

ROAD TREATMENTS

There has been positive resident response to traffic management proposals for the area bounded by Corrigil, Murrumbeena, North and Koornang

Numbers of residents confirmed their approval in written submissions to the Council and numerous telephone calls.

The treatment that has been planned for this area is designed to slow down

the traffic that uses the through roads as a shortcut to the east of the city. It may also have the effect of reducing the numbers of vehicles that use this

Residents were asked for comments on the Council's proposed scheme for traffic management in the area. The treatments that will be implemented include splitter islands at the exit points into Koornang and

Murrumbeena Roads, and other treatments such as slow points and channelintersections along Corrigil Road, Moonya Road, Rosanna Street, Oakleigh Road and Leila Road.

This scheme was agreed to by Councillors at a recent meeting of the Environment and Community Development Committee as part of a city-wide study of traffic management and is the first to be implemented.

A Nursing Home by the skin directed towards the building of nursing

The City of Caulfield may be among the last to receive Federal approval in principle for the building of a nursing home.

A recent review of aged residential and domiciliary care by the Commonwealth govern-ment indicates the new policy direction.

The government's aim is to direct resources to the people in greatest need. It proposes that aged and disabled people be supported in their own homes for as long as possible in their own communities. This may mean that there will be less Government funding

It is likely that the focus will be directed towards the building of hostels and, over time, both nurs-ing homes and hostels will take increasingly frail clientele. Many people who today would be admitted to a nursing home will in future be placed in hostels.

Since the introduction of nursing home benefits in 1963, there has been a doubling of the number of beds available. The emphasis will now be on the provision of support services to people in their own homes. Residential

care will be available only when these support systems no longer meet their needs and will also ideally promote rehabilitation

The Caulfield Council endorses the general thrust of this review particularly as it already provides numerous will however urge the government to maintain the standard of care to current nursing home patients. It will also request that subsidies for hostel care of the frail aged be adequate and that funds

be made available for modifications to hostels not currently suitable for the care of frail residents.

Intending applicants for the proposed Nursing Home are advised that the Council is not yet ready to an admission waiting list.

It is too early to accept names for such a list because the approval is still only 'in principle'. There is still much work to be done before concrete plans can be

Thursday, May 29 Post Office site still Vol. 13, No. 5 under discussion

The Planning Appeals Board convened recently to hear the case for and against the development of the old Elsternwick Post Office site.

The Ministry for Planning and Environment initiated proceedings with a call for an adjournment until the matter has been dealt with by the Historic Buildings Council. This proposal was supported

The Council's legal representative put a strong case for the planning matter to be dealt with quite separately from the historical aspects of the site. But the Board decided to adjourn the hearing until July, when it will be heard at the Caulfield City Hall.

In bringing down this decision the Chairman ad-vised that the deferment was not an excuse for delay but that, in his view, it should speed up the processes.

The Historic Buildings Council hearing will be held on June 18. At this mined whether the old Post Office building is worthy of preservation.

Elsternwick Supermarket

This matter has been deferred to allow further discussions with representatives of residents, traders and developers.

It is anticipated that the issue will proceed to the June cycle of Council meetings for a decision.

FIRE PROTECTION

It is not surprising that the devastating fires at sporting fixtures in Europe last year prompted our own local fire brigade to look into the safety of all similar spectator accommodation. All V.F.A. grounds were included in this study and the Bricker Pavilion at Princes Park was also assessed.

Following a preliminary report from the Metro-

politan Fire Brigade in June last year a number of recommendations have already been imple-mented. These included upgrading of the numbers and types of fire extinguishers available and modifications to doors and furniture.

The final report from the M.F.B. recommends the installation of an independent fire water

main and two fire hydrant connections.

This type of equipment was not installed when the building was erected in 1968 but with changes in regulations, extensions to other pavilions in more recent years have included fire mains.

The works will begin immediately and are estimated to cost \$17,500.

1986 International Year of Peace or is it

In truth, I wonder what degree of consideration world leaders are really giving to maintaining peace, resolving conflict and encouraging each other to consider non-violent solutions in this, the International Year of Peace. It makes one wonder, does it not, especially after the events in the past few weeks.

Javier Perel De Cuellar, the secretary of the United Nations recently made the following statement "There is no wonderful peace recipe for an instant peace, but with faith in the future and confidence in the human spirit, we must embark on a dynamic, perservering and systematic crusade which will lead us, step by step to peace".

The first step is the one that concerns the Youth Council, because if the cooks don't find the right recipe very soon, we are all going to end up well and truly stewed

Focussing our attention on positive issues is one small way of raising awareness of the real needs and one small but solid building block upon which we can build some hope.

In a year designated the International Year of Peace and yet already so filled with acts of terrorism and agression we need all the small building blocks we can possibly find. This building block is Caulfield Youth Council contribution.

We intend to organise a Youth Art exhibition to be held in September 1986. The title of the exhibition will be "Reflections and Future of Peace". Students, employed and unemployed young people are invited to enter their art works in this exhibition. Art works can be in any form or medium. The artists and their work will form the basis of a video which will be sent to world leaders to encourage them to find peaceful solutions to conflict.

Face-lift for Glenhuntly Station

Glenhuntly Station is to be completely rebuilt, as part of the State Government's \$72 million metropolitan station upgrading program.

The Glenhuntly program will see the demolition of the century old station buildings, which will be replaced by a modern station complex, similar to the design of Boronia Station, which was opened last year.

The project, which will cost \$385,000 will feature a comfortable centrally heated waiting room and ticket booking office.

Glenhuntly is one of a number of stations on the Caulfield to Moorabbin

Disabled Rehabilitation Centre

Permission has been granted and a notice of determination will be issued for the establishment of a rehabilitation centre in Balaclava Road.

The centre will provide assistance to disabled people and include sponsor-ship for improved job opportunities, therapy programs, counselling services and the provision of aids and appliances. It will cater to some 300 disabled people per year. Objections from

residents included the possibility of parking problems and the inconvenience that might be

However the Council considered the proposal to e a worthwhile project, but in granting approval, conditions were applied in the event of weekend or evening use.

Roofing decision deferred

Nearby residents have expressed concern at the proposal to build a roof over an Elsternwick timberyard. No change in the use of the area is planned. But the roof will provide protection of materials and more com-

fortable conditions for the

public and staff. Objections include the possibility of fire risk, reduction of sunlight, wind and rubbish problems, increased noise and others.

The item came up for discussion at recent meetings of the Executive Services and Policy and Resources Committees and has been deferred for further discussion.

A change of name

Following the resignation of Brian Logan, Mr Neil Arbuthnot has been appointed to the position formerly known as 'Manager Operations'. He will now be known as Manager Engineering and Development' - a title change which more closely describes the position.

Mr Arbuthnot is a qualified Civil Engineer with a Municipal Engi-neers' Certificate and a Graduate Diploma in Local Government Management. He will commence work for Caul-field in June.

No more cardboard please

The fluctuations that exist in the paper industry have caused present supply to far exceed demand for waste paper.

Australian Paper Manufacturers have conducted a waste paper and cardboard collection service in the City of Caulfield since 1982 and since that time an average of 1,100 tonnes has been collected each

But they now advise that cardboard will no longer be collected. A.P.M. has expressed disappointment in this decision because of the general need to increase recycling levels within the

community.
The collection of waste paper will continue.

Disabled Parking

Up to now disabled drivers have been disad-vantaged when it has come to parking in the Or-

mond shopping area.

But the situation will be eased with the establishment of a parking bay for the disabled in the Katandra Rd carpark opposite the Ormond railway

A new face

Caulfield builders can expect a new face to greet them at the City Offices. Tom Govorcin has been appointed Deputy Building Surveyor following the promotion of Geoff Milner.

Tom is a qualified Building Surveyor with qualifications also as a Building Inspector, Scaffolding Inspector and Ar-chitectural Draughtsman.

He was previously employed by the Broadmeadows and Melbourne City Councils and his arrival has brought this section to full strength for the first time in many

Nepean Highway Lighting

The section of Nepean Highway between Glenhuntly Rd and McMillan St, is one of the few remaining areas where the lighting has not been upgraded to keep pace with recent roadworks.

The S.E.C. has forwarded to the Council, its proposals for lighting this section of the Highway. As it is a declared state highway, the lighting costs will be shared by the Road Construction Authority, the S.E.C. and the Councils involved.

The works will involve the installation of new poles to mount a total of 27 new, high pressure sodium lights. Existing timber poles, brackets, wiring and substandard lights will be removed.

Costs to Caulfield are calculated to be around \$11,000 with an increase in the annual tariff of approximately \$1000.

Activities Programme

Caulfield Council's Recreation Officer for Older Adults, Penny Paxman, conducts a comprehensive range of recreational activities for Caulfield's older residents.
