

Rate increase 1.26% - a record low

CAULFIELD Council will increase its 1993/94 rates by a mere 1.26%, with no increase in the garbage charge. This figure is less than half the anticipated inflation estimate of 2.86%

Caulfield's Acting Mayor, Cr David Spencer said Council had been able to achieve the minimal rise due to sound financial management over many years.

"We keep breaking our own record and I am pleased to say that this is the smallest rate increase in this City in 27 years," said Cr Spencer. "Last year the increase was 1.6% and the year before 3.3% It's the fourth year in a row where the increase has been below the general inflation rate," he said.

"A major loan of \$828,000 has been repaid, resulting in debt reduction of around \$2 million over the past year," said Cr Spencer.

The early repayment of the loan, which was due for renegotiation on September 21, 1993 will provide Council with annual interest and redemption savings of nearly \$117,000.

Council's chief executive officer, Doug Aylen, said "By paying the loan this financial year, rate increases for 1993/94 and 1994/95 can be below projected inflation rates.

No new loans are anticipated for the third year in a row and overall indebtedness has been decreased from \$15.7 million in 1990 to \$8.5 million in 1993.

Cr Spencer, said "In a budget of over \$37 million, Council has adopted a capital works program totalling \$6.3 million, including a new Recreation Centre to cost \$1.5 million. This Centre will be funded from reserve funds and the sale of property and will not be an impost on rates.

There is to be no major reduction in service levels with the City continuing to provide human services at a cost of over \$10 million. This is largely offset by grants and user charges to the extent that the nett cost against rates is only \$1.4 million. Technical and engineering services are of a similar order, but without the major grants and income sources, will cost a nett \$9.8 million of rates.

Amidst the multi-million dollar programs of the Council, Cr Spencer pointed out a special allocation of \$20,000 which will be provided for emergency relief to those who are urgently in need of food and basic assistance to live.

In support of its financial position this year, Council will carry forward a healthy surplus of \$1.4 million which in the main is a

result of salaries and wages costs being under budget.

The rate in the dollar to be struck is 5.0659 cents of nett annual valuations. Minimum rates are being phased out over the next four years. At the end of this period, minimum rated properties will pay rates based on their valuations - the same as other properties.

Council's director corporate services, Brian Hoban, said the budget has been framed to provide an increase in total rate revenue of 1.5% over the amount levied in 1992/93. This is to cover the general inflationary cost increases for staff, goods and services purchased by the continued page 2.

The impact of this total increase, will however, be significantly reduced by additional revenue from property developments which will mean that the actual increase faced by most individual ratepayers is only 1.26% Rates paid by many ratepayers on minimum charges will have a nil increase due to the phasing out of this charge.

Government grants to Council have in total declined with a \$408,000 decrease in VicRoads funding being a major item. In the State budget fallout, Caulfield will pay an extra \$18,000 in vehicle registration fees and lose the State subsidy of \$8000 towards the collection cost of the \$100 deficit levy which the State Government promised last year. Library grants continue their steady fall.

Further reductions in State funding for maternal and child health services are anticipated in the future and will increase pressure the Council's budget over time.

Community services recognition scheme

IN 1989, the City of Caulfield established the Caulfield Community Services Recognition Scheme to publicly acknowledge dedicated volunteers working within the City of Caulfield.

At a special ceremony each year volunteers are presented with a certificate and badge by Caulfield's mayor, in recognition of their contribution to the City. A ceremony is planned for June 1994. Accordingly, Council is seeking participation from community groups and organisations who may wish to nominate members for the award scheme.

Engineering update

Easement drains

THERE are many kilometres of Council drains that run in easements through private properties within Caulfield.

These drains are a vital part of the drainage system providing for the collection of stormwater drainage from private properties and in the case of larger drains, also connecting parts of the drainage system.

Caulfield Council has a responsibility to keep these drainsingoodorder, repair them and, where necessary, replace them with larger pipes. Council staff need to be able to gain access to see to these matters. If the drainage network is not properly maintained, flooding may occur.

By far the greatest source of interference to easement drains is from tree roots which enter the drains causing damage to the pipes and blockages.

Property owners should remember not to plant trees over the top of Council drains or obstruct the service pits which provide access to the drains.

Public street lighting

COUNCIL receives a large number of requests for additional public street lighting. These are carefully considered and changes are made to the existing standard where exceptional circumstances exist.

The standard lighting configuration in residential streets is one light every second pole and the lights used are 80 watt Mercury lights.

On main or arterial roads, the lighting is increased to a 150 watt high pressure sodium to provide greater visibility.

The lighting in residential streets is not installed as security lighting to private properties, but to provide adequate illumination for pedestrian and vehicular traffic. Once Council receives a request for additional lighting, an evening inspection is carried out so an assessment of the existing lighting standard and any circumstances which may effect the level of lighting can be made.

In most cases, the lighting falls within Council's policy for public street lighting, but in certain cases a request needs to be sent to the SEC to either alter the existing bracket length or install an additional light at Council's cost.

Defective public street lighting is the responsibility of the SEC. Any requests for maintenance are passed to the SEC for inclusion in their program. Residents are encouraged to phone the SEC directly and report these lights. They should quote the street name and house number outside which these lights exist. This all helps to minimise the time taken to affect repairs.

Municipal Swimming Pool

PREPARATION works to the Caulfield swimming pool complex are currently underway for the coming season.

This involves draining the water that has been left standing in the pools since the end of last season. The pool surfaces have to be cleaned to remove algae and other material that has built up during winter.

Other work to be carried out includes replacing all the cracked and damaged tiles.

The swimming pools are constructed from separate sections of concrete which have expanding joints between them. Over a period a time, materials in these joints deteriorate and have to be replaced.

This consists of stripping out the old material, cleaning the edges of the joints, placing the new expansion joint material and repainting the pool surface.

ALERTING all Victorians to the dangers of fire is the primary aim of Fire Awareness Week which runs until October 15, 1993.

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Victoria's Fire Awareness Week committee is a joint effort of the State's three main firefighting services - the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the Metropolitan Fire Brigade and the Country Fire Authority and other groups and agencies including the Fire Protection Industry Association of Australia, Insurance Council of Australia, State Electricity Commission, Australian Fire Protection Association, Telecom Australia, Directorate of School Education, Institute of Fire Engineers and United Firefighters Union.

Fire Awareness Week started in Australia over 25 years ago, largely as a result of the success of similar programs in America and is held in October as a leadup to the summer fire season.

The Victorian theme this year is Fire - You Are Responsible and the aim of the Fire Awareness Week (FAW) committee is to make people aware of the dangers of fire and to reduce the losses caused by fire. FAW also aims to make all Victorians aware of and alert to the dangers of fire and the opportunistic manner in which it will capitalise on a moment of carelessness.

The National Fire Awareness Week committee coordinates national aspects of public fire awareness programs and each State has its own FAW committee to plan and organise events. Victoria's three fire agencies

attend more than 26,000 fires each year and around 10,000 of these are a result of carelessness.

The Country Fire Authority attends 18,000 fires, a third are caused by carelessness. The CFA attends 2500 house fires, 300 are due to overheating of foodstuffs.

The Metropolitan Fire Brigade attends 8,000 fires, half are caused by carelessness. A guarter of the MFB fires occur in homes and half occur in offices, factories and warehouses.

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources attends 600 fires on public land each year, which burn around 140,000 hectares. People cause three quarters of these, and half of the human-caused fires are the result of carelessness.

This year, the FAW committee is asking people to accept more responsibility for their own actions and safety. Everyone has a role to play in fire safety

Your responsibilities fall into several categories including: Permits for burning off;

 Notifying brigades and neighbours when burning off; Insurance for your home and contents;

Become familiar with municipal, CFA and EPA regulations;

Know safety procedures in and around the house for preventing fires;

Know basic first aid procedures for burns;

Have fire brigade and emergency services telephone numbers prominently dis-

In 1991, a Council officer working party completed a MPHP discussion paper which outlined the provision of health services in the municipality and defined what needed to be done to produce a MPHP for Caulfield.

After presenting this paper to Council in late 1991, a steering committee comprising Councillors, Council officers, representatives of the two community health centres in Caulfield and the community in general was formed.

Following the presentation of an interim Plan which outlined the proposed vision, goals, objectives and framework for a Draft Plan, Council determined to address issues raised in a number of surveys they had carried out and to consult the community more widely regarding, Improving Personal Safety and Creating a More Caring Community. The aim of these consultations was to achieve a clear definition

of what the community's concerns were regarding personal safety, what the community considers a caring community to be, and to assist in the development of strategies on how Council and the community can address challenges of improving personal safety and creating a more caring community in Caulfield.

During the development of the Plan, information about the Plan's process and opportunity for the community to provide input was regularly made available in Caulfield Contact, local newspapers and via Here's Health.

The course includes: Understanding children's behaviour and misbehaviour, understanding more about your child and yourself as a parent, encouragement, communication, natural and logical consequences and developing confidence and using your potential. Living with Asthma requires constant decision making by the asthmatic about prevention, treatment, worsening asthma and when to seek professional help. Many of these decisions need to be made independently.
