Green light for new recreation centre

CAULFIELD Council has given the green light to build a new recreation/swimming complex at the Munro Ave swimming pool site.

This project, approved at the August meeting of Council is scheduled to commence after the close of the 1993/94 season.

The viability of combining the two facilities was supported by Lacey and LRM Leisure Management consultants, and an economic analysis carried out by Council officers showed that the combined centre was the best longterm option for ratepayers.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold said the decision was one of the toughest Council had been faced with for many years, but on balance, should provide a modern, state-of-the-art leisure

facility for all Caulfield residents, at, for a change, a substantial cost saving to the City.

Costs of the project will not exceed \$1.5 million and will be funded from Council's Recreational Fund Reserve, together with the proceeds from the sale of the existing Library and Recreation Centres in Maple St. There will be no rate impost on

Council will approach the State and Federal Governments for financial contributions towards the project.

Consultants advise that capital expenditure should eliminate Council's current operating deficit on the separate operation of the pool and recreation centre. This deficit will be \$132,000 in the current year (around 1% of rate monies).

The comparable result for the combined centre should provide for a saving to rate revenue of in excess of \$100,000 in the first year, and similar ongoing sav-

CAULFIELD Council has recently added 30-40 years life to a Eucalyptus Tallow Wood tree in Glen Huntly Park.

The tree, estimated to be somewhere between 60-80 years has been described by Council's consultant arborist, Ivan Earl, as by far the largest and attractive Tallow Wood tree he has seen in the Melbourne environment.

The highly specialised work to save the tree involved reducing the weight of the canopy by careful thinning and cabling branches to distribute the load evenly throughout the canopy.

Due to a large split in the main trunk, bolts were inserted to strengthen it, minimising the chances of the tree becoming



Engineering update

Inkerman & Glen Eira Rdasphaltrehabilitation work

ASPHALT rehabilitation work has been carried out on the south side of Inkerman Rd between Hotham St and Hawthorn Rd in order to eliminate the many road patches over the existing watermain.

Six hundred square metres of asphalt pavement in Glen Eira Rd west of Hawthorn Rd was replaced due to pavement failure.

The sub-grade was beginning to pump through to the road surface causing cracking and staining of the road surface.

Elsternwick easement drain upgrading

COUNCIL'S engineering department has recently completed a design for upgrading of the existing stormwater pipe network within the easement bounded by Rowan St, Shoobra Rd, Downshire Rd and Hamilton St. Elsternwick.

The existing pipe, constructed during the 1920s, comprised of a 450mm diameter pipe and will now be upgraded to a 750mm diameter pipe.

This work became necessary due to the increase in the water run-off in the catchment area main entrance doorway.

contributing to this drainage system which has occurred due to greater areas of paving and denser development since the drain was originally installed.

As the proposed works are to be carried out in confined areas, no machinery will be able to be used and, as a result, only hand excavation will be adopted. For this project, Council has decided to use a new light weight pipe made from High Density Polyethylene (HDPE) to enable the pipe to be handled by two people.

A contractor is scheduled to commence work this month, and anticipates taking eight weeks to complete.

Council refuses five unit developments

AT last weeks town planning committee meeting, Caulfield Council refused five unit development applications mainly due to overdevelopment and excessive site coverage issues.

AAT says no to dance studio

THE Administrative Appeals Tribunal (AAT) has refused to grant a permit for a dance studio in Glen Huntly Rd, Caulfield South because of its location next to an existing brothel.

Earlier this year, Caulfield Council granted a notice of decision to Sefra Burstin to operate her dance studio at 979a Glen Huntly Rd.

Since this time, Bambra Studios, the neighbouring brothel which has been in existence for some 17 years appealed to the AAT to have the school closed.

The AAT's decision reflects the general planning principle that brothels and buildings where children may assemble for various activities, should not be located in close proximity to one another.

WINDOWISE

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WINDOWISE RESTORATIONS An application to construct four dwellings at 14 Rosedale Ave, Glen Huntly was refused because Council regarded it as an overdevelopment, having regard to excessive site coverage, inadequate private open space areas and inadequate parking.

The application did not provide adequate outdoor living areas to allow for both amenity and the recreational needs of the occupants of the dwellings.

Council's manager planning, Jeff Akehurst said it's Council's goal to encourage family and multiple occupancy of medium density housing into Caulfield.

"Allowing proposals such as this one to go ahead would establish a bad precedent for developments which do not meet the requirements of the Multiple Residential Development Policy," he said.

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Dogs on racecourse - compromise

THE Victorian Amateur Turf Club (VATC) will put forward a recommendation to Trustees of the Caulfield Racecourse at their bi-annual meeting on September 30, permitting dogs onto the Racecourse.

After objection from newly formed Dog Owner's Group (D.O.G.) members to the banning of dogs on the racecourse, the VATC, after consulting with D.O.G. looked at the situation and came up with the following recommendation, which has been accepted by D.O.G.:

- dogs will only be permitted on racecourse grounds after 4.30pm;
- dogs must be kept on a leash prior to reaching the flat area (cente of the racecourse);
- dogs are restricted to run free on the flat area only (40-50 acres);
- while on the flat area, dogs

must be under effective control of their owners;

 dog droppings must be removed by dog owners and placed in the bins provided.

Caulfield Council has agreed to provide the VATC with three 120 litre bins for dog owners to place any dog excrement in, however, emptying and cleaning of the bins will be the responsibility of the VATC.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold complemented the VATC and members of D.O.G. for coming up with what appears to be a reasonable compromise for all parties. He added, however, that the issue raised the broader concern for the City of dealing with dog excrement.


"I believe this is a matter the City should be reconsidering with a view to encouraging all dog owners to protect our environment and pick up after their dogs," he said.

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

A FAMILY Incident Resource Kit has been produced to assist police faced with problem domestic and bereavement encounters.

The kit is a result of a subcommittee formed by the 'C' District Police Community Consultative Committee. This sub-committee was established when the need for updating police with the correct resources to handle problem domestic situations was recognised in 1992.

Caulfield Councillor and senior constable with the Caulfield

Police, David Michelson has been the officer responsible for researching, designing and obtaining government funding for the kit.

Cr Michelson said the kit will provide police personnel with all the relevant information needed when handling problem domestic situations.

"By having this comprehensive kit on hand, police officers can provide essential information to victims of domestic violence, helping them locate help groups to aid them through their difficult time," said Cr Michelson.

The kit contains:

- Easy Reference Guide includes Intervention Order procedure, possible offences and other relevant police information.
- LEAP forms relevant for domestic incidents
- A general brochure containing a list of organisations within the district that may assist aggrieved family members
- A series of brochures relating to specific organisations and help groups
- A list of emergency contact numbers.

The Police 'C' District Community Consultation Committee has been operating for two years and comprises about 20 people including representatives from the Victoria Police, each of the municipal councils (Malvern, Caulfield, Brighton, Oakleigh, Moorabbin and Sandringham), Chadstone and Southland shopping centres, Neighbourhood Watch, State Emergency Service, Ministry of Education, Community Services of Victoria and several smaller community groups.

VOLUNTEER-AID is a community-based service, part of the home and community care program.




look at ways of using the available funding. We should be looking at running activities that can fund themselves rather than being an added strain on local government expenses," he said.

- 4. Maintain a healthy body weight by balancing physical activity and food intake.
- 5. If you drink alcohol, limit your intake.
- 6. Eat only a moderate amount of sugar and foods containing added sugars.
- 7. Choose low salt foods and use salt sparingly.
- 8. Encourage and support breastfeeding.
- 9. Eat foods containing calcium. This is particularly important for girls and women.
- 10. Eat foods containing iron. This is particularly important for

girls, women, vegetarians and athletes.

These dietary guidelines are made for all Australians, not just the health conscious, so perhaps we could all change the priorities to more healthy food choices.






