

# Government Charges Force Rate Rise

CAULFIELD CITY LIBRARIES

The City of Caulfield has already struck its rate for 1987/88 and despite the financial pressures being imposed has achieved a very moderate rate increase.

Local Government in Victoria will be hit with substantial financial burdens in the coming year.

## Government Impact

Council rate revenue has had to be increased by 33% purely to accommodate increased government charges and reduced grants.

Factors involved include clerical staff of Local Government being classified as part of the highest risk group of workers in Victoria. Because of this reclassification the Council will incur a WorkCare premium increase of 83% for this particular group which amounts to over \$100,000 more than the indexed 1986/7 figure.

Grants Commission Funding has changed, and because of the new procedures in the allocation of the funds, the City of Caulfield will suffer a decrease in real terms of approximately \$80,000. The State Government has also changed the method of payment in regard to the Grants Commission Funds which has the effect of reducing interest on investment by another \$80,000 per year.

In the Libraries, once again the State Government has reduced its proportion of the funds for the Library Service. The City of Caulfield, because of these cutbacks must contribute an extra \$40,000 per year to keep this service operating at the same efficient level.

Local government has now also been given the responsibility of ensuring that the power lines are kept clear in the streets of the municipality, previously the responsibility of the SEC. The City of Caulfield will have to meet the cost which is estimated to be in the order of \$10,000 per year.

A new charging policy by the MMBW means that Caulfield will also be paying \$20,000 more for water rates than the inflated figure last year.

## Costs

Other items with substantially increased costs include a superannuation 3% productivity claim and extraordinary increases in insurance premiums.

Notwithstanding these problems, the Council has been able to keep the

overall rate increase down to 9.8%. This has been brought about by a budget surplus from last year, increased rate revenue that is anticipated as a result of encouraging property development in the City and a number of other budget initiatives.

## Resident Priorities

In the budget, the Council has made sure that funds over and above normal allocations are committed to address current demands from residents for increased tree pruning, improved street lighting, and road and footpath works.

## Forward Planning

The Council has also continued with a program to gradually build financial reserves for the equitable replacement of plant and vehicles and for building maintenance.

One of the more expensive items is the replacement of the garbage collection vehicles, many of which are reaching the end of their economical life. The replacement cost of each vehicle on today's terms is \$170,000.

## A Ticklish Operation?



## FAIRWAY REFUSAL

Caulfield Council is refusing to comply with a request from the Ministry of Transport to paint broken yellow lines along tram routes as part of the implementation of the "Fairway" system.

Since Council has firmly objected to the proposal since it was first suggested, and taken every possible step to oppose it, Council has no intention now of funding its implementation.

"It would seem highly inappropriate that the Council be expected to carry out the installation of this line marking in view of its vehement opposition" said the Mayor, Cr. Jack Campbell. "We certainly do not have sufficient resources to carry out the extensive work required, and besides I would not like to see one dollar of ratepayers money spent on this scheme."

In this instance Council apparently has no con-

trol over what happens to the roads of its own municipality, as deputations, petitions and other avenues of appeal have all been to no avail.

The Fairway regulations mean that a driver to the right of the broken lines marked on the road has to move out of the way of an approaching tram to let it through, provided it is safe to do so.

Council reports have shown that the system is highly inappropriate to the City of Caulfield for a variety of reasons.

It has been found that most delays caused to trams occur at signalised intersections - but the yellow linemarking proposed by the R.T.A. will not apply within 60 metres of signalised intersections, therefore linemarking will occur

between intersections, where delays are minimal anyway.

Council is concerned that the fairway linemarking through shopping centres may not be practically viable, particularly where kerb extension work has been carried out requiring vehicles to travel over tram tracks, and that this may result in danger to vehicles and pedestrians.

It has also been pointed out that there has been no opportunity to assess the reduction of the delay to trams as a result of traffic signal works, and that there appears to be no hard evidence to suggest that fairway linemarking alone reduces tram delays.

The measures will cause inconvenience and frustration to motorists requiring to turn right

into streets between intersections - and with the need for access to streets, properties and off-street carparking, it is highly likely that motorists will disregard the regulations due to impracticality.

Council has informed the Ministry of Transport that it has no intention of carrying out the work, and that it continues to be opposed to the system.

It is likely, however, that the government will simply get the Road Construction Authority to paint the lines.

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## News from Council

### Flats Not Up to City of Caulfield Scratch

A Ministry of Housing development in Rosella St. Murrumbidgee has raised the ire of both Council and residents by failing to comply with its planning permit. Residents became concerned when it became apparent that the development failed to match the plan in a variety of ways. The sill heights were lower than the 1.7 metres indicated on the plan, the colour of the finished building was not as indicated, and some unapproved storage sheds were under construction.

Council protested most strongly to the Ministry, and some steps were taken to rectify the situation. False sills have been fitted to the windows and approval has been sought for the sheds, but it is currently questionable whether the Council can challenge the colour of the building. Council has expressed its vehement dissatisfaction with the Ministry of Housing's conduct.

### Stakes

The City of Caulfield Stakes, traditionally run at Caulfield on the first Saturday in December will have to be delayed this year. Now the Caulfield Cup is over, the Racecourse will have to undergo major track work, and no racing is likely to be held until the New Year. The options were either to delay the race, or run it at Sandown - and running the City of Caulfield Stakes at Sandown seemed a little unlikely! The race will then, be held on May 14, 1988.

### Runners at Caulfield

The Victorian Road Running Championships will again be held at Caulfield in 1988, following the successful running of the event in May this year. As with this year, some roads will be temporarily closed, some parking restrictions will be in force and Caulfield will help out with barricades and provision of

traffic officers to help the event run smoothly. The money raised by the event goes to the Victorian Athletics Association, who are only being asked to cover the cost of providing traffic officers for three and a half hours on the day. It will take place towards the end of May 1988.

### Foster Care Donation

Foster Care South East Committee in Caulfield has expressed its gratitude to Council for the Donation of \$7,560 to help meet what is possibly a large deficit. Foster Care organises alternative residences for children whose families are unable to care for them, for periods from a short time to an extended stay.

### Sky Sign Rejected

Caulfield is to be spared a floodlit sky sign in Derby Road over the Caulfield Club Hotel. An application was made to have the sign approved through Council's Executive Services Committee, but was rejected on the grounds that it would be an unwelcome intrusion into the area resulting in a loss of amenity, and that the sign would be out of character with the surrounding buildings. It was felt that the large sign would also contribute

to a cluttered look in the area.

The proposal was for a large Swan Premium advertisement, but this could have been changed to anything in the future.

### Extended Hours

The new Toto's in Glenhantly Road has received conditional approval for an extension in hours till 1.00 am. Some residents were concerned, from previous experience, that additional noise and car parking problems would occur, but with assurance from the owners that the provision was only to allow some customers to finish up their meals, and that the kitchen would still close at 11.00 pm, it was agreed to allow a twelve month trial to monitor the effects.

### Sculpture Finalists

The Arts Selection Committee has assessed some sixty-three submissions made by artists competing for the chance to produce the work for the Caulfield Sculpture Garden. The Sculpture Adviser Mr Lenton Parr, commented that the entries were all of an unusually high standard, but four finalists have been selected. These are Mr Cole Sopov, Mr Tony Pryor, Mr Peter Schippenheyn and Mr Dan Wollmering. All are from Melbourne and are recognised artists. These artists will now produce

a model sculpture and from these the piece to be commissioned will be chosen.

The finalist models will be on display and the winner announced at the opening of the Arts Complex.

### Family History Workbook

The growing number of people researching their family history will soon be aided by a book researched by the Caulfield Library. The Family History Workbook will help beginners in genealogical research with an easy guide on how to begin.

The guide has been thoroughly researched and checked by experts and it will hopefully soon be published. If the book is successful, Caulfield Library Service will receive regular royalty payments while the book remains in print. With the large number of people becoming interested in this fascinating field, it is hoped the venture will provide a regular income as well as good publicity.

### Spray Booths Approved

Council has approved the construction of booths for spraying furniture, as well as various burners and outlet flues, at an existing factory in Glenhantly Road. While

some residents were concerned with a possible health hazard posed by the industry, after extensive discussions with the Environment Protection Authority, the Council was satisfied that adequate protection for the neighbourhood existed. Of course, various conditions were applied to ensure the impact on the area was kept to a minimum.

### Brothel Refused

The Planning Appeals Board has upheld a Council decision to refuse permission for a brothel in Horne St. Elsternwick. Council turned down the proposal in February, but the applicant took the decision to appeal. The Board found that there were no problems regarding noise and suitability of the actual building, but that there were three grounds on which to refuse the application. These included the near-

ness to residential land and the desire to avoid 'clustering' of brothels, as the Daily Planet already operated in the area. 'Clustering' could lead to a Caulfield 'Red Light' district, obviously undesirable for residents.

### Housing Appeal

The Planning Appeals Board has upheld an appeal against Council's decision not to allow five units to be built by the Ministry of Housing in Murrumbidgee. The proposed plan allowed for only three car parking spaces, which Council felt was inadequate for five units. The Ministry for Housing maintained that as the units were to be occupied by elderly people with limited assets, and as the public transport system was good in the area, less car parks were needed. The Planning Appeals Board agreed with this rationale and granted them permission to go ahead with the units.

# COUNCIL ANGRY AT GOVERNMENT MEDDLING

**Caulfield Councillors, at this month's meeting of the Policy and Environment Committee have expressed concern that their traditional decision making role may be eroded.**

This follows the recent release of the Metropolitan Policy Document of the Victorian Government - "Shaping Melbourne's Future".

It deals with the changing population trends and the infrastructure required to support the economic well being of the metropolitan area. The policies outlined aim at overcoming the drift to fringe areas which result in the under utilisation of existing facilities and the need for new ones in outer areas.

Caulfield recognises these aims but the implementation of these strategies for encouraging urban growth threaten to bypass Caulfield's existing planning codes and consultative procedures which have been developed over many years and suit Caulfield's own particular needs. Whilst the objectives of the document may be laudable, it has been prepared without any consultation with Local Government bodies.

"The Council is unwilling to sit back and be dictated to about what should go on in their own municipality," said Caulfield's Mayor, Cr. Jack Campbell. "The proposals cut across Caulfield's own strategies and the power of this tier of Government is being usurped".

"I feel very strongly," he said "about the State Government handing us a planning strategy which through proposed 'RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT PROVISIONS' would undermine the traditional responsibilities of Local Government".

The proposals may well be suitable for new

areas but residents look to their Local Council to preserve their City's individual residential environments - the everyday issues such as streetscape, housing alignment overlooking quality and design.

Although Caulfield, itself, has been experiencing a reduction in its population over the last few years, the Council has attempted to arrest this trend through the use of its Residential Multi-Unit Development Policy. It has shown that it is quite capable of looking after its own affairs and needs no interference from the State Government.



## National Bank sponsors Caulfield Charity Run

The National bank became a major sponsor of the City of Caulfield's DOXA run team, with a donation of \$2,000 towards the run.

"We are proud to be sponsoring this Bicentennial activity which also serves to support charities" said Mr Royce McCracken of the National Bank.

The ten-member team is aiming to raise \$5,000 for charity, of which \$3,000 is to go to Caulfield's Nursing Home.

"We still need another \$3,000" said Team Manager Brian Payne. "We are hoping for more support from local people."

The team will join the DOXA Fun-Run, on the route from the City to Queenscliff, on the ferry across to Portsea, then back, a distance of 200 km.

Following the election held in the South Ward last month, Caulfield Council has a new member - Cr. James M. Barrett.

Cr. Barrett defeated the other candidate for the seat, Phillip Burrell, by 3368 votes to 2981 in a close contest.

Voter turnout was generally down, due partially to the election held recently in the South Ward, and partially due to some people's confusion as to whether they had to vote or not.

Cr. Barrett is a Licensed Investment Consultant who has been involved in the Caulfield

community for seventeen years.

"I am proud to be representing the South Ward on Council" he said, "and I look forward to serving the citizens of Caulfield, particularly those of the South Ward, to the best of my abilities."

The new Councillor is particularly interested in the development of youth through sporting activities and the scout movement.

He is involved with the St. John's Elsternwick Cricket Club and South Suburban Churches and District Cricket Association, is Honorary Secretary of Princes Park Committee of Management, South Caulfield.

Through his training as an investment consultant and former banking experience, he is confident that this financial expertise will be used to the benefit of all resi-

dents in the City of Caulfield, especially given the reduction in Federal and State government funds.

Other issues that particularly concern the Councillor include Neighborhood Watch, improving all facilities, particularly parks and recreation grounds, making shopping centres bright and attractive, and efficient management of rates.

## Staff Restructure at City Hall

A staff restructure has occurred at the Municipal Offices, with an overall reduction of one Manager at considerable savings to ratepayers.

Our City Manager, Doug Aylen, is now known as Chief Executive Officer, and now has four directors of departments under him, as opposed to the previous five managers.

The four departments are: Administrative Services, headed by our Town Clerk Elizabeth

Loftus, which now incorporates administration, Community Liaison, the Libraries and the Arts; Corporate Services with Bryan Payne as Director, which handles all planning, finance and computing matters; Human Services led by Barry Boyle which takes care

of health and legislation, domiciliary and residential care, and children and family services; and Technical Services, for which a director has not yet been appointed and which controls engineering matters and leisure services.

The new structure came about when the resignation of two Managers provided an opportune moment to examine staffing needs overall.

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# COMPUTING A CAREER

A new computer program will help students of Caulfield, and eventually all secondary students, to choose the appropriate career and find out how to go about achieving it.

Caulfield High is trialling the new computer system, which currently has information on 1,063 courses including Universities, Colleges, TAFE and graduate diplomas.

"There is so much information about courses and jobs around, that it is difficult for students to think where to start" said careers counsellor Kerry Howard. "This gives them a starting point."

Students can key in things like their interest areas, how far they wish to continue school, and whether they prefer indoors or outdoors or working with machines or not, and the computer will come up with a range of jobs and poss-

ible courses that suit the student's needs.

A printout can be obtained for each tertiary institution which gives such information as contact phone numbers, geographic region, areas of study available, level of courses offered, whether students can study externally, when the Open Days are, and even what kind of transport is available to get there.

The program was developed by the Ministry of Education and the Department of Labour as part of the Youth Guarantee, and after trial schools report back any criticism or responses, it will be available to all secondary students.

## Child Care Enrolment

Enrolments for Child Care in 1988 at the four Children's Centres run jointly by Council and parents are now open. # A CALL FOR HELP

Imagine that you are suddenly struck down by an illness or accident that leaves you unable to look after yourself completely. You cannot cope with the burden of cleaning your house and are not mobile enough to go out to do the shopping. How do you manage?

After being in hospital for several months, 'Hannah' wanted the comfort and security of returning to her own unit. Her illness had left her unable to get about on her own, so Caulfield's Home Help Service stepped in to fill the gap and enable Hannah to enjoy life in her own home.

Mina Bulcher now comes in two or three times a week to do the shopping, clean, cook breakfasts and do the washing for Hannah.

"I really enjoy it" Mina said, "Especially in situations like this. It's very rewarding - people are so appreciative."

Mina was a cook before seeing an advertisement in a local newspaper seeking Home Help Staff and decided to "give it a try."

There is no doubt that her work is appreciated

by Hannah. "The place is beautiful and clean now" she said, adding that she simply could not have managed without Mina. "It is a wonderful service."

## Company

As well as providing the necessities of shopping and cleaning, Mina provides company for Hannah.

Hannah is lucky in having a neighbour who makes sure that her meals are heated up and that she is all right - but for many clients, Home Help staff may be the only people they see regularly.

Nerreida Graham, Home Help Supervisor, said "Home Help staff are often the first to notice if one of their clients needs medical treatment, is not eating properly, or if there is some other problem."

"Home Help staff have to be special people. We have to know that they will care about the people they assist, and would be non-judgemental about the situations they encounter" said Nerreida.

The service is provided for people of all ages, depending on their assessed needs.

Clients may have undergone surgery, had an accident, had a new baby, or, due to frailty or a particular medical problem, be in need of assistance in the home. Families who have children with special needs are assisted by the Specific Home Help Service.

Recipients are charged for the service according to their capacity to pay, which is individually assessed.

"We currently need some new Home Helpers" said Nerreida.

"We are looking for people who are self-starters, responsible, reliable and interested in people. The cleaning is the practical side of the job - but a large part of the job is providing support to people."

It is important, she

said, that a feeling of trust was built up between the staff and clients.

## Support

Home Helpers receive support from the Home Help Supervisor and senior staff, and are encouraged to talk about

any problems they may encounter.

A uniform, uniform allowance and petrol allowance are provided.

There are currently about sixty-five casual and part-time Home Helpers, most of whom work about twenty-five

hours a week. Caulfield needs about another ten or fifteen staff to meet the demand and cover vacancies.

## A Councillor's View -

While residents sometimes want to cut this service or that to reduce their rate burden, Cr. Sandy Anderson has suggested a few simple ways to save Caulfield money without detracting from the services provided. While only small measures, Cr. Anderson says, if everyone adheres to them the savings could be significant.

### HINTS:

1. Volunteer your services for the Citizens Advice Bureau, Meals on Wheels, the Library etc. Every volunteer serving the City saves numerous rate dollars and their service is noted for its quality. Most volunteers love what they do. Try to find your niche.

2. Pay your rates on time - or better still early.

3. Water your nature strips including the trees particularly in the summer months. Remember dead trees cost money even to be removed let alone replaced. The City does not have staff to send around to water the nature strips.

4. Bring in your black bin as soon as it is emptied. This reduces the likelihood of lost or stolen bins. Remember they are only to be on your nature strip on collection day.

5. Don't damage your black bin by putting in bricks, heavy cans etc as they will damage the bin and also damage the collection truck equipment (worth \$200,000 approx.)

6. Don't park on the nature strip - damage to

nature strips is very costly to make good and makes the appearance of the street unpleasant. You can also be fined for this breach of By-Laws.

7. Keep your trees cut back to your fence line. This reduces the number of calls for our By-Laws officers to attend and fine offenders.

8. Park legally when shopping etc. This permits our traffic officers to attend to other duties. It takes time to write and process a parking ticket, and you don't want one.

9. Keep the street outside your home clean and tidy. Waste papers, leaves etc, only block drains, which means we then have to arrange for a contractor to clean them out. It only takes a minute to sweep up or pick up a few papers. Why not keep your street super clean and tidy and save us a lot.

10. Vandalism costs Caulfield \$1000 per week. Report any possible vandals to the Police and inform Council where vandalism occurs so we can rectify the damage and possibly secure the property from further damage.

11. Pull out a few weeds from your nature strip or on your next visit to the Park. The gardeners can then be working to improve your park rather than just maintaining it.

### How Can Businesses Help

1. Keep the footpath outside their business clean and tidy. This will improve your business image but will help keep the street free of rubbish etc.

2. Water the plants in plant pots outside your shop and pull a few weeds as they appear. That plant will die if it is not watered and it only takes a few minutes of your or your staff's time.

3. Keep your rubbish stored cleanly and ensure collections don't cause litter problems.

4. Keep seats outside your store (where provided) clean. A dirty seat will soil your customers' clothes. If the seat is wiped daily you will have happy relaxed customers.

5. Volunteer your skilled services to the Local Service Clubs, Citizens Advice Bureau etc.

One of the major outcomes of the meeting was a motion which states "that Fringe Network seriously considers by April 1988, deferring the 1988 Fringe festival unless government funding is set at a minimum of 10% of the equivalent of the current State Government funding for the Spoletto Festival."

The Arts Selection Committee at its October 8 meeting assessed some sixty-three submissions made by artists from all over Australia. Sculpture

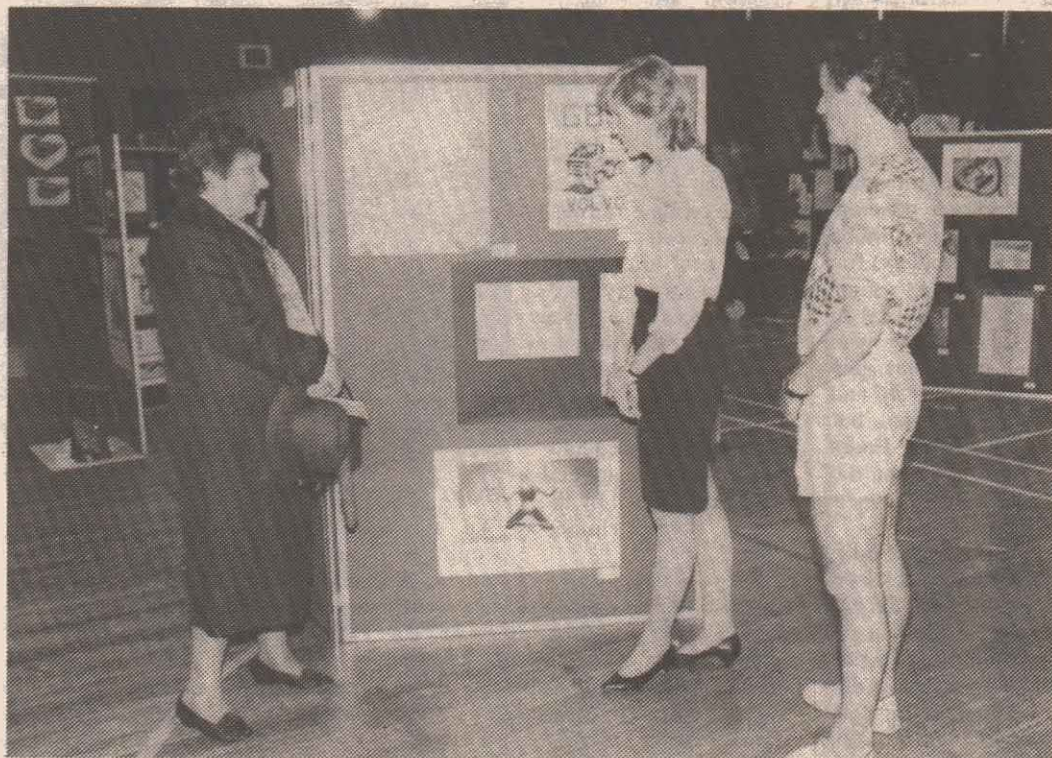
### Permanent Art Collection.

The long-established Caulfield Progress Association has changed its name to the Caulfield Resident's Association. Members voted for the change at a recent General Meeting.

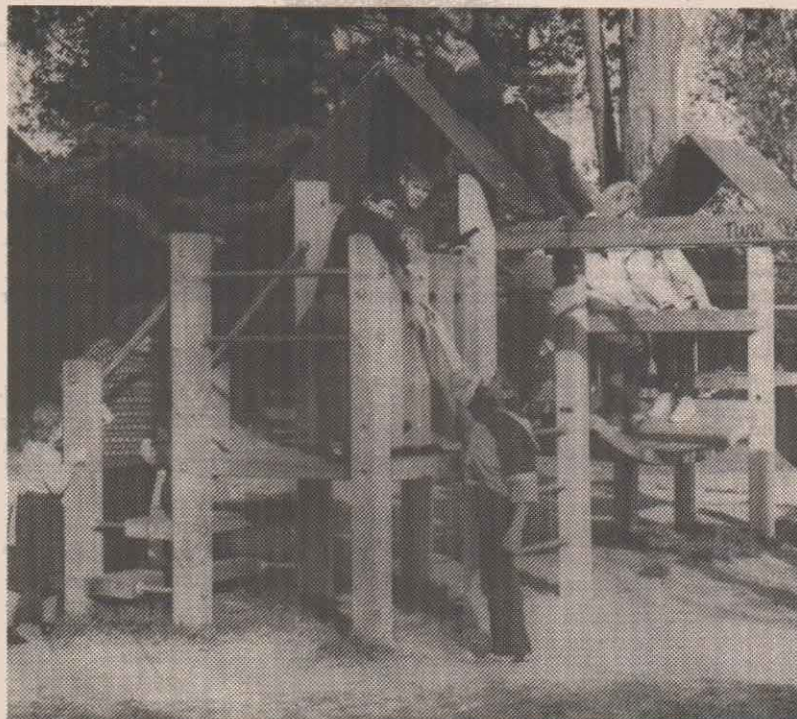

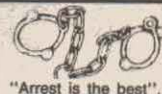

## CARLTON COMES TO CAULFIELD!

Toto's in Carlton has the distinction of being the original pizza house in Melbourne – and it now has a little brother in Caulfield. The newer edition is doing fine, and I am confident that it will live up to (dare I say surpass?) the older Carlton institution.

No-one should be put off by preconceived ideas of a pizza house. Pizzas do feature on one side of the menu for casual eating, but you could also dine on, for example, Lobster Cocktail followed by Prawns Brochette or Sirloin Steak with Crepes Suzette for dessert.

The place has a far classier look and atmosphere than most restaurants of equal price range. The table cloths are white and apricot linen, with real cloth napkins the size of tea-towels and wine glasses on the table. The service is attentive and friendly, whether you are eating pizza or prawns.

The range of dishes is exceptional, with the traditional variety of pizzas and an assortment of pasta dishes as well as seafood and steak. Prices range from \$5.00 for the cheaper pasta to \$16.00 for Prawns Brochette, and cover just about everything in between.

For entree I tried the Antipasto, after carefully checking what they served. The last time I ordered this (at a completely different restaurant, I hasten to add) I was served with a plate of lettuce, tomato and cheese – hardly the traditional Italian dish. The Toto's variety was fine, however, with varieties of salami, prosciutto, ham, olives, egg, radish, and even an oyster.

My partner tried the Seafood Cocktail. Again, at most cheaper restaurants this is usually a scoop of defrosted shrimp with dressing and, if you are lucky, a prawn on top. Toto's provided a large dish of real prawns, portions of lobster, and other assorted seafood – not a shrimp in sight.

We decided to go for traditional pasta for main courses, so we tried a Gnocchi and a Spaghetti Matriciana, both at \$6.00. The Gnocchi (potato based pasta) was served with a Bolognese sauce and was fresh, hot and so filling that I couldn't get through it



all. The Matriciana was a spaghetti with a deliciously spicy sauce, also a generous serve.

To accompany the meal we had salad for two at \$4.00 and some really tasty garlic bread.

I was completely defeated at this stage, but my ever-hungry partner, after the briefest of pauses, was ready to try dessert. After looking through the range of pancakes and Italian ice creams, he couldn't go past the Grand Marnier pancake at \$5.00. Purely for purposes of review, I had a taste and can assure you it was superb.

The fluffiest Cappuccino I have ever seen topped off a wonderful meal. With such a range of prices, good service and a clean bill of health from our Health Department, I am sure that Toto's will soon become as much an institution in Caulfield as it is in Carlton.

Another excellent place is the Delicatessen situated at 533. The Deli sells scrumptious cheese-cakes, special dips in many flavours, and an assortment of cheeses,

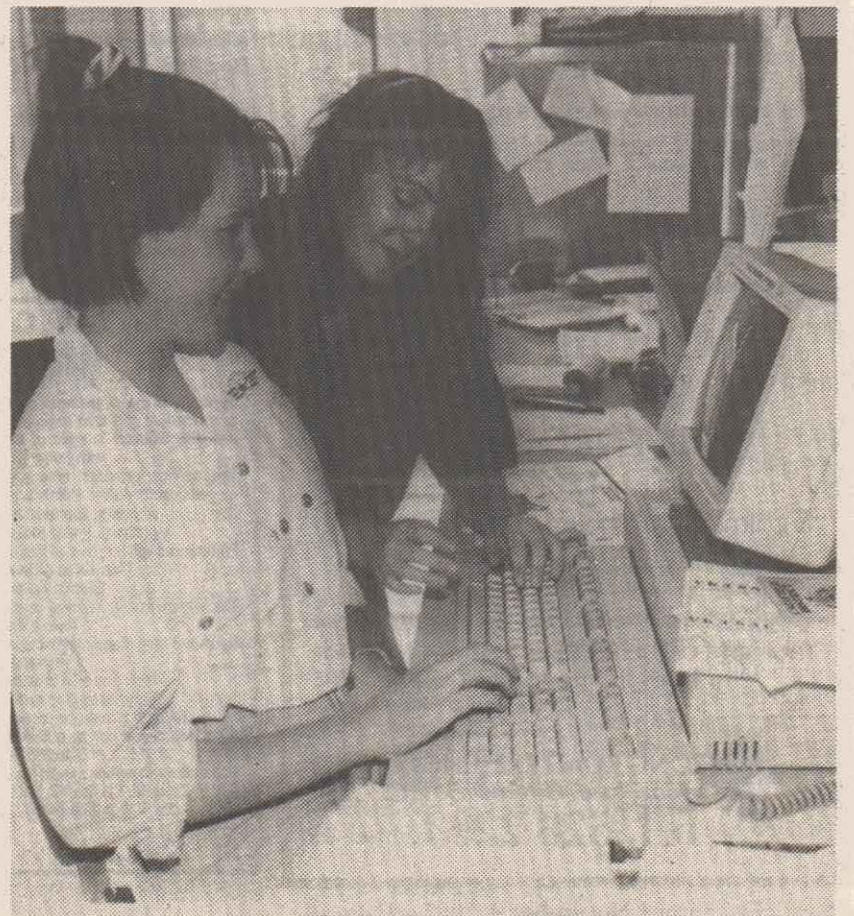
meats, pasta and biscuits.

## ADARD WEEK

A seminar on "Dementia" is being held at the Chadstone Community Health Centre on Friday November 6 from 1.15 pm to 4.00 pm.

There are a group of illnesses called dementia which affect a person's memory, and, later, their ability to understand and reason.

"Going senile" is the common term for dementia, the commonest type of which is Alzheimer's disease. Anyone can be affected. Alzheimer's disease usually comes on at about sixty-five years of age, but can affect people in their 40s and 50s as well as older people.

The cause of Alzheimer's disease is not yet known, but some of the related disorders are better understood. Unfortunately at this stage there is no cure for Alzheimer's disease; however, about twenty per cent of people with dementia do not have Alzheimer's disease but have a treatable illness which sometimes can be dramatically reversed.

"She is frail and her silver head and her body are bowed with the burden of her affliction. Her face lights up in fleeting recognition as I take her hand and speak to her and I see for a moment or two the dear one that I have lost. We walk together and she is lost to me again in the tangled web that has destroyed her ... My pillow is wet with tears that I seem unable to check in the darkness as I think of the futility and waste of it all, of not being able to help her in her world of torment ... As I talk to her, I see again the ravages of the hated enemy which is Dementia, a stealer of minds, a breaker of hearts and an endless funeral."

Whilst we may not be able to alter the course of Alzheimer's disease there are many practical ways of helping those affected and their families. Places at the seminar are limited. Book early Phone 568 2599.

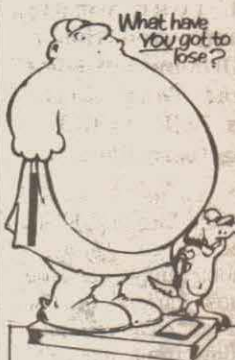

erating at the Recreation Centre for about ten years now, almost as long as the Recreation Centre itself.

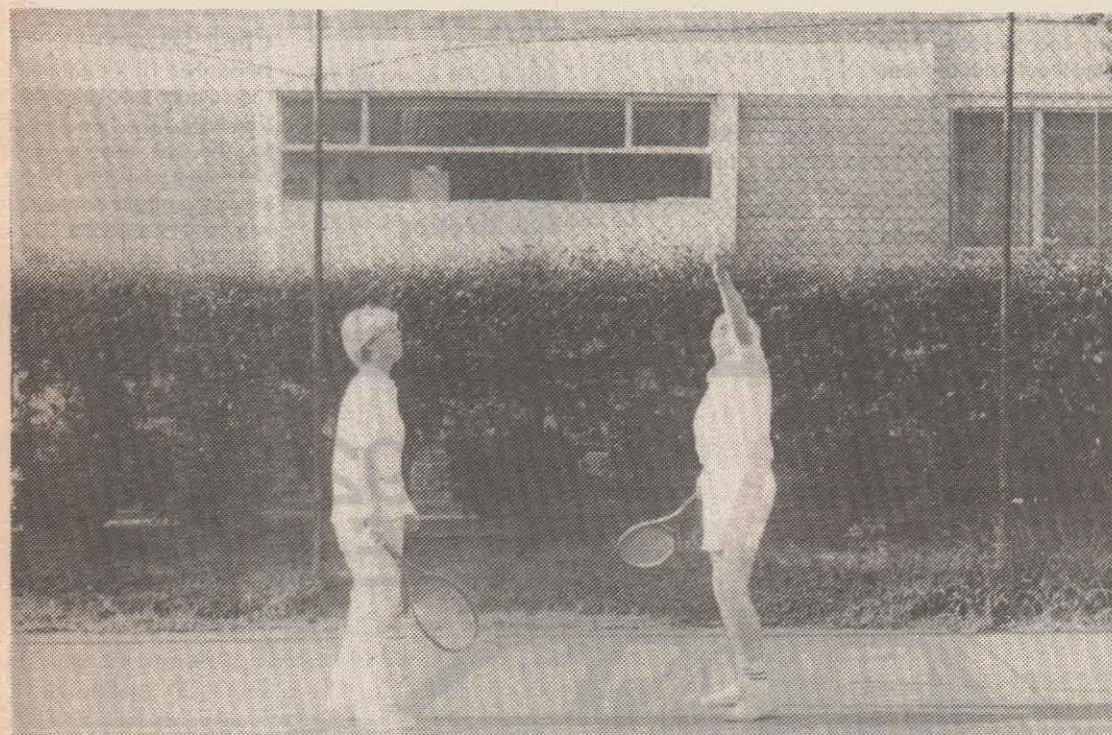
"A lot of our students have been training here for years - it is like a second home to them" said Rod.

Students can begin from age six up, and sometimes up to fifty people can be training at once.

As to the benefits of Taekwondo it "improves co-ordination, balance, and self-confidence through achievement, and involves flexibility, speed, timing, and fitness," said Rod. "We work hard on general fitness - aerobic and anaerobic. Its like dancing, really, but with a sting at the end of it."

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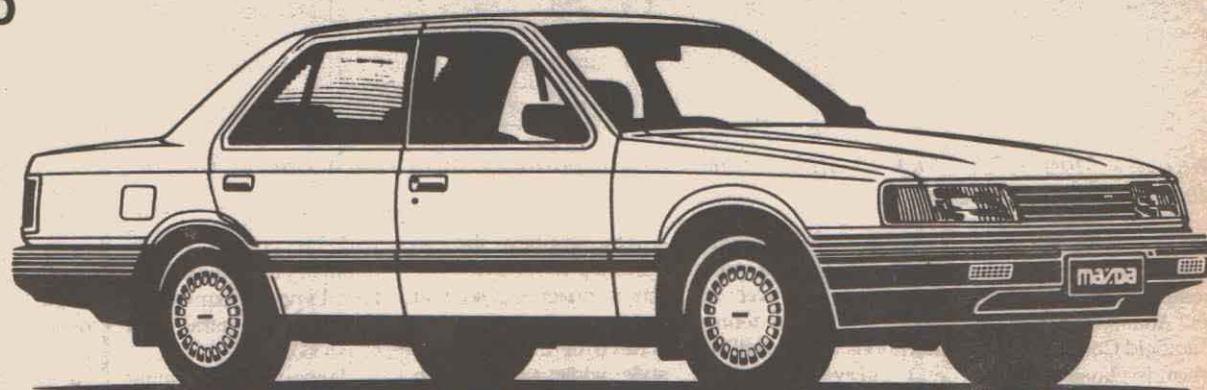
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
