# At last! a Nursing Home for Caulfield

Caulfield is setting the pace again! The Council is pleased to announce that the Federal Government has finally given permission for a new 30-bed nursing home to be established in the City of Caulfield.

A certificate of approval-in-principle to establish a nursing home was received this week from the Federal Minister for Community Services.

Caulfield's Mayor, Cr Max Blair, made the announcement at the recently held Mayoress's reception. This function is held each year to pay tribute to the volunteers and workers of the City who serve the community in such activities as the delivery of meals on wheels, the work of the many auxiliaries that operate in the City, the Red Cross and many others.

There was great jubilation from those in attendance. The ladies who work so tirelessly in the two Council sponsored opportunity shops were particularly happy. For many years now they have been raising funds for such a project in the hope of seeing this par-ticular dream ful-

Caulfield has an ageing population -20% of its residents are over the age of 65 years. The Council

has a commitment to service for the elderly and, in fact, has over the years set the standard in aged accommodation.

It established the first Australian Council run hostel for the aged in 1972 and can now boast three hostels and two groups of independent flats. The need to extend

these facilities to include a nursing home was recognised some time ago but government quotas preclud-ed Caulfield from having any more nursing home beds than already existed. Submissions to the government for permission to establish a new nursing home culminated in a deputation to Canberra in April 1985. This was organised by Mrs Joan Child, Federal Member for Henty and Speaker of the House.

The Mayor of the day, Cr Brian Rudzki,

was accompanied by the City Manager and Manager for Community Development. They spoke with Senator Grimes, the Minister for Com-munity Services, and put Caulfield's case.

#### A Fund Raising Committee

The government may make some funds available and approximately \$350,000 has already been raised by the community. But more will be required. The Council will establish a fund raising committee to see the project through to completion. Donations will be tax de-



#### Health and Safety Program for Council Staff

There is currently a great deal of emphasis on occupational health and safety. The intro-duction of WorkCare, the Health and Safety Act 1985 and the Accident Compensation Act 1985 have combined to produce a good deal of activity in this area.

As a result the Council has engaged the services of the Risk Control Division of its insurance brokers to conduct a risk management program among Council staff.

The initial step was to assess the current situation so far as safety and workers compensation claims were concerned. From this information a planned health and safety program is being implemented. It includes responsibility statements for all personnel, training seminars, accident investigation programs and other acti-

#### Federal Funds Guaranteed for Two Years

For the next two years local government has been guaranteed an increase, in real terms, in its share of personal income tax.

The Hon. Tom Uren, Federal Minister for Local Government has announced significant changes to revenue sharing grants to local authorities. This will assist Councils in their forward financial planning.

The Personal Income Tax Sharing Act is to be abolished and replaced by a Financial Systems Act. For the next two years local government will get a guarantee of real terms maintenance as a base and will be locked into State Government real term increases. Local government will get a real term increase in

funding for the next two years even if the states get a negative in-

#### Council representative appointed to M.M.A.

The City of Caulfield is now a full member of the Metropolitan Municipal Association and has appointed Cr. Jack Campbell as its representative. The Mayor, Cr. Max Blair, will act as a substitute where necessary.

#### New charging policy for Committees of Management

At the November meeting of Council, officers were requested to undertake a review of the method of determining charges for Committees of Management of Caulfield's parks and reserves.

In setting the fees a common charge will be levied for various categories of facilities (eg. the charge for turf wickets will be the same for every park).

The component costs will be restricted to those specifically incurred in maintaining the active sporting areas and depreciation costs apply only to athletics and cycle tracks.

Some Committees will be asked to pay more than previously advised, others less. The new charging policy will be adopted for the current financial

#### Brighton to survey Caulfield boundary

Because of its opposition to restructuring the City of Brighton has engaged a team of consultants to carry out various surveys. One element of these studies relates to the 'community of interest' and a telephone survey will be conducted in the City of Brighton and adjacent areas.

It is expected that some 50 residents of Caulfield, who live along Brighton's boundary, will be involved in this survey.

#### Face lift to scoreboard

The scoreboard at the E.E. Gunn Park main oval is to be upgraded to make it secure and less vulnerable to vandalism. The present structure has unrestricted access and has suffered from physical damage and extensive graffiti

The interior will be made more practical for winter use and the works are estimated to cost around \$3,000. The park Committee of Management will provide \$1,000 towards the cost and the balance will be met by the Council.

#### New shelters for Murrumbeena bowlers

The members of the Murrumbeena Park Bowling Club will get together to replace their old timber and fibro cement shelters.

Professional tradesmen, who are also members of the Club will provide the labour necessary for the proposed new brick shelters and the Council will meet the cost of the bricks and other materials.

The bowling club operates on Council land and the new shelters will be of solid construction lasting many years.

#### Self help kiosk

Residents of the Camden Court Hostel have set up a kiosk for themselves. They are planning to sell a range of basic goods needed for everyday living. The increasing frail-

ty of many of the residents is making visits to shopping centres more difficult. It is good to see our senior citizens showing this sort of initiative.

#### A weighty problem

Earlier this year the Brighton Council requested the help of Caulfield's Meals-on-Wheels Kitchen in the provision of meals for that municipality. Caulfield was able to meet this request and its kitchen is running quite smoothly. Brighton people con-tinue to be delighted with the meals but there is a complaint one of the recipients is now putting on too much weight.



These notices were issued due to the inspections carried out by the By-Laws Officer on a regular basis throughout the City of Caulfield.

As you can appreciate there is nothing worse than being slapped in the face by a wet branch as you walk along the footpath, or if you find that your path is blocked by an overgrown shrub or tree, don't curse the Council because it is the owner's responsibility to keep his trees and shrubs under control.

If the Council's By-Laws Officer leaves a notice for you to cut back trees, shrubs or hedges overhanging a

public street or laneway, you must do so within fourteen

During the past twelve months the

Council's By-Laws Officer has issued

approximately 500 notices to

property owners who have had over-

hanging shrubs on their property.

The tree etc., must be cut to a height of three metres above the ground and vertically in line with your pro-

perty boundary. If you don't comply with the notice then the Conncil will do the work and expenses will be paid by the property owner.

When you do cut back your trees remember not to leave or burn them on the

# Bad Blood at Meeting

Resident discussion became heated at this month's meeting of the Economic Development Committee. The conflict arose during discussions concerning the Council's proposals to relocate the Arts Centre Gallery to the City Hall and the possible establishment of a supermarket and pedestrian mall in Elsternwick.

With publication of the 100th edition of Caulfield Contact the Council put forward some of its economic proposal developments for the City. It invited comments and submissions from the community and asked all interested people to attend this particular Committee meeting.

The Council is facing large renovation costs at the Arts Centre and sees its relocation as a possible solution to the problem. It would necessitate the installation of a mezzanine floor in the City Hall. Most of the people who oppose this project live around the existing Arts Centre, and suggested that parking would be inadequate at the City Hall and that the present location is already well patronised and far more aesthetic.

Councillors argued that they needed to work in the best interest of the whole community, and the relocation would put the Arts Centre in a position more accessible to the majority.

Points made by the residents will be assessed and the matter considered again at the next meeting of the Committee to be held at 5pm on 13th May, 1986.

Similarly, with the supermarket proposal, objectors were mainly residents of the neighbouring area. They were concerned that it would not be an appropriate development for Elsternwick and that it would impinge on the residential character of surrounding streets.

Councillors assured those present that the designs could be modified and many of the problems over-

come. They also said that the project would provide a significant nett return to the Council, and hence the community of Caulfield would benefit.

Statements from residents suggeste that discussion with the Council was futile - implying that the decisions were already made. The Com-mittee was quick to reassure those present that this was not the case and that their input could be instrumental in making improvements to the scheme.

No satisfactory conclusion to the discussions was achieved and the meeting was adjourned to reconvene on Wednesday, May 14 at 7.30pm in the Council Chambers.



# **Community Corrections** Programme now in Place

The State Government has now established community corrections centres in all major Victorian centres, providing the courts with an alternative to imprisonment for people convicted of less serious offences.

The Attorney General, Mr. Jim Kennan, said there were now 23 community corrections centres operating in Victoria, providing counselling and opportunities for community work for over 1,000 offenders.

Mr. Kennan was speaking at the open-ing of a new community corrections centre in Glenhuntly, which will serve Melbourne's southern suburbs.

Mr. Kennan said courts could order offenders to perform up to 360 hours of unpaid community work per year as well as attend correction centres for 6 hours of educational and personal development lectures per week.

"When the Cain Government first took office there were six centres in the State four out of the six in Melbourne. There are now 23 in Victoria, which means that all adult courts in Victoria now have the same range of sentencing options available,

irrespective of where an offender lives,' Mr. Kennan said.

The centres are spread through the 12 administrative regions run by the Office of Corrections. The Glenhuntly office will serve the southern region along with an office at Oakleigh.

There are about 50 people on Community Service Order programmes and 23 on Attendance Centre programmes at the Glenhuntly Centre.

New Centres will be opened soon at Carlton, Prahran, Ballarat, Northcote, Sunshine and Heidelberg. Major Centres at Warrnambool and Mildura were opened last vear.

He said community work generally involves painting and maintenance on buildings owned by charities and community groups.

"Other community work involves gardening for pensioners,



assisting at hospitals, old people's homes and welfare agen-cies," he said.

Mr. Kennan said the expansion of community based correctional programmes was in line with the State Government's belief that imprisonment should be a sanction of last resort.

He said that 23 Centres were responsible for a total of about 6,000 offenders, 4,000 probationers, 1,000 parolees and 1,000 people on community based programmes.

"All but 3 of these locations have been established since 1984. Of the 20 new locations, 7 are still housed in temporary quarters, but negotiations for permanent accommodation in those areas are underway.'

Mr. Kennan said people on community orders carried out much of the work required to establish the Centres.

### Multi-lingual Workcare the new provisions

The Department of Employment and Industrial Affairs, in conjunction with the Victorian Ethnic Affairs Commission, is undertaking a major publicity and promotions campaign of the new Occupational Health and Safety Legislation to the Ethnic Community.

A team of bi-lingual information officers, covering 11 community languages are visiting work places to distribute multi-lin-gual pamphlets in 12 languages on all aspects of workcare.

They are also able to explain to workers in their own language

under the 1985 Occupational Health and Safety Act, which will help to prevent workplace injuries and accidents.

Workplace visits, arranged through trade unions, have been made to fac-tories, such as Ford at Broadmeadows, as well as to smaller unionised workplaces, particularly in the clothing, metal and glass areas of manufacturing. There have also been requests for the team to conduct sessions in regional

# for a Self-Help Tree Planting Scheme



If asked, you might describe Caulfield as a community with plenty of parks and gardens, known for its well kept, tree-lined streets and manicured residential areas.

But not all is as it seems. There are a few pockets of the City that could do with a bit of attention.

In approaching this problem the Council had to bear in mind the high labour costs of street beautification, planting and maintenance. To reduce some of these costs residents will be invited to join in a self-help tree planting programme.

Street trees, stakes and planting supervision will be supplied. In return

residents will be asked to prepare the soil. plant and maintain the trees as an ongoing commitment.

This is the first of a series of streetscape improvement works and is aimed at increasing public awareness and pride in the immediate environ-

The streets in most need of attention will receive priority.

Residents in selected streets will receive information on the scheme and be invited to participate.

# **Safety Houses**

The Victorian Government has approved a \$30,000 grant to Safety House Committees Australia. Their services provide a safety net to about 250,000 children in more than 700 Victorian schools.

Children are given protection travelling

to and from school by a network of about 36,000 houses, identified by the safety house symbol on letterboxes. These indicate to children a place to go in the event of perceived danger from a

The Treasurer, Mr. Rob Jolly, said that the grant would help the organisation to expand its officers to

meet the needs of hundreds of local community committees. He said the programme acted as a deterrent to undesirables and increase community awareness of a problem faced by children.

The Safety House Programme is strongly supported by Victoria's Education Department and Police Force.

### Caulfield Red Shield Appeal

The annual Red Shield Appeal will take place on July 6 this year to once again raise funds to assist the Salvation Army.

The Chairman of the City of Caulfield's Fund Raising Committee, Mrs Judy Arndt, has called on residents to assist on Appeal Day.

Mrs Arndt said that if all homes in the City were to be covered on the day, more volunteers for collecting contributions were required.

Mrs Arndt said that last year the City raised \$22,048.17 towards the Appeal and for the Salvation Army to continue its good work, it was necessary to better last year's amount. This could only be done if every home in Caulfield was visited on July 6.

Mrs Arndt assured residents that doorknocking was easy and that instruction was given by the Army to people volunteering for the first time.

"People think doorknocking is difficult to do, however this isn't true," she said. "The Caulfield

community always responds magnificently to our door-knocks."

Mrs Arndt said anyone wishing to help should contact Lt. Peter Thompson on 82 5880. Volunteers will be required from 10am until 12 noon on July 6.

# Oakleigh Road Reconstruction

The section of Oakleigh Road between Koornang and Grange Roads in Carnegie is being reconstructed thanks to a Commonwealth Government grant.

Labor member for Henty, Mrs. Joan Child, has announced that a total of \$225,000 has been provided to Caulfield Council under the Bicentennial Road Development Program.

Mrs. Child said that the grant was further evidence of the priority given to roads funding by the Government.

"The Government is spending a record \$1248 million this financial year on road construction and maintenance," she said. "As well as helping to bring about a safer and more efficient road system, the road grants program provides about 80,000 jobs throughout Australia."

### Commonwealth support for St. Anthony's integration scheme

Labor M.P. for Henty, Joan Child, had some good news recently for St. Anthony's primary school in Glenhuntly.

Mrs Child has been advised by the Commonwealth Schools Commission

that St. Anthony's has received a \$1,000 grant to go towards salary support to assist with the integration of 28 socially and emotionally disabled students.

The grant comes from the Com-

mission's Special Education Program. Mrs Child said that St. Anthony's was to be commended for its preparedness to take responsibility for the integration of disadvantaged children into the school system.



Rosemary Crossley, with the Minister for Community Services, Ms. Caroline Hogg, and the Minister for Health, Mr. David White, jointly opened the Deal Communication Centre at 538 Dandenong Road, Caulfield recently.

Ms. Crossley, a long time campaigner for people with severe

communication impairments, and Programme Co-ordinator at Deal, emphasised that this is the first Centre in Australia to be devoted exclusively to the needs of people with severe communication disabilities.

The Deal Centre will house all types of communication equipment from simple picture boards costing almost nothing to sophisti-cated computer systems and speech synthesisers, costing several thousand dollars.

#### Services Offered

The Centre will provide 'hands on' evaluation and teaching sessions for people who have no means of communication; a technology testing centre who wish to upgrade the means of communication they now use; a resource and information centre for the families of people with disabilities, and for people working in the field; and public education and advocacy.

It will also provide for the development of new equipment and adaptation of current equipment to suit individual clients and, in the future, research and development of new communication

The service is free and no doctor's referral is necessary.

#### Funding


