Gillard Resigns

The South Ward may have to go to another poll following the surprise resignation of Cr. Graeme Gillard.

Cr. Gillard has resigned for personal reasons which he does not wish to discuss.

"It is unfortunate that it has happened this way" said Cr. Gillard "But the events in question happened after the elections and I could not have foreseen them."

"I have tried to do my best for the City of Caulfield over my eight

years of service and I am sorry to have to end it this way, but circumstances made it difficult for me to continue."

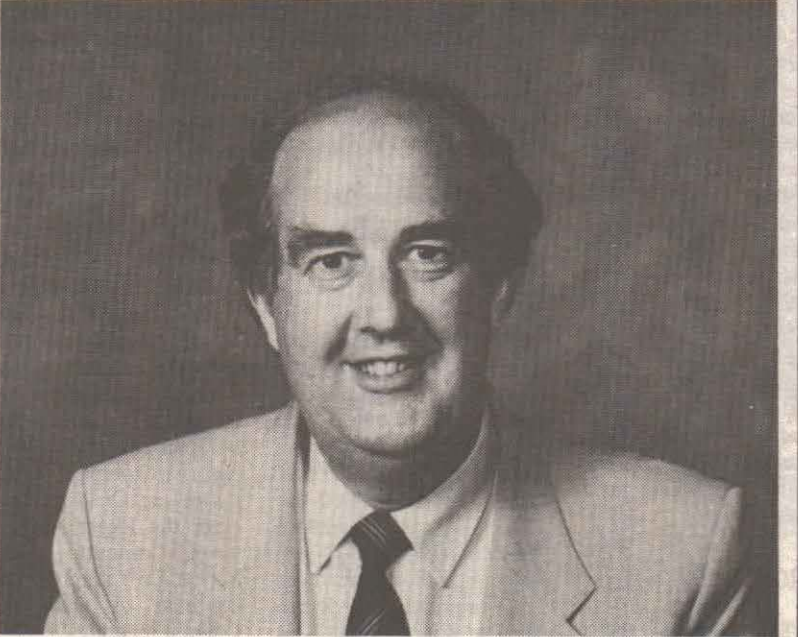
Cr. Gillard has acted as Chairman of each of the Committees over his eight years with Caulfield Council, has served on two Committees of Management and has had a long association with Caulfield Community Services.

"He was a good committee chairman," said the Mayor, Cr. Jack Campbell. "He was well respected for his work, particularly in the areas of planning and strategy in which he has always shown a keen interest."

"I personally am sorry to see him resigning. I am sure he could have continued to make a significant contribution to Council deliberations."

"However, having reached that decision I wish him and his family the best of health and fortune for the future, and thank him for his long service to the City of Caulfield."

Cr. Patience, a fellow South Ward Councillor, was also sorry to see Cr. Gillard resigning and spoke highly of his service to the Council.

A SCULPTURE GARDEN?...NOT QUITE



Passing onlookers may well have thought that the City Hall was being buried under a tonne of rubble. Unlikely as it seems, though, the mess on the corner of Glen Eira and Hawthorn Roads is actually the beginnings of what will be a magnificent sculpture garden.

Work has begun, with the trees being removed from the side of the Hall to make way for the transferring of the front carpark.

What was the carpark is being dug up and the piles of dirt are the basis of the landscaping that will highlight the park. It will be mounded slightly to give a more attractive aspect and to make the garden visible from further away.

It is obvious that work is progressing quickly, and while the sculpture is not likely to be in place before next October, the garden itself should be fairly well established by then.

We apologise again for the mess and inconvenience, but it should soon be worthwhile when the new garden will enhance the City Hall and serve as a pleasant, quiet recreation space for all Caulfield citizens.

A Fair Day

News from Council



Glenhuntly Parking

Glenhuntly shoppers take note! The two hour parking restrictions along Glenhuntly Rd. in the the Glenhuntly shopping centre will be reduced to one hour. This follows a petition by the Glenhuntly traders, 84% of whom were in favour of the restrictions.

Council decided that in view of the offstreet parking available around the centre, in Station Place and Manchester and Watson Groves, it was reasonable to reduce the hours of parking in the main street.

Facelift

The property at 97 Mimosa Road Carnegie is to be given a facelift courtesy of the Gas and Fuel Corporation which currently leases it.

The Gas and Fuel had requested permission to erect another shed on the site, but Council was con-

cerned that the already unattractive aspect of the site would be worsened.

Council requested that the Gas and Fuel undertake landscaping of the site and paint the fence a suitable colour, a condition which was agreed to by the representative of the Gas and Fuel.

Home Update

The Nursing Home Sub-committee is ensuring that the plans for the Home are moving along smoothly and quickly.

Discussion with architects have been held and have centred around the "home like", non-institutional model preferred by the Department of Community Services.

The City of Caulfield has also been conducting talks with operators of existing Nursing Homes and the Department of Community Services in relation to other aspects of the home, and further fund-raising plans are in the pipeline.

Red Bus

Council noted a report by the Metropolitan Transit Authority that a pilot bus planning project had been carried out in Moorabbin.

The project aimed to test alternative bus planning techniques with a view to extending the study to the rest of Melbourne. While the report did not affect Caulfield, it was read with interest as the MTA has recently been requested to investigate the possibility of improvements to bus services in the Murrumbena and Carnegie areas.

New Appointments

Following the elections, Cr. Rudzki has been elected Chairman of the Economic Development Committee, Cr. Braun will be Chairman of the Policy and Environment Committee, and Cr. Bloom will chair the Executive Services Committee. The Mayor, Cr. Campbell will continue to chair the Council meetings.

Library Stocktake

The stocktake at the Caulfield libraries is showing that book loss is gratifyingly low. The Elsternwick branch revealed a loss of around 1.6%, less than \$600 a

year. It is hoped that it will be reduced further when the library follows up some outstanding loans.

The Caulfield Branch stocktake took a little longer than expected, as the computer had a malfunction.

Trucks Stopped

Residents of Strathearn Avenue will no longer be subjected to the rumble of trucks down their street.

Following several complaints, Council investigations revealed that trucks did use the residential street as a throughway, and some measures undertaken to stop the practice have not been successful.

A load limit of 3 tonnes will be put in place to dissuade heavy vehicles, and Council will monitor other residential streets nearby to ensure they are not adversely affected.

Flag Decision

Council has resolved the question of how to appropriately fly national flags of other countries on their national days.

Concern had been expressed that other flags had been given an inappropriate position when flown from the City Hall flagpole, but solutions

such as using the front flagpole were unsatisfactory due to the danger of vandalism.

The solution was found to be the placement of a yard-arm where the current flagpole is, to allow for the Australian flag and the flags of other nations to fly side by side. When two flags are flown, the Australian flag will have the position of honour on the left.

Resident Artists

Following the success of Caulfield's Dancer in the Community project, submissions have been made for a Writer-in-Residence and a Composer-in-Residence. If they are approved, the Writer will be employed for nine months to work with young people, hostel residents, and other interested community groups.

The Composer would similarly work with the Caulfield Choir and the Caulfield Band and local musicians to compose an orchestral/choral to be performed during the Caulfield Festival.

Appeals Upheld

Two decisions by Council have been upheld at the Planning Appeals Board.

One appeal resulted from Council's refusal to approve an application for two advertising signs at Caulfield State School. Council felt that the signs would be detrimental to the pleasant aspect afforded by the landscaped school gardens.

The Board agreed with this decision, finding the the schoolgrounds were a 'visual oasis' in the shopping centre and should be left unmarred.

Another decision was to allow the construction of seven single storey units in Booran Road Caulfield. Council had approved this in February, but objectors appealed to the Board.

The Board found that the development did not constitute overdevelopment of the site and that traffic impact would be minimal.

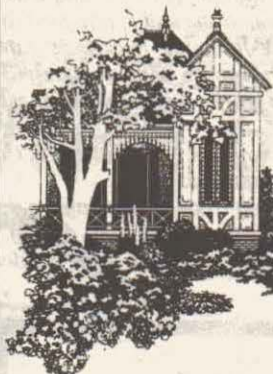
CHANGE OF OFFICE HOURS

Caulfield Loses Medical Officer



Caulfield Councillors and officers were saddened to hear of the death of Dr. Geoffrey Stillwell, Caulfield's Medical Officer of Health for the past twenty years.

Dr. Stillwell was sixty-five years old last November, and died suddenly last month.

As Caulfield's Medical Officer, Dr. Stillwell advised on health matters in the City, and was responsible for all the immunisation projects in Caulfield.

He was a member of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners and a member of the Board of the Victorian Faculty since 1966, and a Fellow of the A.M.A.

Before that he was Chairman of the Section of Medical Officers of Health of the Victorian Branch of the A.M.A. and was a member of the Victorian Public Health Commission from 1970 until it disbanded in 1978.

He had been a distinguished member of the Victorian and Western

Australian branches of the B.M.A. and A.M.A. since 1945.

During his long and fruitful association with Caulfield, begun in 1967, he served on a number of Committees and Sub-Committees of Council, including convening the committee which successfully organised the Centenary celebrations of the Victorian branch of the A.M.A.

He had also conducted a private medical practice in Caulfield since 1950.

Helen Friedmann Elected to Council

Caulfield has a new face on Council, following the election of Halina (Helen) Friedmann over sitting member Dorothy Ford.

Friedmann defeated Ford 4,887 to 3,658 in an election which saw 62% of South Ward residents turn out to vote.

"I thank the residents of Caulfield for placing their confidence in me and I will, as promised during my campaign, work diligently and enthusiastically for the betterment of our City," said Cr. Friedmann.

"I trust the residents of the South Ward will keep me informed on matters of special interest and issues for I, like my colleagues, am always keen to hear and consult with the residents and traders of our City."

The retiring Councillor, Dorothy Ford, has been a representative of the South Ward since 1977, and expressed her thanks to the people who had supported her over the last ten years, both citizens and Caulfield staff.

She felt particularly sad at breaking up what she said was a "close knit team" of South Ward Councillors made up of

herself, and Crs. Patience and Gillard.

"I would also like to thank my family and all those who helped me during the election and for the letters, flowers and cards sent to me over the last couple of weeks in thanks for my service," she said.

"I wish my successor the best over the next three years".

The Returning Officer, Mrs. Elizabeth Loftus, reported that the election was "free of any significant controversy".

At the Statutory meeting, the new Councillor was sworn in along with Councillors Campbell, Robinson, and Rudzki who were re-elected, unopposed.

Last year's Mayor, Cr. Jack Campbell was also re-elected by the Councillors to serve another term as Mayor.

WATCH OUT

Many people are finding that as a result of Neighborhood Watch their areas are friendlier as well as safer.

Henry Nathan, Area Co-Ordinator for Area H29 is adamant that there is a greater awareness by residents of their neighbours, which he believes was not there prior to Neighborhood Watch.

"A lot of people have lived next door to someone for twenty years and only ever nodded hello to them. Now when you walk down the street you see people talking to each other," he said. "A Zone develops a village atmosphere."

Area H29, bound by Balaclava, Kooyong, Hawthorn and Glenhuntly Roads, has been operating for twelve months with great success, but is now needs some more people to help take over some Zone Leader positions.

"Like most areas, since Neighborhood Watch started the crime rate has diminished," said Mr. Nathan. "We have had a successful year."

In the Neighborhood Watch structure, there is an Area Co-ordinator - in this case Mr. Nathan - a Deputy Co-ordinator, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and then sub-committees.

Due to people moving, or having other commitments, positions have come up for about a dozen Zones.

The Zone leaders and their Assistants look after a particular area, often one street, making sure the newsletters are distributed and dealing with specific queries, and attending a meeting once a month.

"It really takes very little time," said Mr. Nathan.

The meetings are held in the Committee Room at the City Hall at 7.30 pm on the fourth Monday of each month. Anyone interested should go along, or ring Mr. Nathan on 523 5624 (AH).

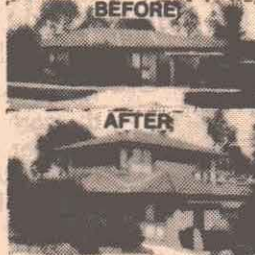

New Books - Fiction

DECEPTION by Joan Aiken

Joan Aiken follows her sequel to Mansfield Park (Mansfield Revisited) with another historical romance set in the same period, just after Waterloo. Alvey Clement and Louisa Winship are identical in looks - but not in character. Alvey wants to be a writer and Louisa a missionary - but her family won't hear of the idea. So Alvey persuades Louisa to change places and so the Deception begins.

I AM ENGLAND by Patricia Wright

"Once upon a time there was a ridge of land". Thus begins a tale which weaves the years together of England's past. In five linked episodes the author has taken a single village in Sussex Weald and through it pass forest people, ironsmiths, monks and adventurers. In the end the reader, too, becomes an inhabitant of the ridge and feels the people all around.

THE FRIEND by Diana Henstell

In this riveting novel of suspense, Diana Henstell paints a remarkably compassionate portrait of a young boy fired by genius and driven by loneliness. His solution to the tragedy which totally destroys his fragile happiness breathes a new and terrifying life into the story that has haunted generations - Mary Shelley's Frankenstein.

THE EYES OF THE DRAGON by Stephen King

A captivating tale of heroic adventure, of dragons and princes, of mysterious mice and magical men, as only Stephen King can tell it. The wicked court magician, Flagg, plans to rule the kingdom when the King is dead. But Prince Peter stands to inherit the realm and remembers Flagg's words, "Here I come Peter! Coming for your head."

New Books - Non-Fiction

TV ASTRONOMER. THIRTY YEARS OF "THE SKY AT NIGHT", by Patrick Moore

In April 1957, a young astronomer named Patrick Moore presented the first programme in a television series called 'The Sky at Night'. Thirty years on, Patrick Moore is the best-known and best-loved astronomer in Britain and his programme is the longest-running in television history. This book celebrates the programme itself and the advances in astronomy that have taken place.

TRAITORS. THE LABYRINTHS OF TREASON by Chapman Pincher

LIBRARY FEES

October 1 is the day on which Caulfield Library Service will reluctantly reintroduce charges for overdue library books and materials, a move forced upon it by the unilateral decision of the State Government to cut library funding.

This decision could leave Caulfield Library Service with a substantial shortfall, assuming that the remaining grant money is distributed to local government on the present per capita basis.

Faced with the need to make up the expected drastic shortfall, or make

cuts in library services, the Library included questions on alternative funding methods, in the major Library Services Review it carried out in December 1986.

- * 42% of respondents said that they felt the Library should introduce overdue charges;
- * 33% favoured the introduction of book borrowing fees;
- * 18.5% wanted the introduction of membership charges;
- * 6.2% opted for an increase in rates;
- * no-one preferred a cut in Library services!

After reviewing the results, it was decided to reintroduce overdue charges, and the charges were set at \$2.00 for a first notice, \$4.00 for a second notice, and \$6.00 for a third notice.

Although regretting the reintroduction of overdue fees, which has been forced upon the Library through external circumstances, it is felt that this move may have the effect of encouraging patrons to return library materials promptly, thus spreading the library's resources as evenly as possible.

YOUTH GUARANTEE

The Youth Guarantee is a government pledge to the community that by the end of its current term of office, all Victorians aged fifteen to eighteen will have the option of:

1. Full time work
2. Full time education
3. Full time training
4. Some acceptable structured arrangement for education, training and work.

By the end of August there will be 162 trained counsellors operating in Victoria. Each counsellor is responsible for advising and assisting about forty young people.

Young people who have been unemployed

for six months or more will be contacted by letter and asked to arrange an interview with their personal Youth Guarantee Counsellor.

Some of the Youth Guarantee counsellors will be based in the regional office of the Department of Labour for easy access and for organising interviews, but they will travel across the state to help in placement and to provide post-placement support.

The role of Youth Guarantee Counsellor is:

1. Assist with job-hunting or job training placement through the CES or other job sources.

2. Identify appropriate labour market programs and arrange placement of participants.

3. Assist young people, their employers or educators after placement so that employment or training position potential is maximised.

One of the most successful innovations introduced as part of the Youth Guarantee is the State-wide telephone service which allows young people to call and seek advice for the cost of a local call.

JODIE SPEAKS OUT



Kilvington student Jodie McVernon was Runner Up in the recent Victorian State Finals of the Plain English Speaking Awards.

Jodie, who is studying for her HSC at Kilvington, spoke on 'The Art of Public Speaking' as her topic.

"Choosing a topic is the hardest part" said Jodie. "Of course, you get nervous at the thought of standing up there in front of people, but that is overcome by practice."

She was not put out by the fact that Ian Cathie,

Education Minister, was in the front row of an audience that consisted of several hundred people.

"It's more frightening talking in front of people you know than people you don't know" she said.

There are three parts to the competition - and eight minute prepared speech on a topic of the students choice, a three minute impromptu speech on an unseen topic for which they are given four minutes preparation, and an interview. The impromptu speech

was 'Indifference', and luckily Jodie knew the meaning of the word.

"A lot of people didn't know what 'indifference' was," said Jodie, "but it didn't matter, in a way, as the judges are more interested in how you handle the topic."

The qualities the judges look for include an ability to keep on the topic, a sound development of the argument, clear speaking with appropriate modulation, and a speech covering the range of ideas that the topic suggests.

Jodie is something of an old hand at these competitions, having been competing since she was in Year Nine.

Kilvington encourages the development of these sort of skills, and its debating team is currently coming first in the A grade schools competition.

Jodie is hoping to get into medicine when she finishes school, and would like to find time at University to keep up her public speaking and debating interests.

Caulfield Collection to Open New Arts Centre

New Look Station

The refurbished Glenhuntly station was recently opened by Transport Minister Tom Roper and Member for Clayton, Dr. Gerard Vaughan.

The final touches to the \$710,000 building were completed in early July.

Glenhuntly passengers now have a covered walk from Glenhuntly Road into the modern, air-conditioned and bright station building.

Red brick, arches, lattice work and a Federation style are prominent in the new building.

"The new station incorporates and blends these elements together, to create a unique and functional building complimenting its surroundings" Mr. Roper said.

The station building proper was completed in December, but work on the covered walkway from Glenhuntly Road could not begin until the old wooden railway crossing gates were upgraded to boom barriers and the old signal box was removed.

"There was an argument at the time for restoring the existing wooden buildings, said Dr. Vaughan. However, they were riddled with white ants and completely inadequate."

Look After Your Bin

The Big Bins which are provided free of charge from the Council are sometimes taken for granted by residents. They are not cheap to replace and with increasing numbers being damaged or lost through carelessness, Council may have to consider charging residents for replacements if they damage or lose a bin through neglect. Hopefully this will not be necessary if people remember a few simple rules:

* Bins for emptying should be out on footpaths or nature strips by 6.00 am on the collection day.

* All waste should be placed in the bin with the lid closed and thus flyproofed.

* The bin should not be used for hot or burning ashes, rocks, soil, paint, oil, solvents or heavy materials which may overload or damage the bin.

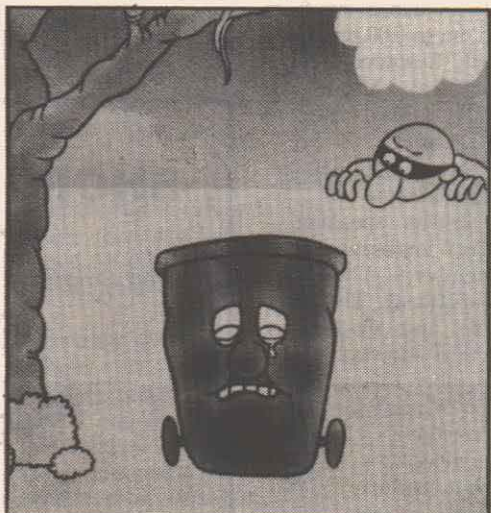
* Bins which are too heavy will not be emptied. * No extra waste will be collected (plastic bags, etc.)

* Do not leave the bin on the nature strip between the collections.

* Please do not place long branches or timber in the bin if it will not allow the lid to close properly.



Please: On bottle collection day stack bottles neatly next to bin or tree to prevent people walking into them.



Please: Do not leave bin on nature strip or footpath (other than on collection days) and so prevent theft or vandalism.



Please: Do not fill bin with heavy materials - it will be too heavy to move.



Please: Do not overfill bin. Cut branches etc. to ensure lid closes properly. No extra bags.

Focus On... GLENHUNTLY

Glenhuntly shopping centre has character - a quality sadly lacking in all those huge, impersonal shopping centres, for all their money and razzamatazz.

The strip along Glenhuntly Rd., from Grange to Booran Roads, contains lots of odd little shops that you rarely see nowadays - cobblers, hat shops, dress-makers, picture framers, a shop that sells 'Antique Crafts', and the wonderful Cane Shop which is great for those "what do you get someone who has everything" birthday presents.

As well as these, it has the full range of Milk Bars, Chemists, good butchers, cheap Fruit and Vege shops, Hairdressers, Newsagents, a Supermarket, Laundromats ... everything you need to keep body and soul together, clothed, clean and entertained.

However, this column is devoted to the delights of eating, and Glenhuntly has lots of pleasant surprises of the food variety tucked away in nooks and crannies.

I will start with Annabella's Pizza, not only because it starts with 'A' but because I have sampled its wares fairly often over the years.

Located at 1141, it makes fine pizzas, especially the Annabella Special or Cappriciosa. There is a sit down area as well as the take away section, and the service is always efficient and friendly.

A surprise on my culinary tour was 'Nagoya' a Japanese restaurant at 1107, proudly stating it has Just Opened. It has amazing little plastic models of Sushi, Sashimi, Tempura, Yakitori and Soba in the window, and looks pleasant enough inside. Must give it a try.

The Old Vic Theatre Restaurant is another uniquely Glenhuntly institution. It has been known to have poetry readings on a Sunday afternoon, and is currently advertising a Magic Evening, jazz nights and a \$14.00 a head three-course lunch and show.

The other restaurant is the Tai Yuen at 1161, which proudly advertises Australian and Chinese meals.

What about snacks to while away the time while your laundry is washing? There is plenty of variety in this category as well.

One of my favourites is the Kim Sing Chinese Takeaway, which has Spring Rolls, and Prawn Crackers ready-to-go. Try the Curry Puffs.



If cakes take your fancy you can choose between Karl's at 1134, which has fine cakes, pastries and sausage rolls, and who also makes Wedding and Birthday Cakes and Croquembouche to order; or Polly's at 1183 who also advertise Wedding Cakes as well as having homemade family pies, Banana or Carrot logs, and the "Best Apple Strudel in Town".

There is also the Bakers Delight Bread Shop at 1103, with everything from traditional Dutch loaves to the latest Pritikin-style bread.

For a more substantial lunch there is the Lunch Bar at 1220, with a table outside for fine weather, and offering a large range of pies, donuts, croissants, sandwiches and hot food; the Lunchmaker Deli at 1133 which advertises fresh bagels, cabbage rolls, salads, dips, and Quiches; and the Coffee Shop at 1118 which offers cappuccinos, hot dogs, icecream and other snacks.

If you are feeling really wicked, there is Chris' "Hot" Fish and Chips (what other kind are there?) at 1212, and a Roast Chicken Shop at 1132.

After all that indulgence you can save your conscience at the Sunnybrook Health Food Store at 1146, which has dried fruits, Tofu products, Yoghurt, health biscuits and bread, and other wholesome goodies.

There are several Milk Bars along this strip, and most of them have sandwiches for sale as well as traditional items like pies and pasties.

For people who prefer to make their own meals, there are some good butchers here, some of whom offer things like chicken patties and savoury loaves as well as the usual cuts of meat. The Duck Inn at 1159 specializes in poultry goods, and there are some good cheap Greengrocers in the centre.

The local Chinese restaurant is something of an institution for Australians. For many of us it was our first introduction to 'dining out', and was a taste of the exotic in the days before restaurants ranging from Carribean to Yugoslavian sprang up on every corner.

Despite the advent of newer cuisines, Chinese restaurants seemed to be holding their own, if not increasing their numbers in Melbourne. They range from the lush, three-star food palaces to humble corner takeaways. The Sun Ah falls somewhere in between these poles, with a pleasant atmosphere and very reasonable prices.

The menu is extensive, offering a variety of fairly traditional Chinese meals, with a section of special dishes.

For those who have trouble deciding, though, there are set menus for two or more people. There is only one menu for two people, so we were spared even the decision of which banquet to choose!

Be prepared, though, and come hungry if you choose the banquet. For a mere \$14.00 your diet for Summer will be completely blown out the window. But what a way to go.

The first dish on the menu was good old chicken soup, the Chinese way - i.e. cooked with sweet corn. I must confess I have been a fan of this soup ever since my first visit to a Chinese

restaurant at a young and impressionable age. This hearty bowlful was no disappointment to my memory.

Next on item was the famous Spring Roll, hot, crisp and sweet and straight out of the frying pan. Tasty though it was, the real enjoyment lay in watching my less-than-expert companion trying to eat it with chopsticks. I must say I was not much better. (As a hint, forget trying to pick it up, just impale it on the end of the chopstick. Easy!)

Braised Chicken with vegetables was next to emerge, and the bite sized pieces of chicken came with generous servings of snow peas and tasty oyster mushrooms, among other things.

After this we were served Satay Steak (you have a choice between Satay and Blackbean Sauce). The sauce was spicy and tasty, without an overbearing peanut taste. Neither of the previous dishes was served with rice, which we agreed was a good idea, as the dishes provided a good couple of bowlsful each. With rice we could not have got through it all.

The next dish, sweet-and-sour pork, was, however served with light fried rice, full of prawns and beanshoots. The dish itself was tasty, though it was getting very hard to fit everything in by this stage.

Bloated though we were, we squeezed in banana fritters and ice-cream merely because they looked so delicious being served to everyone else. Coffee or tea was also included in the \$14.00 a head.

This banquet was the cheapest, with others ranging up to over \$23.00 for six people. As prices increased so did the number and quality of delicacies, with the dearest including lobster.

The A La Carte Menu included a good variety of soups, entrees, seafood, beef, and chicken in a variety of styles and sauces. All up, it was a very good value meal, in a comfortable setting and with polite and attentive service.

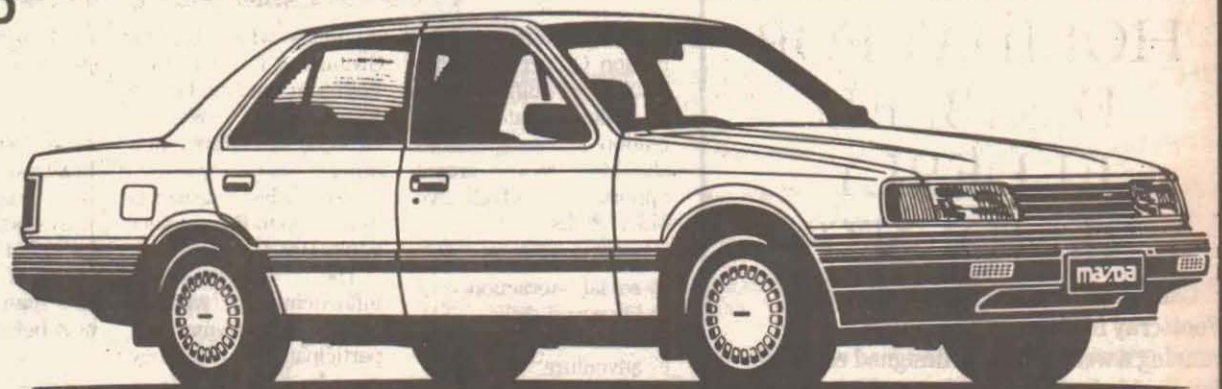
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
