The history of the Rosstown Hotel is almost synonymous with the growth of Carnegie itself.

Whilst the proposal involves only a small increase in floor area, the rearrangement of facilities and the general upgrading of the hotel will create increased patronage and with it, the need for additional parking.

The Rosstown Hotel presents less concern in

regard to amenity issues since the residential properties are some distance away.

The Council has taken all these things into account in approving the application.

It is subject to a number of conditions including a requirement to provide a certain number of parking spaces.

In a situation where the full amount of parking cannot be provided on the site the Council may consider accepting cash payments in lieu.

These funds, in turn, are used to provide other car parking facilities in the City.

An invitation

The Committee's formation is part of a scheme for each municipality to have a community committee, reflecting local interest, that helps endorse projects, provide and coordinate publicity and set up a calendar of events. The CBC wishes to do just that by asking local groups and individuals to think positively about 1988 and possible activities they may wish to put on.

It welcomes groups to send representative members to meetings to discuss ideas and send in events that can be advertised as part of Caulfield's Bicentenary Calendars. The events may be something that you already intend as part of usual annual activities, or something extra you may wish to set up or involve others in.

Vacancies, where they occur in safe seats are eagerly sought and typically attract outstanding candidates. Many people within the Liberal Party have aspirations for a seat - but a number of people in eminent positions (and backed by media endorsement) have been unsuc-cessful. Pre-selection and endorsement can only be obtained by the democratic processes of the party — a grass roots approach which is a feature of the Liberal Party. Seats cannot be "of-fered" let alone be given:

The media speculation about the Higgins seat is quite mischievous. While a lot of people may well have aspirations to such a safe seat - there is no vacancy. Aspiring Liberal members, especially those able to secure a high media profile, would best serve the interests of the Liberal Party by standing for pre-selection for the all important marginal seats.

Roger Shipton gained pre-selection and endorsement for Higgins in 1974, following a convention which featured an outstanding field of people. He was elected in 1975, as Member for Higgins. Under the normal constitutional procedures of the Liberal Party, Roger Shipton faced reendorsement from branches (a process in which all branches vote as to whether a candidate should be re-endorsed, or whether they should face a convention) in 1977, 1980, 1983 and 1986. He was required, auto-matically to face a convention in 1984 - he was the

only nomination and he was endorsed.

Since his preselection in 1974, Roger Shipton has been consistently and clearly endorsed by the Higgins branches. He was again overwhelmingly endorsed in the procedures of 1986 and will be the endorsed Liberal Candidate for Higgins at the next Federal election. He has the support of his Electorate Committee. As Member for Hig-

gins, Roger Shipton has given outstanding service both as a local member (his office by most criteria is one of the busiest in Australia), and in his contribution to Parliament, and to the Party. Development in Foster Avenue

Foster Avenue in Glenhuntly, brought with it a number of objections from residents of the area. But it again raised the issue of dwelling density and diversity.

Objectors saw the proposal as out of character with the existing streetscape and thought that further unit development would adversely affect the amenity of the area.

It was pointed out to residents however, that under current planning regulations, dual occupancy applications of this nature only need to come before the Council if certain criteria are not met. If a proposal complies in all respects with the regulations set down in the planning code then a two unit development such as this may be erected as of right.

When this occurs, the residents of the area have no avenues of objection open to them at all!

In this particular case

the applicant was asking for consideration of some siting details which did not strictly comply and so needed to bring it to the Council for consideration. The Council believed that the proposal met the conditions laid down in its own multi-unit develop-ment policy. This policy attempts to encourage a variety of dwelling densities in the city and so cater for the varying needs

of the community.

The Council did not consider the development in Foster Avenue to be excessive and accordingly recommended that the application be approved and a Notice of Determination to grant a permit be issued. A number of conditions relating to setback and paving of the driveways was applied.

Sister Cities

The Caulfield Council has accepted an invitation to join the Sister Cities Association. This group provides support services to Councils participating in sister city involvement and is committed to such affiliations through the Local Government framework.

Whilst Caulfield does not have any links with other cities, it could use the services of the association to identify the opportunities and advantages in such relationships.

Next Traffic Area

Stage 2 of the Council's Local Area Traffic Management Scheme has recommended that Area 42 (bounded by Lyons Street, Koornang, North and Grange Roads) be assigned a high priority for treatment. A scheme money far more will be prepared for effectively."

Prosecution

Following a number of complaints from residents of the area, the Council has prosecuted the operators of the factory and warehouse at 993 North Road.

Agreement was reached, resulting in a number of undertakings being accepted by the court, in relation to future activities on the site. They relate to hours of operation, level of noise emanating from the property, and a number of other issues which have been a source of annovance.

Meals on Wheels Check

Now that the cook-chill method of food preparation has been introduced for meals on wheels, the Council's Health Dept. will ensure that regular food samples are obtained and submitted for bacteriological analysis.

Already two such samples recently sub-mitted have revealed a very satisfactory bacterial count.

The Council Analyst recently accompanied Health Surveyors on an inspection of the kitchen and was very impressed with the overall design, cleanliness, and the understanding that staff had, in relation to ensuring that the cook-chill process remains at a high

Obituary

The Council was saddened to hear of the death of Mr Keith Miller from the City of Dandenong. For many years he was the Chairman of the Southern Area Commission of the Melbourne & Metro-politan Board of Works.

A number of Councillors have worked with him over the years and condolences have been sent to his family.

Hospital Extensions

A maternity wing and associated facilities will occupy the new building extensions at the Masada Hospital in Balaclava Road. A two storey addition to the existing hospital is to be built and since the site is in a residential area, residential standards have been

A number of the objectors to this application did so on the grounds that noise emanating from the maternity wards would be excessive and that a good deal of privacy would be lost to both residents and patients alike.

However, agreement was reached with the developer that adequate soundproofing would be carried out and there was an assurance that most activity will occur in the sections of the hospital service from abutting proper-ties. The Council believes that the development is a reasonable one for the site provided certain conditions are complied with.

Football Sponsorship

The Council recently considered an application from the Carnegie Football Club for the construction of an advertising sign at the East Caulfield Reserve.

The sign will be erected on the main function hall which faces the railway line and will contain an advertisement for "Derby's Night Spot".

Sporting groups face an increasing number of financial problems and sponsorship like this could be a great boost for the club.

Council is seeking comment from relevant government departments before making a final decision.

Rates Assistance

Past applications will be used to determine the continuing eligibility of pensioners for rate concessions. The Minister for Local Government has consented to this procedure, thereby overcoming the need for annual applications.

Under the Pensioners Rates Assistance Scheme, aged, widowed, invalid or single parent pensioners who have been issued with a Travel Concession Card by the Department of Social Security and Veterans Affairs, are entitled to a reduction of up to 50% on their rate bill. This rebate is dependent on the number of owners of the property and to a maximum of \$135.00.

This reduction only applies to a pensioner's place of residence.

Tennis Lights

If you are thinking of lighting up your tennis courts, then there are some new procedures you must carry out.

Following amendments to the Melbourne Metro-politan Planning Scheme in January, it has become necessary to obtain a Town Planning Permit for the erection of lights over private tennis courts.

The objections neighbours can raise include loss of privacy and amenity due to lighting and noise. To ensure that both applicants and objectors receive fair treatment in all cases, the Council will prepare a planning policy that will be applied.

The need for such a policy was recognised at this month's meeting of the Executive Services Committee when the first of these applications was received.

Superannuation

Forecasts of tight budgets at Federal and State Government level are indicators that we'll hear a lot more about belt-tightening and the need to 'share the sacrifice'.

What we don't hear so much about is the positive side of people, such as local Councils seeking alternative solutions to the current economic difficulties.

Caulfield Council has re-assessed the whole basis for funding the very wide range of services it provides for its com-

Local Rates

despite the quality of the services they receive, ratepayers cannot continue to bear large increases in rates. This is compounded by the fact that Caulfield has an increasing proportion of people in the community requiring support services.

Limited Powers

Overseas, Local Governments have other options for taxation. In Australia, Federal Government collects 80% of taxes, the States 16% and Local Government about 4%.

The Federal and State Governments often seem to regard their tax revenue as "their" money, which they may care to hand back to Local Govern-

ment. But all tax revenue originates from families and firms in local areas, and State or Federal aid to a local authority means that local residents are only gaining access to a ocal Rates small proportion of their total Federal and State spent in their district. Locals have a right to get some of their own taxes back.

Federal Funding

Local Government has a commitment from the Federal Government that it shall receive an increase in funding in real terms in 1987/88.

To ensure that this essential support is forthcoming, Caulfield Council joined other members the Metropolitan Municipal Association on recent delegation to Canberra.

The Carers' Project

The needs and experiences of the confused elderly and their carers are the subject of a project being conducted in Caulfield by three final year social work students from the Phillip Institute of Technology. The purpose of the project is to improve community awareness of the problems these people face and to provide information that will be useful in planning support services.

The study will be carried out over the next three months and will pay particular attention to the views of people actually involved in caring for a confused, elderly person. Opinions of various health and welfare professionals in the municipality will also be sought.


Care of the elderly is a very demanding and necessary task and is often undertaken in the home by wives, husbands, relatives or friends. The demands on a carer of an

elderly person are greatly increased when that person is also confused. They have problems remembering their name, their family, where they are or whether it is day or night. Care of the confused elderly is a 24 hours a day job which often requires months or years of constant commitment.

The outcome is often exhaustion and stress for carers as well as a feeling of isolation from the community.

To ensure the success of this study, direct contact with people involved in such situations is being sought. Anyone who is elderly person on a full or part-time basis is invited to contact Chris Birrell, Sandy Shaw or Simon MacDonald, of the Caulfield Carers' Project, through the Council's Community Development Department (telephone 524 3333) or Heathlands Aged Persons Hostel (telephone 509 3143, Mondays and Thursdays only). 

Road Funding a Priority at the Premier's Conference

Transport Minister, Mr Tom Roper, today warned the Federal Government that Victoria would make maintenance of road funding a priority issue at the Premier's con-

"Specifically we will be asking the commonwealth to continue Australian bicentennial road development funding beyond 1988," Mr Roper told a conference of municipal engineers in Melbourne recently.

"In asking the Federal Government to continue A.B.R.D. funding, we will be doing nothing more than seeking a fair share for Victoria.
"We don't want

anything to which we are not entitled — we simply want a fair go."

Mr Roper said much had been made recently about comparisons of Queensland with Victoria. He feels that Queensland has been receiving far more than its share for some years.

"The Commonwealth Government currently grants Queensland \$106 per vehicle for roads, while Victoria gets only \$68 per vehicle," he said.

"The removal of A.B.R.D. - currently

standing at \$93.5 million for Victoria - after 1988 would only add to this

Mr Roper called on the engineers to urge Councils to join the State Government in its cam-paign over A.B.R.D. funding. He said that if the funding is not continued in some form it would not only mean no more new roads, it will mean that urgent maintenance work will not proceed.

"I want to emphasise that in raising this issue at this time we are not seeka fight with our federal colleagues. All we are seeking is a fairer go for Victorian road users and I ask you to join us in this entirely justified campaign. The Victorian Government, despite tight budgetary conditions has topped up funding in areas where the commonwealth has cut it back," said Mr Roper. "But we can't continue in a situation where there are further cuts by the common-wealth," he added.

Liquor Control

The Sandringham Council has written to Caulfield suggesting that the current procedure of objections to the renewal of liquor licences each year and the subsequent hearings by the Liquor Control Commission are costly. Neither do they offer immediate or effective relief to residents who suffer loss of amenity from living adjacent to hotels.

Sandringham pointed out that whilst there is effective town planning control over hours of operation of milk bars and service stations, there is no such control over

ingham has requested Caulfield's support for a submission to the Government in relation to some of the amenity aspects of hotel operations. It is seeking a commitment from the Victorian Government to implement a number of recommendations of the Nieuwenhuysen Report in conjunction with any reform of the liquor laws.







Leisure Lines

Synthetic surfaces! It would appear that everyone is playing on them. The hallowed grass of Kooyong is to be replaced by a synthetic surface at the new tennis centre and the new soccer/hockey pitch at Olympic Park number two ground will be synthetic grass. And more and more cricket clubs are playing on synthetic pitches - even some horse racing tracks have synthetic grass areas.

Why is there such an interest in using synthetic surfaces for sport? There are a number of factors to be considered, briefly they include the following points. Firstly, high quality natural playing surfaces are expensive to maintain. This applies particularly to the labour intensive surfaces required for tennis played

on grass and cricket played on turf. The high labour costs are beyond the reach Secondly, the increasing professionalism of sport and the demand from the

media and the public for more live sporting telecasts dictates that the playing surfaces must be of a very high standard and playable in all weathers. Thirdly, open space resources dedicated to sporting facilities are becoming increasingly expensive and the demand for access to these limited resources is increasing, along with cost. It is therefore essential that the resources dedicated to sport are well used all season. Natural surfaces cannot compete with the durability of synthetic surfaces that could be used 24 hours a day, seven days a

Finally, the quality of synthetic surfaces has improved considerably over the last decade. Playing surfaces are now being designed to meet the specific requirements of individual sports. High technology has also contributed to the development of sub-surface shock pads, maintenance systems etc., that improve the quality and durability of the new surfaces.

There can be no doubt that synthetic sporting surfaces are here to stay and new synthetic facilities will be constructed for an increasing range of sports. Although this work will continue and will be most noticeable at the elite end of the sporting market increasingly these new surfaces will be provided at the local

For example, within Caulfield we already have a number of synthetic tennis

courts and a synthetic athletics track provided for public use.

The day cannot be far off, when a V.F.L. team runs out onto an oval covered with synthetic grass, but will the game be the same without all that mud?




