

oncern over new residential zones

CAULFIELD Mayor. Cr Nicholas Gold said that the proposed new residential zones which aim to rationalise the plethora of residential zones in Victoria will have a detrimental effect on the City of Caulfield.

"Council generally agrees that the number of residential zones in Victoria needs to be reduced, however it disagrees with imposing a number of zones in Caulfield, which currently only has one Residential C Zone," said Cr Gold.

Of the eight new zones proposed to replace all existing zones (some 160 throughout metropolitan Melbourne), Caulfield is particularly concerned about the Urban Residential Zone which states that for single and multi dwellings, a planning permit is not required. This means that third parties (the community), will be deprived of their right to oppose a dwelling development.

The second concern Council has is with the Residential Enterprise Zone which will give high density developments as-of-right if they comply with VicCode 2.

"Council is not prepared to use the Residential Enterprise Zone as it is currently defined," said Cr Gold. " It's just as likely to become regarded as a 'second class' residential zone."

"If the new standardised zones are introduced, local government will also have little influence on planning of specialised areas," said Cr Gold. It is not clear how or when the new zones will be introduced, whether by public exhibition or by Ministerial amendment. However, Council is eager to meet with the Minister to discuss its concerns with a hope that detached single dwelling zones will be introduced to support the development of family residences within Caulfield.

recent work by the City of Caulfield drama workshop for older adults group, under guidance of drama coach, Anne O'Keefe.


The play has been developed by all members of the group, with many reflecting on their own life experiences.

THE Caulfield needs to address drainage problems SPECIAL FEATURE

MOST people believe that pollution in our bays and waterways is caused solely by sewage and industry. In actual fact, stormwater drains are also a major contributor to pollution in our bays and waterways.

Y O U R ENVIRONMENT

The entire City of Caulfield west of Murrumbeena Rd, together with the cities of Moorabbin, Brighton and St Kilda belong to the Elster Creek catchment. This means Elster Creek drains all the water from these areas, therefore everyone living in the region is responsible for the quality of water in Elster Creek.

Melbourne Water is currently working with these municipalities in an effort to improve flooding problems and the quality of stormwater, which in turn will improve the quality of our bayside beaches and waterways.

The Elster Creek Catchment Advisory Committee, consulting with Melbourne Water comprises councillors, council staff representatives from these municipalities and members of the community. Representing the City of Caulfield on the Committee is Cr Veronika Martens and Council's deputy chief executive officer/director technical services, Noel Wootten.

"The Committee is currently involved in a four month pilot program, which, on completion in April, will have tested alternative models for the Elster Creek Catchment," said Cr Martens. "Our objective as a regional group is to identify drainage problems and look at a range of solutions which local councils and Melbourne Water can undertake cooperatively. If there is no cooperation from residents and commercial users, a user pay system will have to be looked at by Melbourne Water," she said. What Caulfield is doing

Caulfield Council and its residents, along with the other three municipalities need to take responsibility for cleaning up Elster Creek on a regional basis. research grant to test litter traps in local shopping centres, because, as stated in Melbourne Water's Tagged Litter Report. much of the litter that enters the stormwater system comes from shopping strips and supermarkets. Often this is from overflowing bins from people (shopkeepers and shoppers) trying to 'do the right thing'. In a situation such as this, instead of piling rubbish onto an already overflowing bin, commonsense tells us that we should dispose of it in an emptier bin or even dispose of it in our home rubbish bin.

Litter traps are designed to trap litter that's washed from shopping centres into the drainage system.

Council no longer uses a street flusher which use to wash rubbish down the drain through side entry pits. Now it relies on a street sweeper to pick up as much rubbish as possible before it can enter the waterways.

Council has over 660 litter bins located through its streets and paths which are serviced on a regular basis.

Facts on our drainage network

ground drains, open channels and modified natural waterways. The responsibility of these drains is shared by Melbourne Water and municipal councils. There are approximately 25,000kms of Council owned street drains, 1100kms of main drains and drainage channels and 5000kms of waterways.

Stormwater drains carry contaminants such as litter, animal faeces, lead and oil from vehicles, fertilizers, detergents and sediment directly into our waterways. Unlike sewage and industry wastes which are only discharged after treatment at e"her the Werribee or Carrum reatment Plants, under license from the Environment Protection Authority (EPA). Stormwater generally receives no treatment and enters our bays and waterways without undergoing any treatment. This means that stormwater can be dirtier than sewage

"While councils can continue to do their part in cleaning up the shopping centres and streets, it's up to individuals to make a concerted effort to be aware of the pollution situation and try to prevent it," said Cr Martens. Here are some points to follow: check that your rainwater downpipe is properly connected to the stormwater drain and not to the sewer:

choose water efficient appliances and practice water conservation;

select consumables with a minimum amount of packaging; pick up dog faeces and dispose of them properly as below; (Note: Doggy scoopers are available for \$2.50 for Council's traffic and local law counter located on the first floor, City Hall);



containing phosphorus, ammonia or chlorine:

 dispose of unwanted chemicals in a responsible way;

 reduce consumption by reusing and recycling;

place rubbish in bins - don't throw it into lanes or gutters, or leave it in parks etc. - don't litter;




reduce energy consumption gas and electricity in the home, petrol in the car

Improve gardening and outdoor practices by:

 sweep and clean-up hard surfaces - don't hose them down; compost all organic material including lawn clippings and leaves;

wash cars and boats on lawn - not on hard surfaces; below is the correct way:



reduce use of garden chemicals like pesticides and herbicides.






