Economic Development Projects Successfully Completed

The leasing of the Council owned Hawthorn Road offices marks the second successful big development concluded by Caulfield this year, according to Caulfield Mayor Cr. Jack Campbell.

Along with the opening last month of the first exhibition in the new Arts Complex, the leasing of the offices shows how a Council can successfully undertake major development works.

Hawthorn Road Offices

The City of Caulfield has completed construction of its new 3 storey office block at 342 - 346 Hawthorn Road and it has been fully leased to a single tenant.

The office block replaces burnt old shops on the site and was built on a design and construct basis by Camillo Constructions.

Cr. Brian Rudzki, Chairman of the Council's Economic Development Committee stated, "this project is an excellent example of the achievement of the Council's economic development goals.

It was built for \$729,

544, \$17,000 under budget, and completed ahead of time.

Rental of the building will give the ratepayers value annually to the extent of 1% of the rate," he said.

The Council plans to conduct an official opening of the building to acknowledge the excellent work performed on the project.

Cr. Rudzki said "the people of Caulfield can expect the Council to build on its experience in municipal enterprise for the long term financial benefit of the City."

City Hall

"I am pleased to say that the first stage redevelopment of City Hall is nearing final comple-

tion at close to the original budget estimate of \$2.4 million", Cr. Campbell said.

This project incorporates the major changes, including the mezzanine floor, art gallery, City Hall function room and kitchen. Two lifts are yet to come to complete access to the first floor. New furniture, audio and security equipment have been installed.

In a recent report to Council, Chief Executive Officer, Doug Aylen, estimated a small over-run of approximately \$51,000 or 2%. He explained that the contract works had uncovered many areas in the old building in need

of support and reconstruction. "These unforeseen essential works had put the costs up slightly" he said.

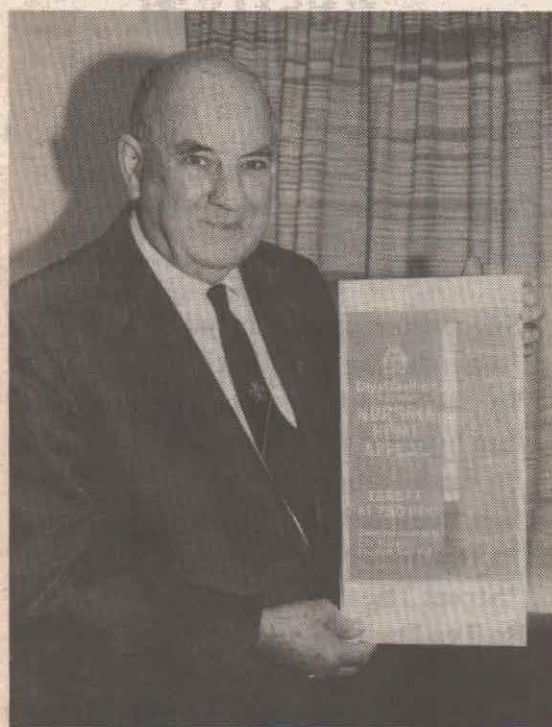
However he anticipated that the project costs will be met from construction and maintenance funds available.

Mayor Campbell said that the Council was extremely satisfied with the results. "Residents and visitors who have used the new facilities have been glowing in their praise", he added. "Some members of the community had been concerned at the cost of relocating the Arts Complex to the City Hall. The Council has received detailed accounts which show a net cost of new and improved arts facilities of around \$1.5 million. Not bad considering the sale of the old Arts Centre realized \$1.8 million" Cr. Campbell said.

PUBLIC NOTICE: SANDRINGHAM LINE PROJECT

Caulfield Council has recently been requested to comment on the MTA's Report - "The Sandringham Line Demonstration Project".

Of particular interest to Caulfield is the Report's proposals for the development of Elsternwick Railway Station.

Initial concept plans propose the development of a major retail complex at the station

including a supermarket, discount department store and specialty shops on the station site, with decking over the existing railway and provision of car parking.

The proposals involve only MTA land and adjacent open space would be retained.

The Council supports the idea of the development of the station but has concerns over cer-

tain aspects of the proposal, namely the inclusion of a supermarket, the location of motor vehicle access and the density of the development.

The Council invites comments and views from interested parties. A copy of the MTA report is available for viewing at the Council offices, cnr. Glen Eira and Hawthorn Roads, Caulfield, during office hours.

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News from Council

New Linemarking

Residents of Sidwell Avenue will be pleased to note that Council is to re-linemark sections of the road which have proved dangerous. Following concerns raised at a Council meeting, an inspection of the bends in the road showed the linemarking was not up to scratch, so arrangements have been made to re-linemark and to install reflective pavement markers in the areas where the road bends. Traffic conditions will be monitored after this to ensure its effectiveness.

Sterilization Up

Last year showed a large 17% increase in the number of sterilized

dogs in Caulfield, attributed to Council's policy of encouraging sterilization by increasing the fees of unsterilized animals. Dogs registered with the Kennel Control Club and those owned by pensioners have increased while the number in the category of working dogs has continued to decrease. There were 181 dogs impounded, of which 108 were claimed by their owners. The other 70 odd obviously weren't concerned enough to rescue their poor mutts. The number of unwanted pets emphasises the importance of sterilizing dogs which are not to be bred.

Caulfield's A-Team

Did you know that Caulfield has its own A-Team? The Assessment

Team in the Human Services Division visits people who have requested Council services and also undertakes follow-up visits and re-assessments. The team assesses for services like Home Help, Meals-On-Wheels, Hostel accommodation and the Adult Day Centre, and the three and a half member team averages 100 home visits a month as well as 2,600 phone calls a year.

2 Hour Parking

New two hour parking restrictions are to be instigated for Koormang Road, on the West side between Truganini Road and Munro Ave. There are currently no parking restrictions, and instances of long term parking have been observed there. In fairness to the the shopkeepers, it was decided to bring this area in line with the two

hour parking restrictions which cover the rest of the shopping area.

Home Help

The vital services of Home Help are in much demand and there are still problems with recruiting new staff.

The demand for the service is increasing as the elderly population of Caulfield continues to increase.

Also, the range of referrals is extending beyond the traditional areas of the elderly and post confinement into the the more complex areas of persons with psychological problems, possibly due to the de-institutionalization process.

In 1987, an average of 60 staff provided 44,132 hours of Home Help to residents of Caulfield, and approximately 850 residents per fortnight are assisted.

With ever increasing demand and a shortage of Home Helpers, not

everyone who applies is immediately able to be granted full and ongoing Home Help.

Specific Home Help, which provides assistance and support to families who have a child with special needs, is also continuing to grow.

The service operates 7 days a week including public holidays.

Last year, 17 staff provided 40 families with 6,380 hours of service over 2,036 visits.

What is the MMA?

From time to time your might read items in "Caulfield Contact" regarding the MMA. The Metropolitan Municipal Association has been in existence for two and a half years as an association of Municipal Councils. In that time it has established close links with both State and Federal Governments. It represents Metropolitan Councils

on all major Government Working Parties to ensure the most grassroots level of government is represented.

Family Day Care

The Caulfield Family Day Care Scheme provided full time and part time care during 1987 for more than 300 children in the care of between 60 to 70 caregivers at any one time.

The scheme has not been able to satisfy the level of demand for placements due to shortage of caregivers.

Disabilities Resource Centre

Following a request from Caulfield's Advisory Committee for People with Disabilities, Council will be supporting their campaign to obtain increased State Government funding for the Disability Resource Centre.

The Centre was set up by the State Government in 1981 to provide advice on the whole spectrum of disabilities, to give support and to provide resources to over 300 low-income disability self-help groups such as the Caulfield Advisory Committee for people with disabilities.

The Centre is run by and for people with disabilities and has produced kits, booklets, and reviews and sponsored forums and investigations as well as support for self help groups.

The State Government currently funds the DRC's staffing and administration costs, but despite a substantially increased workload there has been no increase in funding since 1985.

Council agreed to write to the Premier, Minister for Community Services and others to urge them to consider increased funding for the Centre.

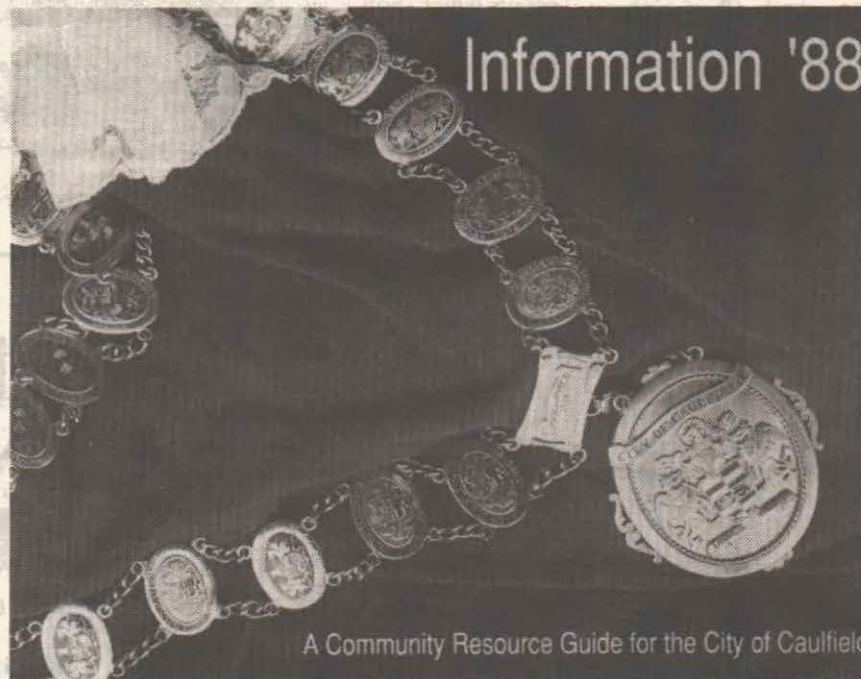

Exhibition Extended Until May 8

Mr. Ian Cathie, Federal Minister for the Arts, opened the Kamuri Collection of Japanese Arts and Crafts, before a capacity audience at the Arts Complex on April 20.

He echoed the sentiments of many of the guests present in praising the high quality of the works on show and thanking the Japanese for the opportunity for Australian audiences to see such a large and varied collection of contemporary work.

One hundred and forty-eight pieces comprising Ceramics,

Weavings, Wood Carving, Metal Ware, Cloisonne and Lacquerware all reflect Japan's rich artistic heritage. The metal ware is of particular interest as there is little similar work being done in Australia.

The Japanese New Art-Craft Artists Association chose the Caulfield Arts Complex as the venue for their exhibition after visiting the still incomplete gallery in January this year, after an invitation from Caulfield businessman Mr. Henry Nathan.

Mr. Nathan had met Yoshiyuki Chosa,

President of the Artists Association, during a trip to Japan, and viewed their 1987 exhibition.

The Caulfield exhibition has a double significance, as it is the tenth anniversary of the exhibition for the Association and the first international exhibition for the Caulfield Arts Complex Gallery.

The display is a conclusive demonstration of the flexibility of the gallery and its suitability for major exhibitions.

Many of the artists whose works are included travelled from

Japan for the exhibition. On Sunday morning a seminar in the Arts Complex Theatre was attended by some forty Melbourne artists and craft workers.

The day proved to be a valuable cultural exchange between the Japanese and local craftworkers.

Again, the Caulfield Art Complex Theatre was a perfect venue for the seminar.

The exhibition has been extended until May 8. Remember that the gallery remains open until 7 pm on Tuesday nights.



Council to Prune Dangerous Trees

Council will soon start a program of pruning 2000 street trees that could interfere with power lines, to meet its new responsibilities under State Electricity Commission legislation.

The aims of the pruning works are to minimise the risk of interruption to power supply caused by tree branches, to improve the effect of public lighting and to ensure public safety.

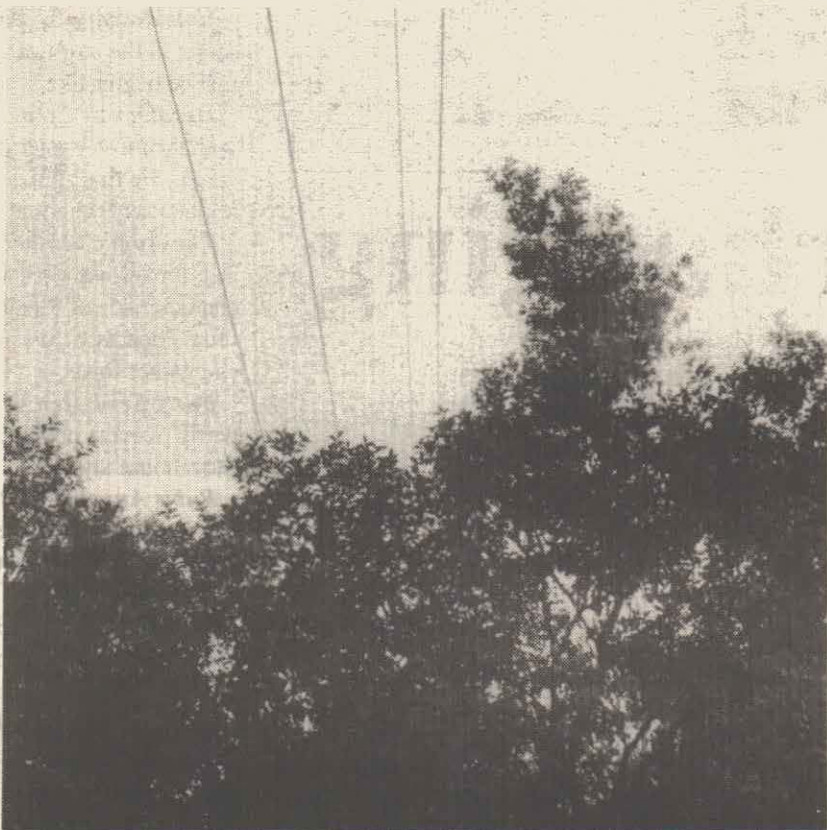
The pruning will apply only to trees under power lines and must be done to achieve clearances specified by the SEC.

Where extensive pruning is required, Council will endeavour wherever possible to shape the tree around the power cables.

It may be necessary in some circumstances for the power supply to be shut down during the day to enable workers to safely prune in the close vicinity of power cables.

This is the first year of a three year phasing-in period of the transfer of this responsibility from the SEC to local Councils.

The State Electricity Commission Act of



Street trees and power lines - a dangerous combination

1958 was amended in 1983 with the Clearance of Lines Legislation which made Municipal Councils responsible for keeping street trees clear of overhead power lines in urban areas. 1987/88 is the first year of the three year phasing in period of this transfer.

Work commenced af-

ter Easter, with about 2000 trees throughout the municipality marked for pruning.

Whilst Council is meeting its responsibilities with street trees, there are many locations in the municipality where trees are growing on private property that are interfering with private electric lines serv-

icing the property.

Under the legislation, responsibility for trees on private property rests with the occupier of the property, and so care should be exercised in the selection of trees planted in the vicinity of these power supply lines.

VOLUNTEERS RECOGNITION SCHEME

Council's Community Service Recognition Scheme, a system of recognizing the work done by volunteers in Caulfield, will be coming into effect in October this year.

Cr. Sandy Anderson, who has been involved in organising the scheme, said she was eager to highlight the valuable contribution made by these people, who are found in all age groups and all sections of the community.

"Many work directly with Council staff, others work with clubs, service organisations, auxiliaries, others caring for those needing assistance and friendship - but all play a definite role in improving the quality of life for the citizens of Caulfield. Recognition of exceptional service can be a way of encouraging them, showing it is appreciated and a small way of saying "Thank you" and "Well done".

The awards consist

of bars, medallions and certificates, depending on the number of hours of service put in by the recipient, to be presented at a special ceremony.

People will be nominated by supervisors, in the case of those working for Council organisations, or the organisation, for those working in community based programs.

Cr. Anderson says that these people often express the benefits of being a volunteer such as new friendships, learning new skills, personal development, the satisfaction of serving

others, pride in performing needed services or the development of their own organisation.

At the meeting to finalise the scheme, the Mayor also expressed his admiration that volunteers generally sought no recognition, being happy just to serve the community.

It was felt that recognition by the City would demonstrate the appreciation of the volunteers efforts, and may make others aware of the areas where such work is needed.

"Such citizens are a wonderful group who work diligently providing a wide range of services that money couldn't buy" said Cr. Anderson. "They are truly "super citizens".

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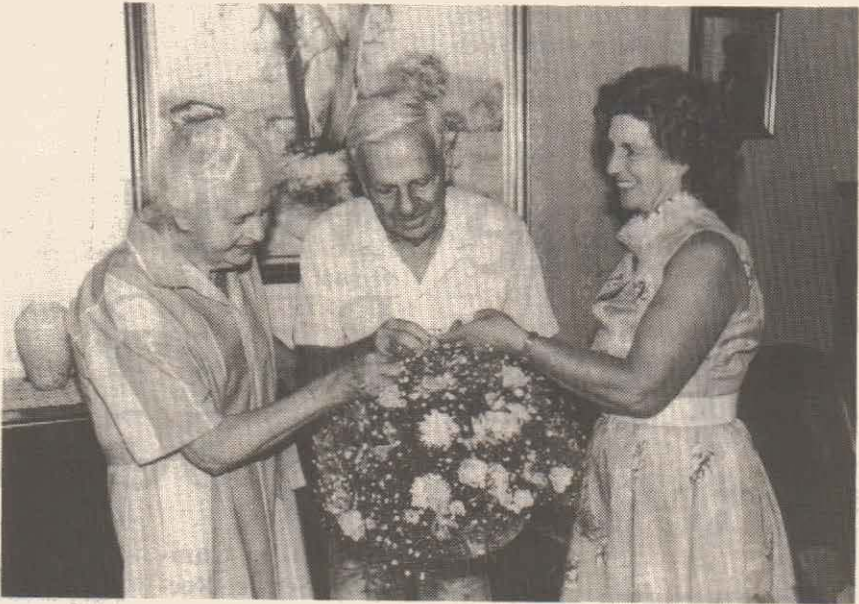

New Books

Kaleidoscope by Danielle Steel, 1987. Kaleidoscope is the story of Sam and Solange. Their romance begins like a fairytale but ends in tragedy.

Katherine Mansfield. A Secret Life by Clair Tomalin 1987. Tomalin's biography presents a classic tragedy - that of an outstanding woman who found herself trapped by forces she herself had set in motion.

Women of the Hills by Gloria Frydman 1985. All around Australia there are people who abandon the city and take to the hills. In this book twenty of them tell their stories.

The Silk Road by Norma Martyn 1987 Norma Martyn travelled the Silk Road through now forbidden places far from the tourist haunts. With a firm eye for detail she describes the remarkable people and places she saw along the way.

Johnny's Song by Steve Mason 1986. This book of poetry by a Vietnam veteran is an unforgettable human statement.

Apparitions of Garabandal by F. Sanchez-Ventura. Pascual describes the extraordinary events which took place in the village of Garabandal, Spain.

Caravaggio Conspiracy by Peter Watson. A true story of deception, theft and smuggling in the art world by the man known as "John Blake".

Living with Allergies by Dr. John McKenzie 1987. This invaluable new book includes sections on alternative treatments such as homeopathy and acupuncture.

Council's Policy on Public Documents

From time to time Council receives requests from various groups asking for special access to particular information relating to issues they are concerned about.

Generally, most public documents associated with Council business can be viewed at the

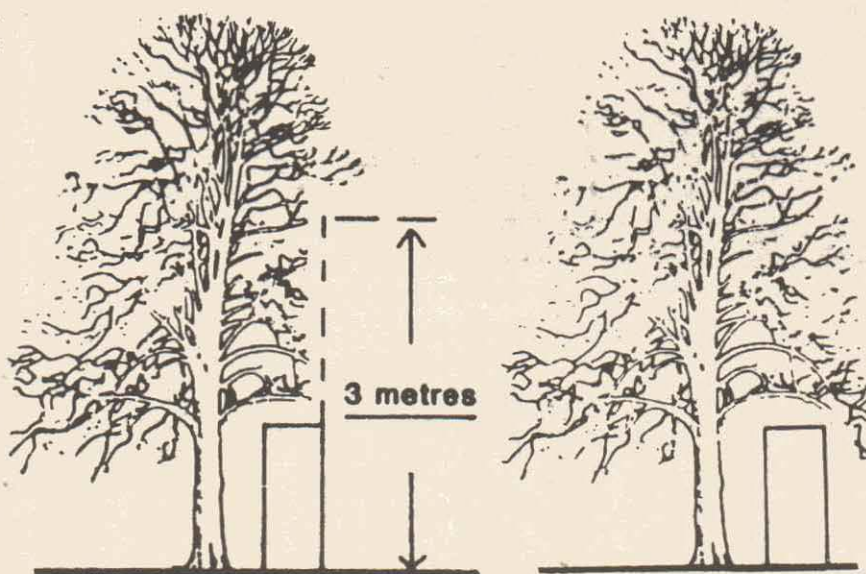
City Offices, by appointment with the relevant Senior Officer and therefore copies of public documents are not distributed.

As residents can no doubt appreciate, some documents such as confidential tenders cannot be open for public viewing while the tender is still being negotiated - this would, in effect, be like disclosing the details of a job applicant before they had been appointed, to anyone who asked.

Overhanging Shrubs

Winter is once again approaching and there is nothing worse than being slapped in the face or dripped on by a wet branch as you are walking along.

If you have ever been obstructed by a tree or shrub overhanging the fence from someone's property, do not curse the Council because it is up to the property owner to keep his trees

or shrubs under control. If a Council By-Laws Officer leaves a notice for you to cut back your trees or shrubs you must do so within fourteen days.

The trees, etc. must be cut to a height of 3 metres above the ground and vertically in line with your property boundary.

If you do not comply with the notice then the

Council will do the work and expenses will be paid by the property owner.

When you do cut back your trees remember not to leave or burn the cutting on the nature strip or in the gutter. If you have any queries concerning this matter telephone the By-Laws Officer at City Hall on 524 3333.

Free Police Bike Marking

Bikeowners in Caulfield will have the chance to have their bikes marked and registered by the police for free on Sunday, May 29 at the the Caulfield City Hall, in an attempt to combat bicycle theft.

The day has been organised by Neighbourhood Watch Area H6.

Bikes will be marked with the Caulfield Police Station identification and a unique number, which will then be recorded in a book along with the owners name and phone number.

"A lot of pushbikes get stolen" said Constable Warren of the Caulfield Police Station. "If they are marked it gives us a way of identifying them and of getting them back to the owner."

It is difficult for police to return a bike if it was

stolen in Caulfield, and recovered in another suburb, the country, or interstate.

"We do recover old frames of bikes" said Constable Broom, also of Caulfield. "It is often hard to distinguish even what type of bike it was - marking helps us with our investigations."

And if you think your bike is unlikely to be stolen, think again. Statistics show that in April 16 bikes were stolen in Caulfield, in March 18 were stolen, and in February a massive 25 bikes went missing - that is,

almost 1 a day. Only a few of these bikes were even locked.

So, if you are a bike rider and want to keep your bike, the message

is clear - basic precautions like keeping it chained up and getting it registered by the police can save you a lot of money and heartache.

If you are interested, turn up at the Caulfield City Hall Car Park, under the flag, on May 29 between 1pm and 4pm.

Wollmering Sculpture Taking Shape

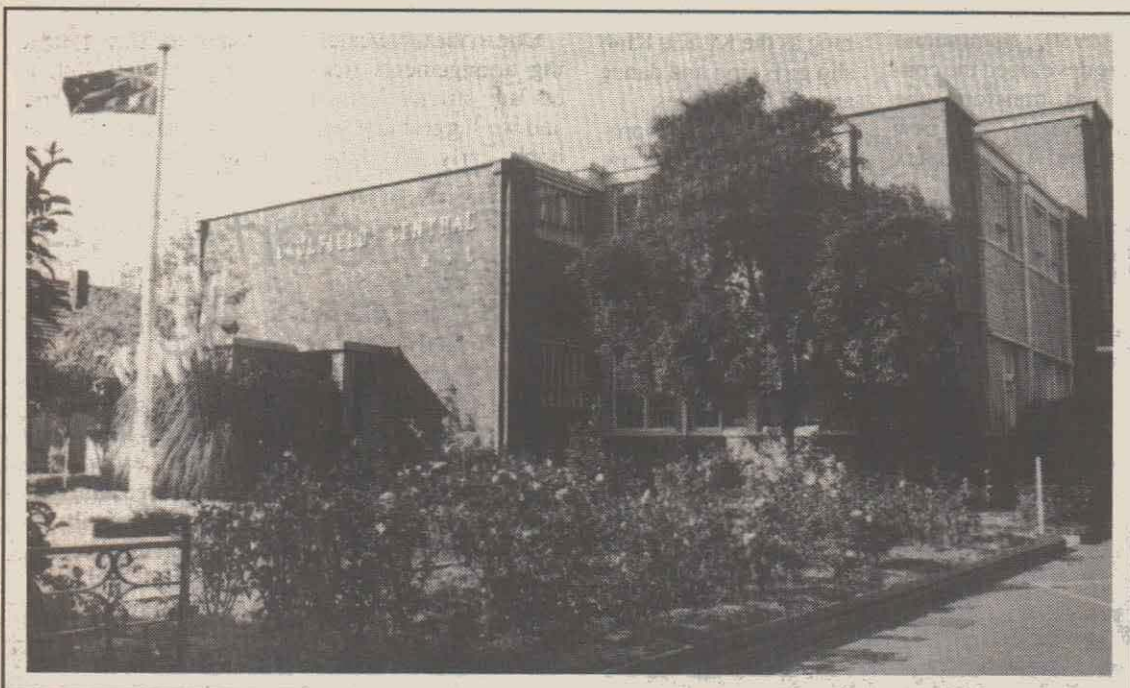
Dan Wollmering, the sculptor selected to work on a major artwork for the Sculpture garden, met recently with Councillors to discuss progress of the project.

It's well under way and on schedule for unveiling early in December. And, while it seems incongruous that a work of art should require such things, he also reported that plans for footings and computations for stresses and strains were almost complete.

'The Future Vitality of Caulfield', the name of the piece, will be constructed of mild steel and will have a polyurethane finish that is sure to outlast any of us. It will be designed to complement the colour and aesthetics of the City Hall but will retain a crispness of form that will set it apart.

Keith Fasham, fabricator of the Concert Hall sculptures and other well known pieces, has been selected to put it all together.

A CHANGE OF FACE FOR RSL



Plans are underway for the old RSL building in Hawthorn Road to be demolished, to be replaced by a smaller building on the same site. The present site which is occupied by the existing RSL Clubrooms and bowling green has been used by the RSL since the mid 1940's.

FEE CHANGES IN THE BUILDING SECTION

A review of the fees charged for some services provided by the Building Department has shown some inequities that have required a restructuring of the fees.

Services such as searching the history of building and planning permits and providing information reports for solicitors take up considerable time in searching file records, and preparing notes and letters.

The cost of such activities has previously not been reflected in the fees charged, resulting in some professional

people letting Council do the "running around" for them

Meanwhile, less time is available for officers to spend on providing

services for ordinary ratepayers, sometimes resulting in delays.

Therefore, Council has decided to restructure the fees as follows:

COUNCIL KEEPS AN EYE ON WHAT YOU EAT

How would you like to find a fly in your fried rice, or see a cockroach, mouse or dog in a shop?

Inspection of food-stuffs and food premises to make sure they are safe is one of Council's many important, but less visible functions.

All premises selling, preparing and/or manufacturing food in the municipality are required to be registered with the Council under the provisions of the Food Act 1984 and are subject to regular supervision by Council Health Surveyors.

Last year 1012 inspections were con-

ducted to ensure that standards of hygiene, food preparation and waste disposal were being maintained, and 232 orders were issued requiring action to correct non-compliance with appropriate standards.

Food investigations are also conducted as a result of information received from members of the public, the State Health Department or directly from inspections carried out by the Council's Health Surveyors.

There were thirty investigations of this type carried out throughout the year including: Zuc-

chini in a container of what was meant to be Kiwi Fruit, an insect in a bottle of milk, hair in a meatloaf and reports of everything from a mouse to a dog in food shops.

Other functions of the Health Department include examining food-stuffs to ensure they come up to the prescribed standards.

For example, there were 30 samples of meat tested to see if it was the real thing, and in 12 of these cases a different meat had been added or substituted. The main offenders were sausage meat and minced meat, these being the easiest to substitute.

But My Kitchen Is Clean...

A clean kitchen is of course important - "clean as you go" is a good maxim to work by. But there are other ways of preventing food contamination.

- Bacteria love warmth. You can beat them by making it TOO HOT or TOO COLD for them to multiply:

*Don't leave hot or cold food standing at room temperature. Modern fridges can cope with food being refrigerated soon after cooking. And cold food should be left in the fridge until the last moment - don't lay out buffets too far in advance.

* Reheat all hot food thoroughly at a high temperature before eating - gentle warming is not enough.

*Cold or frozen food bought from the supermarket should be immediately refrigerated.

-Poultry needs special care. Chicken which is still "in the pink" after cooking is potentially poisonous so..

*Allow two hours to cook a chicken in an ordinary (Convection) oven and longer for larger birds.

Remember: thorough cooking of all food is essential.

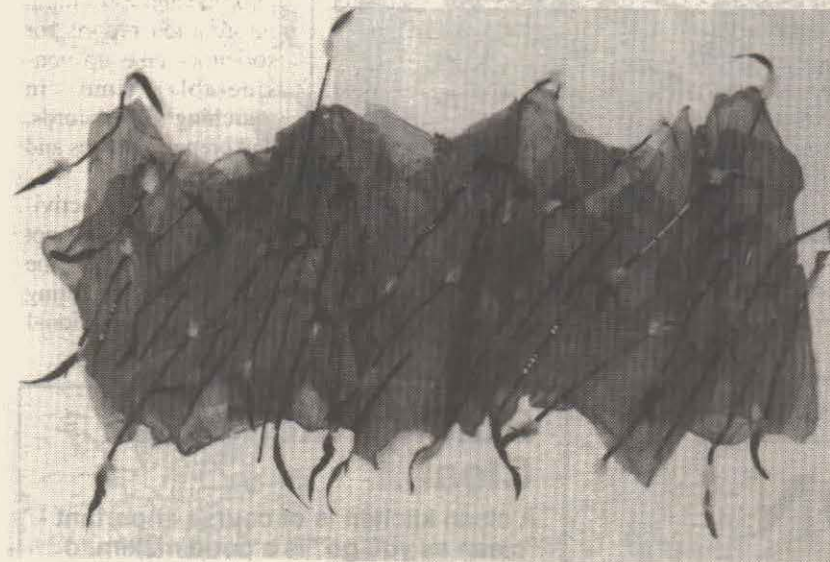

Textiles Of All Shapes and Sizes

An outstanding and innovative exhibition of textiles will open in the Caulfield Arts Complex on Friday May 13, continuing until Monday May 31.

While fibre and textile art may involve familiar materials and traditional approaches, the possibilities for experimentation and new interpretations in the use of the media are boundless. The work in this exhibition shows some of the most exciting fibre art being produced by contemporary artists.

The works are on tour around Victoria from the Ararat Gallery 4th Biennial Exhibition of Fibre and Textiles.

Ararat Gallery, one of Victoria's sixteen regional galleries, focuses its permanent collection on textiles and fibre art.

The exhibition has been divided into three areas: Three dimensional sculptural forms like Annemieke Mein's Barnacles made of silk organza plumped with dakron wadding and combining dog hair and embroidery, or Virginia Kaiser "Dragons Blood", a squat coiled basket form from which flimsy kernels from the Dragon Tree protrude.

The second area is two dimensional works like Tori de Mestre's "Elusive Landscape" (illustrated) which uses the

graceful draping of muslin to create a sense of filmy movement, while wrapped broken twigs direct the eye through this misty landscape.

The third category is tapestry and traditional woven work.

Caulfield is the only Melbourne venue for the exhibition and the showing coincides with the International Tapestry Symposium being held at the Victorian Tapestry Workshop in mid-May.

Sixty-four works will be exhibited. It is an opportunity to see the very vibrant and exciting work being created by our top fibre artists.

Well, to put it in a nutshell, if you are between twelve and twenty-four years of age and would like to get into some fun-filled, challenging activity read on further.

Caulfield Council's Youth Services and Caulfield Youth Council have been hard at work preparing a number of youth projects for 1988. The general view of community organizations young people and council representatives is: The activities promote a responsibility to the local community and that aspects of decision making, control, safety, leadership and innovation are inclusive to all participants, especially young people.

Feeling Great in '88 Youth Concert

The Bicentennial Authority has granted the Youth Council, in conjunction with Fusion, a grant to organise a youth concert and fair. It is planned that there will be music, theatre, technology and information displays, relating to the themes of technology, industry and trade. It will focus on young peoples transition for 1988 to 2000 with an emphasis on technology, communication, needs, rights and responsibilities as being the means to a successful future.

The CYC will administer and organise the production, the basic criterion of which will be that they reflect the needs, rights and responsibilities of youth in Caulfield.

Integrate Kids in Caulfield (KIC) into Local Newspapers
CYC is hoping to re-

talize this previously successful project, but with the aim of encouraging young people to submit articles of relevance to the youth and general community through established local newspapers. A journalist/production team of young people will be organised to collate, edit and submit articles to various local newspapers throughout the year.

Exam BBQ's

The aim of Exam BBQ's is to have a series of informal discussions or quizzes in a relaxed BBQ atmosphere around the exam period. Teachers, Business and Industry Representatives, and those who have finished Secondary School will provide information on study techniques, work prospects and subject areas to those undergoing examinations. This project has received a lot of support from community organizations and young people, and has received endorsement from the Caulfield Community Education Committee.

Casual Work Register

The CYC has received

a grant from the Victorian Department of Labour to establish a Casual Work Register. This would be a computer based project housed at the Youth Resource Centre. The purpose of this project is to encourage individual young people to register some of their skills, and then to match them up with private business and industry who require casual employees.

The project is not exclusive to young unemployed people, but rather accessible to all young people who either wish to acquire or practise their skills and be paid for them at the same time.

Ripponlea

A consultant for the Executive Trust of Ripponlea has indicated that its Management Committee would like to make the historical estate of Ripponlea more open and accessible to young people. Suggestions regarding the nature and degree of youth involvement span from membership on the management committee to groups of young musicians performing ensembles throughout the gardens of the estate.

Baby Capsules Being Misused

The 'Baby Safety Capsules' loaned to Caulfield mothers from the Infant Welfare Centre for the safe transportation of young babies are in some cases being used inappropriately.

The Health Department has pointed out that a Baby Safety Capsule is a safe way to travel for babies 0 to 6 months and no more than 9 kilograms in weight and/or 700 millimetres in length.

However, the Capsules are not to be used as:

1. A carry basket - a capsule and a baby together are heavy and as mother's backs are weakened after pregnancy it is easy to strain a back bending, twisting, lifting and carrying. You should use a pram

or pusher or carry the baby when you reach your destination.

2. A floor play substitute - babies need room to move and freedom of movement for play. The curved confined position of the baby on its back, whilst suitable for car travel, is not the best position for the baby at other times.

3. A Bassinet - there is not enough room for baby to enjoy a good sleep in the capsule, so use the capsule in the car, then transfer baby to bassinet, pram or cot.

Other points to be noted:

1. The washable liner needs to be kept clean.

2. The velcro safety bands need to be expanded as baby grows.

3. The velcro safety bands need to be regularly defluffed.

4. The harness and capsule need to be regularly checked for white stress marks. If these appear, return complete unit to manufacturer or place of hire.

5. The safety band is to be fastened first, then put blankets over that.

6. Capsule and seat restraints need to be replaced if car is involved in a serious accident.

7. The curved confined position of your baby on its back, whilst suitable for car travel, is not the best position for the child at other times.

Welcome to Caulfield's Parks

Parks and Council

There are few issues that attract as much consensus as the desirability of parks in a City. Councillors and residents generally seem to agree that parks make an area more attractive and more desirable to live in, as well as providing much-needed space for children to play in and adults to walk, jog, read or ruminate.

Council's Local Park Strategy was adopted last year, and it mentions the ideal of having a local park within walking distance of every house in Caulfield.

While we might all agree on the need for new parks, in an established and developed area like Caulfield the problem is where to put them. Buying land often effectively means buying buildings and with Caulfield being a sought-after area the cost of such purchases is never cheap.

Cr. Brian Rudzki pointed out the dilemma in response to criticisms over the development of parkland in the West Ward.

"Parkland in Gardenvale will be achieved when it can be done responsibly. Council will not pay substantially more than market value to buy suitable land - alternatives are always possible and are being investigated. It would be irresponsible to purchase a Park AT ANY COST - and I'm sure the ratepayers would agree".

While attempts to create new parks in the most needed areas continue, it is important to remember on the other hand the many fine and well established parks that Caulfield is lucky enough to have already.



Harleston - An Ideal Local Park

Harleston Park is one of the best used and most popular of Caulfield's smaller parks. Its attractive design and facilities mean that it has a large use among residents - a 1982 survey showed 42% of local residents used the park regularly, and it is said to be one of the most used (per capita) parks in Victoria. Its features include a giant slide, a waterfall, a giant chess board, a covered barbecue area and

children's equipment, as well as open space and many closely planted and well established trees. Situated between Seymour Road and Allison Road in between Orrong and Kooyong Road, Harleston Park serves the Elsternwick area but attracts visitors from all over Caulfield.

History

Planning for the Park began in the 70's. The site between Sey-

mour and Allison Roads was chosen and sketches prepared and mounted for public perusal. Residents were asked to comment on the proposal and make suggestions for improvement in the overall layout.

Many people availed themselves of the opportunity and submitted ideas in writing or by sketches. Several of the ideas, such as that of including a water fea-

ture in the park, were adopted. Another suggestion was to move the carparks to the side of the park, indenting them off the roads, a feature which can also be observed in the final layout.

Major trees and botanical features were marked to ensure they could be incorporated into the final design. The majority of the existing trees were exotics, though the planting

since then has concentrated on Australian native plants. The aim was to attract birdlife to the area.

Then the area was levelled, surplus soil was banked into the large mound while smaller raised areas were preserved as later features, a comprehensive water sprinkling service was installed and major items of playground equipment were purchased and located in

position. Shelters and barbecues were erected and commissioned along with basic paved areas, retaining walls and the planting of large exotic trees.

Once finished, a competition was run to suggest a name for the park that was known then as the Seymour/Allison Road Park in Elsternwick. "Harleston" was suggested by a resident, Mrs. Edna Garth. She was inspired by an

old mansion home which was built in the district, and was subsequently sold to the sons of F.S. Grimwade and then donated to the Church of England Grammar School. It still stands, but is known as Grimwade House and serves as the Junior School. Mrs. Garth was invited to the Champagne Breakfast as the guest of the Mayor, for winning the competition.

Funding Arranged for Resurfacing of Duncan McKinnon Athletic Track
