These untied funds go into the general revenue of the Council and spending priorities are allocated according to needs and resources available.

Additional funds for specific purposes are also awarded by the Federal Government in such areas as housing, aged care and other welfare programs.

She was educated at a Swedish state school and before enrolling at the University of Stockholm spent a year at Radcliffe College in Cambridge, Massachusetts, studying American history, music and 18th century Dutch art.

Her interests include not only art but music, the history of music and ballet, and she has a keen desire to attend an evening at the Sydney Opera House.

Regionalisation of Health Services

The Health Commission of Victoria, which is responsible for the development of Health services in our state, has resolved to regionalise its services.

In moving towards a policy of regionalisation the Commission is concerned to improve the supply and distribution of services designed to promote the health and well-being of the Victorian popu-

The concept of regionalisation is invariably associated with the transfer of functions and decision making to the regional level. The State will be divided into a number of regions with the Melbourne regions each totalling approximately 1 million people.

Each region will be responsible for the supervision of existing health programs and the development of new services.

An important part of the restructure is the establishment of District Health Councils. The Councils are designed to allow local citizens to have a say in the planning and development of local health services. While the District Health Councils are advisory they will have direct contact with the Chief Executive Officer of

each region. The Council's will comprise approximately 100,000 people and will be organised along municipal boundaries. It is likely that Caulfield will either be linked with a neighbouring municipality such as Brighton or Malvern or be identified as a dis-trict Health Council in its own right.

A discussion paper on the District Health Council will be available shortly and it is hoped that citizens will

express their views on the subject.

Caulfield Commun-Service, a local Health/Welfare co-ordinating organisation, has considered the issue and has resolved to encourage the establishment of a District Health Council based on Caulfield.

Further information regarding the Health services regionalisation can be obtained either from the Health Commission of Victoria or the Caulfield Council.

Balaclava to become "Goldstein"

The Member for Balaclava, Mr. Ian McPhee, said today he regretted that the name Balaclava would be lost from the Federal Parliament.

commenting on the decision of the Electoral Commission to change the name of the electorate of Balaclava to Goldstein, in honour of Vida Jane Mary Goldstein (1869-1949), a noted feminist, suffragist and social reformer who was the first woman in the British empire to stand for election to a national

parliament. "The seat of Balaclava has a proud record in the Federal Parliament, and I am sorry that its name is being changed, particu-

Mr. McPhee was tion," he said. "It is bound to cause confusion, because people had very little time to get used to the new

"The electorate has been known as Balaclava since Federation and is in fact one of only four Federation seats left in Melbourne. The others are Kooyong, Melbourne and Melbourne Ports." Mr. McPhee said

that, if the seat has to be changed, it is appropriate that it should be named after a distinguished Australian woman. Vida Goldstein larly so close to an elec- went to Presbyterian

Ladies College and was one of the first women to graduate from Melbourne University.

She was a key figure in the appeal which founded the Queen Victoria Hospital and was instrumental in the establishment of the children's courts. She was also President of the Christian Science Church in Melbourne.

The Australian Dictionary of Biography records: "Of all the Australian women connected with the emancipation and suffrage movements of the day, Vida Goldstein was the only one to gain a truly iternational reputation.

"Although Vida Goldstein may appear to have been a visionary idealist, yet by her pioneering efforts, her successes and her failures, she was a trail blazer who provided leadership to innumerable people."

Mr. McPhee said he had been unaware of moves to change the name of the electorate and had not been consulted. While he believed that Vida Goldstein was a commendable choice, he was critical of the procedure of changing electorate names on the eve of an election without giving candidates or electors any opportunity to make suggestions or voice opinions.

Victorian Tourism Booklet Available

ism Commission recently released a new publication dealing with the government's tourism strategy.

> The new approach as outlined in this document marks a major adjustment in V ctorian Tourism policy. Seven primary resort zones have been designated on a geographic basis allowing for development of each zone.

An analysis of the spending patterns of tourists has shown that international and interstate visitors spend far greater amounts while touring Victoria than do Victorians.

The Victorian Government is aware of the need to attract Victorians to Victoria's tourism regions and is working towards this aim. The Victorian Tourism Commission is the body responsible for the implementation of this strategy.

Equal Opportunity for Disabled

The Equal Opportunity Board has available a booklet on Equal Opportunity for people with disabilities which explains the Act in relation to disabled persons.

The Act states that it is unlawful to treat anyone unfairly because of their disability. Any disabled person treated unfairly at work or in connection with housing or schooling or in buying goods or getting loans and other services can make a complaint to the Board.

The booklet covers areas such as What happens if someone complains?, What goods and services are covered?, and What if it is too difficult to pro-

vide the service for disabled people?

Effects of the Commonwealth

Budget

The impact of the Commonwealth budget on Caulfield for 1984/85 is, for the most part, difficult to determine at this stage.

Generally, it would appear that funding is quite similar to last year's structure with some notable changes.

Meals-on-wheels

There is an additional \$750,000 available for the delivered meals subsidy. The availability of this increase however is unclear.

From January 1, 1985 the subsidy will be provided in two components — 50 cents per meal for the cost of production or purchase and 25 cents per meal for delivery. This could mean an increase of 20 cents per meal for those eligible organisations.

Hostel personal care subsidies

The hostel care subsidy rate is to increase by \$1 to \$11 per week. The rate of personal care subsidy will be increased from \$40 to \$44

The Commonwealth has provided grants to the States to assist with the provision of selfcontained accommodation at reasonable rentals for certain categories of pensioners who have little or no means of support apart from their pensions. This allocation is estimated to increase in 1984-85.

There is also a grant which is intended to assist local government and community and welfare organisations to purchase, construct, lease or upgrade dwellings for low cost rental housing. This may be wholly or jointly owned by State housing

aged by the Local Government, community or welfare organisations.

The Government has further decided to introduce a new supported accommodation assistance program which will include three sub-programs; Youth Supported Accommodation, Women's Emergency Services Program and General Supported Accommodation Program. Capital assistance will also be provided for a new crisis accommodation program.

Counselling and emergency relief

The Family Support Services Scheme is to be extended to September 30 1985 to further provide funds for services to assist families during periods of crisis. There will also be a

substantial increase in the amount allocated for emergency relief which could, therefore, see the continuation of the Caulfield Citizens Advice Bureau's involvement being primarily a responsibility for the provision of emergency relief. The Council's social workers will provide supplementary support in this program.

Children's services

The block grant funding made to the States towards the cost of pre-school education will remain at the same level as in 1983/84. There is to be an overall increase in the expenditure however on the children's services program but details are not available at this stage. It appears that significant amounts will be provided for children's services other than preschool activities.

News from Council

New Child Care Centre

The Common. wealth and State Governments have recently announced a large increase in funds for children's services. Caulfield has been selected as one of the target municipalities and has applied for funding for the establishment of a thirty place child care centre on the site of the existing infant welfare centre in Truganini Road in Carnegie.

Meat Confiscated

The activities of the Health and Legislation Department at the City Hall are many and varied. Following a burglary in a butcher's shop a lot of the meat was strewn around the premises. As a result the Council's Health Surveyors had to seize and destroy 70 kilograms of various meats considered as a result to be contaminated.

Councillors Allowance

Caulfield Councillors recently expressed a need for the maximum level of councillors' allow-ances to only be increased along with the consumer price index. This or any other acceptable mechanism would be better than arbitrary increases.

These views were expressed following a request by the Municipal Association of Victoria to determine a possible method of review of the allowances paid to council-

Christmas **Decorations**

The Council is looking at the possibility of assisting local traders associations with the installation of Christmas decorations. This follows requests from these groups for help in decorating the shopping centres of the City.

It may be possible to develop a system that is reusable, year after year, and to progressively introduce it throughout the shopping centres.

Budget Increase for Home Help

Consideration will be given to the allocation of an additional

\$15,000, nett cost, to the home help budget in the 1984/85 annual estimates. This would alleviate the existing waiting list and reduce the anxiety of a number of elderly residents.

The length of time residents remain on the waiting list at present varies between one and five months. Emergency referrals are helped within a fortnight.

Permit Refused

An application to use premises in Koornang Road as an amusement parlour has been refused. Although the proposal complied with the Council's planning code with regard to internal arrangements it was considered to be too close to the Carnegie Primary School and residential areas.

Responsibility for Cemeteries

The Caulfield Council opposes the view of the Mortuary Industry and Ceme-teries Administration Committee that all cemeteries should be administered by local councils. Such a responsibility, the Council felt, would incur greatly in-creased financial burden.

At present the 551 public cemeteries in the State are directly administered by trusteeship. In 86 of these cases the entire council of the municipality has been appointed to be trustee and State Government supervision is minimal.

Education Program

The water quality in commercially operated spa pools was recently tested and three were found to have incorrect chlorine residuals. To ensure that pools are correctly operated proprietors will be instructed in the correct method of chlorination. This requires testing of the water twice daily and maintaining the results of these tests.

Regular tests will also continue to be carried out by the Health Surveyors of the Council.

A Note From the Dog Pound

Dogs are released from the Pound from 4.00-4.30 pm Mondays to Fridays only. Dogs can also be released on Saturdays, Sundays and Public Holidays by appointment only.

The Pound is normally closed down during the Christmas / New Year break and no dogs are kept in the Pound during this time.

The Release fees for dogs include a \$10 Pound Fee and a \$20 Vet Vaccination Fee. All dogs held in the Pound for longer than 24 hours are automatically inoculated by a veterinarian against parvo, hepatitis and distemper.

Other fees relating to registration and dog infringement notices may also be applicable. The Council's officers will advise owners of such liabilities at the time the dog is released to the owner.

Unclaimed dogs

All dogs are kept for eight days then they are either put up for sale or destroyed.

Unclaimed dogs for sale to the public will be sold with a vaccination certificate and the sale fee is \$35 irrespective of breed, sex or type of dog.

Any dog sold from the Pound over six months of age must be registered with the appropriate Council within 48 hours.

A Reminder on Registration

All dogs over the age of six months must be registered with the Council.

Child Care Enrolments

Applications for child care in 1985 at the three children's centres jointly run by the Council and parents are now being accepted until the end of November.

Successful applicants will be notified by mail.

The Centres are situated at Caulfield for two to five year-olds, Ormond and Murrumbeena for babies to five year-olds.

In addition it is likely that a new child care centre will be established in the Carnegie area by mid-1985.

Priority for child care at any of the centres is given to children whose single parent or both parents are working, studying or actively looking for work and to children whose parents require child care because of a continuing disability, illness or incapacity.

Special consideration is given to children of Aboriginal, ethnic or single parent families or those who are isolated or on low incomes because of their restricted alternatives or to children at risk.

A liberal fee relief system is available subject to a means test.

The sliding fee scale with a minimum of 25c per hour is applicable to parents with assessed weekly incomes up to approximately \$500 per week and includes provision for families with more than one child requiring care.

An interesting new book in the libraries is

"The Name of the Rose" by Umberto Eco. The book headed the New York Times best seller list for many months. The front pages contain over 30 rave reviews from some of the most prestigious magazines and newspapers in the U.S.A.

The author is an Italian professor who specializes in medieval history and the novel is set in this period. The plot concerns a series of grisly murders in a Dominican monastery. A Franciscan monk on a secret mission from the Emperor trys to solve the mystery before a high-powered meeting takes place between feuding factions of the Church in conflict over loyalty to the Pope or to the Emperor.

The political and theological conflicts of the time become part of the total mystery as to why the monks are being murdered. The action builds to an exciting climax in the mysterious library. This is a most unusual and very satisfying combination of detective, philosophical and historical fiction set in a very important time in the development of the Catholic Church.

The second Melbourne Fringe Arts Festival is now on and 16 artists are displaying their work at 8 Yendon Rd., Carnegie from October 3 to 7.







EISURELY LOOK

Probably the most rewarding part of my job is making the elderly folk of Caulfield

As we get older we find most of our skills we had when we were younger just get that little bit more difficult to accomplish. This is where the benefits of fitness and health help us carry out daily tasks with vigor and alertness and enable us to enjoy active recreation with a reserve to cope with emergencies.

The Importance of Exercise to the Aged

Exercise is important for flexibility and mobility. It also minimises the effect of Osteoarthritis and will help you keep a full range of movement in your joints and prevent stiffening of muscles from lack of use.

As we age we tend to sit around more, which leads to thinning of the bones, known as Osteoporosis (loss of calcium in the bones) which becomes common over the age of 65. But a good diet and exercise will delay this natural process.

Exercise actually keeps the calcium in the bones. A favorite slogan of mine is "To rest is to rust".

Elderly Programs in Caulfield

At the moment I run a number of programs both in our Council-owned Hostels for the Frail Aged and in the community. Most of my time is spent organising leisure activities in the hostels. Regular activities include:

• Bus trips to the theatre

- Half day coach tours to the country, flower
- festivals etc.

 Monthly coffee mornings

Mystery bus tours

Discussion groups

Exercise class for the Frail Aged run by a physiotherapist from Chadstone Community Health Centre.

One of the most successful programs, now in its third year, is the Over 50s Swimming Program run at Clayton Swimming Pool. Exercises and games are done in a warm and friendly atmosphere. All my participants look forward to meeting their new-found friends and many of them now holiday together.

I am also involved in the preparation of Senior Citizens Week and next year hope to set up an information display in the City Offices.

In the future I hope to start up Activity programs to meet the needs of the elderly. Establishing a walking group in the community is one of my main projects for 1985.
