Council uproar at VicCode proposals

F

CAULFIELD Council has continued its strong opposition to the VicCode proposals of the State Government, which in their present form would mean much higher density development for Caulfield.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Ed Biggs said that the Minister for Planning, Mr MacLellan is clearly in favor of proceeding with VicCode.

"For Caulfield this means increased site coverage for multiunit developments which will have less open space and less provision for car parking," said Cr Biggs. "The Council is most unhappy with the original proposal but its approach to the Minister was swept aside and Caulfield was told to work through the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) and the Metropolitan Municipal Association," he said.

At a recent meeting convened by the MAV, the Minister for Planning and Development advised that he does intend to approve VicCode in a form very similar to the one recommended. Although this proposal modifies

the previous open space requirements it still minimises open space compared with Council's existing policy and increases site coverage dramatically.

At its town planning committee meeting on July 6, Council called for the Minister to come out of his ivory tower and inspect actual developments under the present Council policy.

At Council's policy and environment committee meeting this month, Council had discussions with local member Ted Tanner about its concerns. Mr Tanner has arranged a deputation to The Hon. Robert MacLellan, MP, Minister for Planning and Development on August 5, 1993 so that Council can express its position directly.

To ascertain resident support for its moves, Council has circulated to every household, a leaflet on the potential affects of VicCode and asks for residents to post, fax or return their signed objection. Cr Biggs said that the returns are flooding in with opposition to VocCode and will be referred on to the Minister as proof of community rejection of higher density for the City of Caulfield.

Cr Biggs, said "Caulfield is at the coalface in regard to multiunit development because so much of it had taken place during the past decade.'

"Whilst Council standards are much more stringent than the VicCode proposals, there are still some pretty ordinary devel-

Customer service - No. 1 at Caulfield

CAULFIELD Council will revamp its customer service in an effort to be more in tune with its residents.

In a detailed report to Council's policy and environment committee meeting, chief executive officer, Doug Aylen said it's the first time Caulfield has taken positive steps to implement a comprehensive customer service program.

"For an organisation to be successful it must actively seek out the views and needs of its customers and in doing so, automatically address the quality of service issues," said Mr Aylen.

"Comparatively, the City of Caulfield measures well against other councils in regard to efficient and friendly service, however there is always room for improvement. A customer service program is a desirable way to pursue excellence," he said.

The program, to be headed by Mr Aylen will commence with a training phase from July 1 to September 30, 1993. The executive and corporate managers will undertake the training phase first to give them the knowledge to implement the program and engender their commitment. They in turn will implement the refined customer service program through their staff. The first physical change will be the revamp of the City Hall reception area to make it easier for customers to receive the services they require.

In his report, Mr Aylen also mentioned that customer service is indirectly tied in with "Enterprise Bargaining" - another initiative underway at Caulfield.

"In summary, Enterprise Bargaining is about consulting with all within the workplace and arriving at agreements on the best method of achieving both the organisation's objectives and benefits for staff," said Mr Aylen.

"It's our vision to provide an appropriate range of services to our residents using efficient and effective local government practices. We know that for this vision to be achieved we have to identify how our residents feel

Engineering update

Albert St reconstruction

CAULFIELD Council has accepted quotations for the reconstruction of Albert St (off Inkerman Rd). The quoted price to relay the bluestone kerb and channel and extend stormwater drainage along both sides of the road was \$47,577.

The successful contractor was Westernport Brick Paving and the work is expected to commence in August. The residents of Albert St will be given advance notice when the exact start date is confirmed.

Right of Way reconstruction

CAULFIELD Council's engineering department has recently completed a design to reconstruct the Right of Way (R.O.W.) bounded by Glen Huntly Rd, Selwyn St, May St and St Georges Rd.

This project involves removal of bluestone pitchers which have been overlaid with asphalt, underground drainage and new 150mm thick concrete paving.

The contract has been awarded to Presta Paving at a total cost of \$30,168.

The purpose of carrying out this project is to upgrade the general deteriorating condition of the bluestone pitchers surface and also to provide extra drainage within the R.O.W.

Construction works which commenced earlier this month will be completed in August, 1993.

Residential Property Drainage

MANY property owners are not sure what their responsibilities and obligations are when it comes to the proper collection and disposal of stormwater drainage from their property.

The property owner is responsible for the installation and maintenance of a system of underground drainage pipes of a diameter no less than 100mm (4") to collect all roof water and possibly water runoff from paved surfaces such as driveways, pool surrounds or other large surfaces.

The responsibility rests with the owner for this drainage system right through to what is generally termed the 'legal point of discharge' which is the point where the household drainage system enters the Council controlled drainage.

The legal point of discharge will be one of the following:

1. The kerb and channel in the street at the front of the property;

2. An underground stormwater drain in the street.

3. An underground stormwater drain which maybe within a R.O.W. or contained within an easement in a neighbouring property;

4. A constructed open drain within a R.O.W. or contained within an easement in a neighbouring property;

5. The surface of a R.O.W. that has been constructed with bluestone pitchers or concrete.

Owners should keep a record of where their drains run and ensure that they are properly maintained by regularly clearing leaves and other debris from pits and inspectiing openings and checking the soundness of downpipe connections.Large repairs or renewals should be carried out by a properly accredited plumber.Before any connections are made to underground Council drains or work carried out within the street, a permit must be obtained from the Council's building department.

Hopetoun Gardens amenities block

AN amenities block is soon to be constructed in Hopetoun Gardens. The building is to be used by the Council gardener stationed in Hopetoun Gardens. The gardener has been working from the basement of the existing rotunda.

The amenities block will consist of a storeroom, lunchroom and toilet and will be constructed to conform with Council's health and safety requirements.

Maintenance of Caulfield's parks

CAULFIELD has approximately 100 hectares of parkland for use by its residents and others. This comprises 43 hectares of Crown Land for which Council manages through committees of management, and the balance is owned by Council. In addition, the municipality houses the Caulfield Racecourse Reserve, some 55 hectares which is available at times for public recreation and also the Ripponlea Estate of 5.5 hectares which provides a passive recreational outlet.

Council controlled parkland is allocated approximately 55% to active sporting purposes at specified times and the balance to passive recreation. The passive recreational areas are significant in meeting the needs of all age groups. The active sporting areas are distributed across nine major parks.

Council's major sporting parks are managed by individual committees of management which have certain powers delegated from Council by a formal agreement. These committees decide all park tenancies and levy rental charges on user clubs or park and building usage. The Committees comprise representatives of the tenant clubs and unaffiliated citizen representatives from the local area to provide for balanced decision making.

Council in turn levies an annual charge on each committee aiming to recover a proportion of its costs in maintaining the sporting areas.

The park committees of management have jointly reimbursed Council \$53,500 of its costs representing a 12.3% recovery. Committees of management are also expected to make a meaningful contribution to any capital works.In addition to meeting a share of the active sporting costs, the committee of management at Duncan MacKinnon Park commenced making special contributions in 1986 to an Athletics Track Resurfacing Fund which matches the Council contribution on a dollar for dollar basis. In 1993 the committee contribution was \$12,000. Funds acculumated in this manner will greatly assist in meeting the major expense of track renewal scheduled for the near future. Very few amateur sporting centres in Victoria contribute at this level. opments that result from the present rules. I hate to think what will happen under the proposed legislation," Cr Biggs added.

Caulfield's manager planning, Jeff Akehurst, said "Apart from facilitating much denser development of metropolitan Melbourne, VicCode proposes a blanket control which effectively ignores the individuality of various municipalities and differences within a municipality,"

"Over many years Caulfield has fine tuned its multi-residential development policy to encourage high standards and these standards look like being swept aside with no recognition of the current density of development in the municipality. Forty-six percent of residential sites in Caulfield already contain more than one residence and there should be some recognition of this in future proposals for higher density across metropolitan Melbourne," Mr Akehurst said.

"Caulfield has done its share and will be discriminated against by the proposed changes."

Cr Spencer added, "The Council should not lose control of planning in its local area and this could happen under VicCode."

Elements of VicCode causing most concern to Council include the increase in site coverage for two storey units from 40% to 60% and decrease in open space per dwelling unit from 60 square metres to 25 square metres in many areas of Caulfield. Front setbacks under VicCode are planned to be three metres in lieu of the Council's present policy of five metres.

Apart from these issues provisions for car parking will be reduced and visual and acoustic privacy standards will be lower than Caulfield applies. If VicCode is adopted, not only will the private open space requirements be lowered, but the Government will reduce developer contributions to public open space for five dwellings or less.

Mayor receives assurance of Hospital's survival

CAULFIELD Mayor, Cr Ed Biggs has recently received written confirmation from the Minister for Health, The Hon. Marie Tehan that the Government has no intentions of closing the Caulfield General Medical Centre (CGMC).

The Minister's letter of June 11 to Mayor Biggs states: "Neither the Government nor the Hospital has the closure of the CGMC or a substantial reduction in its services on their agendas. However, as from July 1, 1993, with the introduction of a fundamentally different funding system for public hospitals, all public hospitals in the State will need to perform efficiently, in a competitive environment in order to remain viable. The new casemix funding formula rewards efficiency in the management of hospitals."

ing more responsibility for the running of their hospitals and in setting the directions of services to be provided."

Cr Biggs, said "It is an overdue, but positive response - one worth waiting for."

"After many months of not knowing the destiny of the CGMC it is a relief to have the Government's assurance that not only will the hospital survive, but there will be no substantial reductions in its services," said Cr Biggs.

In her letter, the Minister reiterated that it was her preference for Council to continue to liaise directly with the Hospital Management about issues relating to future planning.

"Caulfield Council will continue to seek assurances that the Caulfield community will receive the essential medical services it needs," said Cr Biggs.

YOUR dog has just been hit by a car - what should you do? You may wish to keep the following protocol in a useful place, on the fridge or in the glove box of the car should you need it some day.

1. Remain calm

Your pet is probably already in

shock and further stress will not get him or you anywhere sooner than was meant to be.

2. Remove your pet away from direct traffic

To do this you may have to secure some soft strapping (gauze bandage, an old sock or a shirt sleeve) around the dogs mouth to create a muzzle to prevent him from biting. Remember, he's in shock and probably unaware as to what is happening or who you are. Lift him as gently as possible, avoiding any sudden movements which may cause further pain or distress.

4 Carefully lift him into to car and take him to the vet immediately

Once at the vet, the veterinarian can begin to assess the extent of the injuries both internally and externally.

NOTE: Even if your pet is able to walk away from an accident he may still be suffering from shock which can lead to death. So even if he appears fine a checkup is advisable to ensure your pet maintains perfect health.

ST MICHAEL'S Nursing Home resident Bill Croft says his Friends For Older People (FFOP) volunteer Raquel Tyghe is like a grandaughter to him.

Bill 82, was introduced to Raquel through the (FFOP) program - a Commonwealth Department of Health, Housing, Local Government and Community Services funded, and MS Society Victoria Ltd. sponsored program, which recruits members of the community to become friends with older isolated people in nursing homes.

Raquel 24, has visited Bill for just over a year - shortly after he came to live at St Michael's.

"I visit Bill about once a week and enjoy listening to him skite about the old days," said Raquel.

"I often bring along photos so he can see who and what I'm talking about. My flatmate and boyfriend have visited Bill with me," she added. Raquel is looking forward to taking Bill on an outing in the near future and although Bill thinks women drivers are the worst, he is very keen to go.

Asked where he would like to go on his outing, Bill replied "The country."

The FFOP program was first introduced approximately 18 months ago. Clare Doyle, FFOP South Eastern Metropolitan Area Coordinator is responsible for recruiting volunteers and matching them with nursing home residents.

"It is essential that we match people who have similar interests and outlooks with our nursing home residents," said Clare.

It's also important for our residents to know that the volunteer is their 'special friend'," she added.

Volunteers are asked to visit their older friend at least once a fortnight and to commit themselves to the program for a minimum of 12 months.

Clare coordinates the FFOP program in 10 nursing homes throughout the Caulfield municipality.

"The idea people have about nursing homes is that it's where people go to die. This certainly is not the case. They are places where elderly people reside and their needs are provided for," said Clare.

St Michael's Nursing Home run a number of activities for its residents, including monthly bus trips to places such as Sorento, Puffing Billy, Williamstown, Warrandyte and Warragul. Their next big outing is down to the Yarra River. Raquel, other FFOP volunteers and relatives are invited to go along.

Award winning careers program launches into education system

FOR the third year running, the Heart Health Active Achievers will be visiting secondary school girls with a message about careers associated with sport and recreation.

Winner of a top award in the 1993 Prime Ministerials Women and Sport Awards (the project also won a special commendation in 1992), Heart Health Active Achievers aims to increase the number of women involved in careers in sport and recreation, with the long term aim of increasing the status of women's sporting achievements.

A panel of role model speakers, known as Active Achievers, are currently visiting government and non-government schools in the Melbourne metropolitan area. Some 54 schools and 3000 girls in years 10-12 will be exposed to the project.

The Active Achievers are all successful women with established careers in sport and recreation who pass on first hand knowledge of the types of career opportunities available to the girls.

They have achieved this success without having to be physically accomplished sports achievers. This is the message which the Heart Health Active Achievers projects seeks to emphasise.

Project coordinator, Peta Whitford, said "Along with highlighting career opportunities, we also talk about having a healthy lifestyle and how this relates to being involved in careers in sport and recreation. Hopefully, more women will enjoy rewarding careers in this dynamic industry and in the long term this should lead to increased participation by girls and women in sport."

Approximately 6000 students have been involved in the project so far, with two very successful campaigns in 1991 and 1992.

"We had a brilliant response to the project in 1991 and 1992 and the 1993 program was booked out within days," said Ms Whitford.

"We are finding that many girls are unaware of the opportunities available in sport and recreation (one of Australia's fastest growing industries) and we hope that our messages will show that girls can "think beyond" and realise that they don't need to be a performing star to really be successful in this field," Ms Whitford added.

The Heart Health Active Achievers project is once again proudly sponsored by Vic Health through the National Heart Foundation (NHF). NHF Health Promotions Coordinator, Patrice Higgins, said "The Active Achievers project has provided us with a unique opportunity to promote to young women our healthy lifestyle message of eating a healthy diet, enjoying regular exercise and being smoke free."

Sunsmart warning for winter holidays

THE Anti-Cancer Council's Sunsmart Campaign Manager, Craig Sinclair has issued a warning to snow skiers and holiday makers heading north that the sun at this time of year in the ski slopes and Queensland can be as harmful as it is on a typical Melbourne Summer day.

"Most people have had very limited exposure to the sun during the last couple of months and are unprepared for the higher UV levels that will burn them quickly. Research has linked sunburn with an increased risk of developing skin cancer," said Mr Sinclair.

UV levels are particularly harmful at the snow because snow reflects 90% of UV radiation. Thinner air at higher altitudes on the mountain tops also contributes to a greater risk of sunburn.

A study conducted by the Anti-Cancer Council of Victoria found that around one third of people who holiday in northern Queensland in winter were sunburnt, UV levels are currently around three times higher in northern Queensland than they are in Melbourne.

"Our research shows that most people know what to do to protect themselves in the middle of summer, but many people do not associate those same protection strategies with their midwinter holiday," Mr Sinclair said.

School holidays are a high risk time for children to get sunburnt. A child's skin is more sensitive than an adult's and should be protected with clothing, sunglasses or goggles, a hat and a water-resistant broad-spectrum 15+ sunscreen.

Two out of three Australians develop skin cancer in their lifetime and research indicates that over exposure to the sun in childhood, increases the risk of skin cancer later in life.

Diabetes is a condition where the level of sugar in the blood is higher than it should be. It occurs through an inability to produce or respond to *insulin* - the hormone produced in the pancreas which enables cells to use sugar in the form of *glucose* which is an essential fuel for the body.

There are two types of diabetes:

• Insulin dependent - having onset in children, young people and some older people. This form of diabetes is controlled through use of a life long program of insulin injections.

• Non-insulin dependent - (the most common type of diabetes) makes up 85% of all cases, mainly affecting people who are usually over 35 and over weight. Also referred to as adult-onset diabetes it increases with age -12% of people over 65 have the condition. As well as having a hereditary component, adult onset diabetes is related to lifestyle factors including diet and lack of exercise. It is controlled through diet and exercise and sometimes tablets or insulin injections. The International **Diabetes Institute** The International Diabetes Instiminutes exercise at least three times a week). Walking is an ideal form of exercise.

In its 17 year operation, staff at the Institute have implemented many new initiatives, including an insulin donation program to countries in urgent need and a self-monitoring of blood glucose program. The Institute employs many diabetes nurse educators, dieticians and health professionals who offer integrated diabetes and care services to nearly 5000 clients.

Practical research programs include the development of new drugs both for the treatment of diabetes itself and its complications. Other research programs include a major American Government funded grant, investigating the alarming rates of diabetes in the Asian-Pacific/Indian Ocean areas. The Institute has undertaken this project for over 17 years.

Its research work at Monash

(DSA), operates from the Institute and produces a regular newsletter, guest lectures and also helps to raise funds for the Institute program. Information about the DSA can be obtained by writing to: DSA, P O Box 223, Caulfield South 3162.

The Institute runs major \$2 ticket raffles with the next one due to be run later this year. Anyone wishing to purchase tickets or take a book to sell on the Institute's behalf, should contact the Institute on 523 0044.

The Institute employs over 55 staff and receives the majority of its funding from non-Government sources including donations and other fundraising activities. The Diabetes Op Shop at 798 Glen Huntly Rd also raises money for the Institute and help is always welcome, as are donations of items for sale.

For the past three years the Institute has recieved funding from the Vic Health Promotion Foundation to promote diabetes prevention messages at sport and art events. The theme, "Be Diabetes Wise - Healthy Food and Exercise", applies to adult-onset diabetes, which, as mentioned earlier, is the major form of diabetes. The Institute collects these items from retail pharmacies, hospital pharmacies and patients from around Australia. They are sorted, stored and dispatched from the Institute and then sent to adults and children desperately needing, particularly the insulin, to survive, in countries in Asia, Africa and Eastern Europe.

The program is a real winner according to the Institute's public relations manager and coordinator of the insulin and essential diabetes supplies donation program Mr Ron Raab, B.Ec. "I have met with some of the children who receive the insulin and I can testify to how it has changed the lives of teenagers, from ones of despair and imminent death to near normal teenage lives." **Shopping at the Institute** In addition to the "One Stop Shop" and conveniently located across the corridor is the National Diabetic Supply Scheme agency (NDSS).

Government subsidised items available from the NDSS agency include: syringes, needles for insulin pens and urine and blood glucose monitoring strips. All other supplies not government subsidised such as: meters and finger pricking lancets are obtainable from the "One Stop Shop".

Syringes and test strips are far cheaper if purchased through the NDSS agency as opposed to your local chemist.
