Caulfield celebrated its 75 years as a city with a cocktail party in the Arts Complex Auditorium on Friday, March 31.

More than 600 invited guests mingled with dignitaries including the Honorable Margaret Reynolds, Minister for Local Government, the Honorable Andrew McCutcheon M.L.A., Attorney General, Victoria's newly appointed Minister for Local Government, Maureen Lyster, Mr Ted Tanner, M.L.A., and the Mayors of St Kilda, Malvern, Prahran and Brighton.

Speaking to his guests, the Mayor of Caulfield, Councillor Emil Braun said the Senator Reynolds story of the past 75 years for Caulfield could be summarised in one word the role local govern-"progress". He said, "Parks and munity and that it in fact

The Glenhuntly Primary School's 75th Anniversary celebrations were officially opened by the Mayor of Caulfield Councillor Emil Braun on Saturday, March 18.

On behalf of the organisers he extended a warm welcome to all of those in attendance, in particular those returning after many years absence.

Seventy-five years ago the Glenhuntly Primary School was established and opened its doors to 248 children.

Since that time both the school and Caulfield - the city it stands in have coped with rapid progress and huge

population increases. At one time during the 1920's the enrolment figure at this school reached 930 and average attendances were 840 with 90 children per classroom.

William Jenkin, the highly respected Head Teacher, often referred to as the 'school father' who took over the school in 1917 steered it through all the years of over-crowding and growth until 1934.

William Jenkin placed the school on a firm foundation and from his time to the present day the school has not only provided a first class primary education for its pupils but has al-

lowed them to develop in a very happy environment - an environment which enabled each child to develop his or her own particular talents.

This environment would, no doubt, have contributed to the success of past pupils such as Allen Brown, later Sir Allen Brown, the Australian Ambassador to Japan: Marie Bremner, an early pupil, who became the lead singer in the light operas of Gilbert and Sullivan, and Victorian Football League players, Neil

contributed to the success of the school has been the dedication of the school committee in its campaigns to gain benefits for the pupils. With the willing support of the local community and the Caulfield Council the committee successfully campaigned, in the early years, for greater accommodation and needed facilities and, in the latter years, for crash barriers followed by school crossings to protect the children.

### COUNCIL OPPOSED TO FAST TRAIN THROUGH CAULFIELD

After considering details of the proposed Very Fast Train Concept report for a new high speed rail system between Sydney, Canberra and Melbourne, Caulfield Council has advised that they would be opposed to any proposal which utilised any land within the Outer Circle linear park.

This would be the case if Option One which proposes the use of the "Outer Circle Railway" reserve from Hughesdale Station to east Malvern Railway Station, was adopted.

The report has been provided for consideration by both Government and the public and is the first investigative step in a long process.

Later studies and reports should provide greater certainty as to the likely route of the VFT and how this may affect Caulfield.

### LOCAL AREA TRAFFIC

In March 1985 Caulfield Council adopted a strategy for Local Area Traffic Management. Council subsequently undertook Local Area Traffic Management schemes in Local Area No 43 (bound by Coorigil, Murrumbeena, North and Koornang Roads) and Local Area No 42 (bound by Lyons St, Koornang, North and Grange Rds).

After further study it is considered that these schemes have resulted in a significant reduction in traffic volumes in the busier streets and marked reductions in traffic speeds to relatively safe levels on streets in both these areas.

### YEARLY FESTIVAL

A three day Caulfield Festival will be held this year replacing the biennial nine day one of past years.

Most municipalities run annual weekend festivals on the same weekend each year so that residents come to regard it as a regular part of their community life. It is hoped this will be the case in Caulfield and an evaluation will be undertaken after this years Festival to determine the composition

Cr McCaughey said

she had "had to learn to walk a very delicate tightrope in her role, to 'come around sideways and use the old honey trick'.

She said she felt women were particularly well suited to a role in the local government area through their insights and experiences in everyday life.

However she said the workload involved in serving as a capital city councillor was immense and brought into question the issue of what it is to be a volunteer.

"To be a councillor in a capital city and not be paid is nonsense, it virtually excludes most women trying to maintain a job", she said.

# A FIRST FOR ST STEPHEN'S

The Rev. Barbara Higgins (pictured above) is the new minister at St.Stephen's Uniting Church, Caulfield. She is the first woman minister in this parish or in its previous denominations in Caulfield in more than 80 years.

She is glad to be the minister of a congregation whose members have been actively involved in the local community over a long period of time.

One of her early memories is of travelling up Balaclava Road on a tram past St.Stephen's, before her feet reached the floor of the tram.

Barbara was previously a deaconess with the Presbyterian Church. When her children were in secondary school - her daughter was at Cato in Elsternwick and her son at Haileybury in Brighton - she enrolled at Melbourne University as a mature age student, and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree.

This was followed by a supplementary course at the Theological Hall before ordination in 1985.

Her husband is also a Uniting Church minister. He is one of the chaplains at Wesley College.

Barbara sees the Church offering a unique opportunity for people to belong to a multi-generational community, espousing values relevant to a wide diversity of people. She is concerned with the presentation of the Christian faith in ways that blend both the traditional and the innovative.

Richard's role as Youth Project Officer is more of a "hands on" task.

He acts in a liaison capacity between the Council and the youth of Caulfield and co-ordinates special projects involving the young.

He has played a key role in the successful development of many of these such as a coffee shop and drop-in centre above the recreation centre in Maple St called the Maple Tower Coffee Lounge and a popular camping program which recently saw 15 youngsters spend four days with Richard and other staff at Wilson's Promontory.

Richard and Lyn get in contact with many young people through groups such as the Southern Region Youth Action Council which is based at the Caulfield Youth Resource Centre in Maple St. This group provides counselling, information and legal advice and general advocacy.

Another group is the Youth Accomodation Workers Network which provides supported accomodation for homeless young people aged 15 to 25 in the southern region.

# MARGO HELPS OUT



In her role as Development Child Care Worker with the Caulfield City Council Margo Anderson (pictured above) wears many hats but her main one is that of a person vitally concerned with the integration of spe-

cial-needs children into the everyday life of the community. She firmly believes

that every child, regardless of their needs, should have equal opportunity and equal right of access to what the community has to

offer. Margo, who has spent 20 years working in the area of childrens needs, said one of the great difficulties of having a special needs child was the strain placed on the family into which it was born.

She said, "The best way for the community to help these families is by accepting these children as whole people not just focusing on their disabilities".

"It's vital that these childen are seen as OK and that they have a place in our society", she said.

One of Margo's main tasks in her role is the

intergration of special needs children into preschool services. Outside specialists

give advice and guidance in setting up programs within these settings in conjunction with the families of the children and integration aides work alongside each child.

Special needs children are placed in each of the Council's four childrens centres and into the family day care program.

Margo believes that Caulfield Council has led the way for local government in the area

of integrating children with special needs into council programs.

While not disputing that these little ones have a need for specialist programs and centres Margo believes that a multi-disciplinary approach works best. She said, "These chil-

dren go through enormous changes that I believe are a direct result of them taking a full part in their local community". Margo said she was

always interested in hearing from parents whose children have special needs "whatever

they may be".

She said, "We are here for a simple chat, for information, a referral or just a voice on the end of the phone when things get tough"

Margo Anderson not only believes that special needs children have a place in society, she believes they have a special place.

She said, "We gain from appreciation of their qualities such as tolerance, their stoic determination and their wonderful sense of humour".

The Shakuhachi is best known as being the instrument of the Ronin, the wandering Samurais, and Melbournians The only Melbourne would have heard it in the scores for the TV Samurai series and Kurosawa's wonderful films which began with the 'Seven Samurai'. It is an endblown bamboo flute which produces very subtle and varied sounds. The mandolin needs no introduction, except to say it became popular in Japan at the end of the nineteenth century. Japanese youth who attended universities in Europe perhaps attracted by the similarity

of the sound to the traditional eastern instruments joined the student ensembles consisting of mandolins and guitars (Estudiantinas) and brought the instruments, repertoire and the European tradition of mandolin ensembles being attached to Universities, back to Japan As well as playing concerts, the group wishes to meet musicians and lovers of Japanese music and see something of Australia on the way.
