Australia Day Celebrated

Caulfield celebrated its 13th Australia Day Breakfast last Friday when 370 guests filled the City Hall to hear long range weather forecaster, Lennox Walker, speak on his experiences.

Mr. Walker was the guest speaker for the "Weather Phenomena" theme of the champagne breakfast explaining to guests the method of long range forecasting.

Mr. Walker used to be a Government surveyor in N.S.W. before going to Queensland as assistant and understudy to the late Inigo Jones, pioneer long range forecaster in 1953.

Knowing nothing about weather forecasting, Mr. Walker was attracted to it "because it sounded unusual".

Mr. Walker bought the establishment two years after Inigo Jones died in 1954.

He became a self-employed forecaster and is now Director of the Crohamhurst Observatory near Caloundra in Queensland.

Mr. Walker's main customers these days with brides from Victoria a close second.

Mr. Walker says he has done forecasting for every major construction project in Australia since 1956 and says the demand for forecasters has increased over the years.

A forecast for 1986?

For Victoria he predicts a fine February with good winter and spring rains. It will be dry in the north with fewer monsoons.

Nancy, who was a Caulfield Councillor for six years, is involved with the Guiding movement and is an Area Captain for the Red Cross and Salvation Army, helping out with door-knocks.

An active member of the Caulfield Early Planning for Retirement Association, Nancy organises the walking group each month, taking participants everywhere from Lilydale to Werribee.

She helps out with Meals on Wheels and has led the Heritage Week walks in Caulfield.

Nancy has been the Secretary of the Royal

Southern Memorial Hospital Auxiliary since 1967 and a Board member of the Keep Australia Beautiful Council.

She was also involved with the committees of local schools and is a life member of the Royal Women's Hospital.

Citizen Award

The annual breakfast is also the venue for the presentation of Citizen of the Year Award.

This year's award was presented to Nancy Needham of Carnegie, a well-known personality among many of Caulfield's groups and organisations.

Resident Group Concerned At Truganini Road Proposals

Residents of the Truganini Road area have been unsuccessful in their attempts to meet with the Minister of Transport in order to discuss the proposals for the area.

The Metropolitan Transit Authority and the Road Traffic Authority wish to construct an additional tram track in Truganini Road between the Glenhuntly and Koornang Road intersection.

A public meeting, held at the Carnegie Primary School last year, was attended by some 50 residents who objected to the proposal and the need to take up at least a metre of the nature strip on either side of the road.

Whilst they agree that the road is a bottleneck and that the area requires some attention the group is concerned that the treatment proposed for the intersections would affect the safety of pedestrians.

The State member for Caulfield, Ted Tanner,

raised the matter in Parliament last year. He said this week that Mr Roper has defended the duplication of the tram tracks in Truganini Road and blamed the Caulfield Council for the proposals to widen the road.

In fact the proposals were initially submitted to the Council for comment. In their reply the Council opposed the project in principle but that if it were to go ahead recommended some alternative treatment of the area.

There has been no response from the authority to date to these suggestions.

New Standing Committee For Caulfield

There are increased pressures on all levels of government to be more effective in the generation and use of funds for public purposes. With this in mind the Council has established another Standing Committee.

The Economic Development Committee brings the number of Council Committees to four. It will meet monthly, but the meeting schedule has not yet been resolved.

All the Caulfield Council Committee meetings are open to the public and interested parties are invited to comment on items being discussed. But all of these committees have a confidential segment towards the end of the meeting where the public are asked to retire.

The role of the Economic Development Committee will be to originate and encourage an entrepreneurial approach to the Council's activities.

It will have the power to approve projects in principle and release project details for community response.

It should be understood, however, that property development matters can include options to purchase property and negotiations with potential partners and developers. Thus a degree of confidentiality must be maintained.

The Economic Development Committee will ensure that proposals for the City of Caulfield undergo rigorous testing and demonstrate community benefit.

Members of the Committee are the Mayor, Cr. M. Blair, Crs. Rudzki, Gillard, Braun, Doolan and Bloom.

Bus Route Problems

Madam,

I invite people who have complaints regarding the City to North Road Route 601 bus service to contact me.

I have in the recent 12 months, had specific and many general complaints made to me about the Orrong Road bus service.

The complaints have concerned the deterioration in the regularity and punctuality of the bus service, the poor manners of some of the bus drivers, the restriction on the ability of elderly passengers to alight from the front doors of the buses and the inconvenience caused to the residents of Gardenvale by the buses on their turning circuit.

I have now been informed that the restriction on elderly and infirm passengers alighting from the buses has been removed.

The Minister for Transport, Mr Roper, in reply to my representations on behalf of such

passengers has advised "These passengers may alight from the entrance door. As you would appreciate, this may inconvenience other passengers and be of negligible benefit to the passenger concerned."

In view of the many complaints I have received regarding the Orrong Road bus service since it was taken over by the government from the Melbourne Brighton Bus Line, I find it difficult to accept the Minister's assurance that there has actually been an improvement in the bus service.

Obviously the Orrong Road bus service is not being operated by the government as well as it was by its former private enterprise owners and I invite any people who in future have specific complaints about this service to contact me.

Twenty years of change

Caulfield has seen many changes over the years and the man behind many of them is departing after 20 years of service to the City.

Manager of Operations, Mr. Brian Logan, started employment with Caulfield in January, 1966 and will be saying his farewells on February 28.

As Manager of Operations he has been responsible for instigating many changes in the areas of garbage, roads, footpaths, carparking and parks and gardens.

"Big Bins"

A major change which brought Caulfield to the fore in local government was the introduction of the "Big Bin" garbage collection system. It was a first for Caulfield, and for Australia.

The fact that the garbage system has been altered four times in 20 years indicates Caulfield's search for greater efficiency in its methods of operation.

Part of this search for efficiency meant the re-development of the Parks and Gardens and Depot sites. New buildings were erected and the amenities for the staff improved greatly.

A policy of park modernisation saw the development of Harles-ton Park, second only in popularity to Jells Park in the Metropolitan area and the construction of a world class athletics track on a former tip site, now known as Duncan McKinnon Reserve.

In fact, Brian designed the bus stop signs one Sunday morning while lying in bed. The signs are now used all over Melbourne to denote bus stops.

He also instigated the installation of the shopping centre signs welcoming shoppers to each suburb's main retail area.

Roads and Footpaths

Brian oversaw the construction of Victory Street, Murrumbena, the last private road in the city to be developed.

He has also been in charge of the reconstruction of Caulfield's streets, many of which were built in the horse and cart days. The resurfacing of roads on a regular basis has introduced saving on maintenance costs and time.

Asphalt footpaths have been replaced by concrete paths, also meaning less maintenance.

Signposting

Caulfield was also the first municipality to introduce the green and white signs, the large car parking signs and the red and white bus stop signs.

Car Parking

Brian has been a firm believer in developing adequate off-street car parking in shopping centres.

"It is very important to



continue development in shopping centres to keep the shoppers at the centres," says Brian.

"Development can only progress at the centres if adequate car parking is available."

What kept Brian at Caulfield for 20 years?

"I'm proud of Caulfield," he said.

"You are part of the decision making process and get to see your decisions implemented."

He also finds it very satisfying working in local government.

Brian likes having contact with the residents of the City and regards Caulfield's gradual, but stable approach to development as the best.

A resident of Caulfield for many years, Brian has been appointed to the Planning Appeals Board.

1986 Caulfield Festival

1986 is Festival year in Caulfield. The Caulfield Festival, which will run for approximately 10 days in November, will provide a showcase for local community groups and organizations to display their activities before the wider community.

The festival organizers endeavour to foster community participation in a broad range of activities including the arts, sporting activities and community services, in addition to conducting a diverse range of entertainments throughout the city.

The planning for the festival is undertaken by the Caulfield Festival Committee of Management. This committee is comprised of Councillors, Community representatives and Council staff. 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News from Council

Carpark Approved

Although there were a number of objections to the use of land in Ludbrook Avenue for carparking facilities the Council approved the application and issued a Notice of Determination.

The site is to be used by the Little Company of Mary Hospital to provide carparking for six disabled visitor cars, two bus parking bays and ambulance and loading bays.

Objectors believed that the proposal would be detrimental to the amenity of the area and adversely affect the

quality of life for residents. However a number of conditions will apply to the permit and proper landscaping of the site is required.

Garbage Back To Normal

Caulfield residents should be able to put out their garbage with some confidence, now that it will be collected at the correct time.

The long-running dispute with garbage collectors came to an end just prior to Christmas.

With the commencement of meaningful discussions it was only a short time before things

were sorted out. Six workers accepted early retirement and the new system is functioning smoothly.

New Citizens

It is a tradition in Caulfield to conduct a naturalisation ceremony on the same day that the Australia Day breakfast is held. This year 100 people were welcomed as citizens of Australia by Caulfield's Mayor, Cr Max Blair.

Local Parliamentarian, Ted Tanner, addressed the candidates and Mrs Irene Capek was the guest speaker.

Mrs Capek is a Caulfield resident and a member of the Victoria Welcome Group. This organisation works for the welfare of new immigrants and helps them settle into their chosen country.

Food Handlers Often At Fault

The 5th Australian

Food Microbiology Conference was recently conducted and attended by two of the Council's health surveyors. The underlying message of the topics discussed stressed that food borne illnesses, despite technological development and testing, were primarily caused by the food handler.

It was emphasised that proper surveillance at this point is essential in ensuring that food does not become contaminated.

One of the many tasks performed by health surveyors involves the collection of samples of food for testing and regularly inspecting food handling premises throughout the City.

Child Centre Open

The pitter patter of tiny feet is being heard in Carnegie. The child minding centre in Truganini Road is open for business.

There are 35 places for children needing day care — 10 of them for children under two years of age. Most of the places are already filled and a parents' committee will be formed some time in February.

This centre brings the total of Council child minding facilities to four and the places available to 120.

Ripponlea Safety Houses

The Council has agreed to assist the Ripponlea Primary School with its Safety House program. The school was initially involved with the St. Kilda Primary School and associated kindergartens in establishing the program.

But the area proposed was considered too large to administer and it was divided in two. Funds previously donated by St. Kilda organisations will go to the St. Kilda based group and it was necessary therefore for Caulfield Council to donate \$200 towards the establishment of the Ripponlea program.

Record Cullet Collection

A letterbox drop by ACI seems to have had the desired results. The Council's glass cullet collection increased to 74 tonnes in October last year. This is the highest amount ever collected at this time of the year and exceeds the average by 14 tonnes.

A similar result occurred with the beer bottles. In October alone 6,500 dozen bottles and 790 dozen stubbies were collected.

Caulfield Youth Council

Over the last three months the Caulfield Youth Council has been involved with submission writing to attract funding to run programs for young people in Caulfield.

The Youth Council has made a commitment to develop and implement services and programs for young people, in the upstairs section of the Recreation Centre in Maple Street. Work to

renovate and refurbish the upstairs section should begin in late February, 1986.

People who are interested in assisting the Youth Council are most welcome to attend the Youth Council meetings.

The next meeting is being held on Thursday February 27, at 7.30pm in the staff house at the rear of the city offices.

Volunteer Needed

A voluntary helper is required for the Elsternwick Infant Welfare Centre at 55 Orrong Road, Elsternwick.

The work involves assisting the Infant Welfare Sister for approximately two and a half hours on Monday,

Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, carrying out some book work and weighing infants.

Crossing Supervisors

The Caulfield City Council requires supervisors to carry out the duties of School Crossing Supervisor at various locations throughout the municipality.

All equipment, including a uniform, is provided by the Council and the current salary

rate is \$6.91 per hour worked.

The hours of duty are one hour in the morning and one hour in the afternoon of each school day.

Former Mayor Dies

Mr. Cedric Pullman, former Mayor of Caulfield and resident of the city for 62 years, recently died at the age of 92.

Mr. Pullman was Mayor in 1936/37 and was a Councillor for Caulfield for three years.

He leaves behind a wife, one daughter, two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

New Resource Guide Available Soon

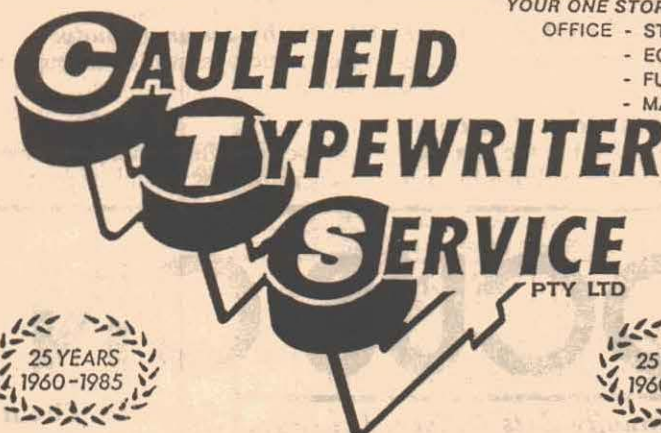

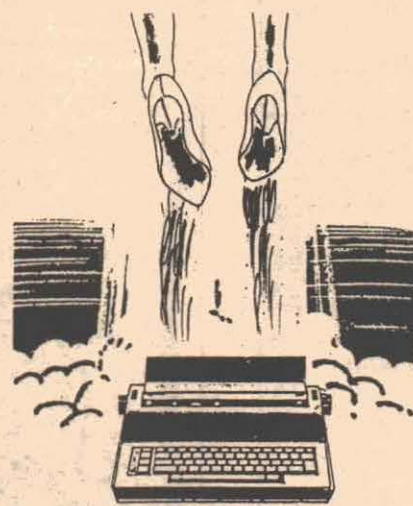

Dual Occupancy Introduced to Planning

The Minister for Planning and Environment has approved the amendment introducing dual occupancy provisions under the Melbourne Metropolitan Planning Scheme.

This amendment will affect all residential properties within the City of Caulfield.

The new controls will result in a significant change in unit development within the City as no Town Planning permit will be required for two unit/two house developments, providing certain conditions are met.

What is Dual Occupancy?

Dual occupancy is two households living independently in two self-contained dwellings on a single residential allotment. Dual occupancy is not new.

Throughout Melbourne there are many examples; sometimes one of the dwellings is occupied by the owner while the other is rented or is occupied by a member of the family. A dwelling can be divided into two independent self-contained homes, a new house can be built behind an existing home, or new dual occupancies can be built on vacant land.

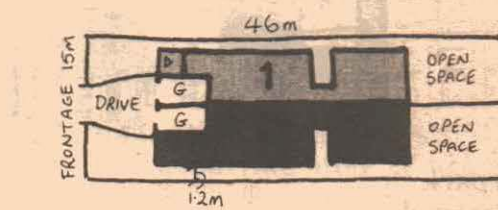
Dual occupancy allows people more choice in the size and location of their accommodation; this is especially so for households such as elderly people, single parent families, the disabled, childless couples and small families. It can help maintain an independent lifestyle.

Other advantages of dual occupancy include:

- The possibility of mutual support between two households sharing a site (for example, child-minding, odd jobs, transport and security).
- Smaller garden areas are easier to maintain.
- Families living in dual occupancies can have the advantage of living in a local neighbourhood with established facilities.

Importance

Dual occupancy is important; it will assist the Government's urban planning and housing objectives which include giving encouragement to:



Two new semi-detached dwellings.

• The consolidation of development in existing urban areas.

• The provision of a greater diversity of housing types and sizes to suit changing needs.

• Adding to the stock of affordable public and private housing for ownership and for rental.

No Town Planning permit will be required for dual occupancy where the following conditions are met:

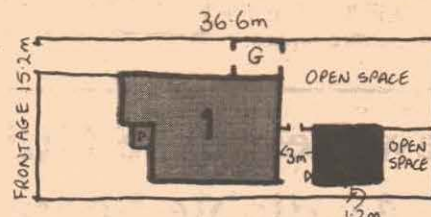
- the site is a single parcel of not less than 450 square metres;
- any new building is not more than two storeys;
- if the development is two separate houses the one at the rear is to be one storey;
- the floor area of one of the dwellings shall be less than 100 square metres;
- buildings are not to cover more than 60% of the site;
- if a window sill of one dwelling is less than 1.7 metres above floor level and could look into a similar window of the other dwelling on the site

a wall of a new building is to be set back from the frontage at least as far as the building on the adjacent land; and at least 1.2 metres from any side boundary for a single storey building and an additional specified distance for a wall more than 3.6 metres high;

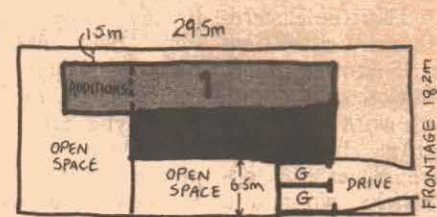
each dwelling is to have open space free of buildings and car parking for 50 square metres. The open area is to be not less than 2.4 metres wide, in not more than two parts and no part less than 16 square metres in area;

parking is to be available for not less than two cars;

the car parking is to be arranged that either of two cars could always enter or leave the site.

Mexican Textiles

Music Therapy Comforts Patients

The Little Company of Mary Hospital, formerly Bethlehem, has taken another step in ensuring terminally ill patients have a more enjoyable last few days.

The Hospital recently appointed music therapist, Clare O'Callaghan to the Hospice Unit which cares for the terminally ill.

Clare is a qualified social worker who worked with music therapists and terminally ill patients in the United States and Canada for six months. During 1984 she was awarded a Queen Elizabeth Fellowship.

The Carnegie and Caulfield Lions Club combined forces to buy musical equipment for the Hospital so that the program could continue when funds were running out.

Music therapy helps the patient to relax and diverts the patient's mind from the pain they are experiencing. It also brings families together and therefore reduces the strain on the family when the patient eventually dies.

Initially the Hospice section will concentrate on live bedside music and establishing a tape library for patients.

Communication Not Teenage Rebellion

Improving relationships between parents and teenagers will be the focus of the STEP/TEEN program, a series of 10 discussion sessions based on systematic training for effective parenting of teenagers on Tuesday, March 4.

The sessions run from 7pm to 9pm at the Royal Southern Memorial Hospital Community Care Centre, 240 Kooyong Road, Caulfield. The program is specifically designed for all parents of teenagers who are finding it difficult to communicate with them.

STEP/TEEN teaches the parents the alternative approach to communication which is neither completely permissive or autocratic, it encourages initial respect between parents and teenagers. The program leads to increased co-operation, more effective communication and hopefully a more responsible, self reliant attitude among teenagers.

"It takes one to take the first step, and that first step is best made by the parent," says Liz Corbett, Head Social Worker at the Royal Southern Memorial Hospital Community Care Centre. The cost of STEP/TEEN program is \$12 which includes participants manual. 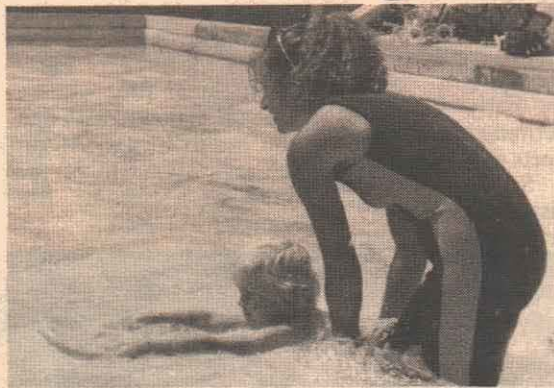
Summer Holiday Swimming
