# Boost to job creation in Caulfield

CAULFIELD has been quick to take up the challenge of the Federal Government to provide jobs from the local capital works program funding.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Ed Biggs, said "When you have the unemployment problem constantly in mind, it is not difficult to develop works and undertakings to employ people."

The following projects were submitted for approval on September 1 and will receive support from Federal local members, The Hon. Clyde Holding and The Hon Simon Crean.

- Residential safety improvements
- Gardenvale Park development
   Hughesdale Shopping Centre

upgrade

- Construction of unmade right of ways
- Construction of underground drainage
- Local Area Traffic management
- Enhance and restore playgrounds

The total cost of these projects is \$964,868, with the Government grant of \$874,800 and Council contribution of \$90,068.

In addition, the City is having designs prepared for the relocation of the Maple St Library to City Hall and extensions to the Meals On Wheels kitchen and facilities.

Caulfield was placed in category three of the program which recognises the average unemployment rate for the last four

quarters in the selection criteria. Caulfield's unemployment rate in the March quarter was 11.8% with 4,165 people out of work. Federal funds for the program will be administered by the Municipal Association of Victoria and guidelines for project approval have been determined. Another media release by the

Federal Minister for Local Government, Mr David Simmons, announced a further \$1.2 million of grants for Caulfield. However, these funds are the annual Grants Commission and Road Grants for 1992/93 and are in line with the level of funds anticipated by the Council.

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COUNCILLOR, Ed Biggs has been elected as Mayor of Caulfield for 1992/93.

Cr Biggs, who has represented Caulfield's east ward for three years, was elected to the mayoral position at the Council's statutory meeting on August 4.

North ward Councillor, Nicholas Gold was elected deputy

Accepting the mayoralty, Cr Biggs said he was honored to have been elected.

"During my term as Mayor, it is my intention to ensure that Council keeps in touch with the residents of this municipality."

"I am also committed to maintaining financial responsibility," he said.

Cr Biggs, 49 lives in Murrumbeena with wife Jo and three children David, 13, Natashia, 11 and Sarah, 8. He has been man-

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ager of the National Football Council for the past 15 years and in his spare time, enjoys long distance running.

Cr Biggs, together with Cr James Barrett, has been very active in bringing the Life Education program to Caulfield. The Life Education Program is a

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## News in brief

#### **Unemployment project**

CAULFIELD Council has adopted a Permaculture project which is aimed at addressing Caulfield's unemployed youth. The matter, discussed at the August policy and environment committee meeting was identified by the Committee due to the continuing high unemployment figures.

The Committee had no reservation approving the program, which once implemented, will involve training of 15 young unemployed youth to develop basic horticultural and life skills, preparing them for future employment opportunities.

#### Corporate Plan

COUNCIL'S corporate plan, as it appeared in the July issue of Caulfield Contact, was deferred at the August policy and environment committee meeting, to allow for further council input.

As the plan, once adopted, will be operational for a three year period, the Committee thought it was imperative to ensure that all aspects of the Plan were analysed to ensure that clear objectives and programs were in place.

#### **Double storey dwellings**

A PLANNING permit has been issued for the development of two double storey dwellings at 3 Langdon Rd, Caulfield North.

Council's executive services committee issued the permit with the condition that there be no balcony constructed on the first floor of the development as it would cause overlooking to the abutting property.

The Committee agreed that it was pleasing to see cooperation shown by the applicant and the abutting property owners in reaching this compromised decision.

# New shelter for Boyd Park

A TIMBER and mud brick gazebo has been constructed at the northern end of the Outer Circle Railway - Boyd Park.

The gazebo is a unique construction, made entirely from Australian materials. It is a six sided building with chunky timber posts of Australian Cypress Pine (Callitn's glauca), from

Narrandera in southern New South Wales. It also features mud brick infills on three sides, all capped with a peaked corrugated iron roof.

This addition to the parkland is a focal point and shelter which further enhances the character and history of the Outer Circle Railway parkland.

# Corporate services six monthly report

CAULFIELD Council's corporate services division has undergone some major changes according to corporate services director, Brian Hoban.

The comprehensive report, released at the August policy and environment committee meeting, details the division's activities during the past six months and focuses on objectives and achievements for the forthcoming year.

One of the highlights from the report is Library Service's newly introduced Monday opening, making this service available to the community seven days a week. Among other things, the extended hours have been a contributing factor in the Service's circulation increase.

Council's early repayment of two more loans which resulted from the availability of funds at the mid year review, will mean future savings for Council's budget

Caulfield Arts Complex staged 14 exhibitions in the six month period, attracting some 20,500 visitors during this time. The two most popular exhibitions staged were the VCE Year 12 Folio exhibition which saw art students from all over Victoria visit the gallery and attracted 6500 visitors. The Art of the Tin Toy exhibition, which attracted 4500 visitors, received extensive TV and newspaper coverage. A similar event, Once Upon A Time is scheduled for December this year, (see page 9 for information about this exciting event).

Mr Hoban, said "The period has been one of major change and review, however, I am confident that the groundwork has been soundly laid for substantial improvement in the more efficient and effective delivery of services in the coming year.

# **Engineering update**

# Staniland Gve/Orrong Rd carpark and R.O.W. reconstruction

CAULFIELD Council recently appointed a contractor to resurface the carpark and rebuild the associated bluestone paved Right of Way located between Staniland Gve and Orrong Rd, at the rear of the Glen Huntly Rd Elsternwick shopping Centre.

This work had become necessary due to the deterioration of the existing surface in both the R.O.W. and carpark.

Total cost of the project was \$30,000 and was carried out by Centro Constructions.

The works included the construction of a new concrete spoon drain and the installation of an underground drainage system with the R.O.W. section, resheeting of the R.O.W. and the entire adjoining carpark with a new asphalt surface.

#### Station St improvements

COUNCIL has recently carried out improvements on the south side of Station St, just east of Kambrook Rd. These works included installation of underground drainage, a new concrete footpath and adjoining concrete kerb and channel.

This work had become necessary due to the deterioration of the footpath, kerb and channel and associated drainage network discharging into Station St from the racecourse site. The new drainage network has now redirected this stormwater outfall into an underground drain.

Total cost of the project was \$24,800 and was also carried out by Centro Constructions.

# Queens Ave/Normanby Rd intersection

CONTRACTORS employed by VicRoads have commenced installation of traffic signals at the intersection of Queens Ave and Normanby Rd.

This follows on from work carried out by Council in June this year of repositioning of the large traffic island and some realignment of the kerb lines to the south west and north west corners of the intersection.

Council will finalise work to paved surfaces when the traffic signal installation is completed.

It is anticipated that all work will be completed and that the traffic signals become operational by the end of this month.

# Local Area traffic management

COUNCIL recently appointed a contractor for the implementation of various mid-street and intersection treatments approved for local area scheme No. 44.

Local traffic management area No. 44 is bounded by Kangaroo Rd, Murrumbeena Rd, Dalny Rd and Poath Rd.

The initial part of this project involves the construction of six raised pavement slow points as well as improved delineation works at specific intersections. Cost of works is approximately \$42,000 and will be completed before the end of this month with the balance of the works in this area following early into the new Council year beginning in October 1992.

Such road works are expected to signficantly improve the various aspects of traffic volume, speed and safety record of this area.

A further area No. 40, bounded by North Rd, Booran Rd, Marara Rd and Bambra Rd will also have works implemented early in the new Council year.

# E E Gunn Park - female toilet block

NEW female toilets will be built in the north east corner of the E E Gunn Park, adjacent to the baseball pavilion with the project also scheduled for completion by the end of the month.

The toilets will provide a much requested facility for female athletes and spectators at match and training sessions who presently have to leave the area to use public toilets on the western side of the park. The proposed building, estimated to cost \$17,500 will be an extension to the existing male toilet block and be of the same brick and concrete construction.

#### Caulfield Park - public lighting

FOLLOWING a review of the lighting in the landscaped western end of the park, which includes the area around the lake, it has been decided to upgrade existing fittings to brighter more energy efficient ones.

In addition, some poles will be relocated and tree branches trimmed to provide the optimum distribution of light along the pathways through this area of the park.

Some works have already been completed which involved removing the lights from the SEC's public lighting circuit and connecting them to a new metered supply for the park which will provide for substantial savings in running costs.

The replacement of the existing fittings will be completed by the end of the month with the total project cost being estimated at \$20,000.

# New faces on Council

CAULFIELD has two new Councillors. They are west ward Councillor, Noel Erlich and south ward Councillor, Tony Browne.

Cr Noel Erlich, 42, who is married and a father of two, has lived in Caulfield for 18 years.

A qualified accountant by profession, Cr Erlich is also coproprietor of the Elsternwick Toyworld on a part time basis.

Cr Erlich is a member of five committees, one of those being Elsternwick Chamber of Commerce. President of this committee, Cr Erlich chose to stand for Council to enable the Chamber of Commerce to have input to Council.

Cr Erlich said he would like to see a reduction in rates, particularly for commercial properties and would eventually like to see a more centrally located swimming pool complex, offering improved facilities.

"I also believe that minor improvements, such as seating, trees and signage need to be made to enhance the Elsternwick Shopping Centre," said Cr Erlich.

Cr Tony Browne and his wife Louise moved to Elsternwick in 1987. They have four children, Spencer, 7, Fraser, 6, Angus, 5 and Charlie, 2.

"I believe I have an abiding interest in people in general as





## Caulfield Hospital update

#### Geriatric services

THE Caulfield General Medical Centre has been serving the needs of elderly residents of Caulfield and surrounding municipalities for many years. The Geriatric Assessment Team (GAT) based at the Centre, is the closest link to the community and provides medical and allied health consultations within the home.

The Team was formed in the early 1980s and is supported by a State/Commonwealth funding programme. The GAT, made up of doctors, community nurses and social workers, is coordinated by Annette Madden, who has lived and worked in Caulfield all her life.

Annette has seen many changes in the past few years, with the amalgamation of the Caulfield and Royal Southern Memorial Hospitals to form CGMC and together with the Alfred to form The Alfred Group of Hospitals. Professor Nick Christophidis, CGMC's director of geriatric services, was appointed professor of geriatric medicine at Monash University in 1988.

Professor Christophidis has a firm commitment to teaching and medical research. He is chairperson of a committee organising a symposium on cardiovascular disease in the elderly, at which the keynote speaker is Professor C Bulpitt, world leader in his field, from Hammersmith Hospital, Lon-

Professor Christophidis has fought for the creation of an Acute Geriatric Unit at the

Alfred, which means geriatric services for the Alfred Group now covers all levels of medical care for the elderly.

The full range of services from community based assessment through to acute care in a tertiary hospital (Alfred), introduces future doctors to the full scope of geriatric medi-

The GAT is the first contact many people have with geriatric services at CGMC. GAT members visit patients at home with the family to determine specific problems. Ongoing care is then arranged through inpatient assessment.

Inpatient assessment at CGMC is used to observe the functional capabilities of people with disabling conditions such as stroke, Parkinson's disease and arthritis. This rehabilitation program helps to enable people to return to their homes. If this is not possible, community nurses with special expertise advise and support the family and patient to arrange relocation to supervised accommodation or nursing homes

The Respite Care programme can be used to provide a two week admission every few months for frail disabled people otherwise cared for at home. This provides a welcome break to family carers and allows the families to function in their own home for months/years before a nursing home is necessary.

The services of the GAT can be arranged by referral from your local doctor. Social and functional problems arising from ageing referral will be accepted from family friends, or by direct personal contact.

# Caulfield promotes housing innovation

CAULFIELD Council has been involved with the Cities of Moorabbin, Mordialloc and Springvale in a study of housing throughout the region. Funded by the Federal Government and known as the Residential Regulations Review, or the Triple R Project, the Study was undertaken by planning consultants, Perrott Lyon Mathiesan.

Some interesting facts emerged from the Study, including:

- Across the region there is a high proportion of single person households.
- Of the four cities, Caulfield has the highest number and proportion of medium density units 45% of all its dwellings.
- Although the proportion of medium density units is high in Caulfield, they are built on only 13% of residential building sites. In other words, detached houses are built on the remaining 87% of properties in Caulfield.

Other general comments from the report emphasise that the State Government's urban consolidation policies should be more actively promoted by councils and 'flexible' dwelling designs

should accommodate a range of different household types.

A major part of the Study was the development of design ideas which could be applied to individual sites. The consultants looked at various development opportunities in each area, preparing concept drawings of houses built to property boundaries (zero lot lines) and dwellings at higher densities than are usually sought.

Some of the Consultant's 'concept' examples in Caulfield include:

Urban Gardens - based on the style of development at St Vincent's Place, South Melbourne, concept plans show higher density developments fronting Greenmeadows Gardens, North Caulfield. Unlike larger public parks, these smaller urban gardens are defined by surrounding streets and houses to create a special character.

Subdivision Patterns - the consultants said that in parts of Caulfield the road pattern created by adjacent subdivisions has produced housing sites overserviced by streets. An

example is Alder St at the intersections of Ellington, Keeron and Omar Sts. There is some potential for use of road areas for residential land according to the consultants.

Linear Park - due to remnants of railway line and easement, some fragments of parkland and public open space remain between Princes and Murrumbeena Parks. Such parkland could form the backbone of a continuous linear park with increased housing densities around the park.

A display of some of the concepts in this report, including plans, drawings and information can be viewed during September at the planning counter, Caulfield City Hall.

# From the 'hip pocket'

### How to take the worry out of retirement

AFTER many years of receving a regular pay cheque, the thought of your income stopping the day you retire can be quite daunting.

Most people can expect at least twenty years of retirement to enjoy - that's a long time for which to budget one lump sum payment. A person could spend years learning how to successfully manage their money through all the peaks and troughs of fluctuating investment markets and ever-changing taxation rules.

So how can you maintain the lifestyle you have worked so hard to achieve withough threatening your financial security?

One way to avoid all that worry is to purchase immediate annuity.

When you invest in an annuity, you pay a life office a lump sum and in return receive a series of payments for as long as you nominate - ideally, for the rest of your life.

An annuity can be purchased with superannuation or non-superannuation money and may be payable for life, payable to a couple until death of the last surviving person and/or guaranteed for a fixed term. In effect, an annuity acts as a private pension.

#### Private pensions vs lump sums

Traditionally, Australians have favored the receipt of that big retirement cheque in one lump sum rather than as a private pension.

However, once the thrill of holding such a large cheque passes, there comes the worry about how to successfully manage that money throughout retirement to ensure it lasts a lifetime. Will you want this worry when you're 75, 85?

Unlike lump sum payments,

there is no lump sum tax payable on receiving your superannuation payment as an annuity and there is an income tax rebate for a proportion of the annuity which is deemed to be the repayment of part of your capital.

In addition, that proportion of the annuity payments that represents a captial return will no longer be counted as income by the Department of Social Security income means test, therefore not jeopardising a retiree's pension entitlement.

These days, you can also invest much higher amounts into superannuation provided at least 50% of your retirement benefit is taken as a pension or annuity, rather than all as a lump sum.

#### How to choose

When considering the purchase of an annuity, it is strongly recommended that you consult an expert on retirement planning. Not every annuity on the market is ideal for every individual and there are a lot of aspects to consider.

Any person who is retired or approaching retirement, should seriously consider including an annuity in their retirement plans to ensure their long term financial independence and peace of mind.

# Students get a kick out of science

APPROXIMATELY 2000 primary school aged children from various schools throughout Melbourne attended the ANZAAS Junior Science and Technology Festival held at Caulfield City Hall recently.

ANZAAS, (Australian and New Zealand Association for the Advancement of Science), has run these festivals since 1988 and have shown over 20,000 upper primary school aged children the fun and value of science.

The festival featured an exciting range of hands on experiments, scientific displays and demonstrations. Highlights included a display by the Victorian Police explaining how speed cameras work, the RACV demonstrating the technology behind a seatbelt and the Anti-Cancer Council's demonstration of how to make zinc cream. Other organisations such as the CSIRO, CRA, SEC and the MFB all took part in the festival, showing how science plays a part in everyday life.

The Swinburne Travelling Science Show demonstrated how to inflate a balloon with liquid nitrogen, how to make hair stand on end and how to keep a tennis ball in the air with suction from a vacuum cleaner.

# Caulfield student wins mathematics competition

MATHEMATICS may not be the staff of life for everyone, but it seems it is for year 10 Caulfield Grammar student, David Williams.

David, 15, recently achieved the Victorian first place (third nationally), at year 10 level in the recent Promaths National Interschool Mathematics competition

David's mark on the test placed him in the top 0.50% of year 10 students who entered the competition throughout Australia.

The Promaths National Interschool Mathematics competition began in NSW in 1989, and has this year, gone national, having been extended to include secondary schools in all Australian states and territories.

The aim of the competition is to enhance skills solving mathe-

matical problems. Students entered in the competition are asked to solve a series of problems which involve the use of general mathematical skills, rather than a reliance of knowledge of any particular syllabus areas

Caulfield Grammar School's Caulfield Campus headmaster, Mr Neil Lennie, said that entering the competition had fostered further the students' enthusiasm for mathematics and had challenged students to extend their mathematical horizons. "Students who participated have found the experience to be thoroughly enjoyable."

"While David's performance in the competition was truly outstanding, the achievement of all out students to gain sixth place was also encouraging," said Mr Lennie.

Elsternwick/Caulfield South Uniting Church, together with Caulfield Council have organised a series of information sessions for those who have recently experienced retrenchment.





# Caulfield's neighbourhood watchers

## SPECIAL FEATURE

## What is Neighbourhood Watch?

NEIGHBOURHOOD Watch is a community-based crime prevention program, aimed at minimising the incidence of preventable crime, especially burglary and theft, in a defined area.

Throughout the State of Victoria, a burglary is committed, on average, once every six minutes and in country Victoria alone, crime occurs every seven minutes.

Without cooperation from the community, the Police cannot effectively control this rate of crime

Neighbourhood Watch offers the community a means of actively participating in the prevention and detection of crime, in a joint partnership with the Victoria Police.

Neighbourhood Watch operates throughout Victoria within local communities affected by burglaries and theft, where there is a demonstrated community desire to undertake the program.

Many areas already have Neighbourhood Watch established and additional areas will be implemented when they satisfy the launch criteria.

#### How does Neighbourhood Watch work?

Residents of Neighbourhood Watch areas participate in the program through four basic strategies.

- Operation identification the marking of valuable household items with their driver's licence number preceded by the letter 'V' for Victoria, using an engraver or ultra-violet pen, or by photographing smaller items, such as jewellery, or items which cannot be marked like paintings and antiques.
- Informing residents of the incidence of crime in the area on a regular basis and advising them of how to best identify and report criminal and suspicious activity.
- Improving residents' awareness of personal and household security.
- Signposting in areas where Neighbourhood Watch operates as a deterrent to criminal activity.

Neighbourhood Watch is a partnership between the Victoria Police and the residents of Victoria, working together to prevent crime.

With cooperation between neighbours and the implementation of the four strategies of the program, Neighbourhood Watch can assist in creating safer neighbourhoods for all Victorians.

# Neighbourhood Watch in Caulfield

Neighbourhood Watch was first established in Caulfield in 1986. Caulfield is a sub-district branch of the Neighbourhood Watch 'C' District which includes the Cities of Moorabbin, Sandringham, Brighton, Oakleigh and Malvern.

The sub-district is made up of 34 areas which incorporate one of the area's four police stations.

The Caulfield sub district recently held a daytime Neighbourhood Watch meeting which attracted close to 200 residents.

According to chairperson of the Caulfield sub-district group,

Nola Baker, the day was a huge success.

"It was the first daytime meeting we've had and due to its success we will continue daytime meetings on a more regular basis. It enables residents who cannot and will not go out at night time, to receive information which could be vital to their own safety."

The meeting covered issues such as rape, local crime and information about locks and security systems. Also, what to do when a helicopter is hovering outside your home and what to do when the dog squad is surveying your area.

In the coming issues of Caulfield Contact, we will be focusing on individual Neighbourhood Watch areas within Caulfield and providing helpful hints on personal safety and home security. #### Someone's in the house


IF you return home to find your place has been broken into and suspect the burglar is still in the house, follow these steps:

 Do not enter. Quietly go to a neighbour's home or some other nearby point and call the police.
 Dial 11444.

- If possible, watch your home from a distance and attempt to obtain a description of any person leaving the house.
- Note any vehicle used by the intruder and try and get the licence number and any other details.
- Jot down immediately what you have seen. The smallest clues could be vital.

# Caulfield makes its Grand Stand

A meticulously designed and monumental addition to Caulfield's rich racing heritage, the new grand stand at Caulfield Racecourse, will be officially opened on October 1, 1992, marking the launch of this year's Spring Racing Carnival.

#### History of the Project

Caulfield Council's involvement in this venture has been incessant since commencement of the project as early as 1988. The development of the grand stand was divided into two halves with the first half completed in 1990.

The second half, which comprises facilities mainly for members, is at the 'touch up' stage in preparation for the grand stand opening in October.

#### Decision to upgrade

The overall look of the Caulfield racetrack needed serious 'surgery' and a decision to upgrade the facilities available was part of a general strategy to improve facilities for racegoers. The oldest parts of the grandstands at Caulfield were built early this century and did not provide the comfort and facilties expected today. Buildings were substandard for a number of reasons:

\* Seating areas were constructed with bituminious felt on steel and timber framework, a particularly hazardous combination, exposed following the Bradford stand disaster in the UK;

\* Exit stair locations in the middle of the stand formed a barrier to access;

 Open stairs and vomitories funnelled draughts to enclosed rooms;

\* Space available and standard of facilities were not adequate for present day patrons.

#### The structure

Two of the most unique and significant features of the building are a 120 metre long, 12 metre high, glass wall, overlooking the racecourse, stiffened by 850mm wide by 25mm thick glass fins located at 2 metres centres along the window. These fins are hung from the roof trusses and since they do not continue to the bottom of the glass wall, cantilever ten metres down from the roof.

In order to maximise the view from the grand stand, the size of the main columns supporting the top floor, was limited to 500 mm in diameter. To develop sufficient column

After four years of grinding hard work, the prestigious, seven level, multi million dollar Rupert Clarke Grand Stand, will be officially

strength, precast columns incorporating 8% reinforcement and 90 mPA concrete, were adopted.

To reduce bending moments in the columns, spherical bearings were provided at each end of the columns.

#### What's in the Stand?

Level 1 - toilet facilities, bar and press dining area, owners and trainers bar, media centre.

Level 2 - members bar, tote area, general facilities. Level 3 - public space, food

Level 4 - members seating and eating area, totes.

Level 5 - restaurant and committee dining rooms.

Level 6 - broadcasting and judges area.

Level 7 - television, camera

check and photo finish camera room.

#### 21st century service

The seven level complex offers numerous hi-tech services which provide maximum comfort and enjoyment for racegoers. Individual air conditioning systems for each area make this construction one of the most comfortable and flexible sporting venues in Australia.

One of the main features is a specially designed demister system for the suspended glass wall. Lighting is largely indirect and adjustable to suit a variety of uses and a standby generator is installed to protect the integrity of betting equipment, safety and comfort systems in the event of a power failure.

Among other features is

a high quality public address and television transmission system including SKY Channel and a full smoke extraction system. Getting from one side of the building to another has been made a breeze with a vertical transportation system comprising four escalators servicing the entertainment tote and grandstand seating areas and two passenger and goods lifts.

#### People behind the scenes

There have been countless hours put into the construction and supervision of this four year project.

Geoff Milner, Council's manager, building, was involved in the first half of the project and paved the way for deputy building surveyor Steve Meade, to take over in the second half.

Steve regularly visits the site

and meets with architects, builders, subcontractors and the VATC, to discuss progress and schedule deadlines.

On asking Steve about his involvement in the project he explained, "this is one of the biggest projects I've dealt with to date ... it's a unique building, similar to an open grandstand but, because it's enclosed, a number of safety factors needed consideration, such as fire and smoke evacuation. I'm a little sad to see the end of this venture, and on a personal level, am pleased to have had the opportunity to be involved in the project and see it come to fruition".

Building inspector John Bordignon is equally pleased with the way the project has come together, "Having been involved with inspections, mainly in the second half of the project, I am amazed at how smoothly everything went". John was on site every day and then, on a weekly basis on commencement of the second half of construction.

On the other side of the coin was VATC project manager, John Noy, who worked closely and cooperatively with Council. John was given prime responsibility for this multi million dollar project and says, "it's been an interesting break from the usual finance/accounting role ... the new grandstand illustrates the importance the VATC places on patron comfort. I will be sorry to see the end of this project and the smooth, working relationship encountered between all those involved has made this a most enjoyable and memorable experience".

From architects Grouse Fleming Bate through to builders Salzer Constructions Pty Ltd (first half) and L.U. Simon Builders Pty Ltd (second half), and countless others involved in the project, the Rupert Clarke Grand Stand will 'make its stand' on October 1, enhancing and symbolising our racing history and pride.



## **Heart Foundation appeal** needs volunteers

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
