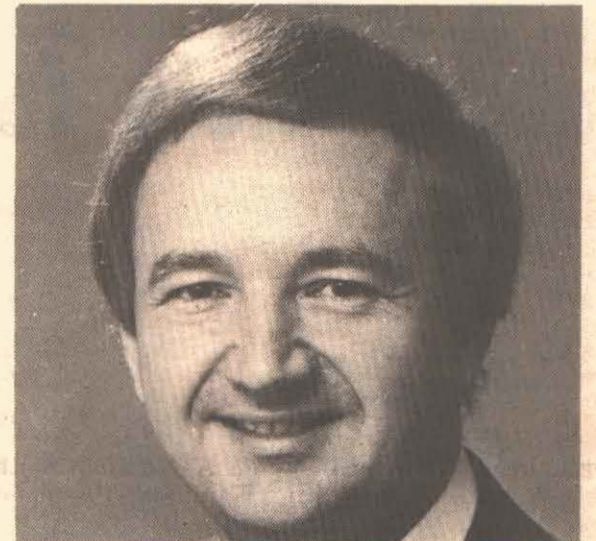
MR IAN MACPHEE Balaclava Electorate

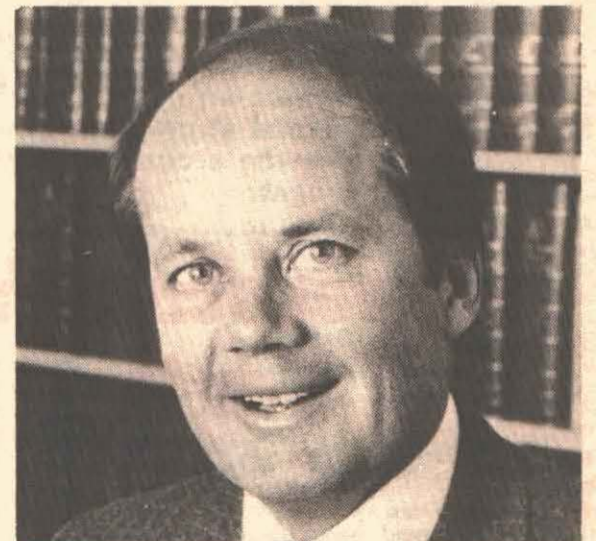
MR ROGER SHIPTON Higgins Electorate

Joan Child was the Federal Member for Henty during 1974 and 1975 and again will represent the Henty Electorate in Federal Parliament.

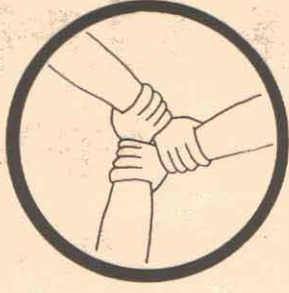
Joan is a widow who has raised five sons. Her experiences, she feels, have given her a real insight into people's needs and have contributed to her commitment to the disadvantaged.

Self Help for the Disabled



What is a Self Help Group?

The term self help is used to refer to groups of people with similar problems, working together for mutual support and assistance in overcoming common problems.

These groups determine their own affairs and may work in association with professionals in the health and welfare field, but are not directed by them.

All policy decisions are made by members who benefit directly from group activities.

The Southern Region

Victoria is divided into several Regions, each having its own Self Help Movement. The Southern Region Association of the Disabled draws its members from Caulfield, Brighton, Malvern, Moorabbin, Mordialloc, Oakleigh and Sandringham municipalities.

Aims and Objectives.

1. To help disabled to reach their potential within the community.
2. To create, within the community, a better understanding of the disabled.
3. To look at the common problems of the disabled, and to find possible solutions.
4. To help disabled to communicate better, both amongst themselves and within the community.
5. To provide and improve facilities for leisure, recreation and social activities for the disabled.
6. To provide support to the disabled and their families, particularly during times of greatest stress.
7. To liaise with other organisations involved with disabled people.

Membership

Qualification for full membership is a permanent physical, intellectual or emotional disability.

Any other interested person is welcome to join and participate but they have no voting rights.

Murrumbeena Students Reach Out



Once a week something special happens at Murrumbeena High School: a group of students from Oakleigh Special Developmental School arrive to take Drama with the Drama C Students from Years 9, 10 and 11.

It's a time that both groups look forward to and for an hour or so they are all actively involved in singing, improvising, talking and drawing.

The project began in Term 1 when the Murrumbeena students suggested they would like to work with some handicapped children.

It has been exciting to watch the increasing confidence of both groups of students.

At first they were tentative with each other, but now each

group has a mutual trust and understanding that leads to a constructive learning situation.

Each Murrumbeena student is paired with an Oakleigh student and is responsible for involving and teaching the visiting child. The learning, however, has been a two way affair as Murrumbeena students have developed a strong sense of care and responsibility for another individual.

The school feels it is a rich experience for them all.

Dental Cement Challenges for Use in Splints

A cement now used in dental fillings is threatening to oust the traditional Plaster of Paris in its use for orthopaedic and fracture splints.

Glass-ionomer cement was originally developed at the UK Government Chemist's research laboratory as a dental filling material, but the laboratory's annual report just published says it is now also seen as an alternative to Plaster of Paris for splints.

Glass and dry acid powders are used to coat the fabric of the bandage to be used on the fracture and the setting reaction is activated by immersion in water.

After setting, the bandage is about twice as strong as Plaster of Paris bandage. This means that the weight and bulk of the bandage can be reduced while retaining normal strength. And because of its increased strength the casts are load-bearing within an hour of application.

The laboratory says the glass-ionomer cement has good water resistance and its translucency makes it easier to x-ray through it.

Following successful tests, the cement is being produced commercially in the UK for use in splints.

News from Council

Tobacco and Alcohol Advertising

After extensive discussion and representations from the public, the Council has formed a policy with regard to the advertising of tobacco and alcohol products in the parks of Caulfield.

No advertising of these products will be allowed without a Council resolution and each application will be viewed on its merit.

Town Hall Renovations

Work is proceeding with the second stage of the remodelling of the Council Offices. The foundations and steelwork are in position and the walls and brickwork have commenced.

It is proposed that a connecting link be constructed between the existing building and the new office area. This will allow people calling at the offices to be directed to the public areas with the least amount of confusion.

Orrong Crescent Road Works

After a number of trial roadworks and extensive resident consultation, the Council has adopted a final plan for traffic control within the Crescent.

The temporary roundabouts will be made permanent and signs will be installed at each end of Orrong Crescent, banning right turns during peak periods.

These bans will be reviewed in 12 months time to consider whether they should operate 24 hours a day.

Proposed Housing Study

In conjunction with the Ministry of Housing, the Caulfield City Council will undertake a detailed evaluation of housing needs and opportunities within the City.

The study will examine current housing controls and policies and evaluate their effectiveness as regards the Council's residential codes. It will also investigate the possible future role that Caulfield Council may play in fulfilling the housing needs of the City.

Management Review

With the introduction, in 1973, of a Corporate Management System within the City of Caulfield, the Council considered that a review of the system was in order.

The City of Caulfield is a pacesetter in this area, and this form of management review is unique within Local Government.

All Councillors and Management Staff will be interviewed and a report will be available some time in February.

Neerim Road Railway Crossing

The Council has approved the installation of a Stop sign in Queens Avenue at Neerim Road in conjunction with proposed treatments at the Neerim Road railway gates. Negotiations have also commenced for the permanent closure of Watson Gve. and Station Place at Neerim Road.

Objection Disallowed

The appeal by objectors against the Council's determination to grant permits for a Special Accommodation Home at Halstead, in Bambra Road, has been disallowed by the Town Planning Appeals Tribunal.

It is proposed that this historic building be preserved and upgraded to house 56 elderly people.

This development means that Caulfield is able to retain a piece of its history with the building still having a viable use.

Amusement Parlours

Complaints concerning amusement parlours are being closely monitored. The parlours are prohibited in areas classified residential C and it is being recommended that any parlours operating in these areas be prosecuted.

Amusement parlours with permits to operate are required to comply with all conditions of the permits. If this is not the case permits will be revoked.

Domiciliary Care Film

A team of students from Rusden State College has been filming at various locations in Caulfield to complete a film on Domiciliary Care Services in the City. A number of older residents have co-operated in its production and some of the filming was done at the Carnegie Elderly Citizens' Club.

Many professional people have given valuable time to the making of this film and the Council is grateful to all who have been involved.

The film should be available some time before Christmas.

BECOMING INVOLVED

The Caulfield Progress Association, established in the early 70's is made up of concerned residents of the municipality — people from many different walks of life, and both the young and the old are found among the members.

As a resident's organisation, it has actively pursued the interests of ratepayers and on numerous occasions it has made sure that residents are consulted on local issues and that their opinions are given serious consideration.

The Association has traditionally been heavily involved in supporting and campaigning for its endorsed candidates at Council elections. In recent times, however, the Association has redirected its activities to place greater emphasis on gaining the participation and involvement of residents in issues which affect them. Consequently residents are finding the Association willing to assist and support them in dealing with many local matters.

The long overdue improvements to the Princes Highway provide an example of the Association's involvement in key issues. The proposal for a major road underpass of the railway line near Malvern Station, was originally suggested by the Association. Later, the Association actively sought resident opinion by letter-boxing the affected areas and by representing the interests of those residents at a meeting convened by the Country Roads Board. The Association argued, along with Caulfield City Council, in favour of the Underpass and ultimately the CRB came to support this alternative. Sadly, because Caulfield is not the only municipality interested in the decision, the matter has not yet been finally resolved, but the

CPA is monitoring the situation.

Further afield, the Association has taken up local concern at the recent Board of Works rate increases. This rate increase was an issue for all ratepayers and the Association voiced resident's concerns by supporting and assisting the Board of Works Ratepayers' Association.

Some years ago the Association supported the introduction of open Council Committee meetings. Under this system residents can participate in discussion and be part of the decision making process. The effectiveness of open Committee Meetings is directly dependent on resident involvement. The onus is on you, the resident, to attend Committee Meetings and to express your opinion, thereby assisting Council to come to a decision. Without your input a wrong decision could be made.

The Caulfield Progress Association has made an important and constructive contribution to Caulfield. If you have a problem with the traffic flow down your street, a permit application that will severely affect your residential environment or for that matter any problem on a local government level, the Association is there to assist you.

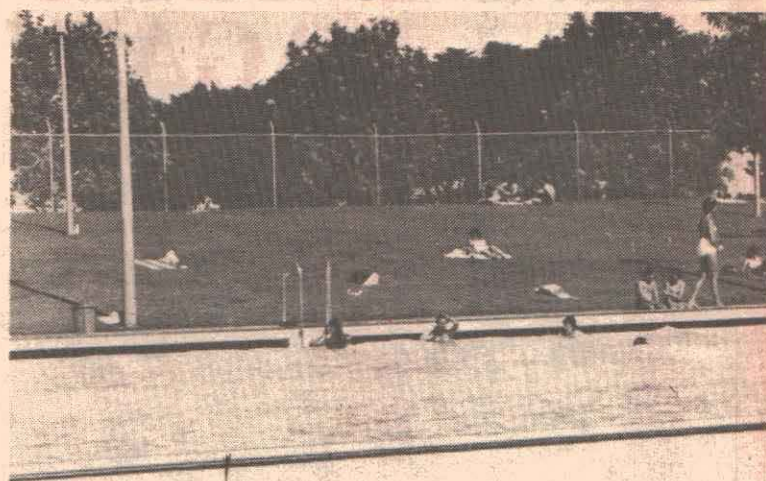

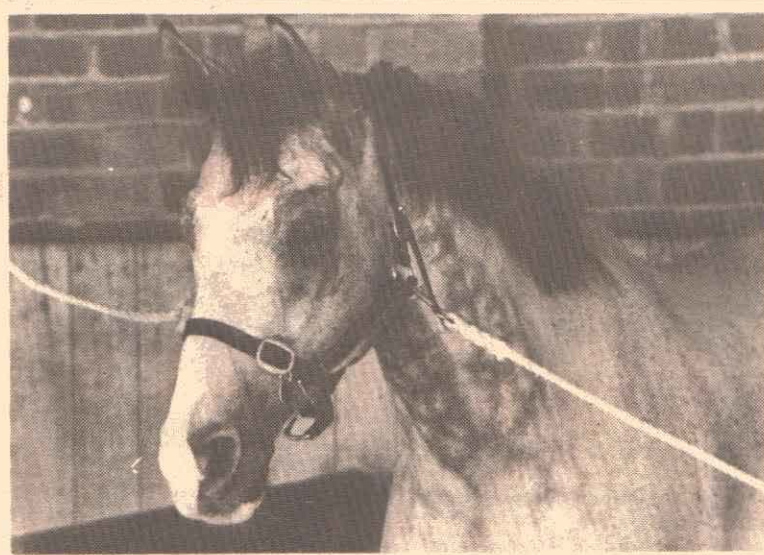

Here's to the New Age of Learning!

With all the aids to study now available to us, this surely must be the new Age of Learning.

This has been made more emphatically so by the Compensatory Education Department at the Caulfield Institute of Technology which offers a wide range of learning programs. These have been designed to suit the individual needs of the many different people within the wider CIT community.

The Department of Compensatory Education now offers an Adult Literacy Program, which has been established since 1978. This is run with volunteers from the community, who are trained at CIT to work on a one-to-one basis with adults wishing to improve their literacy skills.

After the initial training program, volunteers may register and be matched with a suitable student. They meet in an infor-

mal environment, either at one of their homes or in a department house on CIT campus.

Inquiries from people interested in training as volunteer tutors are very welcome.

Classes for Migrants are also offered by the department, both full and part-time (day or evening).

As well as courses run on campus, bi-lingual community-based programs have been set up to help people who are either unable to travel far from home or who lack the confidence to start straight away in a multi-lingual class at CIT.

For people wishing to start a TAFE or Advanced Education course next year, short intensive study skills programs are run every November. These are particularly aimed at helping mature adults resume study or non-native speakers of English who may be studying English for the first time.
