A Service under Review



School Crossing Supervisors like Mr Rightmann in North Road ensure the safety of children who must cross busy highways on the way to and from school. Unless the Road Traffic Authority accepts its responsibilities ratepayers may have to pick up the tab.

Caulfield Councillors are justifiably angry at the possibility of losing some of the subsidies and support for the supervision of school crossings in the Municipality.

Of the 36 crossings presently supervised, 22 no longer meet Road Traffic Authority guidelines as to numbers of school children and vehicles.

However the Council believes that in at least half of these 'unwarranted' cases the supervisors should be retained. This opinion is based on existing traffic conditions and the need to ensure that the safety of the children is not at risk. But it would appear

that 11 crossings may become unsupervised.

In the past 12 months there have been requests for a further 3 supervisors but only two of them are likely to receive funding.

Supervisors are appointed by the Council primarily at flagged school crossings and the Road Traffic Authority generally provides a two-thirds subsidy. But this scheme has been under review and Chairman and Managing Di-

rector of the Authority, Michael Roux, has said that the guidelines have been designed to ensure the most effective and efficient use of available funds.

In cases of declining school enrollments, locations which previously met the guidelines, may no longer be eligible for subsidy. The schools themselves may have to look at the possibility of helping with some of the costs or provide voluntary supervision of the crossings.

At the committee meeting where the item was discussed Council-

lor Sandy Anderson said, "I believe that where we cannot retain funded supervisors the schools will have to help themselves. The Council has only limited funds and cannot pick up the tab just because the RTA will no longer foot the bill."

"It is in situations like this," said Councillor Helen Friedmann, "that the schools should get behind the Council and lobby the State Government to change its mind. It is all very well to receive constitutional recognition but we need the funding to go with it."

Boyd Park - a proud memorial

The Outer Circle Railway Land is still in the news. But this time it is good news. At the July meeting of the Policy and Environment Committee, Councillor Veronika Martens put forward a proposal that could see the park named after the Boyd family of artists, whose life and times are a part of Murrumbeena's history.

Already, informal discussions have been held with officers of the Ministry for Planning and Environment and the Ministry for Conservation, Forests and Lands. They have advised that whilst there would seem to be few problems with the proposal, the Victorian Government's 'Place Names Committee' would need to be consulted.

Resident Support Invited

This committee would take at least six months to consider the request but if there was support from the residents of the City it would assist any application lodged.

To this end the Council invites all those, who would like to see this proposal come to fruition, to contact the City Offices to register their agreement. Councillor Martens would also like to see the formation of a resident committee that would oversee the maintenance and development of the park.

"This is a recommendation, I feel, that all residents can be proud of," said Councillor

Emil Braun, "If the naming of the land is successful, it will also serve as a reminder of the important contribution made by all the people of Caulfield to the wider community."

A Long Story

This would seem to be the final chapter in what has been a very long saga. When the State Government threatened to rezone the Outer Circle Railway Land for residential use the abutting municipalities took up cudgels to have the decision overturned. After a long and protracted battle the land, while still vested in the State Government, will be maintained and developed by the Councils of areas in which it is located.

The portion of land in question, as far as Caulfield is concerned, lies between Dandenong Road in Murrumbeena, on either side of Neerim Road. It gives a feeling of wide open space to this part of suburbia and provides an area in which both young and old can appreciate more rural surroundings.

Family Support

Only recently, Caulfield was saddened to hear of the death of Guy Boyd, the sculptor. He lived for many years, along with his family, in Murrumbeena, and in his youth attended secondary school there. In 1952 he founded the Guy Boyd Pottery and, in 1964, became a full-time sculptor. His works have been exhibited in galleries around the world.

But the Boyd family has produced many artists, sculptors, writers and architects of note. The family has agreed that the naming of the Outer Circle Railway Land in this way is a fitting memorial to the great contribution that has been made to contemporary art.

"The Boyd family is a part of Australia," said Councillor Helen Friedmann, "not just Caulfield."

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News from Council

Child Minding

At this month's meeting of the Executive Services Committee the Council considered an application to use part of an existing dwelling in Sidwell Avenue as a child minding centre.

Thirteen individual objections were received from residents of the area, many of whom did not object to the actual proposal, but were concerned with the traffic problems that could occur.

Even though the applicant offered to pick up and deliver the children the Committee felt that there was no guarantee that this would necessarily alleviate the problem in the long term. After due consideration the Council refused the application. It was of the opinion that such a development would adversely affect the amenity of what they considered a quiet and distinguished area.

At the same time, an existing child minding centre in Grange Road received approval for an extension to its present premises. It was considered that, in this case,

since no objections had been received and the area was unlikely to be affected, the project should be allowed to proceed.

Extended Hours

Patrons of a Poath Road restaurant will now be able to experience its culinary delights in the middle of the day. An application to extend hours of operation was recently approved by the Council.

Since 1982 the restaurant has traded in the evenings without complaint. Lunchtime opening was considered appropriate since there was adequate street parking and no objection was received from the Liquor Licensing Commission.

Another restaurant in South Caulfield has received permission from the Administrative Appeals Tribunal to also extend its hours of operation. Following the Council's original decision to allow an extension of trading hours, a resident of the area appealed to the Tribunal to

have the decision overturned.

Previously the restaurant operated from 6.00pm to midnight only. It will now offer its wares from 11.30am to 1.00am. The Tribunal considered that the extra hours were unlikely to any greater affect on the amenity of the area.

Liquor Licence

Following the refurbishment of the Rosstown Hotel in Carnegie, the proprietors are now seeking an extension of its Liquor Licence for the new entertainment area to 3.00am. Although this matter is outside the Council's jurisdiction it is required to comment on any such application.

Any submission made, however, is not necessarily binding on the Commission but in this case the Council has conveyed the concern it has for the residents of the area should the licence be granted. The parking, noise and nuisance problems that are likely to accompany the late operation of the Hotel would, the Council felt, significantly affect those who live in the area.

It All Added Up

As far as the auditors are concerned the Caulfield Council can be given a clean bill of health.

In finally examining and settling the Annual Statement of Accounts for the year ended 30th September 1987, they were of the opinion that the Council had correctly discharged its duties, in accordance with the requirements of Local Government regulations.

The auditors considered that the Statement of Accounts gave a true and fair view of the transactions of the Council and its financial position.

Caulfield's Chief Executive Officer, Doug Aylen, said that this was an excellent report and one of the best he had seen. The accounting staff are to be congratulated on their good work.

One Way Flow Denied

Residents of Curral Road, in a recent petition to the Council, sought measures to control the traffic and parking conditions in that street.

Their suggestions for one way traffic flow and speed humps, however, were not acceptable. Such isolated treatment, the Council felt, would cause a redistribution of traffic and increased

usage in neighbouring streets.

Traffic counts confirm that the volume of vehicles using Curral Road are typical for streets of this nature and are, in fact, relatively low compared to other similar ones in the municipality. There have been no accidents reported and a one way traffic flow was not considered to be warranted.

The existing alternate day parking restrictions will also be retained. The request that cars be able to park on both sides of the street but be allowed to encroach on to the footpath was considered to be totally unacceptable.

Fair Decision

As part of the Caulfield Festival at the end of the year the Elsternwick Chamber of Commerce will conduct a traders fair. The Council has acceded to a request to close Glenhuntly Road for the festivities but will only allow the Orrong Road intersection to be closed after 12.00noon.

Total closure of both Glenhuntly and Orrong Roads could result in unnecessary and undesirable diversion of significant volumes of traffic. The midday closure will allow the morning shopping traffic to have greater access to the area and festivities for this section of the road can

then be scheduled for the afternoon.

Donation Lockers

The Council has received several requests from Good Samaritan Industries, a division of the Wesley Central Mission, for permission to install donation lockers in the City's carparks. They are metal containers fitted with chutes to receive donated goods such as clothing linen and bric-a-brac. In the past these applications have come to the Council for consideration but the decision will now be handled administratively.

The Director Technical Services will now assess such applications and the Council has established a set of guidelines for their installation. The lockers will need to be maintained in a presentable condition and cleared regularly

and the site must be left tidy and clean. If these conditions are not adhered to the lockers must be removed within 48 hours of written Council notification.

Tree Removal

It is most unusual to see the Council giving permission for the removal of street trees. So it is even more unusual to see permission given to remove five such arboreal specimens.

The Council received applications from five residents requesting removal of the trees fronting their properties and they have all been considered individually by the Superintendent of Parks and Gardens. They are causing considerable problems and are not prime specimens so will all be replaced with a tree species that is in line with the Council's adopted Street Tree Strategy.

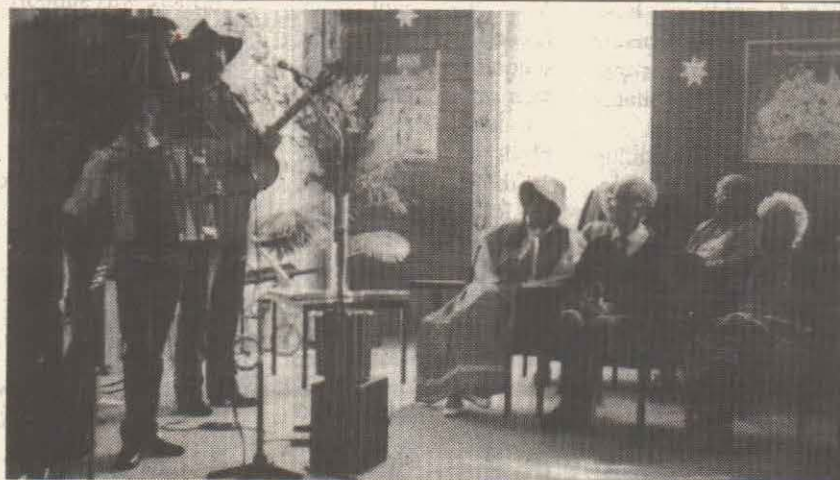

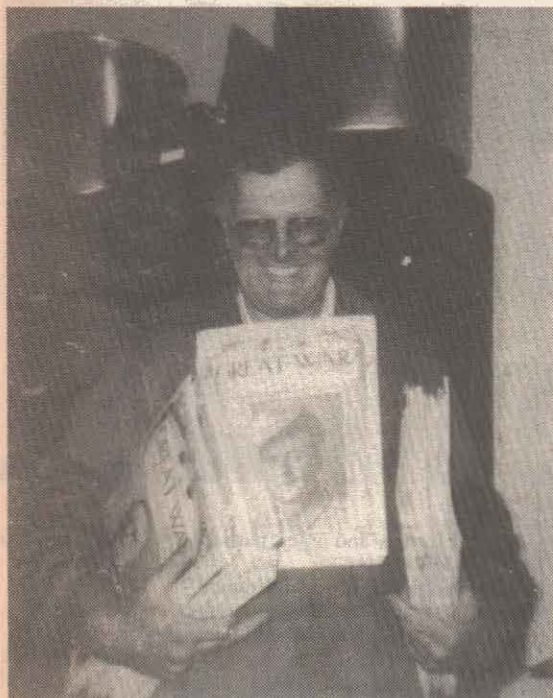

Ken Hargreaves, the 55 year old cleaner at the 7th Field Supply Company (Army Reserve), in Kooyong Road is ecstatic. He discovered numbers of old, first world war magazines in an unused cupboard during a unit clean - up.

Ken, an ex - Korean War veteran was surprised when he unearthed the 290 odd magazines which date back to August 1914.

"The unit is going to have them profession-

ally bound and put in the unit library," he said.

The unit recruiting officer, Second Lieutenant Nigel Minton said,

"We've contacted the State Library and they have authenticated the significance of Ken's historical find."

The 7th Field Supply Company, although a new Army Reserve unit, has a long, identifiable history and relationship with the City of Caulfield.

Incinerator By - Law Comes Into Effect

The new By-Law covering the use of barbecues, incinerators and burning in the open will soon come into effect.

It will become By - Law No. 169 and will be proclaimed in the next edition of the Government Gazette.

Fines Will Apply

After this date fines will be imposed for breaking the new rules.

Burning will not be allowed on any Friday, Saturday, Sunday, Monday or Public Holiday and on other days only between the hours of 10am and 3pm. (Except with special permission.)

Neither will it be permitted to burn on Smog Alert Days or Total Fire Ban Days.

Other conditions also apply to the construction of incinerators.

The new By - Law is based on the EPA Incinerator Model By - Law and fines will range from \$50 to \$400.

Public Response

Following formal advertising and the publicity given in the local press the Council received only a few objections from residents.

Many felt that the new regulations were too restrictive. Some also considered that the prohibitions discriminated against families where both husband and wife work.

But it was the opinion of the Council that such regulations would eventually be universal.

"I feel sorry for the people objecting," said Councillor David Bloom, "But we must protect our environment."

"Caulfield may be the guinea pigs but our aim is to support the EPA. Standard legislation is not far down the track."

"It is important that people learn to dispose of rubbish in more environmentally acceptable ways," said Councillor Sandy Anderson.

"People are just not aware of the amount of pollution they cause."

"We should be allowed to enjoy our back

gardens more than we are able to do at present," she said.

Tip vouchers

As a means of alleviating some of the problems associated with getting rid of rubbish the Council is investigating the possibility of including tip vouchers in with rate notices. This will be discussed in the next round of meetings.

In its next edition, Caulfield Contact will also assist by publishing an article on the various ways of keeping the rubbish at bay.

Rate payers Needs First Priority

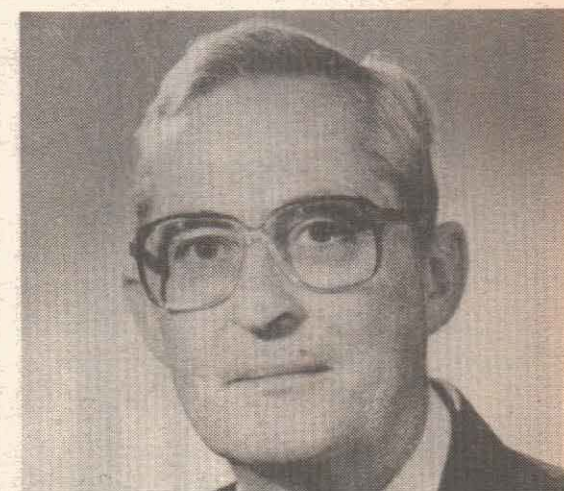
"The needs of Caulfield ratepayers are my first priority", says South Ward candidate, Geoff Hearman.

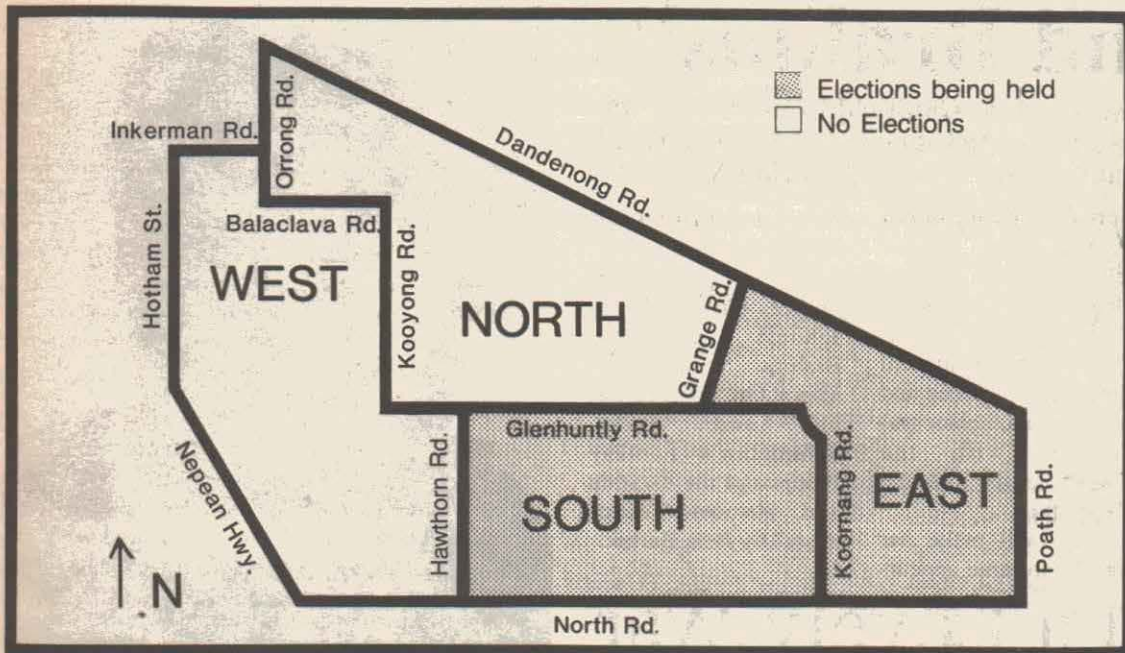

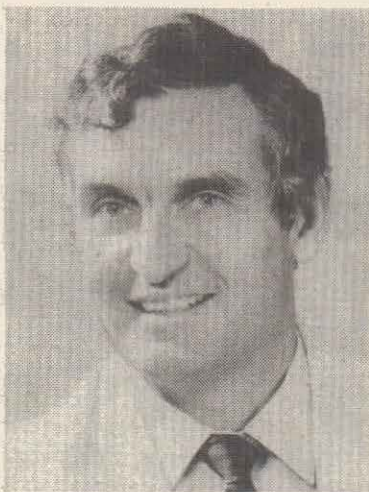
"Local Government directly affects the lifestyle and well being of residents. It is essential for a councillor to maintain contact with people over the full three year term of office - not just at election time."

Who Must Vote?

Voting is compulsory for:

- All persons, over the age of 18, who are resident in the City and whose names appear on the municipal voters' roll; this applies whether they own property or not.

Voting is Optional for:

- Owners or occupiers of property within the City who live outside the Ward.
- Persons over the age of 70 years.

Adult franchise

Following the introduction of adult franchise for Council elections it is now compulsory for all residents of the City over the age of 18 years to vote. The State Electoral office has supplied the Council with a voters' roll containing the names of all persons, 18 years and over, eligible to vote.

This is an important development for there will now be persons eligible to vote in Council elections who have not been eligible in the past, eg. persons living at home with their parents now must vote.

In addition, the Council has prepared a second roll consisting of the names of owners and occupiers of property not resident in the municipality, together with the names of non-naturalised persons and company nominees.

Postal Voting

Postal voting is available for those unable to attend the polling booth on election day because of:

- absence from the Municipality
- illness or infirmity
- conscientious objection against voting on the appointed day.

A special office has been set up at the Hawthorn Road entrance to the City Offices. It will be open between 9.00 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. Monday to Friday from Monday, July 18 with the exception of Tuesday, July 26, Tuesday, August 2 and Thursday, August 4 when applications will be received up to 7.00pm.

No applications for postal voting will be received after 4.00 p.m. Friday, August 5, 1988.

Donation to Caulfield Permanent Collection

Mrs Dorothy Spargo, a resident of Council's Camden Court has offered an oil painting by Jen Hendrik Scheltema to the City of Caulfield Permanent Art Collection.

Scheltema was a Dutch painter who studied at the Royal Academy, Brussels and arrived in Victoria in 1890, where he remained till he died in 1938.

He was known chiefly as a painter of domestic animals mainly cattle and horses. Examples of his work are held in the State Galleries of Adelaide, Hobart, Melbourne and Sydney.

This particular picture, is of kangaroos in a timbered landscape, and is most unusual in that Scheltema rarely painted native fauna.

Mrs Spargo and her husband purchased the picture in 1958 for 5 pounds at an auction of the contents of a Caulfield house. It has been subsequently valued at \$14,000.

Cr Veronika Martens, Chairman of the Caulfield Arts Complex Art Selection Committee said that "The Committee is delighted that Mrs Spargo has chosen

the Caulfield Permanent Art Collection and the new Arts Complex Gallery as a permanent home for this significant work of art."

"It is good that a picture which has been in Caulfield for so long will now remain here as part of our permanent collection and in public ownership," she said.

Mrs Spargo's generous gesture is much appreciated by the Councilors and the Citizens of Caulfield.

The picture has been accepted and will remain on display in the Gallery for public viewing for several weeks.

The artist, Stelarc has astounded international audiences with dramatic performances in which he combines the power of modern technology with human body functions.

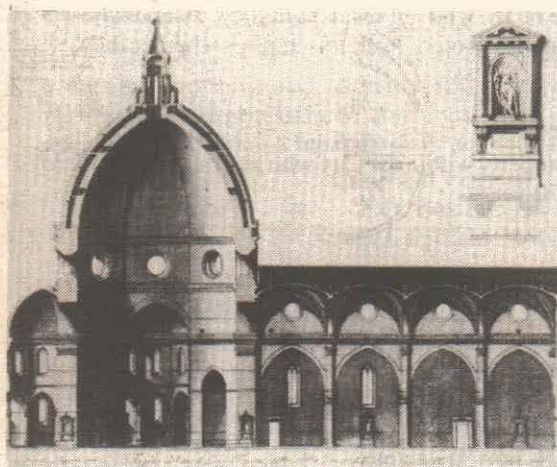

Did you know?

In order that residents may know a little more of the work that is done around their municipality Contact presents a Pot Pourri of extracts from the quarterly report of the Technical Services Division of the Council.

During the last quarter approximately 300 items of correspondence and memoranda were processed by the Design Engineers office. These items originated from either Council resolutions, public enquiries and correspondence from other departments and authorities. During the same time over 3000 telephone calls were also received..... And that is just one small department of the Council.

Following the completion of the investigation and planning stages of the Council's major traffic projects they must be designed and installed. Work was done this quarter on the roundabouts at the intersections of Poath & Kangaroo Roads, Neerim & Kambrook Roads and Booran & Glen Eira Roads. The intersections at Inkerman Road & Alexandra Street and Grange & Oakleigh Roads also received treatment.

Many enquiries and complaints require the issue of job cards. The Works Depot received 215 such cards and 95 of them went to Parks and Gardens. The work done includes such things as road and footpath maintenance, cleaning of rights-of-way, unblocking drains, pruning trees, upgrading nature strips, etc.

The Council has continued its fortnightly, door to door collection of glass containers. All glass is culletted except the CUB 750ml and 375ml beer bottles. These are crated and re-

completed in the Stanley Street carpark and in another three streets.

Other general maintenance works for the quarter have included the installation of 169

been cleaned in 97 streets. It was also found necessary to install extra pits for drain access in 5 of these streets.

The Parks and Gardens people were involved in the removal of 18 dead trees and the planting of 110 live ones. By the end of June, as part of a tree pruning contract, approximately 1200 trees were trimmed away from the power lines.

Harleston Park has had major works undertaken on its water-fall, including a new pump and the clearing of roots from the drain. Tree ferns have been planted out and a new conifer garden is being installed. Treated pine fencing has been completed around the perimeter of the park and the barbecue hotplates have been replaced. Along with this the playground equipment has been inspected and repaired.

When invited to write a review on a restaurant, being extremely generous by nature and endowed with an innate sense of duty, I, of course, said, "yes" and invited Maree to be my companion for the evening.

The restaurant under review was 'Objections,' in North Road Ormond. We were greeted at the door by Joe Mottola. He owns the restaurant with John Kavaliotis. Joe waits on the customers and John is the Chef. They have been in partnership for over seven years and came from a catering background in the Rock and Theatre Industries.

The illuminaries they have catered for include 'Sting', Barry Humphries, George Thorogood and 'Hot Chocolate.' The walls of the restaurant are lined with autographed photos of the various stars they have served.

It was a friendly crowd that we found inside. The decor was clean and modern. There was background music which facilitated conversation rather than drowned it out, and there was plenty of conversation going on.

We took a table, relaxed with a glass of red wine and made our selection from a black-board menu.

The entrees ranged in price from \$5.20 to \$10.20. Four types of pasta were available (\$5.60 an entree serve) with a choice of twelve different sauces. There were also avocado, quail and chicken livers, oysters at \$10.20 and a soup of the day (\$3.00).

I had the Chicken Satay (\$5.20). It was served quickly and it was hot. The chicken was doused with a lightly spiced sauce and a small side salad was included.

Maree had the Tagliatelle with a creamy spinach sauce. She said that she was glad to break her Pritikin diet for the night.

My selection for the main course was the Veal Princess (\$10.80). This was served with a cheese and mushroom sauce and seasonal vegetables. The meal arrived quickly and was served piping hot. The sauce was quite rich without overpowering the rest of the plate. I had a glass of red wine to celebrate my choice and

then another for being so clever.

My companion ordered the Chicken-Smoked Trout. This consisted of a breast of chicken topped with trout and seasonal vegetables. She didn't have much to say which is always a good sign when someone is eating. The first thing she did say was "delicious", so I presume it went down well.

The main course selection offered veal, chicken and lamb dishes. Steak was on the menu as well as a Seafood Platter for Two (\$18 each). The prices ranged from \$10.80 to \$16.50.

At this stage we were talking with the party on the next table. They told

us that the Seafood Platter was 'very nice'.

Over a glass of wine they told us they were regulars at the restaurant. They suggested that I ask Joe why the restaurant was called 'Objections'.

"Well," He said, "Because of all the objections and problems we had when we first tried to set up business."

That sounded reasonable. I then asked about publicity.

"I get a real buzz out of filling this place by word of mouth," He said. "And we have a lot of regulars who keep coming back."

Maree and I now had a look at the dessert menu. We had the Surprise Platter for Two (\$7.50 each). It was well

presented and almost looked too good to eat. Almost... Having overcome a childhood aversion to mussing up anything that looks nice, I set upon attacking it.

I won't spoil the surprise by telling you too much about the Surprise Platter other than that it included over five different dessert types. It was delicious.

We finished off our meal with cappuccinos. Maree agreed her meal was great. Three courses for two cost around \$50 which I thought was a pretty good deal. The service, the food and the atmosphere were great. When you've got all that there isn't really much room for anything else.

A New Lease on Life at Lovell House

A new recreation program is being developed at Lovell House Anglican Home in Caulfield by Recreation Officer, Dianne Hutchins.

The result of a pilot program two years ago, residents are now interviewed individually to assess their personal needs and interests in order to co-ordinate a suitable recreation program for everyone.

"Older people often lose previous recreational interest once they enter a home due to different habits and lack of incentive" Ms Hutchins said.

This program is designed to help people rediscover past interests and encourage passive

participation, opening up new avenues of entertainment. People are realising that they can still go out and enjoy many activities in the community, such as ballroom dancing (there is as much enjoyment in watching as in dancing), theatre and even seeing the city sights after many years.

A fabulous evening was enjoyed recently when five residents of Lovell House attended a piano recital by Sofya Vanier, held at the Caulfield Arts Complex.

They all agreed that it was particularly enjoyable to be taken out in the evening and to participate in entertainment provided by their own

local community.

It is hoped that the program will continue with the support of families, friends and people in the community who can offer some assistance. A most important need for elderly recreation is a companion and suitable transport. This not only applies to residents of homes but to elderly people still living at home who may be in need of company, support and some outside interests.

30 years and \$500,000 later

The Caulfield Voluntary Workers' Shop has survived a major fire and three changes of address in the 30 years since its inception, yet remains a focal point of charity work for the Caulfield community.

possible for Caulfield to be only the third municipality to adopt a Meals on Wheels project.

With the Shop now working for the Spurway Nursing Home the Voluntary Workers have their eyes set firmly on the future.

\$72,000 has already been contributed, as well as donations to other organisations such as the Southern Memorial Hospital and the Senior Citizens Club.

The Shop has turned over nearly \$500,000 in the last thirty years, but

this is only a small part of the contribution made by the Voluntary Workers to the quality of life in Caulfield. One can rest assured that in thirty years time the Caulfield Voluntary Workers Shop will still be going strong.

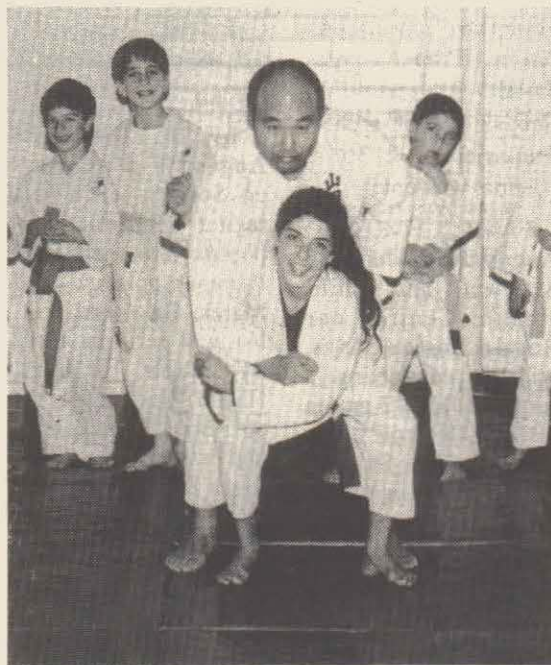
The Club does not have juniors this year, but is most interested in fielding both under 18 and under 16 teams next year. Interested persons

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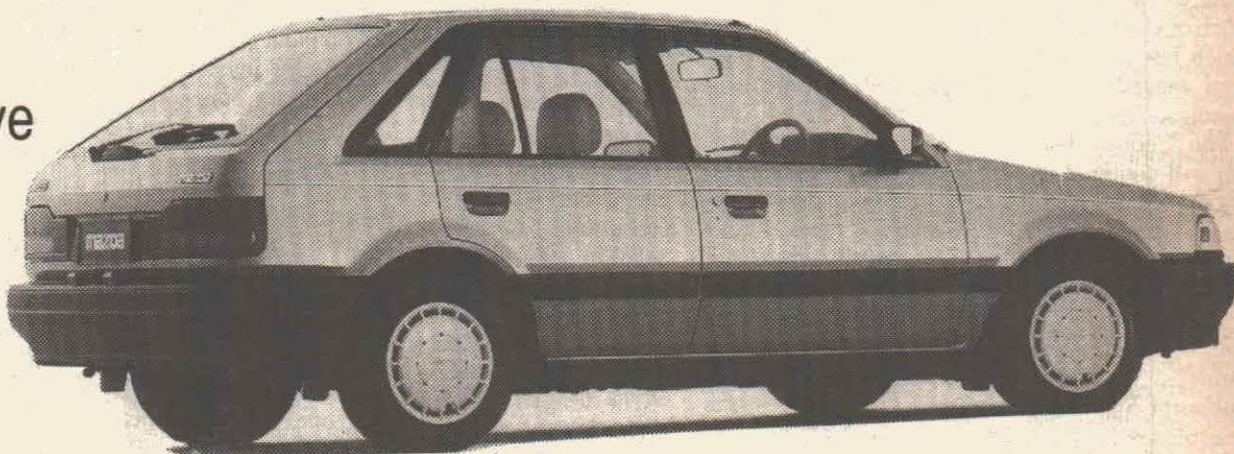
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
