A CELEBRATION OF TWO CULTURES

Exhibition Dates - Access Gallery, 15-25 November, Caulfield Arts Complex November 28 to December 3.

The strong cultural link between Australia and Japan will be a focus of this year's Caulfield Festival, with an art exhibition which will combine works from contemporary artists from Caulfield, with traditional and comtemporary art and craft work by artists from Caulfield's sister city in Japan, Ogaki.

The exhibition is an annual component of the Festival, celebrating the work of local Caulfield artists and is staged in the Gallery at the Caulfield Arts Complex. This year, however, the exhibition can be previewed in the new Access Gallery at the National Gallery of Victoria from

Artists representing Caulfield in the exhibition are: Anne Marie Power, Peter Chiller, Peter Horne and Heather Cull. All the artists either live in Caulfield, or have a working relationship with the Caulfield community. Three artists from Ogaki will also be represented.

A well known textile artist, Anne Marie, has recently returned from Japan, where she conducted a one week workshop in a machine embroidery, in Yokohama, arranged by the Port of Melbourne Authority. As a lead up to the Festival, Anne Marie will be working with local school children, making Japanese boat lanterns.

Peter Chiller's graphic cartoon style has a humorous element, but also makes comments on aspects of our twentieth century life. A scultptor, painter and printmaker, Peter will be exhibiting a selection of paintings and gouaches.

Peter Horne's acrylic painting of the 'Murrumbeena Area' has a freshness which captures Sponsored by Penhalluriacks Building Supplies. his innate feeling for the environment in which he lives.

Originally a graphic designer and craftsperson, Heather Cull now pursues her interest in Fine Art, producing a combination of textile and collage work which is often decorative and richly embellished.



Pool celebrates 25 years

CAULFIELD Memorial Swimming Pool will celebrate its 25th anniversary this month with a fun day on Sunday, November 17.

The day will commence at 10am and will host activities and entertainment for all the family. All entertainment will be free, including a sausage sizzle, along with the chance to win one of our great giveaways.

Those people who attended the riginal opening of the pool, are most welcome to come along and join in the festivities.

The pool, which is situated in Koornang Park, Moira Ave, Carnegie was officially opened on November 19, 1966 and was dedicated as a memorial to commemorate citizens who served in World War I and World War II. After considerable community discussions, it was decided that this would be the most suitable site.

The first stage of the pool complex was completed in 1967.

This consisted of a 50-metre, eight lane outdoor unheated pool, a 4.8 metre- deep diving pool, a toddlers' pool and a wading pool. Additional facilities have developed since then, including:

- heating to all the pools
- 2 giant waterslides
- sunshelters

- landscaped grounds
- a room for fitness classes
- 2 plexipave tennis courts with night lighting
- electric barbecues

Although an outdoor complex, the pools are heated to 26° at all times.

The season extends from November 1 through to March 31 and the complex is open Monday to Friday until 6pm, until 7pm on weekends and public holidays and on very hot nights the pool maybe open until 9pm.

This decision is up to the pool manager.

News in Brief

Covenant removed

CAULFIELD Council made a decision to remove a covenant from the property, 501 Inkerman Rd, East St Kilda at last month's Executive Services Committee meet-

This is the first application for the removal of a covenant that the Council has considered, as previously this was dealt with by the Supreme Court. Recent amendments to both the Subdivision Act 1991 and the Planning and Environment Act have given the power to Council to deal with such is-

The main aspect of the covenant in question was that it restricted the number of dwellings to be constructed on the site.

The committee has decided to issue a notice of decision to grant a permit to remove the covenant and erect three dwellings on the site, as it is satisfied that this would not result in any financial loss of amenity to the neighbouring properties.

Shellard pleads guilty ROSECRADDOCK owner, Mr Peter Shellard was recently fined in the Prahran Magistrate's Court for breaches to the Health and Environment Protection Acts and Caulfield Council's Local Law. Mr Shellard pleaded guilty to the charges.

On a charge of causing a nuisance under the Health Act, by failing to repair a broken sewer pipe which was left exposed to the open air for 22 days during summer, he was fined \$500 with \$221.80 for costs.

Another charge was causing unreasonable noise by driving a tractor on his property between the hours of 6pm and midnight. The noise could be heard inside houses up to one block away. When questioned as to why he drove the tractor at that time of night, he stated he was hoeing a plot to plant potatoes. He was fined \$200.

On a charge of permiting a fire to be lit in the open air without a

CAULFIELD Council recently conducted a survey to find out the number of bins collected and missed on garbage days.

The survey was conducted over a 12 week period, during which time a total of 300,525 bins were collected and only 771 were

The most common reason for bins not being collected was that they were too heavy, or so full that the lids could not be closed.

Caulfield Council's director technical services, Mr Noel Wootten, said that although there is no maximum weight stipulated, bins should be able to be easily handled by the men and to be lifted by the hydraulic equipment of the truck.

The other major problems were overloading the bin and placing hazardous materials such as dust, ashes, broken glass or liquids, building materials, paper and cardboard in the bin.

"Caulfield has a good collecion service, but residents need to comply with the collection regulations so that we can further improve our service," Mr Wootten said.

Chemical collection day in Caulfield

THE Caulfield Council Works Depot will hold a Metropolitan Chemical Collection Day on Sunday, December 1.

The Program, set up by the Board of Works, involves the staging of collection days, throughout the year at different locations in the metropolitan area, so householders can deliver and leave all forms of chemicals, including pesticides, solvents, paints and oils that need special treatment to ensure safe disposal.

Dumping of these materials illegally into sewers and drains threatens the environment and the health of sewerage plant workers.

Disposal into the mobile garbage bin should not occur due to the risk posed to the collection employees and the pollution of the eventual landfill disposal point.

It is also hazardous for these

materials to be stored indefinitely on residential properties, as some-

times occurs. For these reasons, particularly the wellbeing of its residents, the Council has decided to support in principle, the funding of a share of the costs for the Program.

Since this decision, the South Eastern Regional Refuse Disposal Group has considered the matter on a regional basis and resolved financially support the contin ation of the scheme on behalf of member councils. Caulfield will therefore be contributing via its annual allocation to the Region.

Specialist staff and equipment necessary to examine, treat and store chemicals will be on hand on

Loans to be reduced by \$2m

CAULFIELD Council has completed negotiations with the National Australia Bank to repay \$2 million of its long term high interest loans.

The decision follows recent substantial shifts in interest rates and will result in a nett interest saving of \$120,000 per annum.

Mayor, Cr Veronika Martens said, "that the Council's present level of reserve funds was built up during better financial times and can now be utilised to further improve the future finances of the City. A myriad of reserve funds have had to be kept, but nese can now be tidied up providing the opportunity to repay the loans."

Cr Nicholas Gold, chairman of the finance strategy committee and the Mayor expressed Council's appreciation for the co-operation of the National Australia Bank.

Cr Martens said, "Council has decided to consolidate a large number of its separate reserve funds into one general fund. The decision is in line with the new Accounting Regulations which will come into operation for all Australian councils on October 1, 1992. This will result in reduced administrative costs and enable the necessary total level of reserve funds to be reduced by the \$2m required to repay the loans.

Caulfield is taking a lead in implementing these regulations and this year's budget was produced generally in line with this format.

Mayor Martens decribed the debt reductions as "another significant accomplishment of the Council in managing ratepayers funds for their best advantage in line with Council's budget strategy."



Caulfield Urban Conservation Study

SPECIAL FEATURE



About the Study

THE City of Caulfield has recently commissioned a preliminary urban conservation study.

The study has provided a background history to Caulfield's built environment, looking at Caulfield's development from its beginnings until World War 11.

It also included a survey which has given a preliminary indication of the heritage importance of each building in the municipality. The study also identifies four "historic areas".

Caulfield's Heritage

THE study found that Caulfield has retained a great deal of its late nineteenth and early twentieth century architecture.

Much of the old Elsternwick remains in its late Victorian and Edwardian form.

Victorian mansions, federationstyle villas, tramway structures and innovative pre-Second World War subdivisions are special features of Caulfield.

However, the study has also shown that this heritage is at risk. Road widenings, demolitions, changes of building use and building alterations have already occurred, even in historic areas such as Derby Road.

Study Recommendations

THE study proposed more detail investigation of the areas and buildings identified as important to Caulfield's Heritage. With the background history, this information would be used to develop a Heritage Management Plan for Caulfield.

A Heritage Management Plan would only be prepared after consulting community groups and could include a range of statutory measures (under the Caulfield Planning Scheme) and non - statutory measures (for instance, advisory design guidelines).



Background History To The Built Environment

THE environmental history (or background history to the built environment) looks at the development of Caulfield from its beginnings until World War 2. Caulfield's built environment was determined to a large degree by

determined to a large degree by external forces, a theme which is supported and reinforced throughout the report.

Caulfield's importance rested on its strategic location between Port Phillip's eastern runs and the markets of Melbourne in the 1830s. The major highways of Main Dandenong Road and Brighton

Summary of Consultants — Report —

Road already defined the north and south-west boundaries of Caulfield, many years before the local Road Board was established in 1857.

By 1857 most of the district was under pasture with some cultivated land and a total of 159 houses and tents. The district's first self-contained settlement was Camden Town which later remained the principal commercial focus when incorporated into the Glen Huntly Road centre.

Caulfield played host to a number of innovations in the construction of small estates. The Lempriere Avenue Estate built in the early thirties was an estate of "whole streets of houses of a superior type, giving very careful thought to the achitecture and street amenities". Features included planted lawn strips, low front and dividing fences, underground power and ornamental street lamps. The Australian Home Beautiful magazine spoke highly of the Lempriere estate as an example of the best of housing standards. A similar estate was built in Fosbery Avenue in 1923-30.

Two other innovations were the AV Jennings Estates - the "Hillcrest" Estate in Caulfield South and the "Beauville" Estate in Murrumbeena. The Hillcrest Estate achieved harmony in housing style and public environment and introduced the idea of pre selling houses while the Beauville Estate included shops and common parkland. This estate

was the pre cursor of the planned community developments of subsequent decades.

Steady growth continued under the Road Board with many of Caulfield's large villa residences being built until the 1892 depression. A number have survived the post World War 1 suburbanisation and are an example of the high point of the City's contemporary architectural heritage.

Closer settlement was to follow at first in the vicinity of railway stations where Edwardian villas were characteristic. Caulfield was and remains today a tramway City made possible by the opening of the Prahran and Malvern Tramways Trust Network of lines. Growth in the City indicated the general prosperity in the early 1900s.

In 1908, Caulfield had 222 houses built which was the third largest of any Melbourne municipality.

The housing crisis of the 1920s led to increased suburbanisation,

particularly in the eastern parts of the City so that by the end of the 1930s the municipality had been developed although subdivisions along North Road occurred during post World War 2.

SPECIAL FEATURE

Summary Of Consultant's Report - On Caulfield Heritage And Conservation Study

THE preliminary survey assessed the significance of each building in the municipality. The study findings in the report are found primarily on the work of the architectural field survey.

The field survey sheets cover the entire municipality and a preliminary assessment of significance has been undertaken for every building within it.

They can be seen at the Town Hall display. Sites are ranked with the following levels of significance.

A. Of State and possible National significance. Recommended for inclusion on the State Historic Building Register, the National estate Register and for planning scheme protection.

B. Of Regional significance, either on the grounds of its unusual architecture expression or use which has or had regional impact. Recommended for planning scheme protection and possibly for inclusion on the State and National Registers.

C+. Of local significance, but having sufficient architectural value or historic associations to warrant detailed assessments. Recommended for planning scheme protection.

C. Of local significance, being representative of a period, style and/or house type and forming a supportive element in the heritage of the City. Preservation is important for building of this quality when it is situated within an identifiable historic area.


D-F. Of local interest, defaced by alterations to varying degrees. Not considered worthy of protection unless situated within an identified historic area.

N. Not significant

The survey identified 11 level A sites; 44 level B sites; 96 level C+ sites and 590 level C sites in the municipality (some 2.2% of the total properties in Caulfield).

The field survey also identified four "historic areas" on a preliminary basis:









Consultant's Recommendation

THE Consultant recommended: "that the findings of the Preliminary Conservation study be used to form the basis of a Heritage Management Plan for the City. This plan will draw on the following sources of information:

the outline environmental history

ssessments of the historic areas identified and;

assessments of sites ranked at levels A,B, and C+.

It will consist of a range of measures, prepared after consultation with the affected groups, which will assist Council to encourage the protection and enhancement of the City's built heritage.

These measures may include both statutory and non-statutory initiatives and will be responsive to the special characteristics of Caulfield's built heritage. It will embrace procedures which should apply within Council's offices concerning heritage management as well as similar processes applying to property owners within and outside of the identified historic areas. Most importantly, the plan will have as its principal goal the establishment of a process whereby the identified heritage of the City can be responsibly managed in the public interest".

Heritage At Risk

THE preliminary survey has shown that some of the City's heritage has already been lost. Only 8 buildings in Caulfield are now covered by controls aimed at retaining heritage. These are the buildings registered under the Historic Buildings Act. A permit from the Historic Buildings Council is needed for demolition, alterations, or other development of these properties.

Most other existing buildings for example houses in residential zones, can be altered, added to or demolished as long as a building permit is issued. Council cannot consider the effect on building heritage when granting building permits.

A building's heritage quality as seen from the street can be degraded by:

demolition


carports or other outbuildings not in keeping with the building style;

altering the building facade so as to remove or cover heritage features;


painting or putting up an advertising sign that is not in keeping with the building style;

How Can Heritage Be Managed?

COUNCIL could ultimately manage the built heritage of the City by statutory Town Planning controls, conservation guidelines or a combination of the two, over privately owned land.

Statutory

Council could list the four "historic areas" as Urban Conservation Areas under the Caulfield Planning scheme. It could also identify significant buildings outside the "historic areas" under the scheme. It could then require town planning permission to be given for all or some of the following changes:

- demolition
- alterations
- additions
- new buildings
- advertising signs

Council could then take the design of these building works and how they affect heritage value, into account.

What Heritage

Management

Would Not Do

Council could also decide on lesser degrees of control, by allowing some types of development without planning permission, for example:

- alterations not visible from the
- alterations not to the street facade and not including parts of the building of importance to its design:
- alterations that are for maintenance or repair such as painting, gutter replacement, roof tile replacement.

Non-Statutory

Council could provide design guidelines for property owners, giving a practical guide to what building works are in keeping with the heritage character of the area or building.

It could consider providing other heritage design advice. Council's own role in providing street improvement works (eg. furniture, paving) could also be part of a heritage management plan.

Your Views

The introduction of a Heritage Management Plan would not place any onus on the owners of buildings to maintain their properties to any particular standard. It would not prevent most normal activities associated with home ownership.

Seminars

COUNCIL intends to conduct public seminars, where you can hear from the consultant who prepared the study. You will be able to ask the consultant and Council officers about all aspects of the study. Dates for these seminars will be advised through the local press.

Development in East Caulfield Park

RESIDENT'S adjacent to East Caulfield Park and students of the neighbouring Caulfield Campus, Monash University, are witnessing changes to East Caulfield Park, which will lead to major improve-

Caulfield Council has embarked on a program to improve the attractions of the park. An exercise track has been constructed around the parkland and new tables, seats and porticos for the park entrances have been ordered. The new furniture also trials Syntal recycled plastic.

The Council has been confronted with the hard decision to remove many large trees from parklands this year.

Caulfield Council's urban designer, Ms Lynette Hannan, said "it is heartbreaking to see trees being removed, but decisions are made with consideration to professional and expert advise and for

public safety," said Ms Hannan.

"The reality is that trees need to be replaced, the landscape to be re-established and a design and management plan prepared to ensure that large scale tree removal does not feature in the future of the parks".

"The result will be an attractive parkland, thus meeting user and environmental demands."







Help prevent sunburn You and your pets column

ANIMALS, like humans suffer from sunburn which can lead to squamous cell carcinoma or skin cancer. This can be fatal and is only treatable if the problem is dealt with in the very early stages, and preventative measures taken.

Animals are protected from the burning rays of the sun by their hair, coat and by natural pigmentation within the skin itself.

Some animals are more susceptable to getting sunburn than others. These are the pale, pinkits ears.

our clinic to be presented with a cat or dog whose ear tips have been completely shrivelled and eaten away by a form of dry gangrene, caused from nothing else and eventually flakey. Chronic irritation by repeat exposure to the sun may cause cancerous lesions.

Exercise your animal prior to 11am and after 3pm. Try and discourage it from sleeping in direct sunlight. U-V cream or blockout can be applied to the ear tips which will assist in preventing permanent skin damage when the animal is outdoors.

However sometimes despite keeping your pet indoors as much as possible and using creams, if the lesion changes from red, scaley, dry sunburn lesions to ulcerating, bleeding sores, then more drastic measures need to be taken.

It is advised that the lesion be surgically removed if it is in an accessible area. Unfortunately most lesions occur on the nose pad or just behind which need to be attended to at a very early stage.

Prevention is better than letting sunburn become cancerous, so if your pet has had some cases of sunburn, try to keep it out of direct sunlight during the hottest part of the day.
