

Post Office Permit Sought

As there have been many enquiries of late about the future of the old Elsternwick Post Office the Caulfield Council is happy to announce that plans for its restoration and upgrading are well under way.

The Council has lodged a Town Planning Permit application with the Ministry of Planning and Environment and this process will provide ample opportunity for resident input to the project. Plans will be available and on exhibition, during this time, at the Ministry and also the Caulfield City Offices.

Because of the high level of community interest the Council is concerned that residents are kept informed of the progress of the Post Office improvements.

"Not only will the project provide revenue and investment benefit to the community as a whole," said Caulfield's Mayor Cr. Emil Braun, "but it will also contribute to the well being of

the Elsternwick Shopping Centre."

Already the Chamber of Commerce has said that while the building remains in its present state it is not contributing to the area at all. They have expressed their support for the project and feel that improving and preserving the Post Office for commercial use in the way that is planned will, in fact, strengthen and

improve the viability of the shopping centre.

Discussions have also been held with the

Heritage Branch of the Ministry for Planning and Environment and as a result changes have already been made to the original proposal.

The Council is conscious of the need to preserve the heritage of this old building and the changes reflect the comments and suggestions of the officers of the Heritage Branch.

It is the Council's intention to restore, upgrade and extend the building to enable use of the ground floor for one or more shops with the first floor being set aside for office space.

When completed the Old Post Office building will be a reminder of the splendour of yesterday but it has been planned with tomorrow in mind.

Family Picnic Day Success

The City of Caulfield's Family Picnic held in Ripponlea's beautiful gardens was a great success.

Subsidy Furor Continues

Caulfield City Council has protested strongly about the Road Traffic Authority discontinuing its two thirds subsidy for school crossing supervisors at seven sites in Caulfield.

Caulfield's Chief Executive Officer, Mr Douglas Aylen said, "the RTA is withdrawing safety measures from schools where children have become accustomed to such protection".

The Authority has fallen back on its minimum guidelines to justify the changes. These have remained virtually unchanged since the inception of the School Crossing Subsidy Scheme some 14 years ago.

Mr Aylen said he believed the withdrawal of funding was widespread with the cost to Local Government being quite substantial should it chose to pick up the shortfall.

The seven affected school crossings are in Balaclava Rd, Kooyong Rd, King St, Poplar St, Bundeera Rd, Marara Rd and Poath Rd.

Schools affected are Malvern Girls School, Malvern Primary School, Caulfield North Primary School, Adass Israel School, Caulfield Primary School, Caulfield South Primary School, Oakleigh Technical School and Hughesdale Primary School. Caulfield is not the only municipality to have its school crossing scheme being thrown into chaos by the RTA's decision.

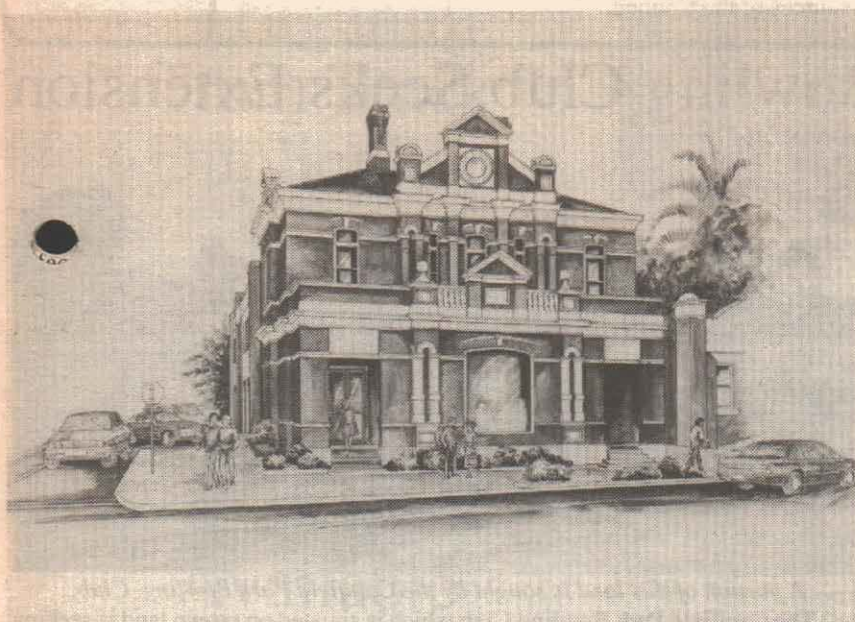
The Metropolitan Municipal Association has been strongly lobbying the RTA regarding the new subsidy guide-

lines on behalf of many of its members.

This has resulted in the RTA agreeing to call an urgent meeting between themselves, relevant municipal associations and the Ministry of Education.

This meeting will focus on the overall administration of the system, proposed revision to the guidelines and discussion of the oncost aspect.

The RTA agreed in a telephone conversation with the MMA that revisions to the guidelines would have to be made.

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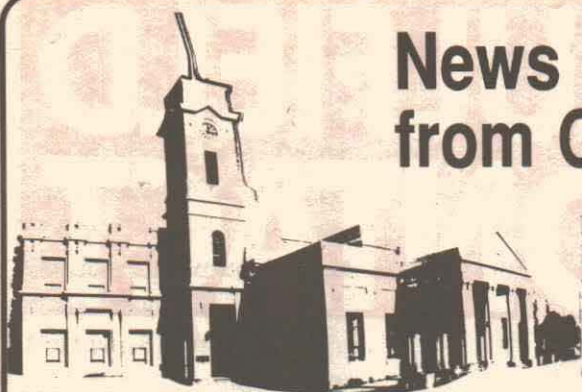
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News from Council

Manager Resigns

Caulfields builders and developers will be sorry to hear that the Council's Manager Planning, Stephen Head, has tendered his resignation. Steven has accepted a position with John Holland Ltd. He leaves for greener pastures on November 18 after being with the Council for four years.

He has expressed his appreciation to the Council for the experience he has gained in his time at Caulfield and commented favourably on the professionalism of the officers in the Planning and Building Sections of the Council.

Longer Hours for Freeman Street

The Freeman Street Day Care Centre will soon be moving to a five days a week operation. The new supervisor, who commences work later this month, will have her work cut out for

her organising volunteer helpers and activity officers and assessing the new clients.

The Centre will provide a day care activity and support program for frail older people, the confused elderly and head injured people and will be operational in the new year.

Elsternwick Toilets

Following of a series of complaints the public toilets in Elsternwick were closed and alternative facilities were provided at the Library.

Because of vandalism and a number of other problems this arrangement has proved unsatisfactory. The subterranean toilets have been opened again but for daytime use only.

Meeting Guidelines

The Chairman of the Executive Services Committee, Cr Bloom,

has distributed guidelines for public participation at his committee meetings. The guidelines do not make any changes to Council policy but assist in clarifying meeting procedures for the many members of the public who attend these meetings.

It has, for many years, been the Council's policy to invite all interested parties to attend committee meetings. They are given the right to address the committee on agenda items in which they have an interest. Because of the large numbers involved at the Executive Services Committee, over recent months, there has been some confusion. These guidelines should be a help to all parties and perhaps even mend a few frayed tempers.

Liquor Licence

The time constraints of the new liquor licencing rules made it impossible for the Council to hear public comments on the extension of the Ormond Football Club Liquor Licence before it was approved.

Resident concerns, however, have been con-

veyed to the Park Committee of Management. They will also have the opportunity of monitoring any disturbances that occur over the next 12 months and these will be taken into consideration when the licence is again up for renewal at this time.

Bowls Club Extension

The Murrumbena Park Bowls Club has made application for minor extensions to its premises. Because the Club is situated on Council land any application has to be made to the Ministry for Planning and Environment. The Council cannot itself approve such an application but has agreed to support it on behalf of the club.

No Smoking Policy

The Council recently approved a 'No Smoking' policy for the City Offices and other Council buildings and vehicles to become effective from January 1, 1989. The Council's Health and Safety Committee made this recommendation following the concern of many employees about the question of smoking in the workplace.

Specified parts of the buildings will be set

aside as smoking areas but prior to January an education program, outlining the adverse effects of smoking on health and work performance, will be conducted.

Information provided to job applicants will include a statement on Caulfield's non-smoking policy but those who smoke will not be discriminated against.

Festival no Longer Ltd

The Caulfield Festival was established as a limited company in 1982 when it moved from being an annual event of two days duration to a biennial event of around ten days. At that time there was a solid base of community support and active participation in its routine organisation. Since then community commitment has diminished and, increasingly, responsibility for its organisation has been left to Council officers.

Given these changed circumstances the company structure inhibits the smooth planning and operation of the Festival. The Council, therefore, has decided that it will no longer operate as a registered company but be fully organised from within the resources of the Council.

Notwithstanding all of this the 1988 Festival gives every indication of being very successful with encouraging evidence of high levels of Community interest.

Council Representative for Life Centre

A Bayside Committee of the Life Education Centre has recently been established to raise funds for an additional mobile caravan to cater for the schools of the Sandringham, Moorabbin, Mordialloc and Caulfield areas. The Life Education program, established by Rev. Ted Noffs, is designed to educate young people about the dangers of drug abuse.

The Council's assistance has been sought in this venture and Cr. James Barrett has been nominated as its representative.

Temporary Fire Station

The former Nu-Line Bus Service building in North Road has been approved as a temporary fire station.

This follows the rationalisation of Metropolitan Fire Brigade Services in the Metropolitan area.

The Brigade plans to build a permanent station next door.

When it is complete the old building will be demolished and the site incorporated as part of the complex.

The Council considered this to be an appropriate use of the site since the visual amenity will be largely unchanged.

The permit has been granted for a limited time only.

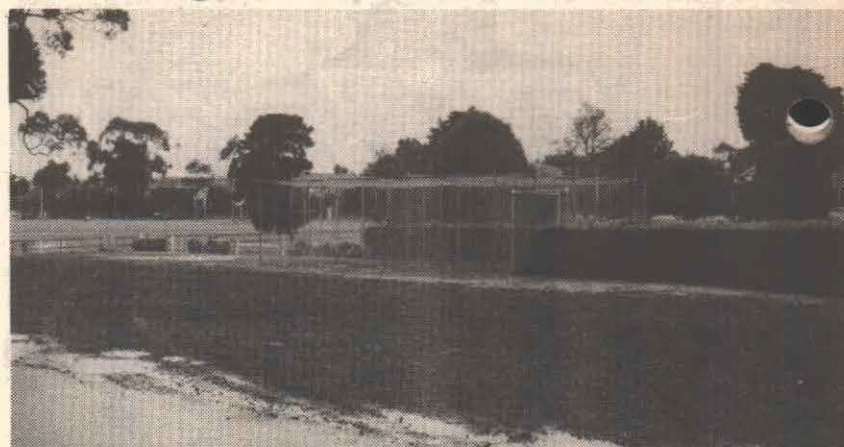
1:- Each of the clock faces in the City Hall clock is illuminated by a fluorescent tube. Recently two of these tubes

were out and these are being replaced.

2:- Council made a decision that all toilet blocks be closed of an evening to obviate increasing the number of reports of undesirable behaviour. The present means of closing is via Council's own workforce which results in closure at approximately 4.00pm on weekdays and closure on weekends.

Council has recently allocated funds to enable arrangements to be made to open the toilets during the weekends and so minimise inconvenience to residents.

Bowling Club Seeks Extension



A portion of this land is sought by the Caulfield Park Bowling Club.

The Caulfield Park Bowling Club which is situated on crown land is seeking permission to extend its facilities by an area 37x17 metres. This will allow the club to increase its number of greens and so expand its membership. Already there are some 300 members and a waiting list of about 50.

The Council will apply to the Department of Conservation Forests and Lands for approval in principle to the issue of a licence for the club to use this portion of land. If approval is received a Town Planning Permit must then be lodged with the Ministry for Planning and Environment.

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Road Maintenance Program

A vital component of Council's road maintenance program is the spray sealing of roads. This involves spraying a bitumen emulsion onto the road surface then spreading and rolling in stone aggregate to form a new surface. The water tightness of the road is restored and the skid resistance for traffic safety improved.

This year's program has already begun and will run approximately five weeks from November 2. There will be some temporary restrictions in the 140 streets being done but these will be kept to a minimum

Construction Starts on Nursing Home

Construction has begun on the City of Caulfield Spurway Nursing Home in Murrumbena Rd.

Construction progress is on schedule with completion anticipated in February, 1989.

In the meantime the Nursing Home Fund continues to grow with donations being received from;

In addition to the above, income from the sale of Spurway Homes and the winding up of the Spurway Homes Trust has now brought the total of the Nursing Home Fund to \$1,150,000.

Cr Geoff Patience, Chairman of the Nursing Home Fund Committee, said he was very pleased with the current result. However he stressed that further donations were needed to ensure the Home was properly fitted out and ready for occupation early in the new year.

Truganini Tram Track Duplication

Due to the continuing deterioration of the road surface in Truganini Rd, Carnegie and the failure of the Metropolitan Transit Authority to remedy this situation Council has decided to proceed with its proposed road construction program in the area.

This will involve resurfacing the road while matching future track levels as best as can be predicted.

More Woodchips Available

Once again Caulfield gardeners can obtain woodchips for their gardens at NO COST from the Caulfield City Council.

From 8am to 12 noon on Sunday, November 20 residents will be able to load up their trailers, car boots and garbage bags at the Dover St Nursery (just off Hawthorn Rd).

A Council operated front-end loader will be there to assist with large loads.

Caulfield Councillor David Bloom recently accepted a cheque for \$1000 on behalf of the Caulfield Council from Grimwade House, the Junior School of Melbourne Grammar.

The donation was part of the School's Bicentennial project, "Trees Across Australia", which is an initiative of the Private Junior Schools Headmasters Association.

The cheque was used by the Council to purchase 16 semi-mature Queensland Box trees for nature strip tree plantings in Orrong Rd, Caulfield which will complement the avenue effect through from Dandenong Rd.

In accepting the cheque Cr Bloom said that the project was a very worthwhile one.

"The survival of the world depends on trees" he said.

"We can help, even if in just a small way, by encouraging our children to plant trees and instill in them the importance of doing so".

Werribee farm currently processes one third of Caulfield's waste with the rest being treated at the South Eastern Purification Plant at Carrum.

The completion of the project in 1993 will upgrade the capacity of the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works to handle and dispose of increases in waste water well into the next century.



Wallenberg Trees

Federal and State Parliamentarians, dignitaries from Foreign Embassies and City of Caulfield Councillors were amongst those who attended a moving ceremony held in Caulfield Park on Sunday, October 23 at 11am.

The Raoul Wallenberg tree planting ceremony was performed by the Mayor of Caulfield, Cr. Emil Braun in honor and remembrance of Swedish Diplomat, Raoul Wallenberg.

Wallenberg saved some 100,000 Jewish lives in Hungary during World War Two but

was arrested by the Russians in 1945. Despite international efforts to secure his freedom Wallenberg's whereabouts are still unknown.

The Ceremony was organised by The Raoul Wallenberg Unit of the Victorian branch of the world-wide Jewish service organisation, B'nai B'rith.

Unit President, Michele Huppert, spoke of the debt the world owed to Raoul Wallenberg, and Lily Bret, well known author of the "Auschwitz" poems recited a tribute she had

written to Wallenberg. An appropriate plaque has been placed next to the tree.

Raoul Wallenberg postcards were launched last year by the B'nai B'rith with proceeds being allocated for the planting of trees throughout the community.

These trees are known as 'The Wallenberg Trees' and this was the first of them to be planted.

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CHILD CARE FOR 1989

Enrolments for **Child Care in 1989** at the four Children's Centres run jointly by Council and parents are now open.

Applications for **Centre Care** to commence early in 1989 will be received until November 16, 1988. **Family Day Care** enrolments (home based care) will be taken until December 23, 1988, then after January 1, 1989.

Parents must either live, work or study in the Caulfield Municipality to apply. First priority for Child Care must be given to children whose parents are working, studying or actively looking for work.

Successful applicants for Children's Centres will be notified in early December. Family Day Care applicants will be notified within a designated period after their application.

The four Children's Centres are situated at:
Caulfield (City Hall Complex), 35 children, 2-5 year olds.
Ormond (Oakleigh Rd), 25 children, 1-5 year olds.
Carnegie (Truganini Rd), 35 children, 1-5 year olds.

Funding Formula Puts Pressure on Chisholm

If the funding formula proposed by the Department of Education, Employment and Training is adopted, Chisholm Institute of Technology may be forced to lower its intake of first year students.

The Director of Chisholm, Dr Geoff Vaughan, said this in announcing that Chisholm was joining the Unified National System which was established by the Minister for Education, the Hon John Dawkins,

as part of reforms to tertiary education.

"The Institute would, however, maintain its total student load, which reflects the increased retention rates in higher education.

Hopefully some funds will be forthcoming from DEET", he said, their formula could require Chisholm to absorb the costs of about 300 students in order to maintain the 1988 intake.

Spurway-A Home Away from Home

Sue Clark is so enthusiastic about her job that she often spends half the night thinking about it.

Sue is the Nursing Home Project Officer for the City of Caulfield's Spurway Nursing Home and her position involves a myriad of duties connected with the development of the Spurway project.

Since she was appointed in December 1987 Sue has worked closely with other staff in the Domiciliary and Residential Care Section of the City of Caulfield's Human Services Division.

Together they have been associated with decisions ranging from the building design, the furnishings, staffing issues, liaison with the Health Department, designing a philosophy of nursing care and developing a volunteer program.

As a trained nurse with almost twenty years experience behind her Sue is especially interested in nursing older people and is currently completing a Graduate Diploma in Gerontology at Lincoln Institute.

Her philosophy towards the nursing care of older people is simple. She said, "I want to demonstrate to each elderly person that they are valuable and worthy of dignity and respect and every other fundamental human right normally extended to the community at large."

This is the kind of philosophy which fits with that of Spurway where the principal approach is to achieve a 'homelike' environment. The aim is to try and break down the traditional aspects of nursing home care with residents living in the familiar style of a small-scale setting while allowing for the constraints of their disabilities.

The Spurway Home is divided into three group houses - a 12 bed home for people who are physically frail but mentally alert, a 10 bed home for those who are profoundly dependent and an eight bed home for people with dementia. There will also be a small administration building immediately adjacent.

Attractively landscaped gardens and courtyards will separate each building which will have an external appearance designed to be sympathetic with housing styles in the Murrumbena and Caulfield areas.

Staff will not be expected to wear uniforms and will be hand-picked to ensure their philosophies closely match that of the Home.

Individual programs will be designed to allow each resident to function to the best of their capabilities.

Families of residents will be encouraged to participate in their lives.

"They will be invited to share in the normal day to day activities of the Home", said Sue. "If

they want to come in and cook their mum a roast on Sunday then sit down and share the meal with her they can".

All Spurway residents will enjoy the privacy of a single room and en-suites are provided for all but those who are profoundly dependent.

The decor of the home is being planned in consultation with the architects and will be classic and elegant.

In a departure from the traditional linoleum floors and vinyl furniture there will be carpets, furniture upholstered in attractive fabrics and matching curtains.

Residents rooms will be comfortably furnished with a bed, fully

upholstered chair, bedside chest and a bedside lamp. Soft furnishings will be color coordinated and residents can bring their own smaller bits and pieces to add that personal touch.

The need for new nursing home facilities within the Caulfield area had been a pressing issue for many years.

In 1987, funding approval in principle was granted from the Commonwealth Department of Community Services and Health. Further funding is being provided through the efforts of the City of Caulfield Council and donations and support from local businesses and individual citizens.

A major boost to finances came with the generous donation by the Spurway Family Trust of the proceeds from the sale of a major property in Caulfield.

Last month saw the home beginning to take shape and work is currently progressing well with an expected completion date of late March/early April 1989.

A committee headed by Caulfield City Councillor, Cr Geoff Patience and including Caulfield's Mayor, Cr Emil Braun, and Cr Jack Campbell has been working on the Spurway project with Council officers for almost two years.

It was fairly crowded for a Sunday with family groups and couples seated in both areas and a constant stream of take-away customers.

However the service was prompt and professional with the friendly staff ever ready to explain the various dishes and cooking methods used.

The restaurant is decorated Chinese style with heavy red and gold

flocked wallpaper, a decorative ceiling and Chinese light fittings. Attractive relief pictures featuring oriental scenes are hung around the walls.

The menu is an extensive one and required quite a bit of reading and discussion before a meal was chosen.

For those who are out with friends but do not want to eat Chinese there is an Australian section on the menu with fish, chicken, steak and egg based dishes to choose from.

We began our meal with a bowl of soup each. Mine was Chop Suey Hong - a chicken based soup with meat and vegetables and my partner enjoyed Wong's Special Soup with pork and chicken.

Entrees were a Spring Roll and Chicken Wing stuffed with Chinese sausage, mushrooms,

bamboo shoots and spring onions.

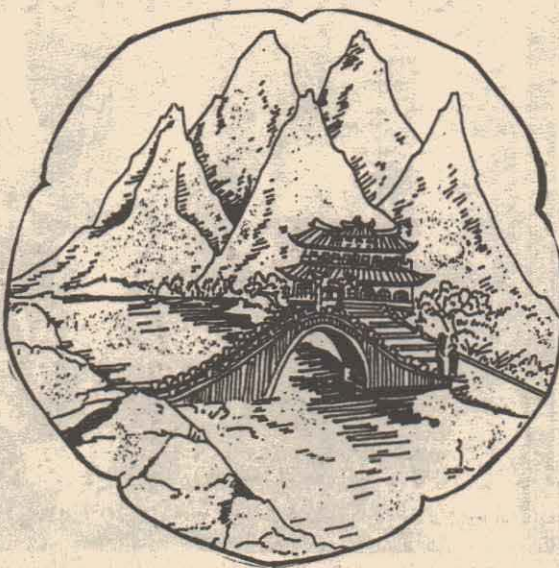
We chose a selection of main courses which were placed, Chinese style, in the centre of the table and we helped ourselves.

Dishes enjoyed were Wong's Special Fried Rice, Chicken with Snow Peas, Mushrooms and Cashew Nuts, Garlic Prawns and Sliced Fish with Vegetables.

Chinese tea was the traditional accompaniment and although I could not face another morsel my partner thoroughly enjoyed his serve of the traditional 'Aussie' style Chinese dessert - Banana Fritters and Ice Cream.

The price for this veritable banquet was a very reasonable \$38 making Wong's the perfect place for Chinese food lovers who want a reasonable night out.

A variation on choos-



ing your own meal is to select one of the four set menus available at Wong's.

For two people at a cost of \$8.30 each could try Steak with Mushrooms, Bamboo Shoots and Vegetables, Sweet and Sour Chicken in Batter, Fried Rice, sweets and tea or coffee.

Or you could lash out and spend \$12 per head on a menu consisting of Sweet Corn Soup, Braised Chicken with Mushrooms and Vegetables, Steak, Bean Shoots and Black Bean Sauce or Oyster Sauce, Sweet and Sour Pork in Batter, Fried Rice with Bean Shoots, sweets and

tea or coffee.

If you are in a party of four there is a very special one for four people. This consists of Shark Fin Soup, Chicken Wing Stuffed with Chinese Sausage, Mushroom, Bamboo Shoots and Spring Onions, Sliced Abalone, Chicken and Oyster Sauce with Steamed Lettuce, Special Prawn Balls with Champignon, Bamboo Shoots and Baby Corn, Roast Duck, Special Fried Rice, sweets and tea or coffee.

This menu is extremely good value at \$15 per person.

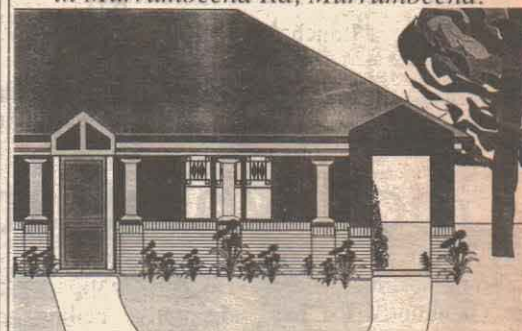
