Boyd family recognised in **Outer Circle parkland**

THE Outer Cicle Railway Park will be renamed, "Outer Circle Railway - Boyd Park."

In 1988, Caulfield Council applied to the Place Names Committee to rename the Caulfield section of the Outer Circle Railway Park, in honour of the Boyd's, Murrumbeena's family of talented painters, potters, writers and musicians.

"Open Country" was the name of the Boyd property adjoining the Park and is the theme for the Park, created in a plaque by Merric Boyd's grand daughter, Lenore Boyd. "Open Country" depicts Merric's view of life in early Murrumbeena.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Veronika Martens said, "It has been a long and slow process, but with perserverence from Council and help from Caulfield Environment Group member, Colin Smith, whose survey of the Murrumbeena community provided a clear indication of how much pride is placed in this part of Caulfield's history, the Park will be renamed "Boyd Park."

"The Boyd family has played a significant role in Caulfield's history and we can be proud of our efforts in recognising them." I look forward to seeing members of the community attend the official opening of the Park on Sunday, May 24, at 2pm."

Meet your councillors

News in brief

New synagogue

CAULFIELD Council, at its last executive services committee meeting, approved an application to use an existing building for a synagogue at 22 Balaclava Rd, North Caulfield. The applicant intends to extend and renovate the property and use the building for a place of worship.

The committee, having considered numerous objections, decided to issue a Notice of Decision to grant a planning permit with standard planning conditions. Hours of operation and landscape planning were included in the additional conditions for the application.

Multi-Unit development

CAULFIELD Council has approved an application to build a 21 unit single storey development, at 22 Sussex Rd, Caulfield South.

Council granted the application, but stipulated that all persons living in the development must be over the age of 55 years and should qualify for Ministry of Housing Assistance.

Councillor selected for Ports electorate

CAULFIELD Councillor, Helen Friedmann has been selected as the Liberal candidate to contest Victoria's most marginal Federal seat, Melbourne Ports.

Cr Friedmann, 48 has been a resident of Caulfield for 27 years and a South Ward Councillor since 1987.

She has been a member of the Liberal Party for 17 years.

Melbourne Ports incorporates parts of Caulfield and South Yarra and all of St Kilda, South Melbourne, Middle Park, Albert Park and Port Melbourne.

Proposed State control - too lax

ACTION taken by Caulfield Council and a number of other councils, has helped influence a statewide amendment for control over gaming.

In December 1991, Caulfield Council resolved to prepare a local planning scheme amendment, which, if approved, would result in the need for a planning permit for five or more gaming machines on a premises.

As a result, a letter from the Minister for Planning and Housing, the Hon. Andrew McCutcheon, MLA and the Minister responsible for gaming, the Hon. Tom Roper, MLA stated that it would be premature for councils to prepare a local law, or change their planning schemes to control Gaming as the Minister was considereing a State Planning Scheme Amendment.

The proposed amendment applies to planning schemes in Victoria and will set State policy and controls for the use of land for Gaming.

The controls are based on the

view that if less than 33.3% of the premises' floor area is used for gaming purposes, there is no change in the basic function of the premises and therefore a planning permit is not required.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Veronika Martens met recently with mayors from the Cities of Prahran, Malvern and Oakleigh to discuss the details of the proposed amendment and as a result, they have written a joint letter to the Hon. Andrew McCutcheon supporting, in principle, the Minister's approach, but raised some concerns about the details of the amendments.

Cr Martens, said "local planning authorities are responsible to ensure protection of residential amenity. The proposed amendment would not enable this to occur."

"Floor area of 33.3% is considered too high in regard to the compact areas that are required for gaming machines. If the floor area is used, it should be much less than the proposed 33.3%," she added.

Council's flag debate

AT the Council's March policy and environment committee meeting, Cr Robert Kirby requested that a report be presented to the Council, on the reasons for selecting the flags displayed in the Council Chamber, in particular the Union Jack.

Cr Kirby, said "The Union Jack forms part of the Australian flag. which will always be displayed in Caulfield City Hall. It is no longer appropriate to display a flag which doesn't represent Australia," he said.

"There are a large number of nationalities represented in Caulfield. At Council's last Naturalisation ceremony, there were 28 countries represented," he

A survey of neighbouring

councils has revealed that the Union Jack is displayed in only one other council chamber, with others carrying the Australian and Council flags.

There is no display of the English flag in State or Federal Government buildings. At State Government level, the Australian flag is displayed together with the Victorian flag.

A change in Caulfield's display requires a resolution of Council, which will be considered at a meeting in several months time.

for Conservation and Environment, the Hon. Barry Pullen, MP, launched a Melbournewide milk and juice carton recycling scheme, developed by the Association of Liquid Paperboard carton manufacturers, in conjunction with Food Plus stores and Australian Pulp and Paper Mills (APPM).

Recycling of liquid/

paperboard cartons

ON April 10, 1992, the Minister

Caulfield residents can now take their milk and juice cartons to any Food Plus store for recycling. There will be a carton-shaped recycling bin at each Food Plus store and APPM will collect the cartons and transfer them to their mill where the cartons will be made into quality office paper.

It has been requested that the used cartons be thoroughly rinsed out and then flattened prior to depositing in the recycling bins. A convenient method of handling is to insert a number of flattened cartons into an open carton.

Pruning of street trees

THE Council has a responsibility to ensure that the SEC power lines in the streets are kept clear of branches from street trees. This prevents the likelihood of fire or disruption to electricity service, caused by wires touching on windy days or brought down by falling branches.

Each year, the Council employs a contractor to carry out pruning works on trees throughout the City to clear power lines and also to provide a clearance to pedestrian and vehicular traffic on footways and roads.

The 1992 contractor commenced work in late April and will continue until August. It is expected that 1230 nature strip trees will be pruned.

Some pruning close to power

lines requires a shutdown of electricity in a street for safety reasons. This is usually done between 9.30am and 3.30pm by the SEC and advance notice of one week is given to residents.

Engineering update

When a power cable in the street or a property service is interfered with by branches of a tree growing on private property, then the property owner has the responsiblity of notifying the SEC and making arrangements for the pruning on a private basis.

AllI suitable prunings produced by the Council or its contractor are processed through a woodchipping machine and the chips become available for use on the Council's landscape projects, or for sale to residents from the Council's works depot in Glen Huntly.

St James Pde reconstruction

CAULFIELD Council is currently conducting the public tendering process for the works of reconstruction of St James Parade in Elsternwick.

The work is being carried out under the Council's Local Road Reconstruction Program and is expected to commence at the end of June this year.

The works include new concrete and kerb channel on both sides of the street, extensive underground stormwater drainage installation and new asphalt surfacing to most areas of the road pavement.

Property access has been a problem in the street and the works are designed to restore the function of vehicle crossings to properties. Property owners are not required to contribute towards this project.

More specific advice of works commencement will be given to all affected residents when a contractor is appointed.

Swimming pool committee members needed

NOMINATIONS are being sought from persons interested in becoming a member of the Swimming Pool Advisory Committee to the Caulfield Memorial Pool in Moira Ave, Carnegie.

The object of this committee is to review the operation and management of the Municipal Pool and to make recommendations to the Council on budgetry or operational measures that will improve the standard of the facility and encourage greater attendances at the pool.

The Committee does not have a direct role in management aspects of the pool.

The previous Committee membership was on an interim basis for season 1991/ 92 and under the terms of its establishment all members have now vacated their membership. The Council is therefore seeking nominations for the 1992/93 season.

Persons nominating must be residents of Caulfield.

Meetings will be held three to four times a year.

Major rating review underway

- will it cost you more or less?

CAULFIELD Council is assessing the impact of a number of changes which will effect the rating process next year. Whilst these may increase or decrease the amount of rates paid by individual properties, they will not, them selves change the Council's total rate revenue.

The following are some notes on the major changes

Minimum Rate - Council is obliged to either discontinue or phase out the present Minimum Rate scheme.

The previous Local Government Act allowed a Council to fix a minimum amount of rates to be paid.

The concept was that there was a minimum level of service provided to all properties and residents. It was appropriate that all assessments should pay at least this amount.

Being a minimum amount, the system obviously impacted on only the lower valued properties in each of the above classes. Municipal Charge - The new legislation gives councils the option to impose a Municipal Charge of up to \$100 in 1992/

A charge is a set amount applied to all assessments without discrimination. It is similar in operation to the present garbage charge.

The concept in the new Act is that every property in the municipality should contribute an equal portion of the administrative costs of the Council. The Government has now allowed councils to recover these costs by way of an equal charge on every property.

Property Revaluations- All properties must be revalued on a four yearly cycle. A new valuation will be in use for the 1992/ 93 year.

The Council can also consider changing the system.

N.A.V. (Net Annual Valuations) - This is the rating system currently used in Caulfield. The valuation is based upon the net return or rent of a property. For residential properties, the legislation provides that this must be 5% of the Capital Improved Value of the property.

C.I.V. (Capital Improved Valuations) - This valuation could be best decribed as being the market value of a property, ie: land and all improvements on the land.

If C.I.V. is adopted for rating purposes, then the legislation also empowers the Council to adopt differential rates.

During the current revaluation of the City, it has been noticed that the market value of single occupancy dwellings has been increasing, on average, at a faster rate than commercial/industrial properties.

This will be reflected in the four yearly property revaluations. Other things being equal, the effect will be to increase the rates paid by this class of property.

Public consultation process The Council will be discussing the options at a meeting on Tuesday, June 16 at 8pm in the Council Chamber, City Hall.

Residents and interested parties are invited to submit their views, either by writing or attending the meeting.

Copies of various information papers on rating are available from Brian Hoban, Council's director corporate services.

Council officers would be pleased to discuss any issues directly with ratepayers.

Caulfield Hospital update

CAULFIELD Mayor Cr Veronika Martens and chief executive officer, Doug Aylen, recently met with the shadow minister for Health, The Hon Marie Tehan, MLC, and Caulfield Member, Ted Tanner to discuss the Opposition's commitment to the Caulfield General Medical Centre.

Marie Tehan said she believed that a long term plan for the hospital is essential and that triennial Government Funding is necessary to give hospitals the confidence to plan ahead. "Certainly I and my

parliamentary colleagues see the continuation of a hospital on that campus which is compatible with the community's requirements."

Cr Martens said she felt it was a productive meeting and felt confident of future support from the Opposition.

Cr Martens and CEO, Doug Aylen will meet with Brian Howe, Deputy Prime Minister and Member for Melbourne Ports. The Hon. Clyde Holding on May 15, to discuss hosptial issues including funding.

Council pushes for netball complex

CAULFIELD Council has applied to the State Government for \$150,000 funding assistance needed for a proposed netball complex at Duncan MacKinnon Park.

This is a further step in Council's endeavour to expand sporting facilities available to women in Caulfield.

Council's application to the Federal Government Department of Arts, Sport, the Environment and Territories in December 1991, was unsuccessful due to limited funding.

As a result, Caulfield Mayor, Cr Veronika Martens and chief executive officer, Doug Aylen met with the State Minister for Sport and Recreation, the Hon. Neil Tresize, who showed strong support for the need of a netball facility and was positive that funding would be available in September this year.

Cr Martens compared the lack

of facilities available to women in Caulfield and neighbouring municipalities, with the number of venues available for men's sports. "While these facilities may be used by sportswomen, the major women's sport, netball is not catered for," she said.

"Netball today is fast becoming popular with men as well as women and therefore a facilty should be available in Caulfield. Council will work hard to ensure that all avenues are explored, enabling appropriate funding assistance for this complex," she

The complex will also serve neighbouring municipalities, such as Malvern, Moorabbin, Oakleigh, Prahran and Brighton creating a regional facility.

The proposed netball complex will comprise eight all weather courts, with floodlighting, together with pavilion facilities and carparking.

If you have ever been obstructed by a tree or shrub hanging over the fence of a resident's property, don't curse the Council, as it is up to the property owner to keep trees and shrubs under control!

If a Council officer leaves a notice for you to cut back your trees you must do so with 14

Trees must be cut to a height of three metres above the ground and vertically in line with your

property boundary.

If you do not comply with the notice, the Council will carry out the work and bill the owner.

When cutting back your trees, remember, do not leave or burn the cuttings on the naturestrip

or in the gutter.



Caulfield remembers a pioneer A train ride of joy

A COMMEMORATIVE plaque was unveiled recently in recognition of Caulfield's well known veteran athlete, Gus Theobold.

The plaque, which was officially unveiled by Caulfield Mayor, Cr Veronika Martens, is located on the wall of the grandstand at Duncan MacKinnon Reserve, home of the Glen Huntly Athletic Club, of which Gus was a member for many

Tragically, on the night of August 8, 1990, Gus was struck down and killed by a vehicle while crossing busy North Rd.

Gus, born March 5, 1897 began his athletic career at age 35. He was classed "too old" to compete in events other than walk-

He won the Open Victorian and Australian 50km walks in 1949 at the age of 52.

When the Veterans' Associa-

tion was formed in the 1970's. Gus was a foundation member. He was undeafeated thereafter and still holds all the Victorian and Australian records for his age group.

Gus's enormous contribution to athletics was recognised in 1982 when he was awarded the British Empire Medal.

Gus Theobold provided both inspiration and encouragement to the sport of athletics.

Caulfield's Commercial Strategy

THE Draft 1992 Commercial Strategy is on public exhibition until the end of May.

The Strategy highlights that concentrated effort is required to bolster Caulfield's commercial areas, particularly Elsternwick and Carnegie in light of major retail expansion outside the muncipality.





COUNCIL'S building control staff are available to assist you with relating advice building regulations, Council policies and construction techniques, prior to preparation of final documentation for building

A feasible yearly average is \$30 million.

Prior to booking a building inspection, it is important to have the site clearly identified with a sign showing the street number and owner's name at the time of the building application.

An approved toilet facility must be on site prior to the first inspection. The builder is required to call for and have the following inspections approved during the course of the building works:

a) Ground inspection - inspecment of concrete.

Trenches to be inspected when dug, cleaned out and level. Pegs and steel reinforcement placed.

Stump holes

Inspection required when stump holes are dug, cleaned out and prior to the positioning of stumps.

Framing

Inspection is required when timber frame buildings are framed or in the case of brick or concrete buildings, when the walls are erected and the roof framed

The design office staff are involved in the preliminary investigation and estimation of the Capital Works Program. After obtaining approval for works, they are required to undertake the surveying, detailed design, plan preparation and go through the tendering process where applicable, and carry out on site supervision of works.

Construction projects Almost all of Council's major engineering works are carried out by a contractor or negotiated on a sub contractor basis. The bulk of staff time is spent on-site during the currency of works to ensure contractors comply with Council specificaions. There is also a need for staff to occasionally set out the

type of work required. General enquiries Design office staff have direct contact with ratepayers and the general public. Staff provide advice on a number of areas

which include Property information sought by owners, developers etc., covering allotment locaions, Title boundaries and easenent information

* hard rubbish collection Household garbage - Council operates a weekly clearance of household garbage to all residences and provides 240 litre mobile bins for this purpose. The service operates weekdays including public holidays. Bins should be placed on the naturestrip for collection prior to

6am on the day of collection. Trade waste collection - This system also uses 240 litre mobile garbage bins (with orange lids) and charges to customers are set to recover costs, with a view to current commercial rates.

Recycling - Glass products, aluminium cans and large plastic PET, PVC and HDPE containers should be left for collection on a weekly basis the same day as the household garbage zens clubs and offstreet bins and placed in the plastic recycling bag provided by the contractor to every residence. Paper and cardboard are collected monthly by a different contractor, but also on the same day as the household garbage. A calendar indicating the collection days is available from Council's engineering depart-

Parks maintenance Council has a system where its major parks and gardens are maintained by permanent groundsmen/women.Tasks include; weeding, edging, trimming, hand mowing, litter pick up, and cleaning of barbecues. Landscaping maintenance

There is considerable work involved in landscape maintenance which includes work at Council properties such as hostels, child minding centres, libraries, elderly citi-

Swimming pool Maintenance of the Caulfield pool located in Moira Ave. Carnegie, includes: upkeep of kiosk, shower maintenance, painting/sandblasting of pools and continuous maintenance of the plant and equipment at the pool. The pool offers a number of facilities including, 4 pools, giant water slide, electric barbecues and a well between November and March

Statutory and Strategic **Planning** Planning in Caulfield can be

Most of the tasks relate to statutory planning which involves applying for permits, the zoning system and other legal processes including enforcement of planning controls. Strategic planning includes the preparation of forward plans, policies and strategies to guide the future direction of Council.It often involves survey research work and the production of planning policies or codes with advice on Council's policies or regulations for residential and commercial development, carparking, tennis court lighting etc. Both fields of planning frequently overlap in matters such as amendments to the planning

scheme or rezoning of land.

Each zone has objectives which provide a guide as to the primary purpose of the zone. Within each zone certain land uses are listed as prohibited in that zone. permitted unconditionally or permitted subject to a planning permit. A planning permit is issued by Caulfield Council, in most cases, for a specific use or development on a particular parcel of land. It may have certain conditions attached to it which define or limit the use permitted. For example, a permit to allow the use of a building for a restaurant will usually be subject to conditions relating to a maximum number of customers or hours of operation or

provision of carparking. Few planning permits are issued without conditions as they allow the Council, the applicant and residents to be more certain of the parameters under which the use may operate or



CAULFIELD Arts Complex will hold a retrospective exhibition of drawings, illustrations, prints and paintings by Thomas de Kessler, from May 13-24, 1992.

Born in Budapest, Hungary, in 1925, Thomas de Kessler studied art at the Academy of Applied and Fine Arts in Budapest and later at RMIT in Melbourne.

This retropspective exhibition of approximately 180 works (predominantly drawings and illustrations) is an interesting reflection of Thomas de Kessler - the social and political commentator and, of course, the person.

Spanning 45 years of his life, the works displayed reveal the sympathy the artist has for the victims of war and its ramifications of isolation, despair and destruction; the inevitable competitive nature of man and the corruption and decay are unavoidable consequences of

His early works of the late 1940s and early 1950s and his recent drawings of the late 1980s and early 1990s, mainly relate

to the folly of politicans, various military regimes and the desire for power disguised and sold as beneficial for political and social evolution. Thomas de Kessler endeavours to find the truth behind these facades and expose the stupidity, corruption and propaganda, engenderd by false prophets, corrupt political leaders and misguided social redeemers.

While his romantic scraperboard illustrations of Hungarian fairytales are at first sight lyrical and poetic, they too represent an era where the romanticised past served as a political tool under an oppressive semi-fascist regime.

Technically accomplished and politically poignant, this exhibition deserves serious consideration. The artist's message of the neccessity to change our ways and create a better world without pretension, social inequality, racism, political oppression and military madness, is

The Boyds, A family portrait and part of Caulfield's history

TO develop a picture of the Boyd family and the artistic and cultural life surrounding their Murrumbeena property, "Open Country", is the current priority of the Art Selection committee for the City of Caulfield.

In starting to create this picture of a story that is both artistically and historically significant to the Caulfield area, it has been decided to focus firstly on the work of the father of the Murrumbeena family, Merric

Also dubbed 'The Father of Studio Pottery' in Australia in a major exhibition of his work at the National Gallery of Victoria in 1990. Merric's adventurous hand modelled work embodies the sweeping lines and rhythmic aesthetics of the European Art Nouveau movement, yet using uniquely Australian motifs, such as koalas, gum trees and kookaburras.

Merric, a well known local identity, also taught the craft of pottery to his children Lucy, Arthur, Guy, David and Mary in their early years, who would model work alongside their father in his studio. Merric's wife, Doris, was also very active, decorating many of the pots

Merric made to be sold in shops around Melbourne.

All of the Boyd children went on to become artists in their adult lives, with Arthur and Guy both setting up commercial potteries at the Murrumbeena home at different times. The "Arthur Merric Boyd Pottery". as it was named, was dominated by Arthur, with involvement from the artists John Perceval and Neil Douglas, while the "Guy Boyd Pottery" involved this artist's own immediate family.

The Boyd family played a signficant role in Caulfield's history. Given this, the Art Selection committee is extremely keen to hear from people with works by Merric Boyd, especially, but also by any members of the Boyd family who may like to donate or sell them to the City of Caulfield collection. All donations are tax deductible under the Commonwealth Government's tax incentives for the Arts Scheme

Passive smoking affects your child's development

THIS year's Quit Week starts on World No Tobacco Day, May 31. Its primary focus will be the dangers of passive smoking around children.

Once comforted by glamorous images of cigarettes, the smoker has shifted to a precarious position in society's eyes. Not only are smokers becoming more aware of what smoking does to them, but also what it does to the people around them.

Ten years ago, the effects of smoking on adults were not well understood. The well-established links between smoking, lung cancer, coronary heart disease, depressed lung function and airways irritation are not limited to smokers alone. The risk for passive smokers is clearly less than for active smokers, but it is a plainly unacceptable risk imposed without consent.

Director of the Quit Campaign, Ms Michelle Scollo says, "the evidence is now very clear that passive smoking can cause serious health problems such as lung cancer, heart disease and attacks of asthma.

"Obviously, the exposure of non-smokers to tobacco smoke varies a great deal. For many, the exposure is heavy and frequent. Unborn babies and young children are at special risk," said Ms Scollo.

Making healthy choices such as quitting smoking and eating healthy food when you become pregnant will not only make you feel better, but it will give your baby a great start to life.

The likelihood of having a low-weight baby increases if

the mother smokes during the pregnancy; the chances of miscarriage, complications during the birth and perinatal death also increases.

Asthmatic children of smokers have more attacks, more severe attacks and the condition develops earlier. Children of smokers are also more likely to develop serious chest infections such as bronchitis and pneumonia, especially during the first years of life. Living with one smoker during childhood and adolescence doubles the risk of lung cancer for a non-smoker. The Australian Bureau of Statistics suggests that almost 50% of children live in a household where at least one adult smokes. A large proportion of ill-health amongst children can be attributed to cigarette smoking.

Smoking is also linked with a lower growth rate in childhood and slower progress in reading, writing and other learning. What causes this is not clear, but it is real. It is suspected that some growth and health problems experienced through childhood might have their roots in the child's exposure to the harmful chemicals in smoke before birth.

The purpose of the 1992 Quit Program is not to scare, judge or criticise, but simply to provide parents and carers of children with information to which they have a right. Special attention should be paid to places where children are cared for and places where they go to play or to eat.
