

Rates up only 7.9%

Despite a major reduction in funds from the Commonwealth Government, Caulfield's Council has managed to keep the increase in general rate revenue down to 7.9%.

The 1988/89 budget has been designed to allow existing programs to continue but it also includes a number of new initiatives.

The needs of a broad cross section of the community have been accommodated. The Spurway Nursing Home is a major project that residents will see completed by April of next year, a fifth Child Care Centre will be established in Elsternwick and an Adult Day Activity Centre will be introduced to Freeman Street.

Council staff also have something to look forward to. Extensions to the City Offices will commence soon and already the Council has \$2 million set aside for the project.

Refurbishment and redevelopment of the old Elsternwick Post Office will also be a

substantial project costing in the order of \$1 million. But it will have a number of beneficial effects: an historic building will be preserved, the shopping centre will be strengthened and revenue will be raised through commercial rents.

In addition the Council will continue to emphasise local area traffic management and its program of streetscaping.

A surplus

Throughout the past financial year, which operates from October 1 to September 30, the Council has restructured the organisation and reviewed several services. This has resulted in substantial ongoing savings. It has, during this time, managed to generate a surplus estimated at \$487,000 which will be

carried forward to this financial year.

This surplus has been achieved, among other things, through the sale of the Trade Waste business and the fact that, because of the lateness of award increases, wages and salaries were well below the budgeted figure.

Major Challenges

During the next financial year the Council will start to realise the full benefit of its Economic Development policies with receipt of rental for the Hawthorn Road Offices. This will amount to some \$110,000. But it will also commence repayment of the capital costs of its involvement in the purchase of a refuse disposal site in Clayton. This is a prudent investment and returns will be in the form of controlled

tip charges in the future.

The new Workcare levy and bonus system has not unduly penalised Caulfield because of its improved work practices and rehabilitation programme. But Workcare costs have risen by \$57,000. Similarly, the new principles adopted by the State Grants Commission in allocating Commonwealth Revenue Sharing grants, continue to reduce the funds coming to Caulfield. The Council is facing a reduction of \$153,327 this year.

The full impact of the 3% additional superannuation requirements will also be felt. It will result in an extra contribution of \$204,000 during the next financial year.

The strength of the Council's financial base is in its policy of building adequate reserves for major items of capital expenditure. Among these, \$100,000 has been allocated to the Garbage Replacement Reserve and \$77,000 to Building Maintenance for urgent repairs to

Council property. The needs in this area are being identified in a comprehensive property survey being conducted.

Revaluation

Every four years private property in the municipality is revalued. These valuations form the basis for levying both Council and M.M.B.W. rates. Property values have increased by an average of around 70% but because values are higher than previous years a smaller rate in the dollar will

achieve the required revenue increase of 7.9%.

Rates

The rate for 1988/89 will be 5.9191 cents compared with last year's figure of 9.4985 cents. This means that those people, whose properties may have increased in value up to or around the average valuation movement will not be facing a large increase in their rate bill.

All minimum rates have been increased by 6% for 1988/89 as has the garbage charge.

In what seems to be a reversal of its normal activity, the National Trust has demolished one of its Caulfield properties, 1A Manor Grove.

The reason for this apparently aberrant behaviour is that the property, a two story, cream brick veneer house, occupied what was previ-

ously the front lawn of the historic Victorian mansion 'Labassa'.

Its demolition, which was donated by Whelan the Wrecker, has restored a sense of visual space and enabled 'Labassa' to be viewed once again in the direction of its grand front entrance.

The Trust purchased 'Labassa', one of

Australia's most important historic houses, at public auction in 1980. Conservation work on the building received a boost this year as it was part of Amatil Ltd's sponsored bi-centennial 'Gift To The Nation'.

The National Trust will open Labassa on Saturday, October 29 and Sunday, October 30

between 10am and 5pm.

This will allow the public a final opportunity to view the Amatil Bi-Centennial Restoration in progress. The project will be completed during the Bi-Centennial year.

Admission will be \$5 for adults and \$3 for children. Visitors are asked to avoid parking in Manor Grove.

News from Council



City Hall Access

From October 1 access to the City Hall and offices via the Centenary Hall entrance will be closed due to works associated with the redevelopment of the City Offices.

The Public are encouraged to use the Glen Eira Rd and Hawthorn Rd entrances while these works are in progress.

More Open Space for Caulfield Park

Due to continued vandalism the Caulfield Park pavilion, south of the old band room, has been scheduled for demolition. The building is aged and in structurally poor condition and misuse over recent

years has not helped its plight. The area now covered by the pavilion will be levelled and grassed thus enhancing the area and providing more open space for the Park.

Closure of Manor Grove

Due to the National Trust holding a formal dinner at 'Labassa', the Caulfield Council will close Manor Grove on Friday, December 2 from 6.30pm till 9pm. Barricades will be erected allowing only taxis and resident cars access. Invitations to the event are to be sent informing guests of the closure and suggesting the appropriateness of a taxi.

Road Running Championships

The Glenhantly Athletics Club will once again be hosting the Victorian Road Running Championships at the Caulfield Racecourse on Saturday, May 27, 1989. The Caulfield Council has given approval for the event which has been well conducted in the past and attracted a strong field of athletes and supporters.

Legal Officer for City Hall

Ms Anna Norgard has commenced duties as Legal Officer on a casual basis with the Caulfield Council. Ms Norgard has already met with Council Officers who make regular demands on the legal service and is analysing the work load to determine future requirements

Longer hours for Carnegie Toilets

The public toilets in Kokaribb Rd, Carnegie, which are located within the carpark to the Safeway Supermarket, will be open from approximately 8am till 5pm on Saturday's. The manager of Safeway has agreed to opening and closing the toilets each Saturday.

Proposed Skillshare Project

A comprehensive program to enable long-term unemployed people to obtain and retain employment or to proceed to further education or community based skill training is proposed for the Caulfield/Malvern Municipalities. A joint submission for funding has been approved by the Caulfield Council and will go ahead.

Council Supports Darby Application

Caulfield Council have supported applica-

tions for an 'extended hours permit' and amendments to the existing Liquor Licence of Darby's Hotel in Derby Rd, East Caulfield. The application has been made to the Liquor Licensing Commission.

Cromwell Street Offices Approved

Council has granted Linkwell Pty Ltd permission to erect a three story office block with basement and undercroft parking on land at 1 Cromwell Street, Caulfield. The land is zoned for office development under the provisions of the Caulfield Planning Scheme. The building will be set back from the street in sympathy with the surrounds and proposed carparking space is for 30 cars.

Lilly Pilly Trees to Stay

After considering reports from its Urban Design Section the Council has decided not

to remove the 18 Lilly Pilly trees in Doris Street, Murrumbeena. A number of residents had requested that the trees be removed because they considered them a safety hazard due to the berry drop.

However Council, whilst sympathetic to the problems caused by these trees considered that their value to the streetscape and the general community is considerable. In line with the Council's Residential Street Tree Strategy the Lilly Pilly's will be replaced gradually with other species as they die off.

Bus For Adults Day Centre

Council has approved an application to Community Services Victoria for the purchase of a suitably modified 20 seater bus to transport residents attending the Adult Day Activities Centre in Freeman Street, Caulfield. The majority of these people will be unable to travel independently to and from the Centre therefore this service would be a great asset to them. The application also includes a provision for on-going running costs of the vehicle.

Debbie, who won gold for Australia in the Women's 400 Metres Hurdle at the Seoul Olympics, attends the Club regularly.

According to Club members she is ever ready to help out with training and support and always willing to run in Club relays. "Debbie has always been a good Club athlete", said Davin, "She is always ready to help the young ones and the children think she's just great".

Glenhantly also had two other Club members at Seoul.

Pat Scammell, who ranked 10th in the

World in 1500 Metres before the Games, did not perform at his best and was eliminated in the heats.

Second claim Club member, Steven Monegetti who is trained by the Glenhantly distance coach and former Olympian, Chris Wardlaw finished 5th in the Marathon.

It was an outstanding effort for Monegetti who has only run three marathons in his athletic career.

Former Club member Robert De Castella, regarded world-wide as one of the most consistent marathon runners finished 8th in the event.

Glenhantly has had an outstanding year, both with its Club Olympians

and on a local level.

It won the Road and Cross-country Victorian Premiership this year making it seven years in a row it has achieved this honor.

With the Winter season over the Club is gearing up for the forthcoming track season which begins on October 15 at Duncan McKinnon Reserve. The Club has teams in A,B,C, and D Grades as well as Under 18's and Juniors.

Club training nights are conducted by Alan Gill and Greg Donan on Monday and Wednesday nights, 7pm till 8.30pm.

Poath Road Kerb Projections

Madam,

The concrete kerb and traffic channels presently being placed at four points in Poath Rd, Hughesdale, are both unnecessary and dangerous. I imagine the idea is to delineate the Hughesdale Shopping Centre. The peninsular kerbings are currently half formed in concrete and will allegedly cost \$12,000.

Already there have been four traffic accidents from running into the edging, one involving injury, resulting from the new kerb being too low to be seen.

A parked car, one to two metres high, can be

seen and avoided. Outside the Hughesdale Service Station, no car can park at the kerbside where two cars could previously park. Possibly eight cars in all will be deprived of parking if the kerbs remain. For a small shopping area road-side parking is essential.

Since Poath Rd is a busy through-way between Dandenong Rd, Chadstone and North Rd, we need all the clearway possible to park, back and turn with respect to passing cars. Please let's not obstruct it.

Council Saves Through Purchasing Scheme

A report reviewing the Council's involvement in the Metropolitan Area Purchasing Scheme shows that major savings were made on many Council contracts.

Savings have been made on such products as distillate, unleaded and super petrol, motor vehicles, copy paper and many other products.

Caulfield City Council was accepted into the MAPS Group and commenced purchasing through the scheme on January 1 this year.

The Scheme allows the group to make bulk purchases for a number of products that are used by all participating municipalities.

The Caulfield Council has therefore recommended that purchasing be continued through the Scheme.

They anticipate an estimated saving for the next financial year of more than \$30,000.

It's Barbeque Time Again!

With the introduction of the new by-laws covering the use of incinerators and barbeques some Caulfield residents have been a little unsure of when they could 'throw a prawn on the barbie' this Summer.

Barbeques which use gas or electricity as the fuel or heating medium have no restrictions placed upon them and are able to be used at any time.

Wood fired or other types of barbeques can also be used at any time except on days of total fire ban or smog alert days. The only stipulation on the location of these barbeques are that they have to be one metre or more from fence lines.

75 YEARS A CITY

The City of Caulfield has reached the grand old age of 75 years. On July 28 this year Caulfield celebrated the 75th Anniversary of it being declared a city.

With due regard to the solemnity of the occasion the Council has declared that from July 1988 until July 1989 shall be deemed Caulfield's 75th Anniversary Year.

It was on Saturday, July 28, 1913 that the Governor of the day, Sir John Fuller proclaimed the City of Caulfield from the Town Hall steps.

He said, "In declaring the Town of Caulfield, for it is a Town, to be a City, I made it such", he said, "But do not be mistaken by the use of the personal pronoun. It is you and not myself that has made these Cities what they are today. I wish you God-speed and good luck and may the shadow of Caulfield never grow less".

A trumpet fanfare was heard and then His Excellency called upon the packed Town Hall to give three cheers for the

City of Caulfield. This was followed by cheers for the Governor.

The proclamation was the result of moves instigated by the Mayor of the day, Cr. Hugh Thomson at the April meeting of the Council. It was at that meeting that he gave Notice that at the next ordinary meeting of Council he would move that steps be taken to proclaim the Town a City.

Seventy five years on we have the opportunity to look at the changes that have occurred in the City since its proclamation. Caulfield has gone from a population of 13,000 in 1913 to more than 71,000 in 1988. Increased European migration since the War has changed the population base significantly, giving the City an ethnic diversity and color.

While moving forward, Caulfield has lost none of its early charm.

A newspaper in 1913 declared the suburb to be 'one of the healthiest in Melbourne with picturesque outlooks on all sides. There has been no congested settlement and in the open centres of the municipality there is a perfect site for a model garden suburb'. The same can certainly be claimed today.

The buildings and events that form Caulfield's history have also been maintained.

Ripponlea and Labassa being but two examples of the City's magnificent architecture and the famous Caulfield Cup is renowned Australia wide.

Caulfield has been able to move with the times while keeping in touch with its past. In its 75th year this is perhaps the City's major achievement. Hopefully the same will be true in another 25 years as it celebrates 100 years.

City Office Extensions Green Network



Centenary Hall staff are re-located in what will eventually be a passage through to the new building.

The Council is inviting building companies to submit preliminary designs and costings for a three to four level extension to the existing City Hall.

The extension will be located in the area of the

old Centenary Hall which has provided temporary accommodation for Council staff for many years.

The building is now sub standard and is expected to be demolished later this year.

Mayor, Emil Braun, said that the Council had commissioned a design brief to ensure the extensions were 'site sensitive' and particularly sympathetic to the existing City hall.

"The matter will be

further considered when submissions are received and developers will have flexibility in putting forward a design and construction package", he added.

The Victorian Government has announced plans to create a 'green network' of inter-linking parks and bicycle/pedestrian pathways throughout the metropolitan area.

The Open Space Plan for Melbourne contains a vision of an unbroken green network based mainly on the city's wa-

terways and coastline.

Work done over recent years includes projects costing more than \$30 million along the Yarra and Maribyrnong Rivers. Since 1982 the total amount of open space in the metropolitan area has increased from 28,700 hectares to 32,190 hectares.

Although the official had no time to make contact with our Council herself she was very impressed both with Caulfield and the people she met here.



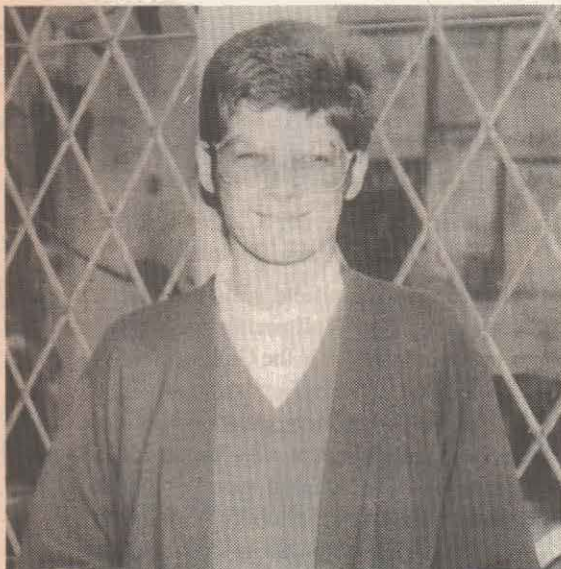
As part of its Community Liaison activities the Caulfield City Council has a Community Caravan which is positioned once a year in each of the major shopping centres within the City.

brance of Swedish Diplomat, Raoul Wallenberg.

Wallenberg saved some 100,000 Jewish lives in Hungary during World War Two but was arrested by the Russians in 1945. Despite international efforts to secure his freedom his whereabouts are still unknown.

To draw attention to this

issue the Raoul Wallenberg postcards were launched last year by the B'nai B'rith with proceeds being allocated for the planting of trees throughout the community.

These trees are known as 'The Wallenberg Trees' and the first of them will be planted in the Hawthorn Rd side of the lake.

\$8 Million Boost for Holmesglen

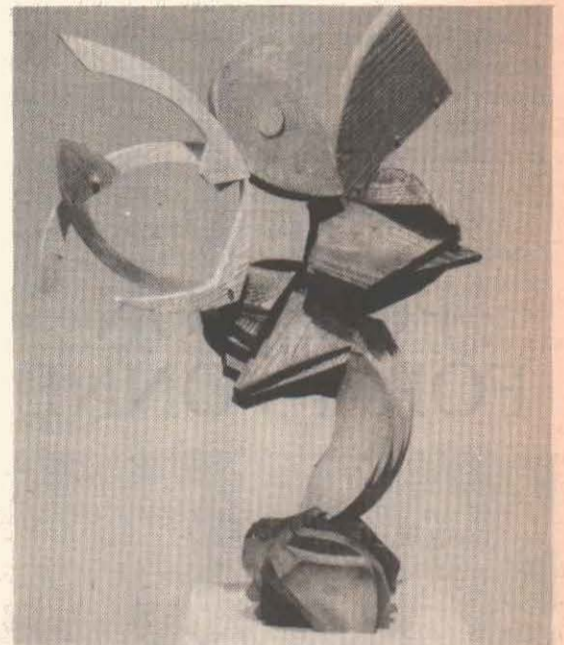
Surrealists Feature

This was purchased by the library with money

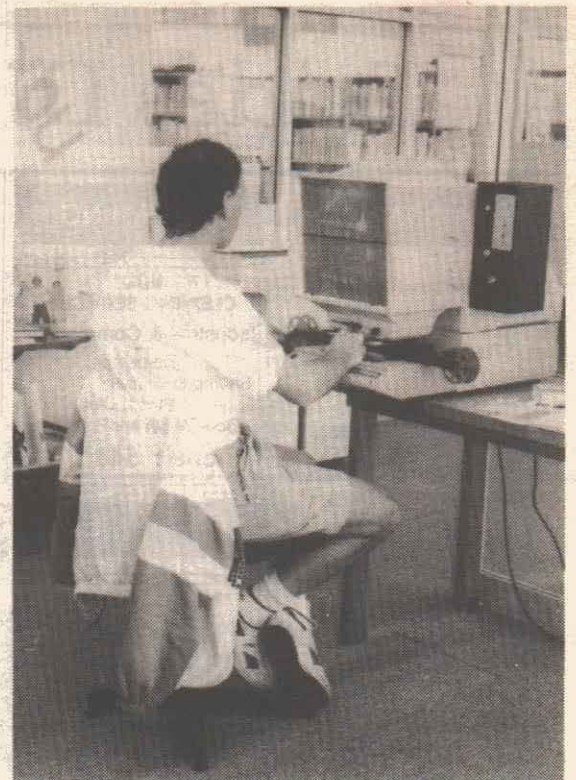
made available by the Bi-Centennial Authority.

On the pizza side customers have 15 different choices of topping. These range from a simple tomato, cheese and basil to the more sophisticated 'Toto's Super Special' with

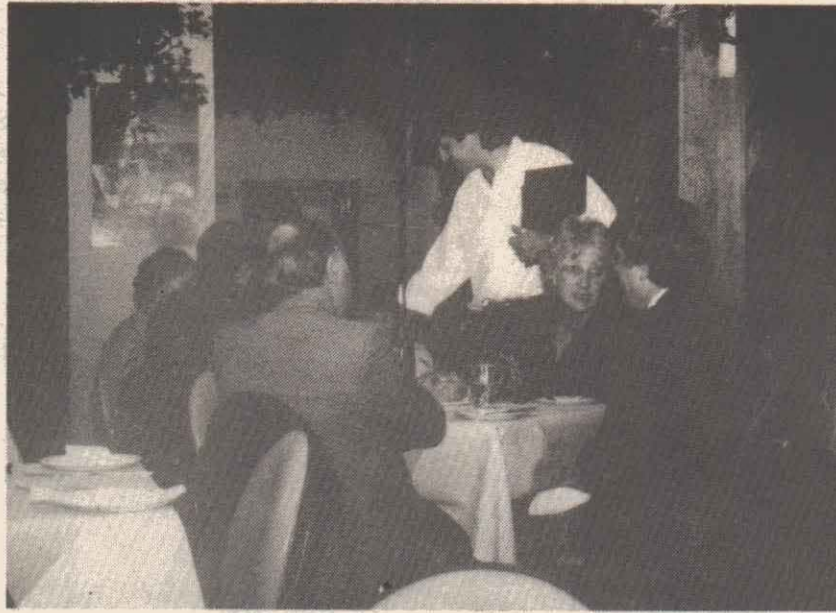
tomato, cheese, salami, hot or mild peppers, olives, mushrooms, prawns and oysters.

Prices ranged from \$6 to \$9.50 for entrees, \$6 to \$9.50 for pasta, \$11 to \$18 for main courses and \$2.80 to \$5 for sweets.

We opted for a dozen natural oysters and a

plate of antipasto to begin with. The oysters were very fresh and traditionally presented with a seafood sauce. The antipasto was fairly basic but quite acceptable.

For main course we shared pizza's with different toppings and a serve of cannelloni with meat sauce. The pizza's were of a reasonable quality and the cannelloni was delicious.

The only problem with the main course was that it seemed to take forever to arrive and the pizza's were served quite a while before the cannelloni. This is poor organization in a restaurant,

especially when customers that arrived well after us were enjoying their meals before we did. The staff available did their best but unfortunately with the number of customers it just wasn't good enough.

Sweets at Toto's are of the basic kind. They include a choice of Italian ice creams such as cassata and tartufo, cheese cake, chocolate mousse, creme caramel and apple strudel - fine for a restaurant such as Toto's. Pancakes are a specialty of the house.

As I was not satisfied with the service on the Saturday evening I decided to take a second

visit for lunch during a week day.

Manager Allan Madi was the waiter of the day and did a superb job. Perhaps the answer for busy evenings would be for him to take the floor and boost the number of staff available.

Once again I chose cannelloni for main course but this time opted for a lighter tomato sauce instead. The meal was delicious, a perfect choice for a lunchtime dish. A cappuchino was all that was needed to round off the meal.

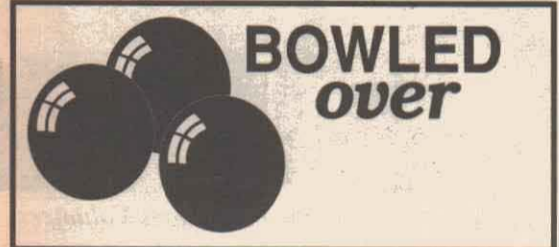

Community work offers Mavis Edwards satisfaction in her retirement

Mavis Edwards is a person who enjoys challenges.

As a voluntary worker for the Caulfield Citizens Advice Bureau she certainly gets many of them.

She said, "When I'm on duty I never know what kind of question I might be asked next. From the simple to the complex - we get asked everything and anything".

Mavis has been involved in the Caulfield CAB since 1975 when she was still lecturing full-time at Toorak Teachers College (as it was then known).

Because of her day-time commitments she was then working on the night roster but since her retirement in 1980 Mavis has mainly been involved in day-time duties.

Mavis believes her voluntary job has given her a greater awareness of the community she lives in.

She said, "I now have an understanding of the different range of problems affecting people in the community and what services and organisations may be able to help them".

Mavis stressed however that CAB workers are not trained counsellors.

Challenge and Community Commitment

"Even though we are involved in establishing the basis of a problem we do not counsel but merely refer people in the right direction", she said.

This direction may be as simple as someone to re-knit the band on a elderly man's jumper or as complex as referring a single mother with no food for her children to someone who can help her

Mavis also enjoys the

contact she has with other CAB workers. She said, "I get a lot of satisfaction from meeting and working with different people and would recommend working with the CAB to anyone who is looking for a challenging interest".

CAB workers come from every walk of life.

The main attribute they need to have is to like meeting and talking to lots of people. Through training they then develop skills in interviewing and information retrieval which enable them to point people in the right direction to solve their problems.

The time involvement (after training) is one half day per week or one full day per fortnight.

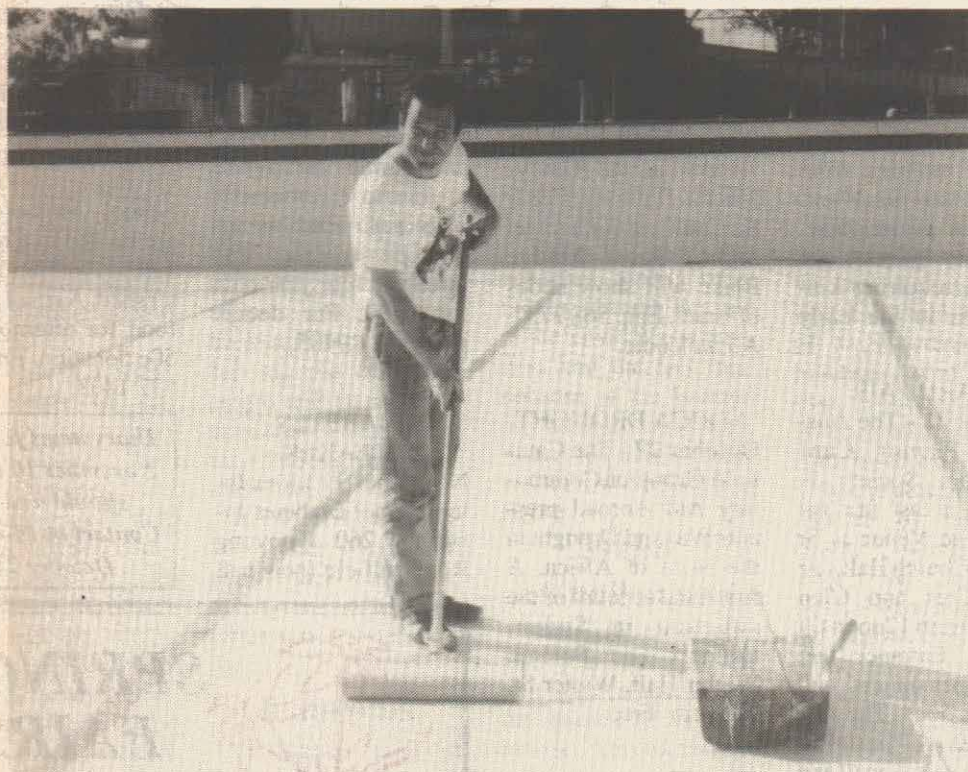

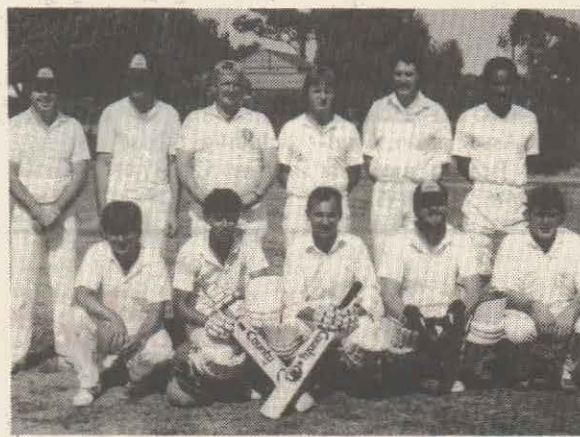
