Caulfield to become "Gardiner"

CAULFIELD'S northern boundary is likely to be changed to take in that area of the City of Malvern generally bound by Wattletree Rd, Malvern Rd, Moira St, Dunlop St, Gardiners Creek, Warrigal Rd, Dandenong Rd and Tooronga Rd. The population of the new municipality will be 90,300 and its rate revenue will be around \$26.2 million based on current rating levels. It will occupy about 29.5 square kilometres.

The new City was proposed by the Local Government Board last Friday and will be subject to government approval.

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Transition to new council

THE report of the Local Government Board implies that commissioners will be appointed to run the new councils for a period of 12 months. These commissioners will be government appointed and therefore not accountable to the community.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold, stated "Caulfield Council is strongly opposed to the sacking of councillors. With such a small change in boundaries, Caulfield Council could easily manage the transition to the new authority," he said.

In its interim report, the Board clearly recognises, "the danger of unelected interim managements cutting services in order to demonstrate savings."

"At the end of the day, com-

missioners will not have the pressure of the ballot box to influence their decisions," said Cr Gold.

Cr Gold is one of a group of mayors who have taken the issue of democratic city representation to the public.

Gold mine for local park

CAULFIELD Council recently approved the construction of a 'Gold Mine' playground in Caulfield Park.

The 'Gold Mine' will replace the existing play equipment situated at the eastern end of Caulfield Park, near Park Cres.

Predominantly timber structures in heritage colors, the 'Gold Mine' has been designed for children of various ages and abilities to stimulate imagination and social interaction through role play and enhance self esteem through challenging yet safe activities using child friendly materials.

The equipment is Australian Made and different to all other playgrounds in Caulfield to date.

The new playground is expected to be completed by the end of June, 1994. A plan is currently on display at City Hall for your perusal. Your comments are invited and should be directed to Council's urban designer, Ms Lynette Hannan, on 524 3348.

The eastern end of Caulfield Park will also be further improved with additional tree planting. Council plans to plant indigenous trees, consistent with the Australiana theme. Extensive planting of Swamp Gum, Manna Gum and Blackwood Wattle will occur during Spring. The trees will help to re-green an area of parkland which has experienced tree loss over the years due to old age and deterioration of trees.

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Waste collections to start

CAULFIELD Council is about to commence regular collections of mulchable garden materials and hard rubbish from all residential properties.

Mulching collection service

This service is due to begin in April and will run for 10 weeks. All residents will receive an advance notice indicating the week during which the collection will be held. The notice requires all materials put out to be bundled according to size requirements to allow for it to fit through the contractor's chipping machine.

There are also exclusions of some materials that will not chip and block the machine or result in an unsuitable mulch product. Residents will again be able to order the resulting mulch from the contractor, but not all requests may be met, as with the last collection, the demand for

mulch exceeded the quantity produced from the collection.

hard Annual rubbish collection

This service will be carried by the same contractor following the completion of the mulching service in June. This will also run for 10 weeks and a sepaadvance notice will be distributed to residents for this collection.

The notice will advise of certain materials that cannot be included in the collection such as paint, chemicals and asbestos, which will not be accepted at the tip due to environmental regulations.

Building and mechanical materials are also unacceptable, and cardboard, glass and other recyclable materials will not be collected and should be cleared through regular recyclina collections.

Council to help local traders

AT a meeting of local traders and business leaders called by Caulfield Council on February 17, 1994, Council committed itself to working with the community to develop and enhance local shopping centres.

With respect to Elsternwick Shopping Centre, Council has allocated funds of \$15,000 to improve some sections of the footpath and, on a broader scale, has agreed to introduce Elsternwick and all other local traders to the Main Street Program.

The Main Street Program is a program designed to bring the community and retailers together for the beautification of the streetscape and to help increase and maintain the level of activity and profitability of strip shopping centres.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold, said "The issue of struggling shopping centres relates to more than just their appearance - it's up to shopkeepers and the community to work together for the overall success of their shopping centre."

Council has already received expressions of interest in the Main Street Program and as a result, invites all interested local traders and business people along to an information evening on Main Street which will include a number of guest speakers specialised in retailing and Main Street programs. This meeting will be held on April 20, 8pm in the Council Reception Room, Caulfield City Hall. (Shopkeepers and business people will receive a formal invitation).

A committee of interested people will be elected to act as a committee of management, similar to that of a Centre Management at Chadstone or Southland.

At an informal meeting held on March 21, 1994 with members of the Elsternwick Chamber of Commerce, Councillors and traders expressed their commitment to beginning a coordinated effort to upgrade and enhance the Elsternwick Strip Shopping Centre. Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold and other Councillors took a walk through the area and reasserted their commitment to work together for the benefit of all concerned.

Engineering update

Walsh St modernisation

CAULFIELD Council has recently called tenders for the modernisation of Walsh St between Grange and Katandra Rds, Ormond.

Works will include the reconstruction of the bluestone pitcher kerb and channel and upgrading of the stormwater drainage system. Continual deterioration of the existing kerb and channel and lack of underground drainage necessitated this project which will require drainage to run along Lillimur Rd between Walsh St and North Rd. This project will also include the installation of underground drainage to the Grange Rd/Walsh St intersection and therefore removal of the existing open bluestone channel across the intersection is necessary. Council will appoint a contractor as part of its Street Reconstruction Program with works envisaged to start in May.

Developments that would irretrievably alter the nature of your community - and the lifestyle you have chosen. All this without you being able to have any say - or possibly any right of appeal for up to two years.

Your commissioner derives power from the government - and answers only to the government. A government committed to fast track development - as events in Euroa and Mount Sterling have recently confirmed.

Many people agree that Melbourne's traditional boundaries urgently need to be redefined and rationalised.

In some cases, efficiencies can be achieved by merging smaller communities into larger, more effective councils.

THE Local Government Board has recommended eight new municipalities covering 18 of the 21 councils involved in the reference area. A ninth proposal includes the City of Box Hill which abuts the reference area. Box Hill indicated its support for this proposal in its submission to the review. Similarly, the proposal involving Altona and Below: The proposed municipal structure.

Williamstown has implications for the City of Werribee which also abuts the reference area.

The Board has not made any recommendations affecting the Cities of Essendon or Heidelberg and it has recommended only minor adjustments to the southern boundary of the City of Footscray. The most appropriate municipal structure for the sub-regions of which these three councils form part is likely to involve councils not included in this reference, and they are likely to be considered in a separate reference at a later date.



Michael added that one of the reasons he joined Futurekids was because it gave the chance to put something back into the community.




