THIS reponse by Caulfield's Mayor, Cr Veronika Martens, was sparked off by the current issue relating to developments and future plans for the Caulfield General Medical Centre.

Mounting concern over the type of information being channelled out to the community and the needless worry and confusion it has caused residents, prompted Council to take affirmative action.

Council's involvement in the issue was fuelled by rumours about the hospital's immediate future causing, as Mayor, Cr Martens expressed, " a great deal of anxiety in the local community especially the more elderly citizens who are the ones that are the real victims in this situation as they do not know the facts and have been confused about what is happening".

Discussions have been held

between Cr Martens, Council's chief executive officer, Doug Aylen and Mr Kricker, chief executive of the Alfred Group of Hospitals.

As a result of the initial talks, a consultative program to schedule bi-monthly meetings between Council's Mayor and chief executive and Mr Kricker on behalf of the Board of the Alfred Group was adopted

Council's chief executive officer, Doug Aylen confirmed "that in order to represent community interests, we will hold regular meetings with Mr Kricker, so that we can be kept informed about any developments. Mr Kricker has given an undertaking that if any substantial changes impacting on local residents were to take place, these would be discussed with Council well advance of any implementation".

In response to the forthcoming public meeting being held to discuss the issue later this month, Cr Martens stated "while we commend the organisers of the public meeting for their concern about the facility, we must ensure that the public is aware of all the facts and that rumour and innuendo will not be allowed to cause unfounded concern among residents".

Sharing Council's views on public consultation is Opposition Whip and Member for Caulfield Ted Tanner, who stated he "welcomed" the public statement from the Alfred Group Board on the hospital's current position. "I welcome the statement because it (cont. page 2)

gives the public an opportunity to express opinion on what is occurring and what is being proposed", Mr Tanner said.

What's the real story?

While it is true that budget cuts at the hospital, in line with general reduction in health funding at both State and Commonwealth levels, have to be put in place, Mr Kricker assured Cr Martens that there were no plans to reduce the effectiveness of the hospital as a local health care facility.

From information provided by Mr Kricker it has been ascertained that inpatient activity levels will be maintained and if possible increased. This will be achieved by changing health care procedures that have seen the average stay in hospital reduced in recent years, as new health care methods are introduced.

RE Ross Centre & Pathology

The RE Ross Centre and Pathology have been subject to rumours which are not based on facts.

Currently the Ross Centre has

been subsidised by the Hospital to the tune of \$100,000, which under current budget reductions can no longer be sustained.

There is no move to close the Centre and the Hospital has guaranteed \$35,000 for 1992 and has asked management to prepare a plan to make the workshop financailly viable.

In the area of Pathology services, there has been ongoing concern about the current expense of providing pathology services at the Caulfield General Medical Centre and the Alfred.

An internal review has recommended a move towards one Pathology Service to serve both campuses. A plan for the formation of a single pathology service is being prepared for Board con-

Radiology

The Radiology department at the Centre has not been closed. It did, however, advertise to appoint new contract radiologists last year following the death of Dr Kotzmann. The department operated continuously during this time

and after seeking approval from the Board, a new appointment to the Radiology Department was made on January 2, 1992.

Proposed action for '91/92

Given the hospital's objective of maintaining or even increasing service levels and the substantially reduced financing, there was obviously a need for the Board to take action to reduce costs. It was decided that the main expenditure thrust reduction would be:

- Better management of beds
- Review various service and activity programs
- Expenditure reduction
- Staff reduction
- Undertake productivity reviews to increase the hospital's efficiency and effectiveness

Initial productivity reviews, will occur on both campuses in the following areas:

- Occupational therapy
- Physiotherapy
- Medical records
- Food /Hospital services
- Central sterile services/supplies. Ultimately these reviews will extend right across the hospital to all areas. Objectives include:
- To develop a process which achieves real, viable implemented productivity improvements generating cash savings in short term
- To identify all services provided by each area and agree to the priority of those services
- To identify 'bottlenecks' in provision of those services
- To establish an analytical basis for a comprehensive review of the organisation at a later date

For the review to be the basis for establishing the process of continuous improvement in the quality of patient services and effective operation of the specific departments.

Gaming machines lack planning control

THE State Government has recently approved the Gaming Machine Control Act which provides the opportunity for certain premises throughout Victoria to operate gaming machines.

The Victorian Gaming Commission has been established where persons may apply for a Gaming Venue Operators Li-

Only premises which already have a restricted club, full club, general or residential liquor licence can be granted a gaming venue licence.

The Government has licenced Tattersalls and the TAB as gaming operators. They will own the machines and will enter into contracts with venue operators to allow them to operate the machines.

In Caulfield, several premises now hold liquor licences which would be suitable for gaming venue licences. These include social clubs, sporting hotels Caulfield Racecourse. Some of these premises are located in

The Gaming Machine Control Act has seemingly avoided controls over planning matters because of this, Caulfield Council is currently preparing an amendment to the Caulfield Planning Scheme which will require a planning permit for more than five gaming machines.

Through issuing a planning permit, Council will be able to specify the maximum number of machines, hours of use, carparking and other considerations which are important in preserving the amenity of residential areas.

Discussion is also taking place with neighbouring municipalities to see if they share a similar con-

The Caulfield Planning Scheme Amendment will be on display at the Town Planning Counter, Caulfield Municipal Offices.

Neerim Road reconstruction

CAULFIELD Council recently awarded the contract to reconstruct Neerim Rd, between Hobart and Poath Rds, to Centro Constructions Pty Ltd at a cost of \$211, 381.

Eight of the eleven tenders received, were below the Council engineer's estimate and reflects the present competitive economic environment.

The project is fully funded by the Federal Government allocation of funds to Local Roads and is expected to be completed by April 1992.

The works include: 1400 metres of concrete kerb and channel, 207 metres of stormwater drain, and 880 tonnes of bituminous conrete.

Kerb extensions into the road pavement have been included in the design in order to slow traffic speeds and link the parkland that exists on either side of Neerim Rd

Assault & abuse, it doesn't pay!

LAST year, a female Caulfield Traffic Officer was verbally and physically assaulted while on duty in Glen Huntly Rd.

The Officer was merely doing her job of issuing a parking infringement notice to a vehicle which was parked in a No Standing area. The very irate owner of the vehicle approached the Officer, yelling abuse and snatched the parking infringement notice from her and pushed it into her chest. The blow was painful and frightening to the Officer.

"Traffic officers have the most difficult job in Local Government, with few if any of the public appreciating the need for parking supervision. This results in officers having to endure attitudes from people they encounter, ranging from hostility, threats and physical violence," said the Council Superintendent Traffic and Local Law,

Bob Hannah.

"What most people tend to forget is that these officers are just doing their job and anyone who uses abusive language or assaults an officer will be confronted by the full force of the law."

The courts recognise the difficulties that traffic officers have to encounter and supports them with effective penalties where offences have been proven.

In this particular case, the defendant, who would only have had to pay a \$40 parking fine, is now up for \$1,133.

The total fine is made up as follows:

- unlawful assault fined \$500
 plus \$33 costs
- indecent language \$250
- offensive behavior \$250
- leave a vehicle in a No Standing area - \$100

Revised conditions to council permits

MOST applications for building permits for works on private properties need to by accompanied by an approval of ancillary works within the road.

These extra works can include erection of hoarding or scaffolding, excavating an opening in the road, naturestrip or footpath to install or meet services such as gas, water or sewer; constructing a new vehicle crossing; installing a new temporary crossing to protect the footway during cartage of materials placement of a waste container in the road reserve to store and cart away building and other wastes.

The Council requires that all of the above activities be subject to the issue of a permit and the payment of a fee and deposit. This is necessary so that control can be exercised through an inspection system to ensure the safety and convenience of motorists and pedestrians and to preserve the condition of the road and footway through proper reinstatement of any damage from the works.

The Council sets conditions that are to apply to any permits and these specify the requirements that Council has in regard to the activities.

These conditions have recently been revised and a set will be provided to all future permit applicants.

They are also available to other interested persons and may be obtained from the building department at Caulfield City Hall.

Red Cross Needs YOU

IT'S that time of year again when Red Cross calls for community assistance in the collection of money for the Red Cross Calling Appeal.

Appeal Day this year is March 10 and more than ever, the Red Cross needs volunteer support.

Caulfield has always been a stronghold for the Red Cross and our City's support has included among other things, the use of the Caulfield Race Track during World War Two as a respite abode for returned soldiers and their immediate family to meet, rest and feed before returning home.

The track accommodated hundreds of soldiers from all over the country in temporary barracks who had returned from the war via Melbourne.

Alice Campbell has chaired the Caulfield Red Cross Committee for many years and has been a Red Cross voluntary worker since 1939!

Alice has many memories of her years with the Red Cross and has assisted many unfortunate families and individuals in need.

"People ask me 'what type of work have you done for the Red Cross over the years?' I can tell you that I've done everything from helping victims of bushfires, cyclones and other natural disasters, assisting returned soldiers and their families and possibly the most frightening experience, was working in a Kew mental asylum when the hospital staff strike occurred", recalls Alice. "Usually they would send two Red Cross volunteers in these circumstances, but volunteer numbers were down and I was sent on my own ... well I can tell you that it was horrific ... I knew where nothing was kept, medication, clean linen ... all these things I had to find on my own while patients in the hospital were screaming out helplessly."

Individuals like Alice are hard to come by nowadays and it takes a very special, caring person to do what Alice has done for so many

people in our local community.

"I'm not as young as I used to be but that doesn't stop me from doing as much as I possibly can for this community ... I run Telecross in Caulfield which is a phone service for those people living alone. The aim of this service is to telephone these individuals once a day at the same time to ensure that they're well ... if by chance they do not pick up the phone then I ring the neighbour or pop around to see them. I've always enjoyed working for the Red Cross and I hope that more people will experience the feeling of achievement that I've always felt in helping those who are less fortunate than myself".

There are many ways of raising money for the Red Cross. The most prominent and effective method has been through yearly appeal.

Local resident Graham Blythe and friend John Shaw did something a little different this year in an effort to raise money for the Red Cross.

Both Graham and John attempted their very first parachute jump. These two high-flyers jumped on February 2, 1992 at the Meredith Parachute Club, Meredith.

On asking Graham why he

decided to jump he simply replied, "it's a good way to raise money for a worthwhile cause."

Caulfield Mayor Cr Veronika Martens is a strong supporter of the Red Cross and the Appeal and keenly collects for the Appeal every year along with other Caulfield Councillors. Cr Martens believes that the generosity of many individuals in the Caulfield community is always highlighted when charity, volunteer assistance is However, she urges required. sporting and bowling clubs and organisations to get involved and be more supportive. "It would be wonderful to see some clubs and organisations put in the effort that many individuals in our community do ... it's a matter of give and take ... unfortunately the latter is more prominent than the former with some groups. It only takes two hours of one's time to help Red Cross on collection day ", Cr Martens stated.

Become a Foster Family

FOSTER Care South East is an agency which organises alternate care for children (0-16 years) who are temporarily unable to live with their own families. Placements can be for a day or two to several weeks or months, sometimes years.

Care is needed for a variety of reasons - parental illness, family breakdown, severe stress, child abuse and neglect.

Two examples of children needing care are:

A little girl of seven - She has been taken away from her mother and step-father because there is a strong suspicion of child abuse. She needs a warm and caring home where she can stay while her future is decided.

An active toddler who is three years old - His mother is soon to go into hospital to have another baby and his father works long hours.

The family have no relatives in Australia and no friends able to care for him while his mother is not there. He needs foster care for a week or two, until his mother is back home and able to cope. There will be a series of three training sessions from February 20 for those who would like to share their time and family with some of our community's needy children.







Disability committee 'maps' the way in Caulfield

Act as a representative body for persons with disabilities to the City of Caulfield and;


Seek to further the recognition and integration of persons with disabilities by and within the City of Caulfield on such issues as:

Commitee's Achievements

SINCE 1982, the Advisory Committee has investigated and highlighted major access problems within Caulfield; advised on improvements to access in public and private buildings; issued a Resource Guide; issued a Shopping From Home Guide; received a grant to investigate access to recreation and community services and won their second National Award in the 1988 Bicentennial Access Awards to set up the Home Computer Access Project, Good Access Award Scheme, issue the Access Map of Caulfield and fund general publicity projects.

The 1989/90 project for the Caulfield Advisory Committee is the Footpath Clutter Campaign which aims to increase public awareness of the problems caused by display units, builder's materials, sandwich boards and street furniture which is increasingly a part of the streetscape today.

- telephones



Featuring Caulfield's parks and gardens

GLEN HUNTLY Park and E E Gunn Park are just two of nine sporting venues within the City of Caulfield. Like all the other parks, Glen Huntly and E E Gunn are used all year round by football and cricket clubs.

■ Glen Huntly Park

GLEN HUNTLY Park, situated in Caulfield's north ward was originally located on a large area of temporary reserve which was to become the Caulfield Racecourse.

In 1927, an area on the southern section of the racecourse reserve, bordered by Neerim and Booran Rds, was permanently set aside for recreation.

Some 40 years later in 1968, the reserve passed under formal Council management to become the Glen Huntly Sports Ground.

Like all Caulfield's sporting venues, Glen Huntly has its own committee of management, which is responsible for the general upkeep and management of the park.

The committee of management, which was first formed in 1963, is made up of 10 members. Cr Nicholas Gold is chairman/president and Mr Victor Townsend is the secretary/treasurer.

E E GUNN Park, formerly known as Ormond Park, is situated in Caulfield's south ward, cnr Foch and Malane Sts, Ormond.

The Park occupies 3.5 hectares of Council-owned land and comprises two football ovals, three cricket pitches, a baseball oval and baseball pitch, main and outer pavilions, playground and scout hall.

It is home to the Ormond Amateur Football Club (the most senior and successful football club in Caulfield), Ormond/Glen Huntly Baseball Club, Ormond Cricket Club and Ormond Tennis Club. Kilvington Girls Baptist Grammar School and other local state schools use the ground for their athletic sports.

The E E Gunn Park committee of management was established in 1975. Today its members include; Cr James Barrett as president, Mr Clive Singleton as chairman, Mr John Robertson as secretary/treasurer, six representatives from the various clubs who use the Park and three citizen representatives in addition to Clive and John.

Both Clive and John have been involved with the Park for many years and have been active committee members for at least ten

Caulfield Urban Conservation Study

About the Study

THE City of Caulfield has recently commissioned a preliminary urban conservation study.

The study has provided a background history to Caulfield's built environment, looking at Caulfield's development from its beginnings until World War 11.

It also included a survey which has given a preliminary indication of the heritage importance of each building in the municipality. The study also identifies four "historic areas".

Study Recommendations

The study proposed more detail investigation of the areas and buildings identified as important to Caulfield's Heritage. With the background history, this information would be used to develop a Heritage Management Plan for Caulfield.

This plan will draw on the following sources of information:

the outline environmental

- assessments of the historic areas identified and;
- assessments of sites ranked at levels A,B, and C+.

It will consist of a range of measures, prepared after consultation with the affected groups, which will assist Council to encourage the protection and enhancement of the City's built heritage.

These measures may include both statutory and non-statutory initiatives and will be responsive to the special characteristics of Caulfield's built heritage.

Heritage At Risk

The preliminary survey has shown that some of the City's heritage has already been lost. Only 8 buildings in Caulfield are now covered by controls aimed at retaining heritage. These are the buildings registered under the Historic Buildings Act. A permit from the Historic Buildings Council is needed for demolition, alterations, or other development of these properties.

Most other existing buildings, for example houses in residential zones, can be altered, added to or demolished as long as a building permit is issued. Council cannot consider the effect on building heritage when granting building permits.

A building's heritage quality as seen from the street can be degraded by:

- demolition
- carports or other outbuildings not in keeping with the building style;

- altering the building facade so as to remove or cover heritage features;
- painting or putting up an advertising sign that is not in keeping with the building style;
- adding extensions not in keeping with the building style.

How Can Heritage Be Managed?

Council could ultimately manage the built heritage of the City by statutory Town Planning controls, conservation guidelines or a combination of the two, over privately owned land.

Statutory

Council could list the four "historic areas" as Urban Conservation Areas under the Caulfield Planning scheme. It could also identify significant buildings outside the "historic areas" under the scheme. It could then require town planning permission to be given for all or some of the following changes.

- demolition
- alterations
- additions
- new buildings
- advertising signs

Council could then take the design of these building works and how they affect heritage value, into account.

Council could also decide on lesser degrees of control, by allowing some types of development without planning permission, for example:

- alterations not visible from the street;
- alterations not to the street facade and not including parts of the building of importance to its design:
- alterations that are for maintenance or repair such as painting, gutter replacement, roof tile replacement.

Non-Statutory

Council could provide design guidelines for property owners, giving a practical guide to what building works are in keeping with the heritage character of the area or building.

Boyd collection Disabled Persons Parking Scheme

THE Road Safety (Disabled Persons) Regulations 1990 and the Code for the Disabled Persons Parking Scheme came into effect in December 1990.

The Statewide Disabled Persons Parking Scheme was developed by a Working Party comprising representatives of the Municipal Association of Victoria, Metropolitan Municipal Association, Local Government, people with intellectual and physical disabilities, Australian Medical Association, Victoria Police and VIC ROADS

Following advice from Council representatives on the Working Party, it was agreed that Council would have 12 months to phase in the new Scheme.

Purpose of the Scheme

The purpose of the Statewide Disabled Persons Parking Scheme is to provide people with significant ambulatory or intellectual disabilities with equal opportunity to access facilities and services throughout the State.

Types of Permits

The following types of permits will be issued for use under the Disabled Persons Parking Scheme:

- Code A for a disabled passenger/driver
- Code B for passenger
- Code C for an organisation providing a transport service for people with disabilities and;
- Code D for a temporary permit

Eligibility

- 1. A person will be eligible for a disabled persons parking permit if a medical practitioner determines that he/she has a significantly ambulatory disability such that he/she is incapable of walking:
- unaided or unassisted and;
- up or down a slope of 1.14 (ie.a wheelchair ramp) and;
- up or down steps or gutters

If a specialist medical practitioner or a clinical psychologist determines that he/

she has a significant intellectual disability such that he/she is an extreme danger to himself/herself and others in a public place without continuous attendance by a caregiver.

2. An organisation will be eligible for a disabled persons patking permit if it is recognised by a Council as providing a transport service for people with significant ambulatory or intellectual disabilites.

New Parking Permit

As of December 31, 1991, the above parking permit will be recognised by police and Council traffic officers.

If a disabled person has an old style permit, they should make an application at City Offices, corner Glen Eira and Hawthorn Rds, Caulfield South to obtain a new one. Action should be taken soon as both police and Council traffic officiers are issuing parking infringements on vehicles displaying the old style permits.

Conditions applying to Permits

- A permit is valid up to and including the expiry date, provided that the expiry date and permit number are legible;
- The parking entitlements applicable to the permit apply anywhere in Victoria. Reciprocal arrangements between states which have been agreed to be the Australian Transport Advisory Council also apply;
- The permit must be clearly displayed at the left side of the front windscreen, with the expiry date and permit number visible from the outside of the vehicle;

When requested by an authorised officer, a driver using the permit must:

- state his/her name and address
- produce his/her driver's licence
- produce the relevant valid

- disabled persons' permit
- show proof that he/she or a passenger in the vehicle is the permit holder
- move the vehicle from the reserved place, if the officer deems that the permit is invalid or
- that there is insufficient proof that the driver or a passenger in the vehicle is the permit holder
- Adriver using the permit must either be the permit holder or must be parking the vehicle for the convenience of the permit holder who needs to leave the vehicle.
- The permit remains the property of the issuing council and must be returned within seven days of notification of such return being required.
- A person may only hold one permit.
- An organisation may hold more than one permit but must justify in writing to the Council the number of permits required.
- Provided no other restrictions on parking are breached, a vehicle correctly displaying a valid disabled persons parking permit may be parked either:
- in a parking area or bay designated for use by people with disabilities for the time and parking fee specified for that area or bay, if applicable or;
- for twice the specified time for any parking area or bay not designated for use by classes of people or classes of vehicles, upon payment of any initial parking fee, if applicable.

Australian landscapes by Polish artist

ANDREW Bartosz was born in Poland in 1946. As a painter he specialises mostly in modern land-scapes, nudes in oil and watercolors, acrylics and pastels.

Bartosz studied at the National College of Fine Arts from 1960 to 1965 and undertook private studies with Professor Marian Turwid from 1965 to 1966. He then attended the Mikolaj Kopernik University, Torun, Poland from 1971 to 1981.

Andrew is well known to European audiences, with his works being displayed in prominent galleries and private collections. Since 1982, Andrew has been working and painting in Melbourne and this exhibition will be his first major one showing in Australia.

Andrew's large scale works depict the Australian landscape as seen through the eyes of a Polish trained artist who has had the opportunity to take advantage of lessons learned from two vastly different cultures. His works are in oil, watercolor, gouache, pastel and pencil and incorporate themes of landscapes, still lifes and nudes.

The landscapes in particular are not easy to categorise because they are an interesting mixture of abstract forms of biomorphic shapes on two picture planes. The bush is reduced to a series of powerful images, textures and contrasts.

The figurative nudes are closely related to the landscapes, through an emphasis on simplified forms, balanced composition and sublimated painter lines. The bodies are transformed and reduced to basic characteristics - almost

sculpturesque in nature, flexible and translucent. An overall feeling of passion and sexuality is exposed in the poses.

Additionally an interesting and exciting part of the exhibition are his works on paper, including watercolors and pencil drawings.

This is however, an exhibition that should be experienced rather than explained.

The exhibition will be held at the Caulfield Arts Complex from February 9 to February 23, 1992.

Pirate Pete invites children between the ages of five and twelve years to help him find his treasure, while discovering the range of art works at City Hall.



Development of Health Plan for Caulfield

Caulfield is currently in the process of developing its Municipal Health Plan to improve community health

The Municipal Health Plan

The 1988 Health General Amendment Act required every municipality in Victoria to prepare, at three year intervals, a Municipal Health Plan. The objectives of such a Plan include:

- the identification and assessment of actual and potential public health dangers affecting the municipal district and;
- the outling of programs and strategies which Council intends to pursue.

Health Plan implementation

As an initial part of the planning process, a working party was established to consider requirements necessitated by the Act. Consequently, the working party has prepared a discussion paper to define projects and describe current health service provisions and facilties in the municipality.

One of the key concerns of the working party has been to ensure that a 'community needs' based approach to the project is taken, allowing for a high level

of emphasis on public consultation processes.

Project Steering Committee

The development of the Municipal Public Health Plan will be managed by a Project Steering Committee who will be involved in all aspects of the planning process.

- two Environmental Health officers from the Health & Legislation Department
- two representatives from **Human Services**
- two representatives from the Community Health Service


