

CAULFIELD Council has always given priority to serving the needs of residents, and this has been given a boost with the recent adoption of a customer service program and new facilities at City Hall.

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
Chief executive officer, Doug Aylen, said "Through the program the Council will provide specific training to staff and develop customer service strategies in all departments. A focus on customer needs and opinions will be encouraged through both oral and written surveys of local people."

Included in the customer service program was the renovation works which have recently been completed at City Hall. This included the relocation of the Caulfield Library to City Hall which is now open for business (see details on page 5) and relocation of the cashier, rates and reception areas. The main entrance to the City Hall complex is now from the carpark on the Glen Eira Rd side of the building and the entrance to the Library is from Hawthorn Rd.

Visitors to City Hall will have access to a modern and functional reception area, with provision for meetings with staff in pleasant and comfortable surroundings.

Uniformed reception staff are specially skilled to provide a friendly response to a wide range of enquiries. They will be joined from time to time by senior managers of the Council, who will spend time "at the frontline" to experience first hand, the reaction of Council's customers.

Mr Aylen said "I will be first on the roster for the reception desk and look forward to hearing the public response to our services and facilities. The information obtained will be used to continuously improve our services and the way we deal with people, ne said.

Council contracts out garbage collection service

CAULFIELD Council will save around \$580,000 in garbage collection costs annually from next year.

After carrying out an extensive review of its current garbage collection services, Council found that substantial savings would be made by using one man operated trucks instead of the current three man operated trucks.

Following the review, Council set up a competitive tendering process to outside companies. Council's own employees with their Union also submitted a tender, however, the external tender submitted from Pacific Waste Management Pty Ltd offered the best overall service to the City. The service is due to commence early in 1994 pending the availability of the new trucks.

The new contractor will be responsible for a high level of customer service once completing an initial community education program in conjunction with Council. In order to achieve the cost savings with the new

system, a high level of resident cooperation will be sought. Bins will need to be placed more carefully for collection, facing close to the kerb and with adequate clearance from trees, light poles and parked cars. Some adjustments to collection days may prove necessary but residents will receive adequate advance warning.

The operation of the new trucks will cause less noise and the collections will be spread across the full day rather than the current morning operation.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold, said "Council is keen to see that residents are fully satisfied with the new service. We have great expectations of this innovation. It emphasises Council's commitment to keeping costs down, whilst providing high levels of service to our residents," he said.

Engineering update

Allison Rd reconstruction CAULFIELD Council has appointed a contractor for the reconstruction of Allison Rd, between Kooyong and Orrong Rds, Elsternwick.

Works commenced on site in early September 1993 by the successful tenderer, Baldur Pty Ltd and should be completed by early December 1993.

Major underground drainage works are currently being undertaken with concrete pipe sizes ranging from 225mm diameter to 750mm diameter.

At the intersection of Grafton St and Allison Rd, a split drainage network comprising of 600mm diameter and 750mm diameter were installed to relieve the pressure of the large volume of water orginally experienced by the existing 700mm diameter brick barrel drain installed during the 1890s. Throughout the piple laying process, problems with trench widths were experienced with continuous collapsing soil - a problem due predominantly to the relatively high water table level associated within this area. Other works also include the modernisation of the bluestone pitcher kerb and channel and associated concrete vehicular crossing reconstruction.

This project, which was necessitated by the continual deterioration of the existing kerb and channel and the need to improve the underground drainage, will greatly enhance one of the municipality's finer treelined streets.

Tree planting program

THIS year, Council's parks and gardens department has planted a total of 1300 trees throughout Caulfield's streets and parklands.

Within the parklands, tree planting was concentrated at Murrumbeena Park (160 trees), Koornang Park (300 trees) and East Caulfield Park (60 trees) consistent with revegetation programs. Additional trees will be planted in the parklands during 1994.

The street trees are planted

aims to finalise the planting program in February for planting in the same year.

Road resurfacing

COUNCIL has an annual program to resurface approximately one ninth of the residential streets each year and works are programmed to commence this month for the 1993/94 year end. This will cover 90 streets.

The major purpose of these works is to improve the skid resistance of the roads by providing a new surface, seal the road pavement to prevent harmful water penetration and thereby increase pavement life, take out some irregularities in the road pavements and enable general maintenance of previously patched areas. The work consists of spraying a thin film of a bitumen based emulsion on to the road surface and this is then overlaid with 7mm (1/4") stone which is rolled onto the emulsion.

according to Council's Street Tree Planting program. This generally aims to plant trees in areas where Local Traffic Management Treatments are implemented and to meet requests from residents.

The tree planting season extends from late autumn through to early spring with most planting occuring during the winter months. The trees are generally selected and ordered in advance of the planting season to ensure that good quality stock is received and that the large numbers of trees required can be supplied. Council therefore

The road is then left for approximately one or two weeks before any loose material is swept up. This is to allow sufficient time for the materials to bind to the road surface.




Caulfield Library is open again

Council expands building services

CAULFIELD Council has given its building department the go ahead to certify architectural plans for building approval outside of its municipal district

side of its municipal district. People from outside Caulfield can now approach Council's building surveyor for certification of plans under clause 8.2 of the Victoria Building Regulations 1983.

Council's manager building, Geoff Milner said the move would pre-empt expected sweeping changes to the building industry if the State Government's new Building Bill is passed.

Council building departments will need to become more enterprising and be involved with work outside their municipal district.

If passed, the new Building Bill will be aimed at a user pay system allowing Council building departments, if managed properly, to become self supportive.

Areas normally supervised by Councils would be opened up to the private sector, forcing Council building departments to become more enterprising.

"Council's decision has anticipated new legislation giving the building department time to get into the market," said Mr Milner. "Indications have already been received from developers and builders within the municipal district and beyond about using the Caulfield certification system to assist in obtaining building approvals," he said.

A small number of Councils have already commenced external certification and Caulfield's building department is keen to join them.



FOUR Caulfield schools under the microscope during the State Government's recent school rationalisation program will remain open and continue to operate from their current sites.

Caulfield Primary School stood out among Caulfield South, Caulfield North and Ripponlea Primary Schools as clearly the one to close due to its population of just 130 students.

Principal Mr John Solomon said Caulfield Primary School had the community to thank for its survival.

"The school community, made up of parents, teachers and students alike, worked together and united to show that the school should remain open," said Mr Solomon. "The recently released census figures showing a 6% increase in the number of 0-4 and 5-9 year olds in Caulfield since 1988 possibly supported our fight for survival," he added.

Although now in the clear, Caulfield Primary School is not taking a breather, instead the School has implemented a number of new attractions including:

 before school care (it already offers after school care)

music classes

 Japanese Exchange Cultural program.

Mr Solomon has visited with other local principals in an effort to work in with their schools to improve education facilities for all Caulfield children.

"Most importantly we have to overcome any rifts which have taken place during the past few months and get back to where we were," said Mr Solomon. "We lost a number of students to private schools, but we are pleased to announce that the number of students coming into the school next year is almost double those departing."

Students to benefit from new Austudy

STUDENTS renewing their AUSTUDY for 1994 will find it easier following the new release of a shorter, user-friendly AUSTUDY application form.

Students across Australia should already have received the new form, with accompanying information.

Designed for use by students already receiving AUSTUDY, the streamlined form asks only 13 questions, replacing the previous 52 question form.

Caulfield student assistance manager, Mr Gaffney, said the new form represented a landmark advance in improving service to AUSTUDY clients.

"The form will take students less time to complete because each student's personal details will be pre-printed on the form," Mr Gaffney said.

"In addition, the form's brevity

will enable faster processing by the Department of Employment, Education and Training, further reducing students' waiting time," he said.

Mr Gaffney encouraged students to lodge the new form as soon as possible to ensure continuity of payments from 1993 to 1994.

When it arrives, students should check the accuracy of their personal details, complete the application form and lodge it as soon as possible with their nearest Student Assistance Centre or CES lodgement outlet.

Mr Gaffney said the Federal Department of Employment, Education and Training, which administers AUSTUDY, is committed to improving the speed, accuracy and quality of services to its clients.

Japanese Cultural Exchange program at Caulfield Primary

THE handing down of the decision by the minister for education, Mr Don Hayward to maintain Murrumbeena Secondary College on its existing site as a secondary education provider was strongly endorsed by an extraordinary meeting of the school council recently.

Caulfield Councillor, Veronika Martens, who is a member of the school council, said while this outcome was preferred by the school council in its considerations during the task force process, there was the possibility of the campus being amalgamated with McKinnon Secondary College.

"Murrumbeena prides itself on personal student attention and it would have been a shame to see students deprived of the excellent learning opportunities available to them at the school," said Cr Martens.

Given the number of large colleges in the area, Murrumbeena offers a clear alternative for those students who are looking for a more personal approach to their education. While not offering single sex education, Murrumbeena last year introduced a practical policy of school resource access for girls which extended the umbrella policy for rights of all students. The college has always had a policy of individual care and attention for its students.

Following 7-8 years of operating under the prospect of change in one form or another, the school council has taken the latest positive move by the Minister as a lead to gear up for a committed and stable future that builds on the particular strengths the school has to offer its students in comparison with its larger neighbouring colleges.

Despite the difficulties that schools are facing, Murrumbeena Secondary College has determined that it will continue to be in a position to offer a range of years 7-10 and VCE subjects that will allow students entry into all mainstream university courses. The school council believes this core capability to provide a strong academic education is fundamental and planning has begun to tailor a curriculum to optimise this feature in light of various staffing scenarios.

The overriding strength of Murrumbeena Secondary College in the new era remains as its ability to provide superior pastoral care to the student body compared with the large campus models. Teacher commitment and the more personal relationships that are readily built up in the smaller campus produce more effective teaching environments, reinforcing the potential for academic achievement. Furthermore, the natural features of the campus , ie: adjacent comprehensive sporting facilities such as the Duncan MacKinnon Reserve and the large grounds within the campus, and a highly specialised purpose built arts complex staffed by working artists and designers, add to the appeal for the discerning parent.







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Give a chance for life

Australian Bone Marrow Donor Registry

APPROXIMATELY 400 patients per year are diagnosed as having some form of leukaemia which can now be cured by bone marrow transplantation.

Of these 400, only 100 have a relative who has an identical tissue type (the method used to determine bone marrow type) and is therefore suitable as a bone marrow donor. The other 300 patients are treated by conventional chemotherapy, but most of them die prematurely as a result of their leukaemia - usually within three years of diagnosis.

The only option for these 300 patients is to search for an unrelated matched bone marrow donor through a donor registry. This registry is a panel of thousands of people, willing to donate bone marrow who have all been tissue typed by way of a blood test and the results entered onto a date base.

Such searches have had to be carried out overseas because, up until now, there has been no viable bone marrow donor registry in Australia. Families caught up in this heart breaking situation are faced with having to raise tens of thousands of dollars for the search. Often, by the time the money has been raised, the patient has died and more often than not, the patient is a young adult or child.

There was an urgent need for the expansion of the bone marrow donor registry in Australia to provide many of the 300 patients with a matched bone marrow donor, and thus

a cure for their leukaemia.

The Australian Bone Marrow Donor Registry has now been established and is working with 26 unrelated transplants performed using Australian donors (5 for overseas patients). Eleven of the donors were from the Victorian component of the registry. Seventeen Australian patients have received an unrelated Bone Marrow Transplant from international donors. The Australian Registry is now a member of the World Donor Registries, alongside the USA UK and 25 other countries which allows ready access to their registries when a donor is not available in Australia.

The Australian Bone Marrow Registry is currently searching for 205 patients to find a compatible bone marrow donor.

There are now over 47,000 tested potential bone marrow donors on the Australian Registry, of whom over 21,000 are Victorians. Many more donors are needed if the Registry is to reach its target of 100,000 tissue typed donors within the next three to four years.

The Australian Bone Marrow Donor Registry is in desperate need of funds as it costs approximately \$100 to tissue test each potential donor. To reach the Victorian target of 50,000 tested donors within three years, they need to raise about \$3 million.

Caulfield women urged to take part in screening

THOUSANDS of women in the Caulfield area will be asked, if not already, to participate in a Victorian cervical cancer screening program during the next month or so.

The three year Pap Test Victoria program, conducted by the Anti-Cancer Council of Victoria, in conjunction with the National Cervical Screening Program is targeting women in the 50-69 year age group.

As part of the program, almost 7700 local women in this age group will receive a personalised letter encouraging them to have a Pap test if they haven't had one in the last two years. They will also receive an information brochure about how to prevent cervical cancer and a hotline number where questions can be answered.

The manager of the Council's Pap Test Victoria Program, Ms Sheila Hirst, said a Pap test was used to detect very early changes in the cells of the cervix before a woman could feel or notice anything.

Ms Hirst said one Australian women dies everyday from cervical cancer, and most of these deaths occur in the 50-69 year age group.

"A lot of older women don't really believe that they could get cervical cancer, particularly if they have been with the same partner for many years," Ms Hirst said.

"We hope that through this letter, women will be encouraged to have a Pap test with their local doctor. If they don't have a local doctor or they don't feel comfortable going to their usual doctor, they could contact their community health centre," she added.

The Anti-Cancer Council of Victoria has also set up a toll free line (008 801 202). Women wanting information about the program or the services available locally should contact this number.

Pap Test Victoria began last year and the south-east metropolitan Melbourne, Gippsland and Goulburn/north-east areas are being targeted this year.

The south-east metropolitan region is vital to the Pap Test Victoria program, as almost 95,000 women between the age of 50-69 are involved.

The program is funded by the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation through the National Better Health program.
