Elsternwick submission completed

CAULFIELD Council will lodge its submission on the Elsternwick station redevelopment with the Elsternwick Station Reference Group on November 9.

The deadline for submissions was extended from October 26 to November 9 after the council told the reference group the earlier date did not allow sufficient time for public consultation.

In a draft submission which was prepared late last month, the council said any future development of the Elsternwick station site should be predominantly residential.

"The opportunity exists for residential development at this site at a higher density than would be suitable elsewhere due to the site's proximity to public transport, shopping facilities and open space.

"The encouragement of residential development would contribute towards improving the viability of the centre."

Elsternwick shopping centre is Caulfield's main retail and commercial centre. The retail core of the centre is to the east of Elsternwick railway station.

The submission said no development should proceed on parkland or open space to the east of the railway line.

"The small parkland off Riddell

Parade extending through to Glenhuntly Rd should be maintained at all costs and preferably enhanced and strengthened through sympathetic design features."

Traffic management was one of the council's major concerns, and the submission stressed that the proposed redevelopment should have a minimal effect on nearby arterial roads and intersections.

The submission also recommended adequate on-site parking.

The council wants to ensure that any development will be architecturally compatible with the general area and complementary to the existing shopping centre.

"The council is keen to see that the viability of the Elsternwick Shopping Centre is maintained and improved.

"Therefore, the role of the centre should be strengthened within the existing infrastructure.

"It would be undesirable and contrary to State Government policy to significantly enlarge the centre, thereby upgrading its function and placing added stress on existing, long-standing tenants and operators."

Member for Caulfield Mr Ted Tanner also has made a submission to the reference group.

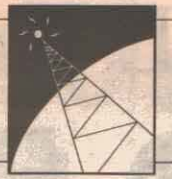

Wheelchair frustrations

IMAGINE your frustration if you were in a wheelchair and wanted to enter a shop, bank or office, only to find your entrance was barred by a step.

While most people don't give a second thought to steps, automatic doors or heavy doors, they can pose huge problems for people in wheelchairs.

Once they do make it inside, people in wheelchairs then have to do battle with high counters, shelves and narrow aisles.

Merchandise displays on footpaths can also cause problems for these people.

The Caulfield advisory com-

mittee for people with disabilities has just announced the winners in its 1990 Good Access Awards.

The awards were introduced to make local businesses more aware of the pitfalls disabled people face while going about their everyday business.

The committee surveyed all Caulfield business premises and identified those with good access.

At the committee's annual general meeting on November 27, a total of 27 businesses will receive certificates of appreciation and one business will be presented with a plaque for the 1990 Good Access Award.

Disabled advisory group reports an innovative year

THE 1990 AGM of the Caulfield advisory committee for people with disabilities promises to be an informative event.

This year has been an exciting and innovative year for the group, which has undertaken many worthwhile projects.

The committee ran an information stall at the 1989 Caulfield Festival, which allowed able-bodied people to negotiate an obstacle course in wheelchairs, to experience the problems disabled people face when on crowded footpaths.

A talking-book format for the successful "Shopping From Home" guide was produced as well as an updated hard copy edition, and thanks to publicity through Radio 3RPH, has found its way to disabled users.

A new access map for the City of Caulfield is underway, thanks to funding from Caulfield Community Education Group, and lots of hard work from people at the Caulfield General Medical Centre, who did the preliminary field work for a pilot map of the shopping centres catering for wheelchairs.

The committee has sought out speakers at its monthly meetings to provide information on Council by-laws, the work of the southern region Community Services Victoria office and dealing with the CES.

The committee has advised the Council on disabled parking spaces, redesigning footpath treatments, access to and from Caulfield shopping centre and the Elsternwick toilet block.

As well, the committee has lobbied local businesses to provide better access to their shops.

Members have worked hard on a joint submission to CSV to provide a worker to help develop the work of advisory committees within Melbourne's south-eastern region.

The advisory committee was set up in 1982 to advise the Council on disability issues concerning residents.

The 1989-90 AGM will be held at the recreation hall, Caulfield General Medical Centre, Kooyong Rd, on Tuesday November 27 at 8pm. It will be chaired by Caulfield's deputy mayor, Cr Veronika Martens, and the guest speaker will be Helen Lewis from Southern Citizens Advocacy.

Heritage survey commended

Some places have state significance

CAULFIELD heritage watch committee has commended a preliminary survey of buildings in Caulfield carried out by Mr Andrew Ward for the Council.

At its recent meeting, the committee congratulated the council for having the survey done.

Committee secretary Cr David Spencer said the committee hoped the survey would lead to a heritage conservation plan in Caulfield.

The survey of 34,000 buildings in Caulfield identified 11 buildings of state significance, 44 of regional significance and 96 of local significance - all worthy of further study and probably preservation.

"A further 590 buildings of local significance may deserve protection if they are in an identified historic area," Cr Spencer said.

The Council will publicise the survey results and consult with the public before considering the development of a heritage management plan.

Minister for breakfast

MUNICIPAL electoral tribunals, funding cuts and Sultana Bran were on the menu when local government minister Maureen Lyster visited Caulfield Council for a breakfast meeting last month.

Mrs Lyster, who was accompanied by her secretary Jan Morrison, met with Councillors and Council officers for the two-hour meeting.

Subjects Mrs Lyster raised at the meeting included Council boundary changes, the difficulties in

planning regional dumping facilities, funding cuts to Jewish kindergartens, the Elsternwick Station redevelopment and the benefits of redeveloping inner metropolitan areas instead of the outer fringes.

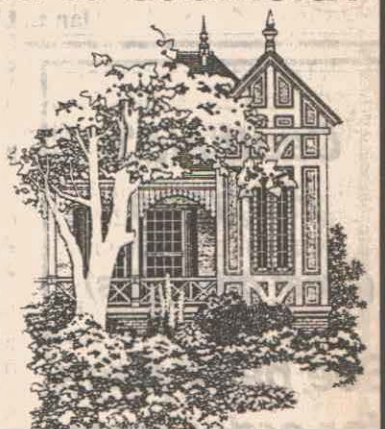

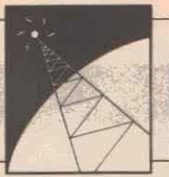

Public question time may be introduced

CAULFIELD Council may introduce a public question time at council meetings.

If the proposal goes ahead, a question box will be put into the chamber and the public will be able to drop in questions, which will be read out at the meeting.

A report on the proposal has been deferred to a meeting of the Council's policy and environment committee on November 13.

At that meeting, a further report will be submitted detailing the way questions will be delegated to various councillors for response.

The Council's chief executive officer, Mr Doug Aylen, said one aspect which set Caulfield apart from other councils surveyed for this proposal was the relatively short duration of its council meetings.

"Some difficulties may be encountered with the time constraints

placed upon gallery members to submit questions and officers time to peruse those submitted," he said.

To allow for this, the committee has set out procedure guidelines.

It is anticipated that public question time will follow the present questions with or without notice on the agenda.

People can submit one question in writing on forms provided.

The forms must supply the questioner's name and address and must be signed.

Questions can be directed to the Council generally, a specific councillor or a council officer.

Questions will be collected about 15 minutes after the start of the meeting and read by the director corporate services who will recommend to the Mayor questions he considers appropriate.

All questions and answers will be

brief and no discussion on these will be allowed.

The Mayor may defer any questions until the next ordinary council meeting to research an answer or request referral to an advisory committee for a further report.

The Mayor also may decide that a written response is appropriate.

Mr Aylen said the above procedure would enhance the Council's policy of open and responsive government and decision making.

The Council had a similar procedure when it operated under its old by-laws, where the public could submit questions to the town clerk at least six days before the meeting.

However, this became ineffective after the Council introduced open committee meetings, where the public could address the committee on agenda items.

People sought for sister city committee

CAULFIELD Council is keen to hear from people interested in nominating for the Friendly Cities Advisory Committee.

The committee has been established to boost links between Caulfield and its Japanese sister city, Ogaki.

The Council's chief executive officer, Mr Doug Aylen, said the Council wanted to hear from people who could contribute something useful to the committee.

"We want people from the community who have a keen interest in furthering the cultural exchange between Caulfield and Ogaki," Mr Aylen said.

"We are looking for people with expertise to contribute - people like teachers, service club representatives and people interested in hosting Japanese visitors."

A group of Japanese adults will visit Caulfield between February 15 and 20 next year. The visit will be hosted by the Caulfield Lions Club and, in return, the Ogaki Lions Club will host a party of Australian horticulturalists sponsored by Caulfield Lions.

A group of Caulfield high school students will visit Ogaki in September next year. Their visit is being planned by the Rotary Club of Caulfield-Rosstown.

Payment claims rejected

CAULFIELD Council has rejected state government claims that changed payment timetables for grants will not impose a financial burden.

Council chief executive officer, Mr Doug Aylen, said the Council would lose about \$40,000 in interest with changes in the timing of state government grants to local government.

Previously, pensioner rates concessions and municipal library subsidies were paid to municipalities twice a year. Now the grants will be paid in July only.

The state government has said it will increase some grants by between 5 and 6.5 per cent to allow for interest impact, but Mr Aylen said the Council still would be worse off.

"There is no guarantee that the next budget will include the amounts of money involved," Mr Aylen said.

"But we have to go on providing the services in anticipation of the grants."

Mr Aylen said the changes meant the State Government would remain a year behind in paying the grants.

State Treasurer Mr Tom Roper and Local Government Minister Mrs Maureen Lyster said last month the changed timetable for payments was implemented to protect grants in a period of cuts in Government spending.

"The Government, because of reductions in its revenue share from the Commonwealth and reduced income from State taxes, had to cut its spending in this year's budget," Mr Roper said.

Mr Roper said the Government would save \$17 million from the pensioner rate concessions and \$9.5 million as a result of the changed payment timetable for the municipal library subsidies.

Community awards

IN 1989, the City of Caulfield established the Caulfield Community Services Recognition Scheme to publicly acknowledge dedicated volunteers who work within the Caulfield community.

At a special ceremony each year, people who have given many hours of their valuable time and effort to our community are presented with a certificate and badge by the Mayor in recognition of their valuable contribution to the city.

A similar ceremony is planned for May 1991.

The Council is seeking participation from community groups and organisations who might want to nominate members for the award scheme.

THE COUNCIL'S engineering department is doing its bit to conserve the environment.

A display currently in the City Hall foyer demonstrates the different sorts of compost bins available to Caulfield residents.

The Council's manager engineering Mr Peter Onley said the display aimed to make the public more aware of the types of compost bins available.

The Council sells black compost bins made from 100 per cent recycled plastic.

A 210 litre bin is \$32 and a 280 litre bin \$40.

Mr Onley said the Council introduced the bins in October and sold about 100 in the first week.

"The sales have tapered off a bit since then," he said.

The plastic compost bins are made by Palamont Rotor Pty Ltd and bought by the council, which sells them to residents for the same price.

Also on display in the foyer is a range of recycled products made by Smorgon Plastics Recycling.

Smorgon makes a large range of items, including park benches and an open bio-bin composting system.

However, the Smorgon composting system is more expensive than the black plastic bins.

Mr Onley encouraged residents to visit City Hall and view the display.

Service improved at child health centres

CHANGES were introduced into maternal and child health centres in Caulfield last month to improve the way the service operates.

Under the new structure, two types of sessions will be provided by nurses at the centres.

The first are open sessions, at which the nurse will be available at the centre for individual consultation with parents and children.

The second are flexible sessions, which are used by the nurses to undertake group work, home and hospital visits and consultation with parents by appointment only.

During a flexible session, the nurse may not be at the centre.

These changes were introduced after the Council reviewed its maternal and child health centres late last year.

Kinder promise 'not affected' by budget

BUDGET reductions would not hamper the state government's commitment to provide all four-year-olds in Caulfield with access to kindergartens a reasonable distance from their homes, Member for Waverley Province Mr Kennedy said.

"Parents in the Caulfield area can be reassured that kindergarten for four-year-olds is the Government's priority and that Community Services Victoria will be working to provide the fairest spread of services for that age group," Mr Kennedy said.

He said there were more than 1300 pre-schools in Victoria and the number affected by budget changes would be minimal.

"Any kindergarten committee of management that has strong concerns about the possible impact of budget reductions on basic services for four-year-olds should consult with their regional pre-school advisor," Mr Kennedy said.

"The advisors will work with kindergartens in Caulfield and the department's managers to ensure the fairest spread of services."

Mr Kennedy said the State Government would spend \$64 million on kindergartens despite reductions in spending of \$2 million.

He said about 97 per cent of all four-year-olds attended kindergarten.

"This government funds more than 90 per cent of the ongoing cost of kindergarten compared with 50 per cent in New South Wales," he said.

According to Mr Kennedy, most kindergarten services being reduced have been chosen on the basis of hours available and the ages of the children attending.

He said the services that would no longer be funded had never been available to most parents and children.

Services which will be affected when the Budget changes are intro-

duced next year include:

- Pre-school for three-year-olds, which is not generally available to children in Victoria.
- Toddler groups, which operate only in certain suburbs.
- Additional extended hours sessions, which are not available to all Victorian children.
- Subsidised kindergartens in independent schools.
- Saturday sessions, which usually have lower attendance rates and cost more to run.
- Minimum class sizes, which will increase from 42 to 46.

Mr Kennedy said special needs teachers or assistance would continue to be funded and the \$2600 kindergarten operating grant would not be touched.

"I am confident the proposed cuts to kindergarten funding will minimise any hardship suffered by young families in Caulfield," he said.

Funding push

CAULFIELD Council has written to 12 state government ministers, asking for support in its fight against decreasing State Grants Commission allocations.

The Council is heading a group of municipalities which have been affected by the decreasing grants.

The group comprises Caulfield, Brighton, Camberwell, Hawthorn, Malvern, Moorabbin, Oakleigh, Prahran, Kew, Sandringham, Altona, Port Melbourne and South Melbourne Councils.

Between them, the municipalities contain almost 16 per cent of Victoria's population, yet receive less than 5 per cent of the annual Federal allocations to Victoria.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Geoff Patience, said the group's share of the Victorian allocation had fallen steadily since 1982-83.

"It is, in fact, now nearly half of

what it was in that year," he said.

The rate of decline has substantially increased since 1986-87, with grants falling by 40 per cent since that year.

"All the councils are down to basic per capita grants and receive nothing on a 'needs' basis," Cr Patience said.

Cr Patience called for an overhaul of the formula used to allocate federal revenue sharing grants.

He said the current system discriminated against efficient councils which made every effort to keep rates down.

The group is planning submissions to the Federal Grants Commission Review and the State Grants Commission.

The major thrust will be to promote an increase in the councils' per capita of grants from 30 to 50 per cent of available funds.

Tribunal decision

THE MUNICIPAL Electoral Tribunal has upheld an appeal by former Cr Brian Rudzki relating to an unauthorised pamphlet that was distributed before the August 4 Caulfield Council elections.

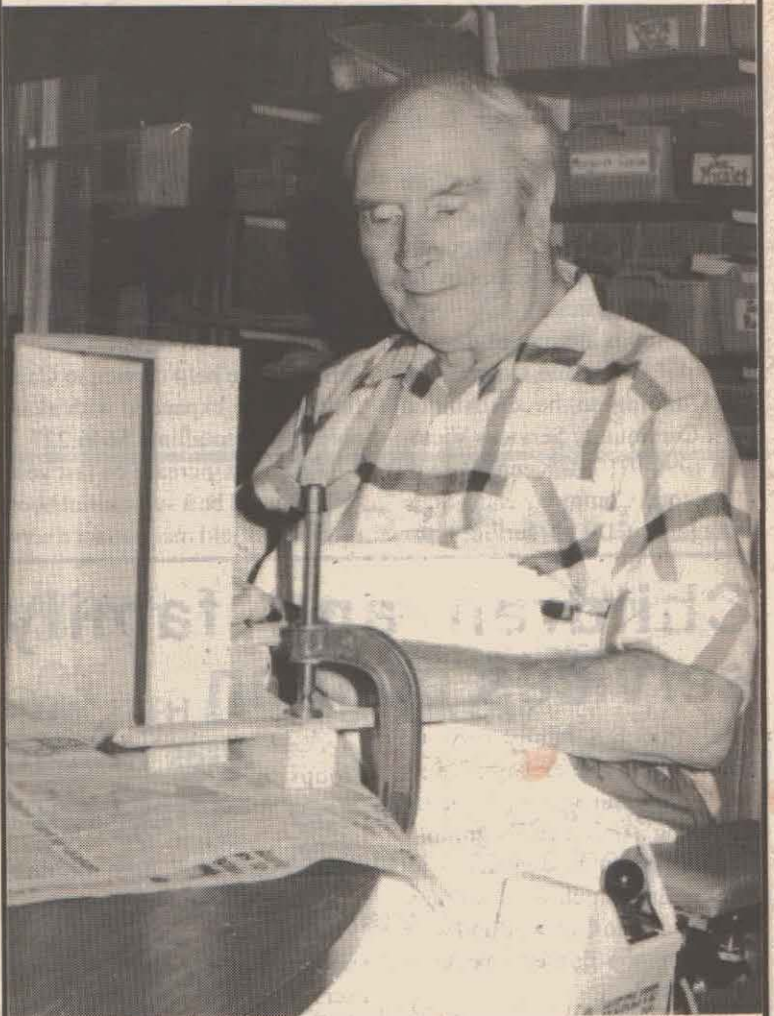
In Brighton, magistrate Mr Kevin Mason said the pamphlet, which was distributed the day before the elections, was unauthorised and defamatory.

However, he said there was insufficient evidence to prove that Mr Rudzki lost his seat as a result of the pamphlet's distribution.

Mr Rudzki lost his west ward seat to Cr Robert Kirby by 1380 votes.

Mr Mason said Mr Rudzki would need to prove that the pamphlet caused a considerable swing against him before he could upset the election.

"She is a human being, like all of us," he said.

The Duchess of York is the United Kingdom patron of the Motor Neurone Disease Association and her attendance at the ball raised money for Bethlehem Hospital's neurology unit.

The hospital aims to raise \$700,000 over the next year.

\$1.3m for HACC services

MORE than \$1.3 million has been allocated in the 1990-91 budget for a range of Home and Community Care (HACC) services in Caulfield.

Member for Waverley Province Mr Cyril Kennedy said the services would benefit frail, older people and people with disabilities living at home in Caulfield.

"These funds are part of the \$84 million of Home and Community Care funding to be distributed under Community Services Victoria in 1990-91," Mr Kennedy said.

"The total Commonwealth-State package of HACC services for

Victoria in 1990-91 will be worth \$134 million."

HACC helps people help themselves with tasks such as personal care and meals-on-wheels.

Some of the key aspects of the HACC funding package for the Caulfield area are:

- \$106,057 for the Caulfield Combined Day Care Centre, an increase of 23 per cent on last year.

- The home help service in Caulfield will be expanded with available funds totalling \$646,227, a 21.2 per cent increase on last year.

- There will be a substantial boost in the Caulfield maintenance serv-

ice, with \$49,002 available, an increase of 14.3 per cent on last year.

- The Kasher meals-on-wheels will receive \$24,000.

Council chief executive officer, Mr Doug Aylen, said the ceiling levels for grants under the HACC program had been increased by 6 per cent to cover indexation.

"In addition, we have been successful in gaining an additional \$83,600 in growth money for general home help," Mr Aylen said.

"This will enable us to make considerable inroads into the waiting list for home help."

Pool opens in Carnegie

THE 1990-91 swimming season has started at Caulfield swimming pool.

The pool opened on November 1 and will be operational for the next five months.

Situated in Munro Ave, Carnegie, the pool is open from 6am to 7pm weekdays and 10am to 6pm weekends and public holidays.

Admittance charges have risen slightly this year to \$1.60 for adults and \$1.10 for children.

Concession books offer discounts up to 33 per cent and a family season pass is available for \$105.

The solar heating and gas-boosted system will ensure the water stays at 26deg.

Some changes visitors will notice include a new shade structure and new seats.

The Caulfield pool patrons committee is appealing to pool users to attend a meeting at 8pm on Monday November 12.

The meeting at Koornang Park meeting hall will decide whether the committee is still necessary to provide input to the Council.

Bronti also has assisted in the development of a children and family services network in Caulfield.

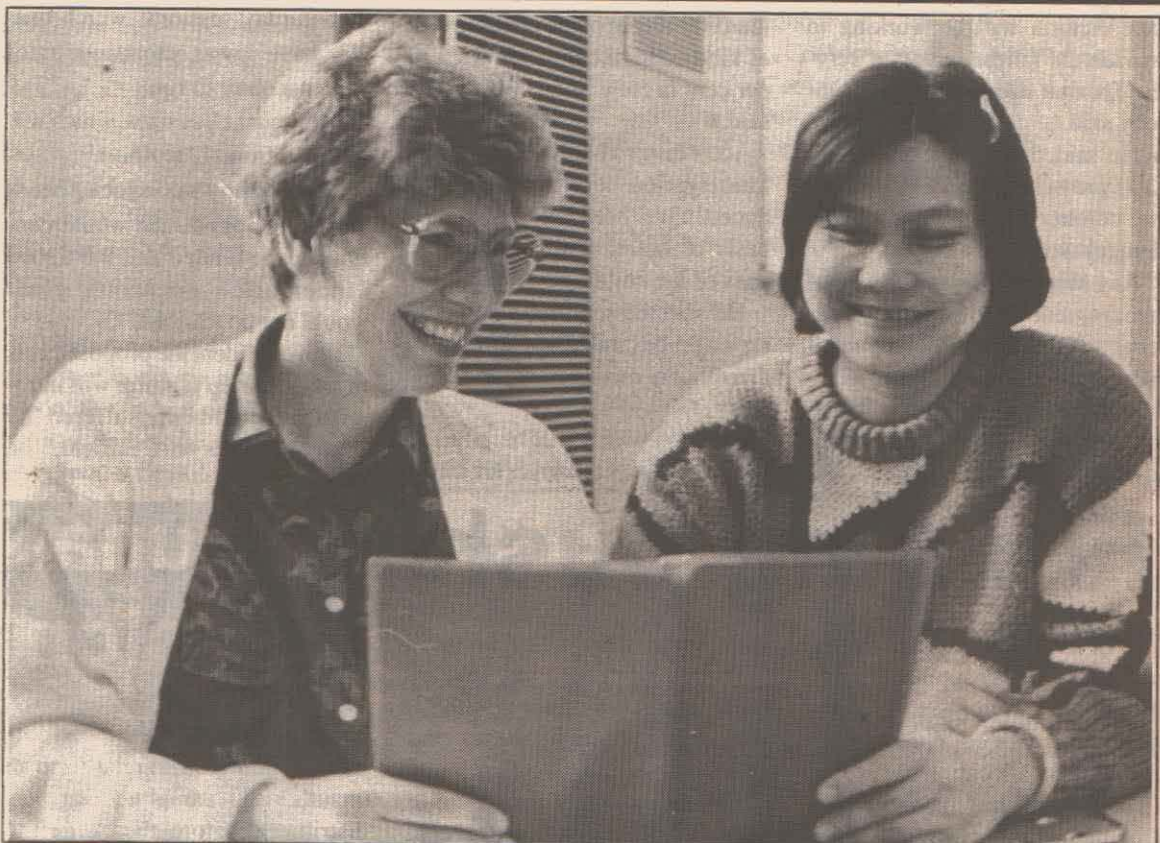
Community groups were invited to attend the network's first meeting on June 7. Two meetings have been held since then.

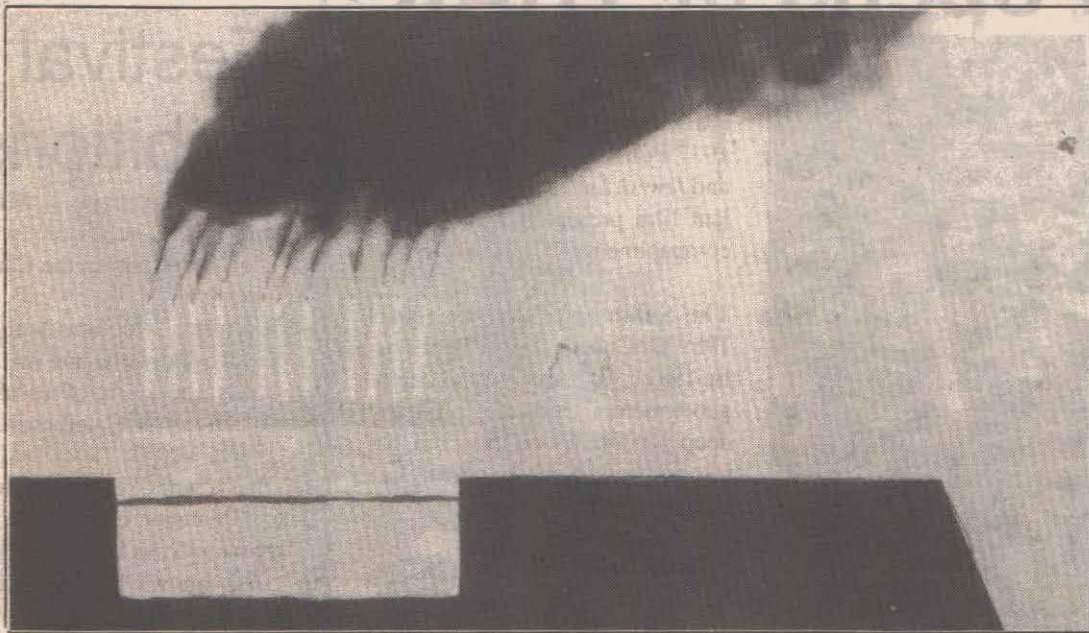

What Elke communicates is her

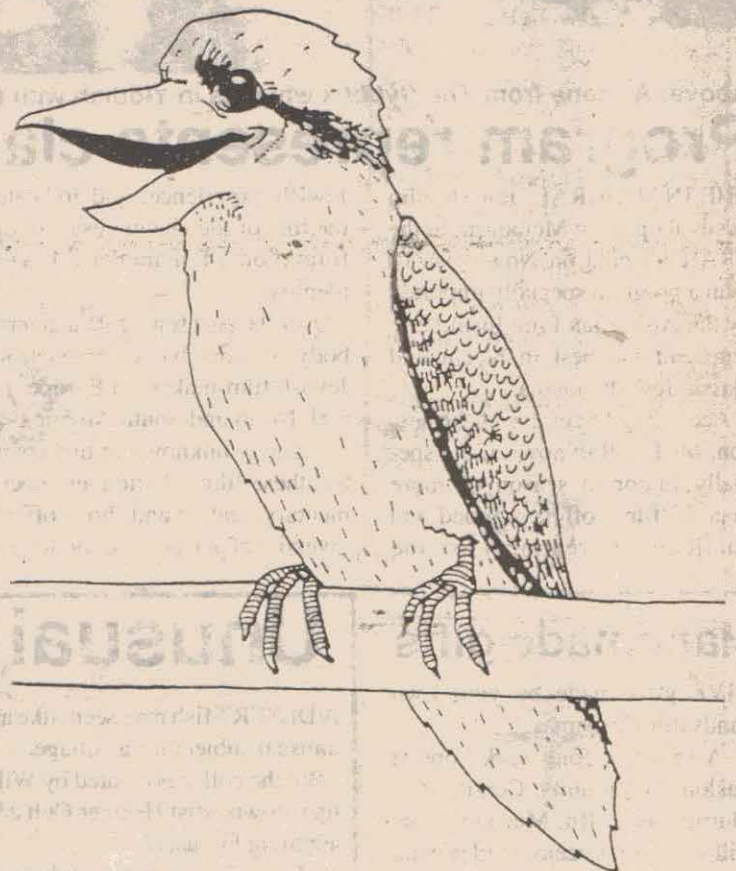
attempt to reduce large concepts to essential shapes with few colors formally balanced.

Program represents classic cinema

THE INAUGURAL Jewish Film Festival opens in Melbourne at the TRAK Cinema on November 10 with a program specially imported by the Australian Film Institute to represent the best in recent and classic Jewish cinema.

According to curator of the season, Mr Les Rabinowicz, the specially imported season of more than 20 films offers a broad and challenging treatment of the

Jewish experience, and indicates the role of the cinema itself in the formation of a modern Jewish identity.

Over the past few years a diverse body of work has emerged from Jewish film-makers in Europe, Israel, North and South America.

Largely unknown in this country, these films - fiction and documentary, feature and short - offer a diversity of perspectives on Jewish

history, culture and political aspirations.

The festival is pleased to welcome two international guests: Aviva Kempner from the USA, director of the important documentary *The Partisans of Vilna* and Alexander Zeldovich, director of the new Russian film *Sunset*.

Ms Kempner's film documents the little known story of Jewish Resistance during the Holocaust in

The Summer of Aviya (Israel 1989 Eli Cohen) (Silver Bear Berlin 1989) An exquisite and courageous memoir about the fragile and deeply poignant relationship between young Aviya and her fiercely independent mother.

Poor Butterfly (Argentina 1986 Raul de la Torre) When a Jewish journalist dies mysteriously after receiving the names and contacts of important Nazi exiles, his daughter is prompted to come to terms with her Jewish background and her father's activities.

Korczak (Poland 1989 Andrzej Wajda) The great Wajda's latest - a morally uplifting, if controversial, account of the wartime activities of Janusz Korczak, the Jewish doctor and pedagogue who established an orphanage in the Warsaw Ghetto.

Memories of a River (Hungary/France 1989 Judit Elek) A landmark film for Hungary which fictionalises its last "Jewish ritual murder" trial - and denounces Hungarian anti-Semitism for the first time.

The festival runs from November 10-25 at the Trak Cinema, Toorak.

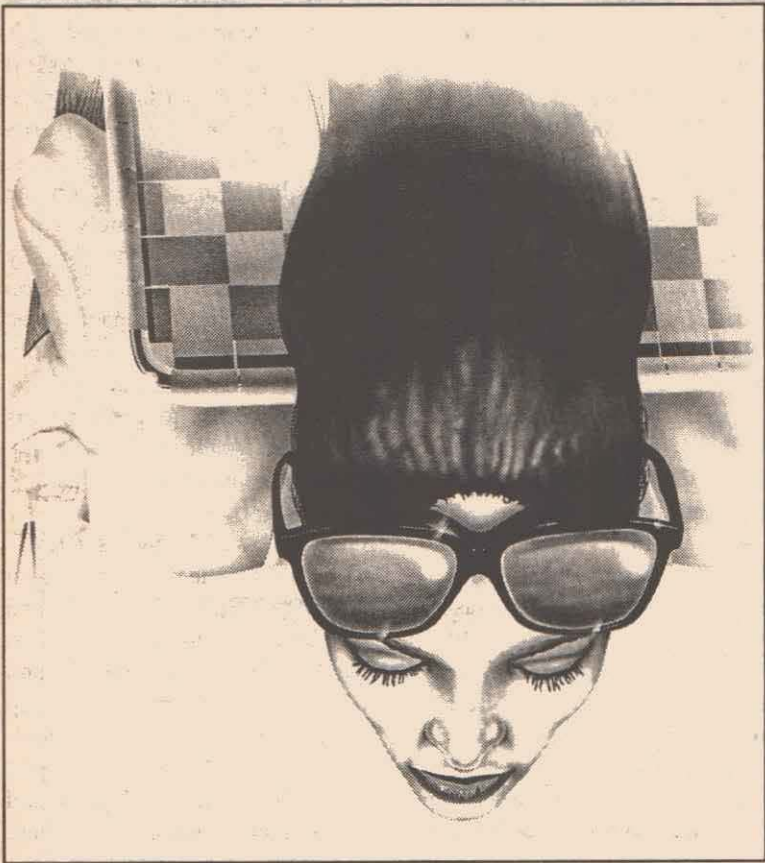

GRAB your hats and slap on some sunscreen - National Skin Cancer Awareness Week is on this year from November 19 to 24.

The Anti-Cancer Council of Victoria's SunSmart campaign will stage daily activities in the Bourke St mall to educate Victorians, especially young men, on the dangers of skin cancer and methods of sun protection.

SunSmart will distribute to doctors a general practitioners information guide on skin cancer.

This booklet is described as the most up-to-date guide to skin care under the sun and will provide information on diagnosis and the management of skin cancer.

Other activities to be held during National Skin Cancer Awareness Week include:

Health festival for women

A GRAND festival of women's health activities will be held on November 23 and 24 at Chadstone Community Health Centre, 568 Nerrim Rd, Hughesdale.

The festival, which is for women of all ages, will include workshops, a pap smear clinic, mammacheck, displays and fitness.

- Dermatologists will be on site to give personal advice on skin cancer.

The official opening by Rose Sorger from Health Sharing Women will be at 10.20am on Friday November 23.

Manic Mothers, a unique entertainment troupe, will wind up the festival at 3pm on November 24.

MEN are more likely to get sunburnt than women.

With this in mind, here are some SunSmart tips to keep Australian men looking hot and staying cool.

- Research shows that men spend more time outdoors than women and are less likely to use a maximum protection sunscreen. This summer, remember to use adequate and regular sun protection whenever you go outside.

- Hats are a popular fashion accessory for men this year and a great way to be SunSmart. Choose a wide-brimmed, closely woven hat to ensure you obtain maximum sun protection.

- Wear clothes with a close weave and collar whenever you can. To test how protective the fabric is, hold it up to the light. If you can see through it, so can the sun.

- Remember to apply your SPF15+ sunscreen about 15 minutes before going outside. This allows time for the sunscreen to bond to your skin and dramatically reduces your risk of sunburn.

- The sun's rays penetrate water - which means that if you enjoy water sports you are four times more likely to get sunburnt than people involved in other outdoors activities. To prevent this, make sure you're well protected and

avoid activity between 11am-3pm.

- At the beach, watch for reflection off water and sand and remember to take a beach umbrella for shade.

- Beware of sunburn on cool, overcast and windy days. The UV rays which cause the burning are not hot. On cloudy days, there is a lot of reflected light, so take care.

- During late December and early January - cricket season - the UV radiation is at its greatest, so take care during the Christmas break.

- Remember to protect yourself from the sun whenever you go outside - even if you're just taking the dog for a walk.

Sun tips for children

A CHILD'S skin is more sensitive to sunlight than an adult's skin.

This means particular care should be taken to protect children's skin.

A young child's skin will receive enough sunlight to cause burning after only a few minutes' exposure.

There is considerable evidence

that overexposure to sunlight during childhood is related to the development of melanoma later on.

Use zinc cream for total blackout on your child's nose or other small areas and remember to pack a hat when your child goes to creche, kindergarten or school.

Victorians burn

RESEARCH shows that as many Victorians get sunburnt each weekend in spring as on the hottest weekends in summer.

SunSmart campaign coordinator Ms Sue Noy said Melbourne's weather in spring was notoriously unreliable.

"The day often starts off cloudy and turns into a bright, sunny afternoon," she said.

"It's on days like this that people who plan to be outside in the middle of the day need to be prepared.

"Don't get caught out by the weather and be especially careful between 11am and 3pm (daylight saving time)."

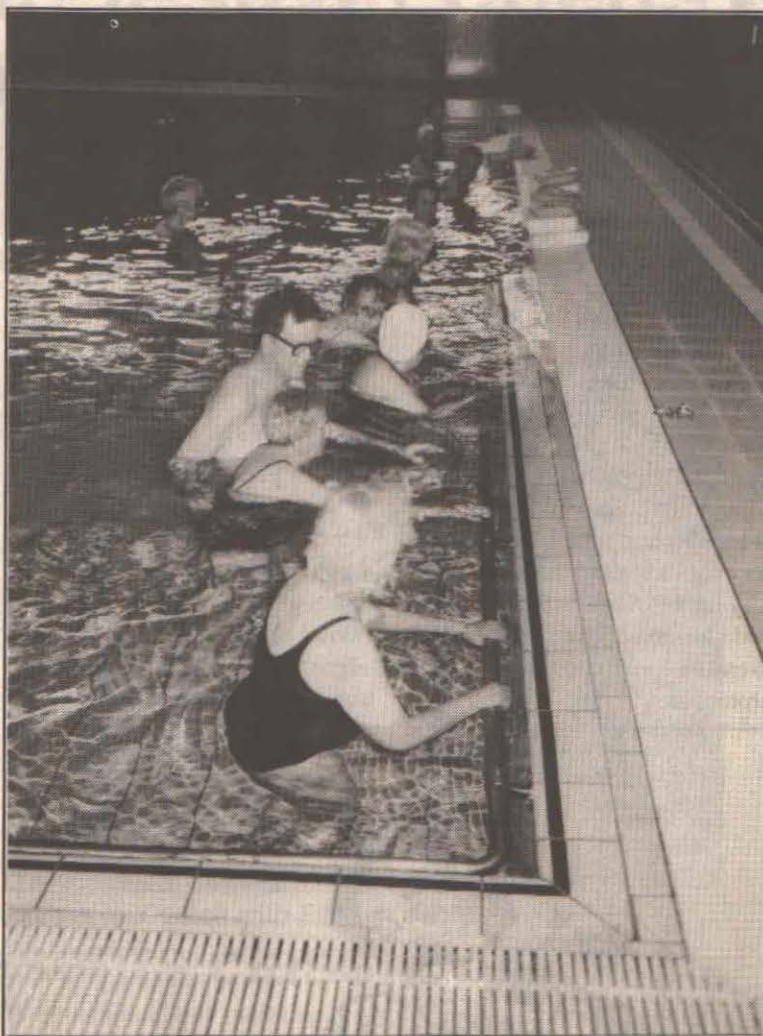
