# Roper snubs 72,000 for Ripponlea

Caulfield Council is affronted by the treatment it has received from the Minister for Planning and Environment, Tom Roper, over planning issues affecting the City of Caulfield as well as Ripponlea. Mayor, Cr. Emil Braun said:

"All of the Councils requests for a deputation have been ignored and the Council has sought the assistance of Local Member, Andrew McCutcheon, Minister for Local Government, Maureen Lyster and the Premier, to break down the barriers being put in front of the Council deputation.

It is not fair to the people who have elected us as their representatives, and the people who live around Ripponlea that Mr Roper refuses to give us an audience.

The Minister is having dialogue with the National Trust and has not seen fit to accept a Council deputation to hear the other side of the argument", he said.

"This is a democracy and it should be possible for representatives of a community the size of Caulfield to express their views on a major controversial issue.

One can only assume that the Minister is going to accept the influence of the National Trust over that of the people directly affected, as he has spoken with them and is waiting for a detailed submission from the National Trust", Cr. Braun said

Caulfield has been seeking the deputation to the Minister for several months and has received continual support from Andrew McCutcheon's office and from the Minister for Local Government who has made contact with Mr Roper's office to no avail.

In frustration, the Council has written to the Honourable John Cain to seek his support and influence in obtaining a deputation.

The letter was sent on 14th June and no reply has been received, not even an acknowledgement.

The present situation with regard to Ripponlea is that the Council has refused planning permits for the commercial uses, those being the reception rooms, kiosk and plant nursery and has met with the National Trust to discuss areas of agreement and disagreement.

Cr. Braun said "The parties at the meeting agreed to intensive negotiations for a two week period in May to sort out their differences.

Unfortunately the National Trust has not responded to requests for further information and would appear to be relying on the Minister to make a decision in their favour, ignoring Council's views entirely.

If the Minister does take the matter up on behalf of the National Trust without consideration of the community interests, it would be a travesty of the demoncratic process", Cr. Braun added.

### SPURWAY: "HOME-AWAY-FROM-HOME"

After many years of commitment by the Council and residents of Caulfield, the City of Caulfield Spurway Nursing Home was officially opened by His Worship the Mayor, Cr Emil Braun on Sunday 16th July 1989.

The Nursing Home which is situated in Murrumbeena Road, Murrumbeena, will p r o v i d e accommodation for 30 residents in a "home like" atmosphere.

Cr Braun explained this concept to the 220 guests in attendance by pointing out the problems that residents can experience when moving into large scale institutionalised buildings with long corridors and shared

space and facilities, compared to the type of environment spent over many years in their homes.

The institutional style buildings result can be disorienting and confusing for residents and often results in the residents ceasing to make decisions for themselves, with a consequent reduction in

their independence and individuality.

"The Spurway Nursing Home has been designed to overcome these problems by having separate residential houses developed on a homelike scale" said Cr Braun.

"We wished to have each unit different in character and have managed this through variations in colour, architectural details and furniture design to compensate for sensory and memory losses in a positive manner" he added.


The home-awayfrom-home atmosphere is emphasised by having a floor plan resembling a family home with bedrooms (with en-suites), sitting rooms and dining room where residents can meet or dine with family and friends. Furnishings have also been selected as if a family home was being furnished.

Cr Braun paid tribute to the Spurway Trust which was responsible for donating more than \$870,000 towards the overall cost of \$2.2 million and pointed out that in recognition of such a wonderful contribution, the Council had resolved to name the Nursing Home, the Spurway Nursing Home.

The contribution of the Commonwealth and State Governments were also acknowledged as were the many wonderful private donations made by residents and community groups.

"The continued efforts of the Carnegie Opportunity Shop, the Caulfield Voluntary Workers Shop, the City of Caulfield Lions Club and residents and staff of our three Hostels for the Aged have resulted in raising over \$270,000 which has been a m a g n i f i c a n t contribution" said Cr Braun.

At the completion of the ceremony all guests were invited to inspect the Nursing Home.

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#### Housing Strategy Adopted

Council has released its much publicised Housing Strategy and Multiple Residential Development Policy.

The draft versions of each document have been widely available since November, 1988 and were the subject of public comment considered by Council in June this year.

In a climate where social and economic discussion places 'housing' high on the agenda Council considers its new strategy and

Policy to be both innovative and responsible.

The new Multiple Residential Development Policy will be the Council's basis of assessment for all new development of two or more dwellings on a site where a planning pe rmit is required.

Policy performance objectives are deliberately flexible to allow quality innovative design but also seek to control new development so that the impact on existing surrounding housing stock is minimised.

Under Council's new policy compliance with minimum standards alone will simply not be good enough and Council will have legitimate reason to reject proposals which do not achieve the performance objectives contained in the Policy.

The Policy is effective from 1st August, 1989 and will be reviewed in two years.

It is available from Council's Planning Department.

**Local Area** Traffic Management Policy

To establish a comprehensive basis for traffic management planning throughout its municipality the City of Caulfield some four years ago adopted a number of traffic management strategies.

These strategies were established to determine the existing traffic conditions in local streets and collector roads in each of the municipality's 45 local precincts, and to determine the most suitable and feasible area wide solutions to address adverse traffic conditions which may be occurring in these streets.

Council's Traffic Engineers have now completed an extensive traffic study program of the whole municipality which has enabled a city wide data base of exisiting traffic conditions in all streets within the municipality to be compiled.

The data base resulting from these studies, which includes details of traffic volumes, traffic speeds and reported accidents has significantly strengthened Council's ability to assess and review the priority of its local areas for possible Local Area

Traffic Management works, and for expenditure allocated for such works to be directed in areas of greatest need.

In conjunction with its extensive traffic study programs, Council has implemented Local Area Traffic Management works in a number of its local ar-

Assessments of traffic conditions in these areas following such works have confirmed Council's local area or scheme approach has been effective in improving residential amenity in areas which were previously experiencing undesirable and adverse affects of through traffic and poor driver behaviour.

Traffic data will continue to be obtained throughout the municipality in order that the relative priorities of Council's local areas can be continuously monitored and reviewed as part of Council's ongoing traffic managment planning proc-

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# MAYORAL TERM 88/89

On August 9th 1988, Cr. Emil Braun, North Caulfield resident of 40 years was elected Mayor of Caulfield for 1988/89.

Almost one year has past since then. Cr. Braun said "I will step down as Mayor of Caulfield next month with a feeling of great achievement and satisfaction".

During the Mayoral Term of Cr. Emil Braun, the Council has achieved many rewarding changes, of benefit to the City of Caulfield.

The Council has continued its sound financial management and the latest budget review shows an estimated surplus of some \$91,000 on operations to 31st March, 1989. On the 16th of July Cr. Braun opened the New Spurway Nursing Home which is to be one of the best in Victoria, and a model for those to come.

It is based on the need to provide domestic rather than institutional or hospital conditions.

Furnishings and Fittings will be similar to those commonly found in the family home and there will be en-suites for most residents as well as lounge and dining areas where they can meet and eat with visitors and family.

The construction cost of \$1.8 million has been met by Government grants and donations.

Four storey extensions to the City Hall to the value of \$3.5 million have been carefully planned throughout the past year.

Construction has commenced and a foundation plaque was unveiled on the 18th of July.

Council's fourth Child Care facility has been completed in Kooyong Road opposite the Royal Southern Memorial Hospital.

Extensions to an existing house owned by the hospital have cost the order of \$280,000, with most of the capital cost being borne by the Govern-

#### NEW CHILD CARE CENTRE

The need for a Child Care facility in the west of the Municipality has been recognised for some time and was highlighted in Community Consultations which took place in all wards in 1985.

The Council did not have a suitable site and was pleased to accept the offer made by the Southern Memorial Hospital to use the premises at 269 Kooyong Road, Elsternwick on a 20 year lease.

A capital grant from Community Services Victoria has resulted in major renovations taking place to provide a well planned, purpose built centre which will cater for 35 children. The Architect, Graeme Jones and the builders M. C. Kool Construction Pty Ltd worked well to have the centre ready ahead of the project completion date and as a result the centre will be open to accept children in late August. Parent fees and a small operating grant from the Department of Community Services and Health will provide the ongoing funding for the Centre.

The Elsternwick Childrens Centre, like all of the

City of Caulfield Child Care Centres, will employ a number of staff qualified in Early Child Development as well as Child Care Workers. The Elsternwick Centre will cater for 25 children, comprising of 15 3-5 year olds, 10 2-5 year olds and 10 children under 2. There will be a limited number of places for babies.

Enrolments at the Centre will be finalised in mid August and priority of access guidelines set out by the Office of Child Care, Department of Community Services and Health will be used to determine successful applicants:

- 1. Work force participants, including parents looking for work or studying to obtain work.
- 2. Children of parents with a continuing disability or incapacity.
  - 3. Children at risk.
- 4. Children at home.

# BEFORE YOU

In July 1988, a By-Law aimed at protecting residents from pollution resulting from the effects of "burning off" and interfering with lifestyle, particularly in leisure, was introduced.

The By-Law, based on the EPA Incinerator Model By-Law stipulates requirements such as:-**Incinerator Restrictions** 

1. Hours of operation - use of incinerators are not allowed on any Friday, Saturday, Sunday, Monday or Public Holidays and on other days only between the hours of 10 am and 3 pm.

2. They are not to be lit at all on any day declared to be a Smog Alert Day or a Total Fire Ban Day.

3. Standards imposed on construction of Incin-

- they are to be made of an approved non-combustable material

- they are constructed in such a way that sparks and burning materials are prevented from spreading

they are situated at least one metre from the boundary of the property and at least three metres away from any building on the property and three metres from any dwelling or adjacent properties

- they are stable in their construction

- they are maintained in good repair

4. Articles prohibited from burning:-

- any rubbish or plaster substance

- any waste petrolium oil or any waste material containing petrolium oil

- any paints or receptacles which contained paint

- any manufactured chemicals

- any textile fabrics

- any food waste

- any material or substance in such a manner or to such an extent as to be liable dangerous to health or as to be offensive to any person

5. The practice of lighting fires in gutters to burn leaves is prohibited.

6. A permit is required for lighting fires in the open air and the nearest Fire Brigade Station shall

Such a permit as well as limiting the size, the requirement for supervision and safety standards is also restricted to the prescibed hours of operation and a fee of \$100 a day is required.

Barbeque Restrictions

1. A barbeque must be positioned one metre from the boundary

2. Gas or electricity as the fuel or heating medium barbeques are not subject to this By-Law.

3. A barbeque is not to be used on any day declared to be a Smog Alert Day or a Total Fire Ban Day.

# THINK COMMUNITY SERVICES RECOGNITION SCHEME

# Closures ...

Caulfield Council has reacted strongly to speculation that Murrumbeena and Glenhuntly police stations could be closed.

Mayor of Caulfield, Cr. Emil Braun said that the matter is of grave concern to the community. 'There are more break-ins and burglaries in Caulfield than in most Melbourne suburbs as well as a number of violent crimes and incidents of vandalism", he said, "and the presence of police in local stations helps to deter such crimes.

Government Economies of this kind don't make sense and the Government should look to major areas of financial detriment such as Tricontinental, Workcare and the VEDC to name only three,

Local people live in an area regarded as 'high risk' by insurance companies and already pay the highest burglary premium. They deserve proper police protection so that they can maintain a peaceful lifestyle", he added.

Mayor Braun said "the Council has always received co-operation and good results from officers of the two police stations, who are involved in preventing all types of crime in the area. In its efforts to preserve this service the Council will continue to strongly oppose the closure of the stations."

### **BROTHEL APPEAL!**

Council was recently un-successful in its attempt to retain a three (3) year trial condition on a planning permit issued for renewal of an existing brothel in Glenhuntly Road, South Caul-

The Administrative Appeals Tribunal (Planning Division) upheld an appeal by Marlas Studio which claimed tha t the condition which limited the operation of three years with the need to further apply at the expiration of that period, was unreasonable and unnecessary. Council felt the condition was a necessary part of the planning permit for the brothel as a trial period would have enabled its operation to be monitored and reviewed by Council as the Responsible Authority.

Although the brothel, which has been in operation for over 10 years has not been the subject of complaints to Council concernng its effect on nearly properties Council wished to retain ulti-

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# HOUSE NUMBERING

Is your property able to be identified easily by persons wishing to locate it?

There are numerous functions that rely on proper identification of houses, flats, shops and other premises from the simple daily mail delivery to more important occasions of provision of Emergency Services.

The Local Government Act places the responsibility for the property numbering system with the Council, and all initial number allocations, and thus subsequent re-numbering as a result of property re-development is administered by Council.

Where a property is not marked with the proper number, the owner may be liable to a fine and Council also has the power to affix a number and recover the cost of doing so from the owner of the property.

Council of course generally prefers to rely on co-operation of its residents and ratepayers, and their recognition of the benefits to themselves in having their property appropriately numbered for identification.

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# Interchange Southern

The local branch of the Interchange Family Programme temporarily expanded its service recently in a bid to provide a little extra help for families who have children with disabilities.

The change in service involved families listed with Interchange Southern working with second-year student nurses from Victoria College School of Nursing to provide 'real-life' training in the care of children with an intellectual, physical or sensory disability.

Students spent in total six days in homes and at school assisting with the care of an Interchange child.

Mutual beneficiaries mum Linda McDonald of Brighton and nurse Joanne Panagiotopoulos of Port Melbourne, describe the programme as having been highly rewarding.

"During the six days, I learnt more about both the physical and emotional needs of a person with a disability than I could ever have learnt from a text book," says Ms Panagiotopoulos.

"Probably the most important thing I learnt was that, if you treat people with disabilities on an equal level, after a while you stop seeing the disability and you see a person who has the same needs as everyone else."

In addition to help with the care of five-yearold Andrew McDonald, who has cerebal palsy, the McDonald family have benefitted from the training programme due to the opportunity to have real input into nurse education.

"Hopefully, this will give future nurses a better understanding of both the patient's and family's needs in a hospitalisation situation," says Mrs McDonald.

The Southern branch of the Interchange Family Programme was established in 1983 to assist families with children who have a physical, intellectual or sensory disability by providing volunteer hosts who care for a child one weekend a month, giving the family a well-earned break.

Co-ordinator Maggie Matheson says that the reason Interchange joined in the nurse education programme was two-fold.



### Who must vote?

#### Voting is compulsory for:

. All persons, over the age of 18, who are resident in the City of Caulfield and whose names appear on the municipal voters' roll; this applies whether they own property or not.

#### Voting is optional for:

- . Owners or occupiers of property within the City who live outside the Ward.
- . Persons over the age of 70 years.

#### **Adult franchise**

Following the introduction of adult franchise for Council elections it is now compulsory for all residents of the City over the age of 18 years to vote. The State Electoral Office has supplied the Council with a voters' roll containing the names of all persons, 18 years and over, eligible to vote.

This is an important development for there will now be persons eligible to vote in Council elections who have not been eligible in the past; eg. persons living at home with their parents now must vote.

In addition, the Council has prepared a second roll consisting of the names of owners and occupiers of property not resident in the municipality, together with the names of non-naturalised persons and company nominees.

## **Postal voting**

Postal voting is available for those unable to attend the polling booth on election day because of:

- absence from the municipality
- . illness or infirmity
- . conscientious objection against voting on the appointed day.

A special office has been set up at the Hawthorn Road entrance to the City Offices. It will be open between 9.00am and 5.00pm Monday to Friday from Monday, 24th July with the exception of Tuesday, 25th July, Tuesday 1st August and Thursday 3rd August 1989 when applications will be received up to 7.00pm.

No applications for postal voting will be received after 4.00pm Friday, 4th August 1989.



# Computer program wins coveted competition

DIABETES Key-facts, the diabetes education program designed for personal computers, has won first prize in an Australia-wide competition for the best computer lesson. Designed as a timesaver

for physicians, educators, and nutritionist, Diabetes Keyfacts incorporates text, colour graphics, animation, and sound effects into an "easy-to-use, no computer or typing skills needed" format. Ten lessons cover most aspects of diabetes and progress reports are provided.

Diabetes Keyfacts was produced by Dr Matt Cohen, Deputy Director of the International Diabetes Institute in Melbourne, which is now marketing the program itself.

The use of CAI as part of an education program is a very efficient use of limited resources. Computers are always friendly and forgiving, have endless patience, and (apart from blackouts) have energy to work 24 hours a day if needed, without breaks. Studies of CAI, both in diabetes and in other areas, demonstrate that CAI in better knowledge retention rates and at half the learning time, compared to conventional education.

### **BOOK REVIEW:**

# The Shipwrecked Camel

Caulfield identity, Yehuda Svoray, has put together an anecdotal account of a rather hectic life in his new book, 'The Shipwrecked Camel'.

"The book evolved out of the fact that a lot of family happenings are not passed onto future generations", Yehuda says. "Originally it was a family history only of interest to my immediate family. What it became was an opportunity to tell of the whole period."

The book traces Yehuda's life, growing up as Heinz Sobersky under a fledgling Nazi regime, through his family's escape from Germany to Palestine and finally to his experiences working in a Kibbutz. Throughout it all he maintains his good humour in a style motivated by his belief that "truth is no less true when spoken with a smile".

"The problem with the usual histories," Yehuda says "is that they are very dry or theoretical. Writing with a smile reveals more truth because you can't be too pompous. There is a dearth of humerous books these days. I think some Australian writers take themselves much too seriously."

For Yehuda, one of the most important times in his life was his work on Kibbutz. "Kibbutzs have taught Israel's youth a lot of good values despite the problems", he says. "The Kibbutz has helped develop Israel as well as the individual."

Yehuda went to work on a Kibbutz when as a young man he joined the Youth Movement in Palestine. "Going to the Youth Movement was the revolt of the day", he says. "It was a remarkable period when the left really felt that they had sewn up the solutions to all the world's problems."

"It wasn't just talk", he continues. "Through the Kibbutz we had created a new society."

At this stage Yehuda's wife, Rachel, enters the

conversation. "You have to understand" she says "that those on the Kibbutz considered themselves a political elite. Many young Israelis wouldn't believe the hard work and toughness required to live in a Kibbutz back then. They just wont believe the book."

'The Shipwrecked Camel' leaves Yehuda at this juncture, coming to terms with life in the Kibbutz. It promises to tell of how Heinz Sobersky eventually landed himself in Australia, "but that", he insists, "is another story".

For my part, the book is a very good read. It makes little attempt to explain the upheavals of the time, prefering instead to describe history from the perspective of a boy growing up. That perhaps is its charm.

# **NURSING MOTHERS** RAISE \$500 FOR CAULFIELD HEALTH CENTRES

The Caulfield-Carnegie Branch of the Nursing Mothers Association of Australia has presented a cheque for \$500 to Caulfield's Maternal and Child Health Centres.

Group Leader, Josephine Biggs, said "The donation has been made because her group wanted to make a direct and meaningful contribution to the local community, which had so actively supported and encouraged NMAA."

"NMAA, 25 years old this year, is an Australian wide body providing essential counselling and support for young mothers.

The Health Department of Victoria today announced the introduction of a new vaccine that would protect children from measles, mumps and rubella with one injection.

Minister for Health, Ms Caroline Hogg, said the triple vaccine for measles, mumps and rubella (MMR), will replace the current measles/mumps vaccine to help reduce the risk of children contracting rubella.

"At present, the rubella vaccine is only given to school girls in Year 6 and to non-immune women of childbearing age," Ms Hogg said.

Local Caulfield Council Health Surveyor, Bernie Heffernan, said MMR should be given to all children at 12 to 15 months in order to keep the level of protection high in both sexes. Only by immunising both boys and girls can epidemics be avoided.

"A single dose of vaccine will produce longterm immunity in more than 90 percent of children, if the child is more

than a year old," Mr Heffernan said.

"A child who has previously had measles, mumps or rubella could still be safely vaccinated.

"In that case, the vaccine would be neutralised by existing antibodies, or would act as a booster to the child's natural immunity."

Ms Hogg said immunisation played a key role in reducing the amount of disease, premature death, and disability in the commu-

"The MMR vaccine has been used for some time worldwide, so it's safety and positive protective results have been proved," she said.

Immunisation with MMR will be available free from local councils throughout Victoria from July 3, 1989.

Immunisation programmes are run by council health teams consisting of maternal and child health nurses, health surveyors and medical officers.
