Officiating at the special opening of the Caulfield Arts Complex the Right Honorable Sir Zelman Cowen, former Governor General of Australia, acknowledged that Caulfield was well known for its encouragement of local artistic and cultural endeavour.

In declaring the Complex, which is adjacent to the City offices, open Sir Zelman emphasised the importance of cultural enrichment.

He said, "Whilst Australia's capital cities can all boast excellent arts facilities it is desirable that other facilities should also exist a little closer to home".

Sir Zelman said he supported Caulfield's concept of community arts saying that it "provided a focus, an identity and an opportunity for shared activity".

"What has been achieved with this new Complex", he said, "Will bring much of this together and provide expanding opportunities for a wide range of

activities within the framework of this well known and well loved City Hall".

In responding, Caulfield's new Mayor, Cr. Emil Braun, paid tribute to those involved in the success of the evening, the Fundraising Committee, the Council and the community who have so generously supported the Complex.

He said the Complex, which includes an auditorium with first class catering facilities, a well appointed ground floor public gallery and a theatre, was the first of many projects for the Council.

"We must look ahead and plan for future generations", he said. "We

must look to tomorrow and a Caulfield that people can continue to be proud of".

More than 250 people attended the Opening

which was held on Saturday, August 20 in the auditorium of the Complex.

Special guests included Sir Zelman and Lady Cowen, Sir Donald and Lady Trescowthick, Sir

Rupert and Lady Clarke, the Mayor of Caulfield, Cr. Emil Braun and his wife Judy. The Regional Manager of the National Australia Bank, Mr Lawrie Brooke and his wife Sally and Mr Bill Collins and his wife

Robin were also in attendance.

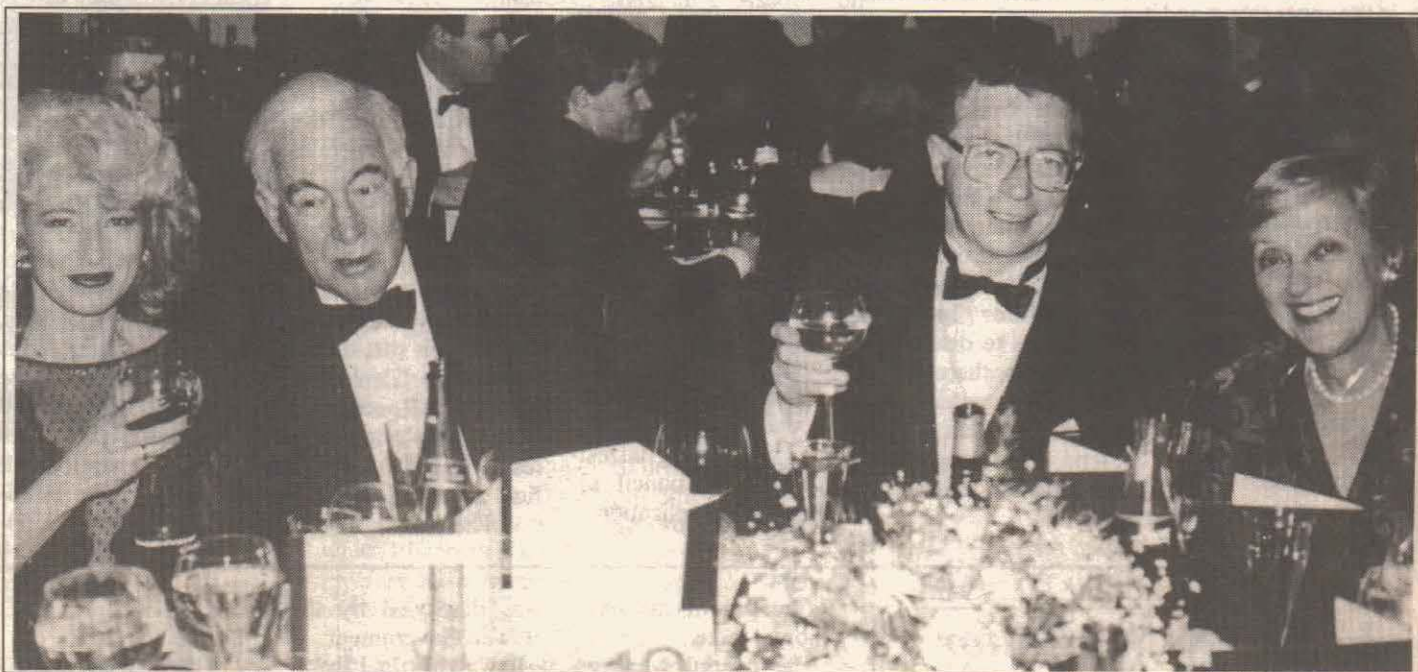
Also present were the Victorian Amateur Turf Club Board Members and their wives.

## Meet Emil Braun, Caulfield's New Mayor

The new Mayor of Caulfield, Cr. Emil Braun was elected unopposed on Tuesday, August 9, at the Council's Statutory Meeting.

In his first statement as Mayor of Caulfield, Cr Braun said that Caulfield had launched itself into the new Council year with vigour and confidence.

He said, "With a good team of experienced Councillors at the helm and officers of high calibre and expertise we are in a strong position to act positively in the interests of all the residents of Caulfield".

Cr Braun came to Australia from Czechoslovakia in 1950 and has spent the past 38 years as a Caulfield resident.

A naturalised Australian he said he'd never imagined, as a young man fleeing from war torn Europe, that there existed a place with such freedom of speech and democracy as Australia. "I found in Australia more than I'd ever dreamed of", he said.

Twenty years ago Cr Braun felt it was time he gave something back to the country which, he felt, had given him so much.

With a small group of friends he established the Theodore Herzl Social Club with an aim to work for different charities.

Initially members of the Club met in private homes but nine years ago a house was purchased at 222 Balaclava Rd, Caulfield.

From its humble beginnings the Club now has upwards of 1200 active members each of whom give their time and skills for raising money for charity.

Four years ago Cr Braun, who had previously not thought about

standing for Council, was persuaded to do so by a group of friends.

He was a successful candidate and the rest, as they say, is history.

Cr Braun says he has found his four years as a Caulfield Councillor most enjoyable.

While he is interested in all areas of Council concern he feels particularly strongly about two main issues.

One is providing more open space for residents in the Elsternwick and Gardenvale areas and the second is developing more office space in the City Hall area thus cre-

ating more space for community use.

He said, "I believe the Town Hall is one of the most magnificent structures in Melbourne and when the staff moves into their new accommodation I would like to see it used more for community activities".

A man with a strong community spirit, Emil Braun is nevertheless a devoted family man.

He has been married to his wife Judy for 29 years and they have three children Peter 28, Gary 26 and Susie 22.

He and Judy are partners in a jewellery business in the city.

## News from Council

### Dangerous Trees

Two large cypress trees near to the aviary in Caulfield Park will need to be removed. There is extensive cracking in the lower trunk sections of these trees and they could drop limbs at any time.

Close by there is a pine tree which is dead in the upper crown and it needs cutting out.

All trees are in close proximity to a children's playground and the park perimeter path so could prove quite a danger to the public.

A number of other old cypress trees scattered throughout the park are in similar need of attention and may also need to be removed.

The Council unfortunately faces the dilemma of trying to pre-

serve these beautiful old trees and yet still maintain public safety. Any decision to remove them is not taken lightly and will only apply to dead and dangerous trees.

### Parkland Cleared

The site of the old plant nursery at the Princes Highway end of the Outer Circle Railway land has been cleared. The removal of the old structures and vacant buildings has opened up that end of the proposed linear park.

The Council recently met with the Department of Conservation, Forests and Land and other involved Councils to discuss the next step that will be taken in implementing the park which will extend from Hughesdale Station all the way to Kew.

A resident committee is being formed to support an application to establish a section of the land as a memorial to the Boyd family - it may in the future become known as Boyd Park.

### Reception Refusal

An application to convert the vacant buildings of the former Kahlyn Private Hospital in Bamba Road, for use as reception rooms, was opposed at this month's meeting of the Executive Services Committee.

A number of objectors addressed the meeting and argued that if the proposal went ahead it would disturb the quiet residential nature of the area. Traffic and parking problems would occur, they alleged, and the noise and disruption that such a use would cause would be unacceptable.

Supporting the residents the Council refused this application.

### Counselling Centre

Objectors to the establishment of a family counselling centre in Orrong Road have been assured by the applicant that they would not be dealing with drug related problems or sexual deviants.

The Council approved the establishment of this centre which will provide relief in personal crisis, family counselling and education. "The Jewish Centre" will be manned by professionals and is a non-profit, non-sectarian, independent and autonomous organisation. It is not a welfare body or a rehabilitation centre.

A number of concerns along these lines were expressed by neighbours and the school which operates close by.

### New Zoning

The Council has approved a proposal to rezone the Glenhuntly Fire Station site, on the corner of Glenhuntly and Grange Roads, from its existing zoning of residential 'C' to 'Office' zone.

The site is owned

by the Metropolitan Fire Brigade which is in the process of vacating the premises.

The Brigade is rationalising its operations and a new station is to be established in East Malvern. This will provide a fire service to the area formerly covered by the Glenhuntly Station.

### Kangaroo Road

Residents of Kangaroo Road, last May, presented a petition to the Council expressing concern at the traffic conditions. Following a study of the area it was found that although traffic volumes had increased over the past three years they reflect its function as a limited arterial road.

The speed of morning peak traffic has also increased but the accident rate has dropped off since reconstruction work in the street was recently completed.

In an effort to solve some of these problems, 60 KPH traffic signs will be installed and the police will be requested to regularly patrol the area. Consideration will also be given to establishing a pedestrian op-

erated crossing at Murrumbeena Park and the installation of traffic lights at the intersection of Murrumbeena and Kangaroo Roads.

### Kindergarten Relocation

The St James Kindergarten has operated successfully for many years at the church in Inkerman Road. But they have been given notice to quit these premises and have approached the Council seeking assistance with the cost of relocation.

Ripponlea Primary School has offered the use of two classrooms and play space from the beginning of next year but some capital works would be required.

The Council has agreed in principle to the request and has referred \$5000 to the 1988/89 budget estimates.

### Red Cross

The Council has once again granted a request by the Australian Red Cross society to conduct its annual "Red Cross Calling" appeal in the City.

During 1988 the Caulfield Local District Appeal Committee successfully raised \$52,582 towards the state total of some \$1.5m.

The appeal next year has been scheduled for the early part of March.

### Toy Library

Since 1984 the Caulfield Community Toy Library has operated as a family resource. It has proved so successful and has grown so rapidly that it is now seeking funds to employ a part-time coordinator.

Children's toys are so expensive and they either break or children tire of them. A resource such as this is both a boon to the family with young children and, to some extent, an educational resource.

Up till now the library has operated using volunteer services and caters to some 124 families - over 200 preschool children.

The Council has referred this request to the budget for the next financial year.

### Constitutional Recognition

Madam,

I refer to an article printed in the May 26 edition of the Caulfield Contact discussing the Federal Opposition's position on the constitutional recognition of Local Government as 'disappointing and frustrating'.

The Opposition have decided to oppose all four proposals to be put to referendum on September 3 after much deliberation and consultation.

On the Local Government question we have received much support for our position from local authorities around Australia.

Whilst the recognition of Local Government in the Constitution is superficially appealing, it is a fundamentally unsound and even dangerous position.

Potentially the recognition of Local Government could allow for a centralist Labor Government to revive the dream of a regionalised Australia. This would signal the end of Local

Government as we know it today.

The careful wording of the proposal is enough to raise this suspicion. The wording merely requires that State Governments establish a 'system of local government' - it does not define local government.

There is no guarantee that Local Government in the form of Municipal and Shire Councils will remain in that form.

In the case of four states, Local Government recognition has been enshrined in their State Constitutions. It is at this level that recognition should take place.

It should not be forgotten that it is as a Liberal Government that gave Local Government a percentage share of Federal Tax Revenue. That fiscal guarantee

was destroyed by the Hawke Government.

It was also a Liberal Government which established the Advisory Council for Inter-Governmental Relations, a body later abolished by the Labor Government.

Local Government should not forget that Labor cut road funding by \$35 million in the May 1988 Economic Statement. This is an indication of Labor's lack of support for Local Government responsibilities.

In summary, the local government proposal will do nothing to protect and enhance local government in Australia, but rather lead to the erosion of the vital role played by local government in the community.

### Traffic Management

Madam,

I have some doubts about Caulfield Council's proposed Traffic Management plan for the area bounded by Hawthorn, Glenhuntly and Kooyong Rds and Aileen Ave.

The plan includes raised pavement slow points, min-roundabout (channelisation) slow points, splitter islands and white lines (improved delineation). Most of these will be in Sycamore St.

Residents in the area have been circularised with the Proposal and all Caulfield residents were invited to comment before 29th July.

I believe the proposed plan has its merits and I

applaud the fact that the Council is consulting residents.

BUT residents cannot make informed decisions without knowing the estimated costs.

They were not told that a mini-roundabout costs about \$20,000, a raised pavement slow point costs about \$13,500. The whole proposal is estimated to cost \$91,500 of which \$74,500 is to be spent in Sycamore St.

Caulfield Council has spent more than one quarter of a million dollars on these Traffic Management Schemes in Carnegie over the past three years.

It is time to do a full review in the areas treated to see if the work has been cost effective and satisfactory BEFORE proceeding with further traffic treatments.

# Town Clerk Takes Top Legal Job

## Office Extensions

The Council is inviting building companies to submit preliminary designs and costings for a three to four level office extension to the existing City Hall. The extension will be located in the area of the old Centenary Hall which has provided temporary accommodation for Council staff for many years.

The building is now sub standard and is expected to be demolished later this year.

Mayor, Emil Braun, said that the Council had commissioned a design brief to ensure the extensions were 'site sensitive' and particularly sympathetic to the existing City Hall.

"The matter will be further considered when submissions are received and developers will have flexibility in putting forward a design and construction package", he added.

## No 'One Way'

The Council was unable to accede to a request from McLaurin Road residents to convert it to a one way street. Traffic data for this area has been obtained as part of the Council's on-going assessment of local areas. It shows that although there has been a decrease in the volume of traffic using the street there has been a small increase in the speed of peak traffic.

Generally, the establishment of one way control on streets of significant length such as McLaurin Road, does not alleviate or discourage speeding. It may, in fact, encourage it because of the greater road width that would become available.

In an effort to solve some of these problems, however, stop signs will be erected at the side streets, there will be a ban on heavy traffic and the police will be asked to make random speed checks.

Caulfield is losing its Town Clerk. Elizabeth Loftus has resigned from her position with the Council to move back into the legal field.

She was appointed town clerk in January 1985, a position she combined with her role as the City of Caulfield's Manager Administration and her responsibilities for the Council's legal work.

Elizabeth, the first woman to hold the title of Town Clerk in a Melbourne metropolitan municipality, has been appointed Executive Director of the Leo Cussen Institute.

It is a position which is highly regarded within the legal profession

and one which will give Elizabeth the opportunity of combining her considerable skills in the legal, educational and managerial areas.

The Institute is the body responsible for the practical training of lawyers and providing continuing legal educational courses. It was established in 1972 and is governed by members representing the various legal bodies in Victoria.

With the potential phasing out of the Articles system for legal graduates the Institute will be facing a considerable increase in students. A challenge which Elizabeth is looking forward to meeting in her new role.

Elizabeth's career move will not, however, mean the end of her association with local government.

She said, "While I do have regrets about leaving the local government arena I will still be maintaining contact".

"I am currently completing a two-year term of office as national secretary of the Australian Local Government Women's Association and lecture part-time in local government law at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology".

Although returning to the legal field where she previously spent seven years specialising in commercial litigation Elizabeth is an enthusiastic advocate of local government as a career.

She is currently chairing a working party on future educational requirements for local government managers, an area she has spent considerable time on in the past.

Elizabeth said there were many highlights for her during her seven years with Caulfield City Council.

She said, "As Founder of the City of Caulfield Nursing Home Fund I was delighted with the contribution to be made to the Fund following the sale of the Spurway Homes. I had worked for several years to obtain the Court Order for the transfer of the Spurway Trust assets to the Nursing Home Fund".

Elizabeth also spoke of the satisfaction she had gained from her role in citizenship ceremonies.

"I really got a buzz out of them", she said. "Partly for the pride I have in Australia but also in recognising the courage each participant had to leave their country of origin to settle in a new land".

In her role of town clerk Elizabeth has also been the returning offi-

cer for local government elections.

"I have witnessed the changing fortunes of many candidates", she said. "But more importantly I have enjoyed the contact with a group of citizens who wanted to voluntarily serve the community in which they lived".

Last month when the new mayor of Caulfield, Cr Emil Braun, took office Elizabeth was heard to remark to him that one of her deepest regrets was that she would be unable to serve with him during his mayoral year.

A small remark but one that nevertheless shows why Elizabeth Loftus will be sadly missed at Caulfield.

A highly educated person, a skilled administrator and an outstanding lawyer, Elizabeth is nevertheless, a person who never forgets the human side of her work.

She is essentially one of the world's 'people person's'.

## Old Post Office Site Under Review

For some time now residents, of Elsternwick in particular, have been expressing concern at the need for preservation of the historic post office site.

The Caulfield Council has recently been examining development options for its most viable use.

With each option, the common element is that the site be developed with a mix of ground floor shops and first floor offices.

Each option involves retaining and upgrading the significant features of the 'older' part of the existing building with the extensions to be in architectural sympathy.

The Chairman of the

## Fee for Footpath Use

The Caulfield Council is concerned about the numbers of goods, signs and articles being placed out on footpaths within the City.

Whilst not wanting to totally prohibit this practice Council believes there needs to be adequate controls. These would allow adequate pedestrian access whilst still allowing shopkeepers some opportunity to display goods.

A policy is now being considered by the Council which will require shopkeepers wishing to display goods to obtain an annual permit from the Council for payment of a nominal fee.

The policy proposes controls over the number of tables, chairs and signs that can be placed outside any property and delineates the extent of area that can be occupied by the placement of goods.

For example, it is proposed that goods and signs shall be restricted to no more than one half metre from the building line.

Copies of the proposed policy are available from Mr Doug Evans or Mr Bernie Heffernan at the City Hall and any comments should be in writing and directed to Mr B. Heffernan, City of Caulfield, PO Box 42, Sth Caulfield by September 30.

Following this date the matter will again be considered by Council.

## Traffic Scheme Approved

Following submissions from residents living in Local Area Number 32 Council has decided to proceed with the proposed Local Area Traffic Management scheme for the area.

Residents of the area, which is bounded by Glenhuntly, Hawthorn and Kooyong Rds and Aileen Ave, showed an overall favorable response to the scheme.

A significant proportion of the work involves Sycamore St where two splitter islands, channelisation and raised pavement slow points will be constructed to address adverse traffic conditions in this street.

Other works in the Scheme include splitter islands in side streets off Glenhuntly Rd and Clarence St and improved delineation at isolated intersections.

## Brett Street Bus to Stay

Alarm was caused earlier this year when Caulfield residents were told that bus route 655 would be changed to Boundary and Murrumbidgee Roads.

A petition protesting about the move was taken up and sent to the Ministry of Transport.

Recently, Caulfield Councillor, David Spencer, received a letter from the Ministry informing him that the Metropolitan Transit Authority had reviewed the proposal and decided the route would remain in Marlborough and Brett Sts.

Cr Spencer said he was delighted that the petition had been successful.

"It was important for residents, particularly children and the elderly, that the bus route stayed to service that residential area", he said.

## Welfare Founder to Speak.



Carmel Benjamin, founder and Director of the Victorian Court Information and Welfare Network, will be the guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Caulfield Citizens Advice Bureau.

The meeting will be held on Wednesday, September 28 at 8pm in the Mayoress' Room, Caulfield Town Hall.

The Court Network is a non-government, voluntary agency concerned with providing assistance to all those in contact with Victorian courts whether they be defendants, victims, witnesses or their families.

The assistance offered is non-partisan and non-judgemental. It offers objective emotional support, information about procedural matters and, when appropriate, referrals to community agencies for

continued assistance. The organization provides no legal advice.

Ms Benjamin, a qualified welfare worker, was responsible for getting Network off the ground.

In seven years she has seen it grow from one person operating from a suburban court to more than 100 people working in all the main Melbourne courts with a central office in the city.

In the beginning it received little or no support from the legal profession or the police force. Now, representatives of the police, the Legal Aid Commission, Office of Corrections and Magistracy attend Network management committee meetings as advisors.

# All Sitting Councillors Returned

Election day in Caulfield this year was cold wet and windy - not a pleasant day to be out and about drumming up support for election. But for those who won, it was obviously all worthwhile.

In the elections held on August 6 the two sitting candidates, David Spencer in the East Ward and James Barrett in the South Ward retained their seats with majority wins.

In the East Ward 65 per cent of residents voted compared to 63 per cent for the 1986 annual election.

The results were as follows:

David Spencer polled 4,243 votes, Edward Biggs polled 3,755 votes and 534 residents voted informally.

In the South Ward 62 per cent of residents voted as was the case in the 1987 annual election.

The results were as follows:

James Barrett polled 3,751 votes, Geoffrey Hearman polled 2,933 votes and 676 residents voted informally.

Councillor David Bloom, from the North Ward was re-elected unopposed as was Caulfield's new Mayor Councillor Emil Braun from the West Ward.

## Public Interest in Council Decision Making

Many residents wishing to attend Council meetings have been concerned at the lack of notice they have received of their item appearing on the meeting agenda.

It should be noted that invitations to residents to attend Council Meetings are not sent out until the Council Meeting agendas are prepared.

Usually this is the Thursday prior to the regular Tuesday Council Meetings.

Normal mail deliveries would see such invitations reach residents on Friday.

While it is accepted that such notice is short, mailing of invitations prior to the production of the agenda would not be practical.

On occasions, items scheduled for agendas are removed at the last minute.

Similarly, invitations sent before the production of the agendas would mean that not all items would not be able to be included with the invitation.

Unfortunately delays have been experienced with some residents not receiving their invitations until the Monday or even the Tuesday of the Council Meeting concerned.

However under normal circumstances the present system works effectively and notice given before that time would be at the expense of both accuracy and content.

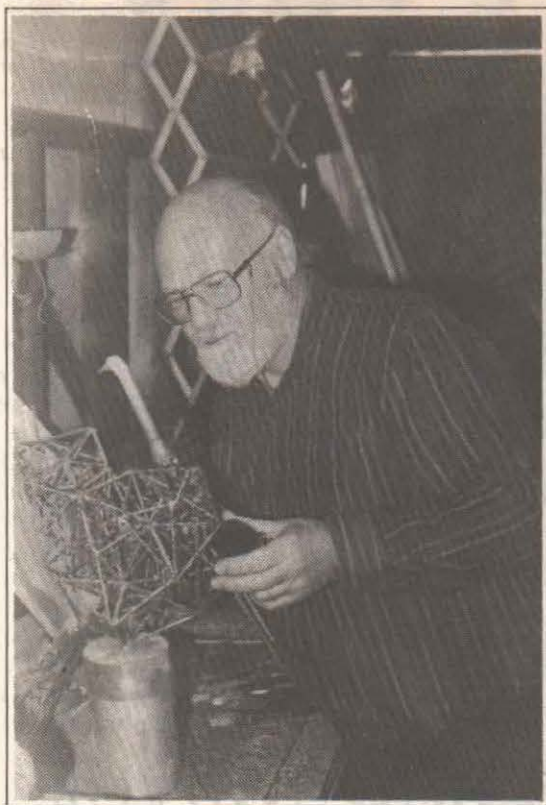

## Portrait for the Mayoral Gallery



William Cowley Watts, Shire President of Caulfield in 1876 and 1883. Another portrait that can now be added to the gallery of Mayors that is being featured in the clock tower entrance to the City Offices

The Watts family name is one whose associations with the City of Caulfield stretch back into the last century.

Brothers William Cowley Watts, (1839-1883) and Thomas Henry Watts, both served as Presidents of the Shire of Caulfield, as it was known then.

The two brothers sailed from Bristol, England, in June 1855 to land at Sandridge, (Port Melbourne), in November that year.

William Watts was associated with his brother in establishing a firm of architects, later known as Thos. H. Watts and Sons.

The firm designed many of Melbourne's best known buildings of the period, some of which are classified by the National Trust.

Thomas Watts became President of the Victorian Institute of Architects and William was appointed City Surveyor of Melbourne.

William was responsible for the first paving of Melbourne's streets, using tarred red gum blocks, which remained in many areas for more than 60 years.

He also introduced the first drainage system to the City and extended Melbourne's water supply by surveying the Watts River catchment area at Healesville.

The stress of the monumental tasks William was engaged in was attributed to his early death at the age of 43.

William Watts' son, Charles George, 1872 - 1940, was one of the first pupils of Caulfield Grammar School and a Fellow of the Federal Institute of Accountants.

He was City Treasurer of Melbourne from 1923-1937.

William's grandson, Geoffrey Watts, who lives in Kelmscott, Western Australia, sent the information and the photograph of his grandfather to us.

## Having Trouble with Rubbish?

**From Wednesday, July 27 Caulfield residents were protected from pollution resulting from the effects of 'burning off' by a new By-Law covering barbeques, burning and incinerators.**

The By-Law, based on the Environment Protection Agency's Incinerator Model By-Law, restricts the use of incinerators to particular days and times and is specific about their siting and construction.

The By-Law can be viewed at the City Offices or residents can phone the Council on 524 3333 for further details.

Residents complaints and Council concern had led to the By-Law being introduced.

Its introduction was welcomed by many residents including the Caulfield Residents Association.

They commented that the new regulations addressed an issue which had concerned them for some considerable time.

The CRA said that more than half of Melbourne municipalities had regulations covering incinerators in force for many years.

Some concerns have been raised however on

new ways to get rid of that excess household and garden rubbish.

There are many alternatives available to residents wanting to 'Spring clean' their homes and gardens.

\*\*\*

#### Many Alternatives

**Glass Recycling** is now a part of life for most community conscious people and Caulfield residents have access to two different services.

For recycling of bottles and glasses, the Council is now collecting these every second week.

Just take special note of their collection day from the calendar supplied to each home and make sure that they are left out by 6am on collection day.

There is also a glass recycling centre at the Council depot, Neerim Rd, Glenhuntly and glass bottles and jars can be left at this 'drive-in' depot any time.

**Paper** - for getting rid of those newspapers and cardboard boxes that tend to build up in the corner of the garage, these are collected by an independent contractor who places a notice in residents letterboxes advising of collection day.

For further information on this service just ring - 523 9479.

**Normal household garbage** is handled by the Council using the large bin system.

The 240 litre, plastic bins have been distributed to every dwelling within the Municipality.

These jumbo-sized bins hold a lot of household and garden rubbish, (such as tree and shrub prunings), and are emptied by the Council once a week.

However they cannot be used for hot or burning ashes so put these on your garden or compost heap.

**For heavy rubbish or garden refuse** such as rocks, garden soil or large branches Caulfield residents are allowed to use the Pioneer Tip in Deals Rd, Clayton.

The Tip is open from 7am to 5pm Mondays through to Saturdays and from 8am to 4pm on

Sundays. Normal fees apply.

If you have too much rubbish to fit into the boot of your car there are many trailer hire firms who can help you.

Just remember to secure your load properly and make sure you are at the Tip more than 15 minutes before closing time.

**Composting.** For those who are fortunate enough to have space for a small compost heap why not make this one of your Spring projects.

Compost heaps are a wonderful way of getting rid of a lot of rubbish such as leaves, kitchen scraps, grass clippings or weeds.

The compost which is produced is a marvelous soil conditioner and will improve the texture and drainage of soil as

well as increasing soil fertility.

Directions for making a compost heap can be obtained from the Information Services Branch, Environment Protection Authority, 240 Victoria Pde, East Melbourne, 3002, your local library or from the Caulfield Town Hall.

**Hard Garbage.** Caulfield Council conducts an annual hard garbage collection which allows residents to get rid of items such as old furniture, disused whitegoods, (ie fridges or washing machines), and small amounts of wood or garden rubbish.

This collection begins after Easter and continues for approximately three months with residents being notified beforehand.

The face of dining out has changed dramatically in the past few years with new fringe benefit laws and a tightening of most family budgets.

Dining out for both business and the family has almost become a 'special occasion' event.

Many restaurateurs have found this hard to cope with. Others have changed with the times and modified their menus to make sure they are within the reach of small business people and family groups.

One of the latter is Allan Dinnar from Dinnars Restaurant in Poath Road who has introduced a fixed price menu as an adjunct to his regular a-la-carte menu.

Recently renovated to wife Robyn's own design, Dinnars has an atmosphere very conducive to that special night out. Attention to detail has ensured that everything, from the serviettes to the table decorations, tones in with the very elegant color scheme of soft apricot with black highlights.

Allan, who trained at

the Pickwick and Top of the Town restaurants aims to provide good quality food at a cost competitive price.

We booked in for a Saturday evening meal and the restaurant was nearly full when we arrived, always a good sign.

Greeted by a friendly hostess we were shown to a table in the side room of the restaurant.

Our meal began with a complimentary nibble as we perused the menus. Tiny sausage rolls with a tasty spiced filling made a delightful start while both the fixed price and the a-la-carte menus listed equally delicious sounding dishes.

On the a-la-carte menu prices for entrees varied from \$6.50 to \$11, main courses started at \$15.50 and went to \$18 and desserts were all \$8. The fixed price menu offered customers the choice of two courses for \$20 or three courses for \$25.

We decided to try both menus so my partner chose from the a-la-carte and I chose from the fixed price.

We both began with soup, the spinach and oyster and the soup of the day which was pumpkin, both were delicious.

For entree I chose a Filo Duo which was a caramelised carrot, basil, cashew nut and gruyere strudel and a spinach, mushroom, ricotta and nutmeg bundle in filo, both served with an orange and carrot glaze.

The strudel was light and sweet but the filo bundle was a let-down.

My partner chose Mussels and Blue Eye Tempura - mussels filled with smoked trout and fingers of blue eye in tempura batter, fried and served with a to-

mato chilli sauce and avocado salsa.

The dish was nicely presented and a good balance of flavors except that the mussels seemed to be missing from some portions. A bad oversight.

For main course we both chose fish dishes. I enjoyed a fillet of fresh trevally, pan fried with lemon, butter, parsley and almonds and my partner pronounced his oven baked trevally on a bed of vegetable ratatouille, topped with avocado, crab meat and prawn au gratin as 'very nice'.

Sadly, the vegetables were not up to standard and did not complement the rest of the course.

For desserts I enjoyed the chocolate and hazelnut steamed pudding whilst my partner could not go past the ice cream parfait.

The pudding was lovely and light and the parfait - a combination of Dinnars own strawberry praline and chocolate chip ice creams with a mint cream anglaise and raspberry sauce was very acceptable.

To finish off we chose Twinings Orange Pekoe tea served with a selection of after dinner treats.

Most definitely, a feature of the meal was the friendly, efficient service from Dinnars staff.

Dinnars is a good value, 'good night out'.

Advice from the Commonwealth Department of Health advises that original prescriptions should be endorsed 'Workcare' or 'For Compensation,' if applicable.

It will then be dispensed and charged as a private prescription and not on the NHS.

the patient with a receipt for claiming from the insurer.

If the prescription is not endorsed the pharmacist should contact the prescriber and seek confirmation of the patient's status from the prescriber. The Pharmacist can then endorse the prescription and dispense it as a private prescription.

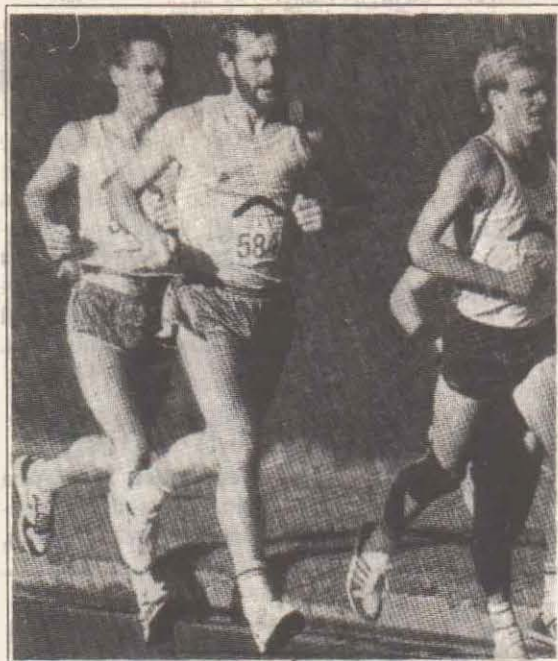

## Safety Fences a Must for New Pools

Residents interested in putting in a pool for the Summer season will now have to include the cost of safety fencing in their estimations.

Last month the State Government introduced a building regulation requiring all new domestic swimming pools to have safety barriers erected around them.

The regulation was introduced due to the Government's concern about the number of children drowned in domestic swimming pools.

Caulfield Council, as with all Victorian Municipal Councils, will be able to impose fines of up to \$1000 on householders not complying with the new regulations.

Although these regulations do not apply to existing pools, people who already have swimming pools have been urged to erect safety fences.
