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## Grant for multicultural program

The Neerim Pre-school in Carnegie is to receive a grant towards its multicultural program. The Ministry of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs has approved a grant of \$200 to be directed towards the purchase of multi-lingual library books.

Dr Vaughan, who with Mrs Joan Child, M.H.R. for Henty and Caulfield Councillor Glenn Richards, is a trustee of the Pre-school, said he hoped further financial support for the program would be forthcoming.

"Up to 20 nationalities are represented at the Pre-school adding to the richness of the program presented.

"Amongst these nationalities, the largest group who do not speak English are children whose parents were born in Greece".

In 1978, 10% of the children enrolled were of Greek parents and 36% of all parents were born overseas.

In 1979, 20% of children enrolled were of Greek parents and 46% of all parents were born overseas.

In 1980, 26% of children enrolled were of Greek parents and 61% of all parents were born overseas.

"These trends have continued for this year" Dr Vaughan said.

"The lucky children who attend Neerim Pre-school learn in an environment as culturally enriching as an international holiday" Dr Vaughan said.

The Pre-school was truly a microcosm of the Community at large".

Submissions are also being made for a full time bi-lingual assistant. The Centre currently has one Greek speaking part-time member of staff and wishes to extend the availability of such skills.

## TRADE WASTE COLLECTION — next stage in Council Program

The next stage of Caulfield's Total Waste Collection Program is to be implemented. A Trade Waste Collection Service is to be provided for business premises throughout the City.

A number of requests, for such a service, from Traders in the North Caulfield and Elsternwick areas, have already been received and reference to trade waste collection services in surrounding municipalities indicates that at least 50% of such premises would use a trade

waste collection service if it were provided by the Council.

Whilst it would not be compulsory for business premises to use the Council waste disposal services constant checks would be made to ensure that all waste was being disposed of in a sanitary manner.

It is envisaged that charges would be levied along the lines indicated below:

## A Giant Water Slide for Caulfield's Pool

The Caulfield Memorial Swimming Pool will take a new lease on life after it undergoes some radical changes in the near future.

In order to attract more people to the pool complex and to encourage additional use of the facilities, a range of activities are being considered for both summer and winter use which could provide the basis for a recreational centre in the Carnegie area.

The Council has approved the installation of a giant water slide for the coming season. It will consist of two circular sections,

each 150 feet long and charges over and above the entrance fee would be levied on those wishing to use the slide.

Slides similar to this have been erected elsewhere and have proved enormously popular.

CONSIDERATION HAS BEEN GIVEN TO MANY OTHER INNOVATIVE CHANGES.

The pool surrounds provide an ideal location for both ice and roller skating. The pool itself could be used for supervised scuba training, canoe classes, model boat races or fly fishing practice.

Already approval has been given for the establishment of netball, handball and volley ball courts in the car park area of the swimming pool.

The possibilities exist for the establishment of an electronic amusement machine area adjacent to the office building and an additional building could provide facilities for a gymnasium, table tennis, sauna, solarium clubrooms, coffee shop or first-aid instruction and resuscitation areas.

The possibilities are unending and the future looks bright for Caulfield's swimming pool.



# FRUIT FLY CONTROL IN CARNEGIE

Queensland fruit fly a native pest of Queensland was detected in Carnegie during January this year, according to Agriculture Minister, Tom Austin.

Immediately fruit fly were detected, Carnegie and the surrounding district (see map) was proclaimed a "Fruit Fly" area. This prohibits the movement of fruit and vegetables from the area without a permit. On proclaiming the area, Department of Agriculture inspectors distribute traps throughout the district to monitor any further outbreaks of the pest.

The fruit fly is a little larger than the common housefly and is reddish-brown with bright yellow patches on the body. However, it is most unlikely that you would see any fly, or the sting of the fly, on the fruit. The eggs are laid just under the skin and when the maggots hatch, they burrow in towards the centre of the fruit. Look for white active maggots in otherwise sound fruit. The maggots will jump if removed from the fruit. The fly usually strikes fruit which is ripe or almost ripe, so windfalls should be given special attention.

Fruit fly larvae are maggots and have no heads or legs. Don't be confused by grubs or other insects. Codling moth grubs have legs and distinct heads. Fruit infested by codling moth clearly shows the entry hole whereas the stings of the fruit fly are hardly visible.

To eradicate the pest an attractant spray is applied in small 100 ml squirts containing Protein hydrolysate and only 0.5 g of malidison to roadside trees. This procedure replaces the old method of widespread cover spraying with poisonous insecticides. Both the baiting and the monitoring are conducted fortnightly throughout the summer and

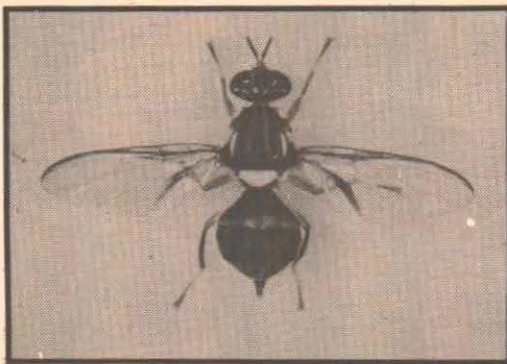
autumn and again in the spring to eradicate those few flies which survive our southern winter.

Householders can assist the Department of Agriculture in eradicating this pest by picking up and burning or boiling any fruit which is not eaten, or alternatively burying the fruit beneath 25 cm of compacted soil will destroy any larvae present.

Co-operation with the Victorian Department of Agriculture to eradicate this pest is in your own and your own district's interest.

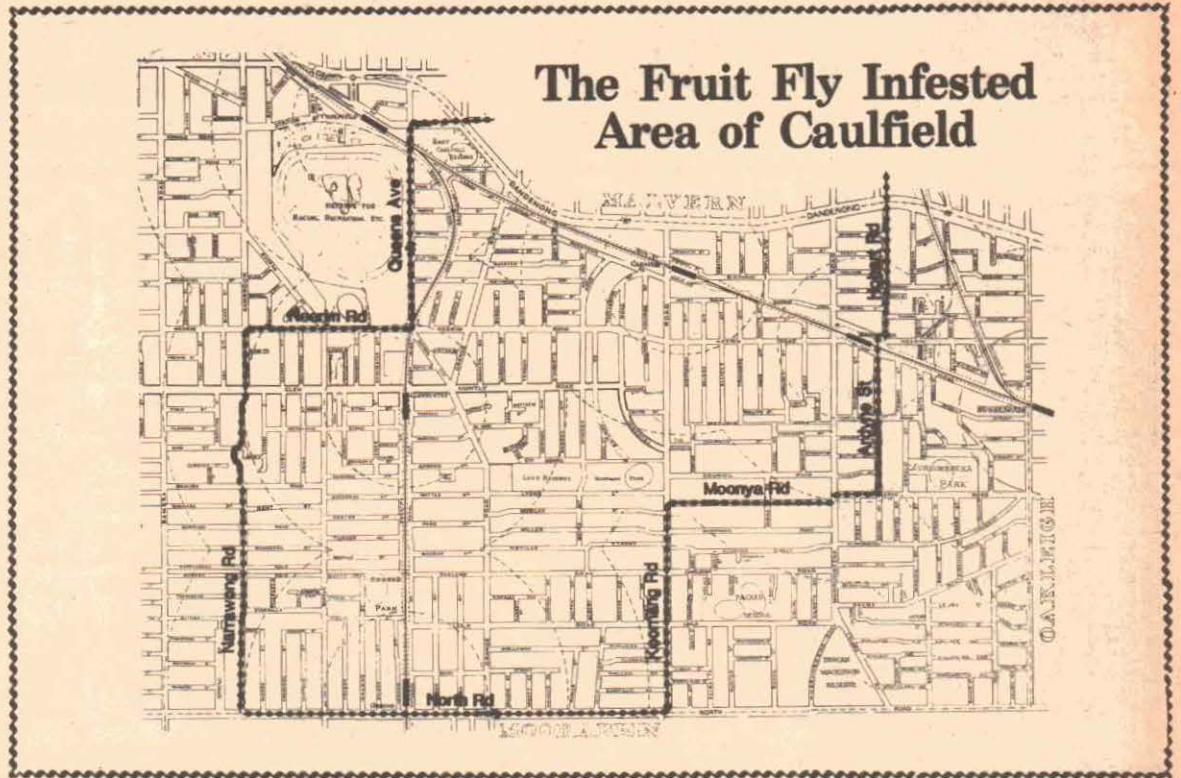
The Fruit Fly is a little larger than the common housefly.

## ARTS VICTORIA Music '81

The first in a series of Prom Concerts presented by the Early Music consort of Melbourne at the Caulfield Arts Centre will be held on Sunday March 29th at 3.00 p.m. The Program is entitled: "The Sound of Early Music" and was specially devised for senior music/history students, featuring an extensive range of Medieval and Renaissance instruments.

Historic music, from as far back as the court of Henry VIII, along with the dances, songs and costumes of Henry's times, will be a regular feature of activities during 1981.

The move will bring to the Arts Centre Australia's most frequently performing Early Music group, the Early Music Consort of Melbourne, and a team of authentically costumed Renaissance Dancers who are regarded as the world leaders in their field.

The dance group, widely known as the Rippon Lea Renaissance Dancers, has been in intensive training for the past four years and has performed frequently at Rippon Lea.

Highlighting the instrument collection will be a recently completed Italian Virginals, C. 1600, made by Mark Nobel of Melbourne. Instruments by

Mark Nobel are featured in many performances by the Early Music Consort of Melbourne, and this maker was recently chosen as chief exhibitor of historic instruments at the largest Music-81 instrument exhibition, to be staged by the Sandringham Arts Council in November.

## Caulfield Plans for the Disabled

Throughout 1981, a year declared to be devoted to upgrading services and facilities for the disabled within our community, Caulfield City Council will do its best to support the aims of the handicapped.

Several proposals have been put forward and include:

- Establishing parking areas in all major shopping centres around Caulfield for disabled Persons.
- Assessing curbing and grading slopes will be recommended at all traffic lights and pedestrian crossings where not already present.
- Council will be encouraging owners of local shops and commercial

premises to make their buildings accessible to disabled people and particularly people in wheelchairs. Stickers denoting the International symbol for wheelchair accessibility to be given by the Council to shops and commercial buildings. There will be leaflets available from the Community Liaison Officer.

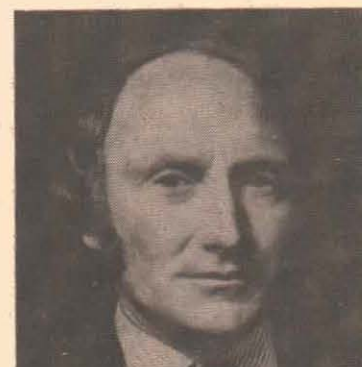
- Encouragement for handicapped children to attend the school holiday programs which are conducted in the local libraries (except Elsternwick), with various activities (crafts, stories) to encourage social interaction between all groups of children.
- Encouraging local self-help groups to publicize their group's purpose and aim through 'Caulfield Contact'.

- The Council Offices are to be assessed and recommendations will be made to the Council to upgrade parts of the buildings most likely to be used by disabled persons.

- A recommendation to Council that they formally adopt the Australian Standard 1428 - 1977, "Design Rules for Access by the Disabled" as part of the Caulfield Council Building Code. To ensure that, in the future, commercial/public buildings and those needing major renovations will have access for the disabled, with facilities provided where required.

- The Citizens Advice Bureau to have extensive information available regarding the disabled. Services such as Self-help groups, charities etc.

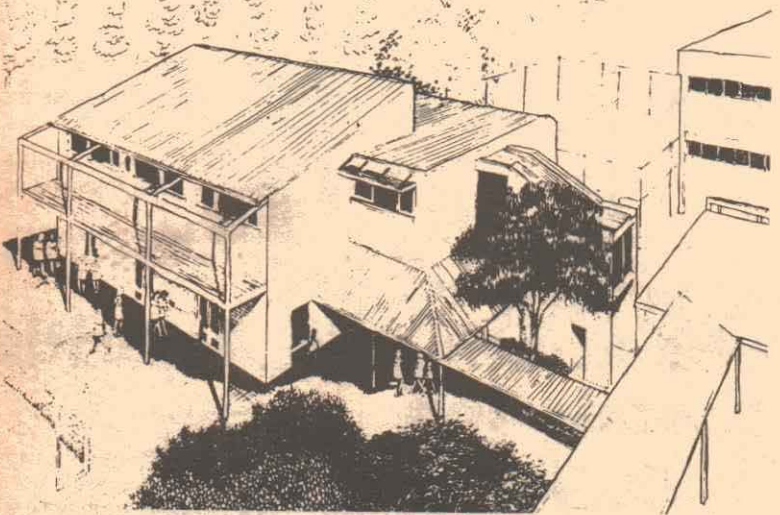
1981 has been designated a Jubilee Year to mark the 50th anniversary of this event and a number of special occasions have been planned to mark it.

## VICSWIM AND THE DISABLED

For some time swimming has been recognised as an ideal form of recreation, exercise and therapy for many people with disabilities.

Vicswim, the State and Water Safety Development Committee, is at present reviewing the methods currently being used for the teaching of swimming to people with handicaps in Victoria.

Vicswim's philosophy is to broaden its emphasis from swimming simply to learn stroke technique, to swimming for fun and recreational purposes, with the manifest aim of safe-swimming. This applies as much to swimmers with disabilities as it does to those without. In the past, swimming has been seen more as a therapy than as a recreational activity for disabled swimmers. There is no reason why it cannot be both.

It is hoped that a teacher of Swimming and Water Safety Certificate Course for those teaching disabled people, along with a swimming certificate for disabled swimmers, will be introduced in 1981. ## Reflections of Life in Caulfield

## New legislation needed to control incinerators



Each year the Caulfield City Council receives a considerable number of complaints relating to the use of incinerators.

But although many municipalities have by-laws that attempt to control the days and hours of operation and the construction and siting of incinerators, no such by-law is applicable in this city.

In seeking legal opinion, it has been found that no power exists to enforce these by-laws and their legality is questionable.

It has been considered, therefore, that unless any by-laws controlling the use of incinerators in the City of Caulfield are enforceable they would serve no useful purpose.

The Municipal Association of Victoria, however has made representation to the Minister for Local Government to have the Local Government Act amended so as to provide adequate by-laws making powers.

The only real method of control at present available, is to apply the nuisance provisions of the Health Act in respect of any incinerator from which smoke is emitted in an offensive manner.

This control could be applied

irrespective of the time of day and the situation or type of construction of the incinerator.

The Environment Protection Authority has recommended restrictions on the use of domestic incinerators and the development of alternatives to incineration.

The Council supports the M.A.V. and the E.P.A. and continues to provide a hard rubbish collection service and garden refuse disposal facilities.

With the introduction of the 'big bin' system for the disposal of household garbage, there is virtually no need for residents to dispose of rubbish by burning.

Nevertheless, as an adjunct to existing and future alternatives, the ability to improve legislative control over the use of incinerators would be advantageous.

## Library Subsidies

The Hon. Don K. Hayward, M.L.C., Member for Monash Province announced that Caulfield City Library will receive \$239,625 and Malvern City Library, \$145,725 as part of the \$13,153,850 Victorian Government Library Subsidies to Municipal Regional Libraries.

Mr. Hayward said that the total of the subsidies was \$1.157 million greater than last year and provides for an increase in the maximum subsidy allowable to councils of 25c per head of population.

The subsidy is paid on the basis of \$2 from the State Government for every \$1 spent by a municipal council on its library services and the increase

brings the subsidy to \$3.25 per head.

In addition Caulfield-Malvern Regional Library will receive a regional grant of \$11,250. Mr Hayward said grants to regional libraries have increased by 15% this year and these have played a major role in making Victoria a leader in the regionalization of library services.

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## TAKE CARE WITH TETANUS

Autumn is the time for tidying up the garden. A harmless enough occupation you may say; a time when we can get out for a little exercise and fresh air.

**BUT BE CAREFUL.** It was stated in a medical report from the Fairfield Hospital that a 58-year-old woman recently suffered a severe attack of tetanus after she received a small wound on her hand while she was gardening.

She was treated by a total paralysis regimen and was kept unconscious while artificial respiration was applied. The lady has since recovered, but a tetanus immunisation would have averted the trouble.

In January of this year, a Caulfield resident was also reported to have contracted tetanus as a result of a motor mower accident.

Tetanus can result from trivial or even unnoticed wounds since the bacterial spore can survive in soil or dust for very long periods, even years.

Immunization is the only method by which tetanus, resulting from unnoticed wounds, can be prevented.

In addition to providing free immunization at each of five Infant Welfare Centres and the annual campaigns in schools, evening sessions are held at the Caulfield Infant Welfare Centre for the benefit of adults.

It is recommended that following the primary course of three doses, booster doses should be given every 5 - 10 years to maintain immunity.

Any adult who has not had the primary course or not had a booster dose in the last 5 - 10 years, can attend the evening sessions for free immunization. Sessions commence at 7 p.m. and the next three will be held on May 5th, June 16th and July 28th.

They will organise and take part in short courses and other educational programs to improve knowledge and skills in horticulture and environment improvement.

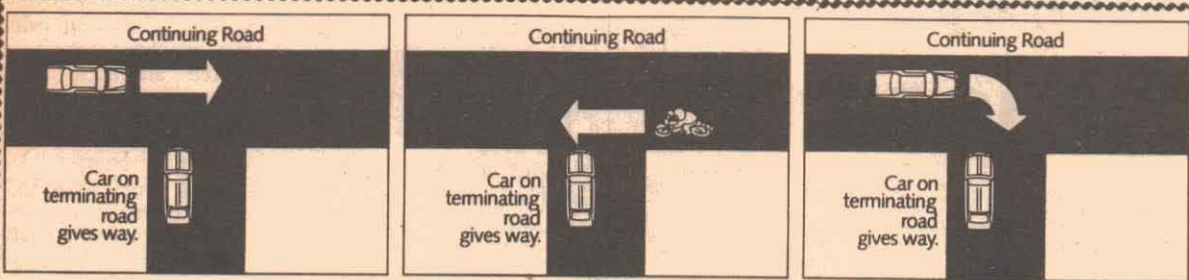

# 'T' INTERSECTION RULING

On March 1st, 1981, road traffic regulations were amended to allow for the control of traffic travelling in 'T' intersections.

The new ruling will require traffic entering an uncontrolled 'T-Junction' on the "terminating" road (the stem of the 'T') to give way to traffic on the "continuing" road (the top of the 'T'). THIS ACTION WILL INTRODUCE THE FINAL PHASE OF STATCON IN THE STATE OF VICTORIA.



All traffic on the terminating road must give way to ALL traffic on the continuing road including traffic turning right from the continuing road.

**Give way to both the left and the right.**

The new rule applies to all types of 3-way intersections:



**Think. And give way.**

Some irregular 'T' or 'Y' junctions may cause problems and require the installation of "Stop" or "Give Way" signs to allow the safer involvement of traffic.

Over the past few years the Authority has been directing considerable attention to the development of techniques for controlling traffic in the local street system.

There is a need to recognise the inherent differences between the nature of local roads and the function of the arterial road system. Local roads exist principally to provide access to properties, and vehicle flow along such roads should be characterised by low speeds and low volumes.

In urban areas, treatments already available for traffic management in local streets include pavement narrowing, road closures, roundabouts, advisory signing as well as the use of STOP and GIVE WAY signing. Continuing work is being undertaken in the development and evaluation of further techniques which include intersection splitter islands, road narrowing, changes to street entry profiles and associated streetscaping and other speed control devices.

## Run for Fun

Shake off that lethargy and join the 4th Annual Fun Run on Sunday, April 12th.

It will follow the same 7 km course as run in previous years from the Caulfield Town Hall to Duncan MacKinnon Park in Murrumbeena.

## News from Council

### Community Day

The guidelines and principles upon which Caulfield Community Day was established are at present under review.

In order to assist the Council in setting the format for future Community Days, those who have participated in the past and other community groups who are interested in the concept of a community day, will be asked to evaluate the day and put forward new ideas for the future.

### Proposed Roundabout

It is considered that a roundabout is necessary at the intersection of Poath and Kangaroo Roads. ROSTA has been requested to seek the Minister's approval to provide finance for the works under the Statcon Program.

A splitter island should also be constructed in Murrumbeena Cres. at Murrumbeena Road to ensure the proper flow of traffic to the roundabout.

### No tree felling for catchment areas.

The Caulfield City Council, through its representative to the Southern Region Area Commission, Cr Ron Walters is objecting to the proposals being discussed by the MMBW for the possible granting of permits which would allow tree felling in the catchment areas of the State.

Such activities, it is felt, would disrupt the ecological balance of these areas and possible consequent erosion would result in the pollution of water supplies.

### Entrance to Carnegie

A major banner sign is to be erected at the Dandenong Road entrance to the Carnegie Shopping Centre in Koornang Road.

This point is a gateway to the City of Caulfield and the attractive sign will welcome visitors and encourage a 'city image'. The sign will identify one of the City's major shopping centres and also encourage use of the indicated off-street carparks.

### Hit-up Wall

Following a request from the Glenhantly Park Committee of Management, the Council has approved the construction of a tennis hit-up wall near the existing tennis courts in Glenhantly Park.

### Agreement with R.S.P.C.A.

The Council has entered into an agreement with the R.S.P.C.A., legalising its activities within the City, and their efforts to provide an animal resource service. This agreement is necessary under the Dog Act and allows animal welfare organisations to seize any dog; restore it to its owner, or sell or destroy the dog.

The R.S.P.C.A. has operated a sick or injured, stray animal resource service throughout the metropolitan area since 1968.

### Computer News

The conversion from Honeywell to the Wang computer is now complete. Only minor problems were encountered and the system is now running smoothly.

Students from CIT have completed some of the 76 programs which will form a major part of the new system.

The Council's Record System is now fully computerized, the Property System is being standardized and a Community Resources File is soon to be established.

Using these new and existing programs enables much of the work at the Town Hall to be processed more efficiently.

### From the Engineers

Carnegie Shopping Centre is a hive of industry these days. Works involved in the footpath widening in Koornang Road have been commenced and should be finished some time in June.

Roadworks in Kooyong Road between Glen Eira and Glenhantly Roads are well underway and a right-hand turn signal is being installed at the traffic lights at the intersection of Kooyong and Glen Eira Roads.

### Ready for the Winter Season

The outside staff of the council have been hard at work repairing the turf wickets and preparing football grounds for the coming season. Goal posts have been repaired and painted and everything is in readiness for all those Caulfield-based football teams to show us how it is done.

### Administrative Officers Permits Committee

With the proclamation of new planning legislation, Local Government authorities are now able to delegate certain planning matters to committees and officers.

Whilst, for more important applications, the Council is the elected decision making body an "Administrative Permits Committee" has been established to process minor Town Planning applications.

All decision making will be subject to no objections being received from the parties concerned and that the project is recommended by the Town Planner.

The Council's aim in setting up this committee, is to allow for streamlining of the planning process and to improve the service to applicants.

## The Potter's Art

The Caulfield Arts Centre will present an Exhibition demonstrating the excellent and individual quality of domestic pottery being made in workshops throughout Australia by Australian Artist Craftsmen.



It will feature the work of 27 established Australian potters. The display aims to increase the awareness of the general public to what pottery is available and provide guidelines on quality. It will provide examples for the many aspiring potters seeking to make functional ware and will help promote the work of potters making consistently good quality tableware.

The Exhibition is touring under the auspices of the Australian Gallery Directors Council and opens its National tour at the Caulfield Arts Centre.

I will be 90 in July and there probably aren't many people left that would remember these things.

Club officials are looking forward, with confidence, to these Grand Finals, and with reason — performances have been outstanding.

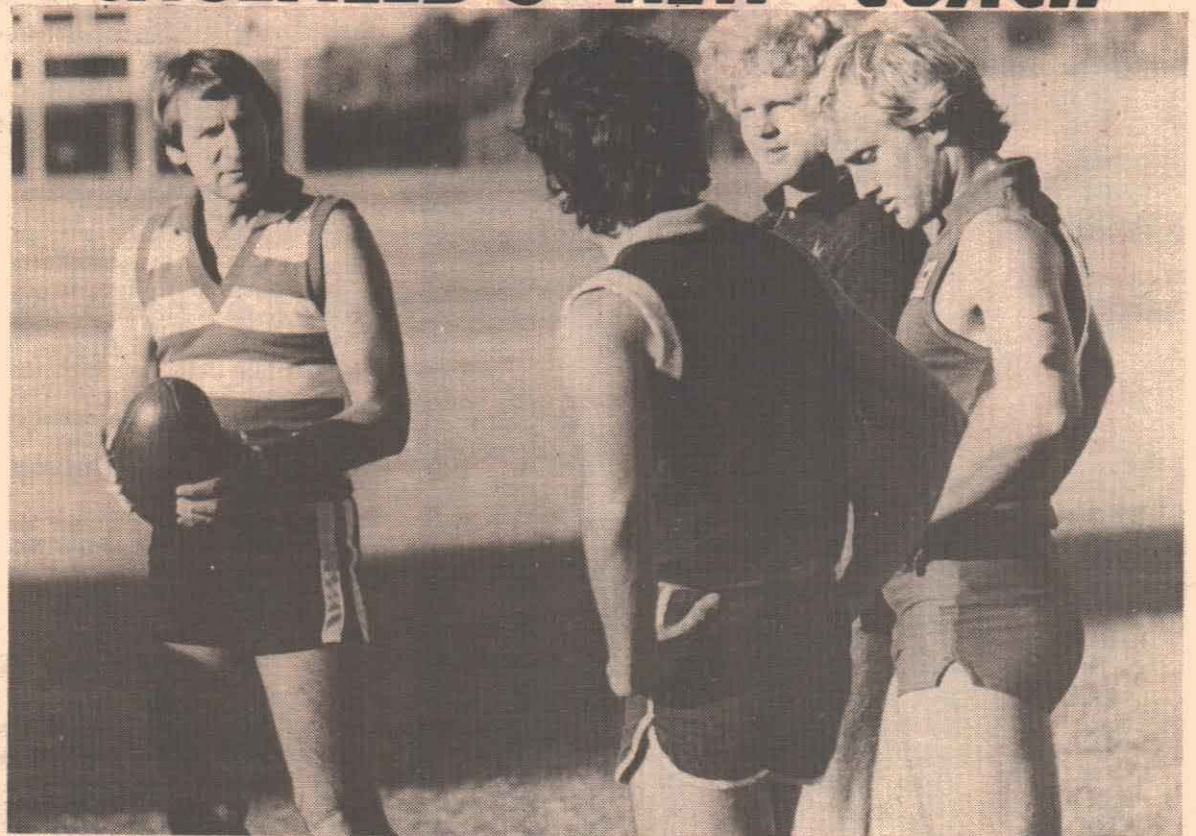

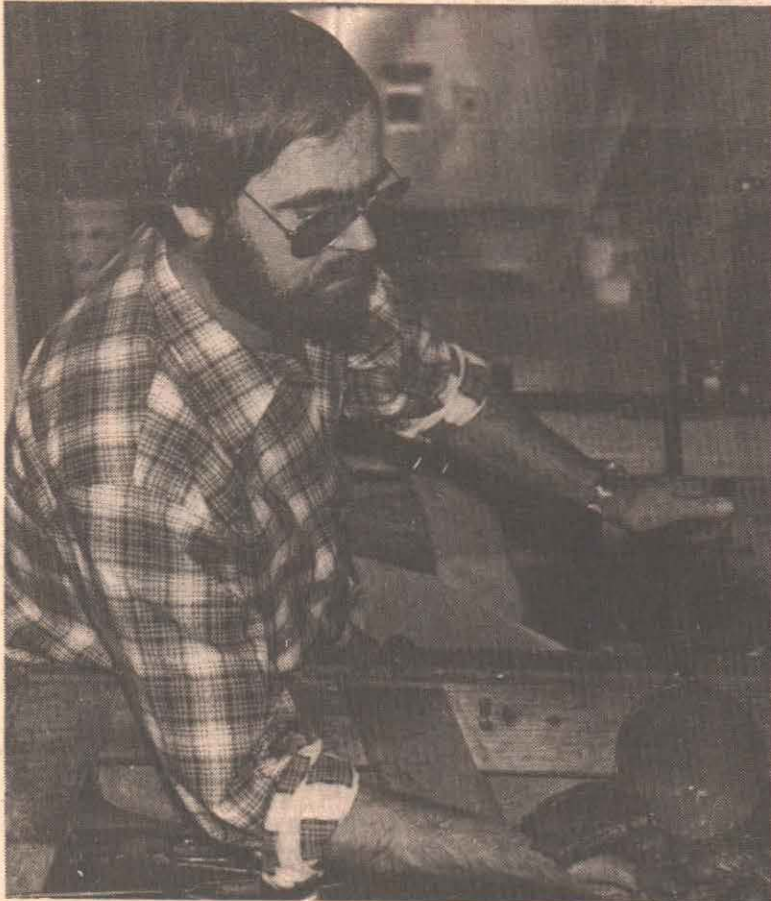
