### Caulfield's response to "Gardiner"

CAULFIELD Council has submitted its response to the Local Government Board regarding the Board's proposal to merge Caulfield and East Malvern.

At a Special Council Meeting on April 12, Council approved the new boundaries of Tooronga Rd, Wattletree Rd, Gardiner's Creek and Warrigal Rd.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold, said "Whilst Caulfield supports the proposed new boundaries, it is concerned that moves to have the Gascoigne Estate and other areas in East Malvern included in the City of Stonnington, will reduce the economies of scale forecast for Gardiner. If these changes eventuate, the Government might as well amalgamate the whole of Malvern with Prahran," said Cr Gold.

Council also believes that annexation rather than amalgamation or merger should occur.

"In our submission, we draw on a similar comparison where a small area of Melbourne was transferred to Essendon without the need for changes to the Council or its administration," said Cr Gold. "We are ideally hoping for a similar outcome for Caulfield," he said.

As indicated in its original submission to the Board, Caulfield still retains an interest in the eastern boundary, particularly that area between Poath Rd and Warrigal Rd and feels that this should become part of Caulfield in the second round of municipal reviews.

"Economic and community of interest arguments would strongly indicate the benefit of this boundary change," said Cr Gold. "Also, it would be logical and natural to extend the proposed eastern boundary of the new city," he said.

Although it agrees to the boundary changes, Council has concerns with the transitional arrangements and the proposed name 'Gardiner'.

"While the world celebrates South Africa's move to democracy, in Victoria, the State Government appears to be taking it away," said Cr Gold.

Current Government proposals still indicate that community elected representation is to be removed for an undefined period and replaced by government appointed commissioners.

"Council is concerned that the resident's voice is in danger of suffering a major bout of laryngitis!," said Cr Gold.

At another level, Caulfield residents have been quick to challenge the new name and point out the advantages of keeping Caulfield.

"Having obtained the views of East Malvern residents as requested by the Board, the results indicate that 'Gardiner' is not popular in that area either," said Cr Gold.

The problem with the name 'Gardiner' is that many community facilities, including the Gardiner Railway Station, fall within the boundaries of the new City of Stonnington.

"Three quarters of the new

City has historical links with the name Caulfield, including the internationally acclaimed Caulfield Racecourse," said Cr Gold. "With such a minor change to our municipality (an increase of only 18,000 residents), it hardly seems necessary to change the name, especially considering it could cost as much as \$250,000 to alter street signs, stationery, logos, publications and so on," he said.

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

## Caulfield's

THE new combined swimming pool/recreation centre soon to commence construction in Moira Ave, Carnegie (the present Caulfield Memoral Swimming Pool site), will be called the 'Leisuredrome'.

To create a local connection and thus achieve a local identity, research was carried out on the nature of the site prior to its current use. It was found that the site was previously that of Victoria's second official aerodrome and was officially named the Glen Huntly Aerodrome in 1921.

The aerodrome theme links today's community with Caulfield's historical past. The formal name of the Centre will be the Caulfield Leisure Centre.

The Centre will hopefully be completed in time for the opening of the Caulfield Swimming season in November this year.

### Register your dog

ONWERS of unregistered dogs in Caulfield could be in for an unpleasant surprise, as Council officers are carrying out door-to-door checks on the registration of dogs in the City.

Animal control officers will check on properties with dogs and if unregistered pets are found, owners will be given the option of either registering the animal on the spot or paying a \$200 fine.


Considering it costs \$50 to register an unsterilised dog, \$18

for a sterilised dog and \$28 for VCA animals, a \$200 fine is an unattractive alternative.

Dog owners are strongly advised to register their dogs immediately. Where the owner is not home, they will receive a fine in the mail if an unregistered dog is found.

Dogs can be registered at the Council, cnr Glen Eira and Hawthorn Rds, Caulfield.

### Footpath upgrading program 1994

IN association with Council's ongoing program of footpath repair and replacement, the footpaths in Albert Rd, Furneaux Gve, Parkside St and Parnell St are all to be replaced as necessary.

The extent of the works will be marked on site and the appropriate quantities provided to contractors to enable quotes to be obtained.

These renewal works are expected to significantly improve the alignment of these footpaths, assisting pedestrian traffic in these areas. Works are due to commence this month.

### Balmoral Crt/Sidwell Ave easement drain

CAULFIELD Council is currently investigating the options for upgrading the existing easement drain bounded by Sidwell Ave, Sidwell Crt, Inkerman Rd, Balaclava Rd and Balmoral Crt.

This project is necessary due to problems associated with flooding of the properties within the vicinity of the drainage pipe. Council's engineering department investigated the capacity of the existing pipes and found that a larger size pipe was needed to accommodate the catchment area.

This project will be challenging for both the contractor and the engineering department because work will occur near trees, brick garages, buildings and tennis courts. It is anticipated that this project will be carried out in two stages with the first stage to be completed this year as part of the 1993-94 Drainage Upgrading Program.

#### **Hotham St drainage**

ALSO as part of its 1993-94
Drainage Upgrading Program,
Council's engineering department recently completed a
design to provide an underground stormwater drain in
Hotham St from A'Beckett St to
94 Hotham St,

The purpose of carrying out this project is to improve the drainage in this area to eliminate any flooding and also provide direct connection of property drains to the proposed Council drain.

The project includes approximately 207 lineal metres of 300mm diameter to 375mm diameter fibre reinforced cement pipes which would be partly located within the footpath area. There will be new concrete footpath slabs in Hotham St where the new drain is to be installed.

Council is in the process of obtaining quotes from contractors and work is scheduled to commence this month or early next.

#### Vehicle crossing location

NEW Vehicle crossings are installed to serve properties usually because of some redevelopment work, whether it be completely new buildings or simply construction of an onsite parking area.

In many cases, the proposed location of the vehicle crossing is found to coincide with some other feature of the street such as street trees, drainage pits, electricity poles, fire hydrants or other features which may require modification or relocation to accommodate the vehicle crossing or may preclude the installation of a vehicle crossing altogether. Other factors that may influence the siting of a vehicle crossing are the closeness to street corners, other vehicle crossings and reserved parking ar-

In all cases, it is vitally important that proper investigation of the site of any proposed vehicle crossings is thoroughly undertaken at an early planning stage of any property redevelopment. Building or planning approval for a property development does not consider these ancillary issues and accordingly it can be found that new building development works progress only to find vehicle crossings and driveways cannot be located as per the approved building plan.

Failure to adequately check vehicle crossing locations and take heed of any possible obstructions can lead to delays in the approval process for vehicle crossing installations or costly modifications to street features or property entrance details which have to be carried out at cost to the property owner or developer.

# Self driven petition to stop Oakleigh merge

TWENTY percent of Murrumbeena residents have signed a petition in an attempt to safeguard Murrumbeena from the proposed take-over by the City of Oakleigh.

Their reaction is the result of a recent newspaper article which stated Oakleigh's proposal to extend its eastern boundary from Poath Rd to Murrumbeena Rd, annexing 12,000 City of Caulfield residents in an attempt to save Oakleigh.

Murrumbeena resident of 34 years, Mrs Wilma Minogue was the initiator of the petition. "When I heard about Oakleigh's proposed take-over of Murrumbeena I knew I had to do something," she said.

"The people of Murrumbeena have put a lot of work into their homes and are proud to belong to Caulfield. We have nothing to gain from Oakleigh - it has higher rates and completely different policies," she said.

"Through this amalgamation process, residents have had their rights taken away from them. We have always been Caulfield and that's the way we

want to stay," she added.

East ward Councillor, Veronika Martens tabled the bulky petition at the April Council meeting.

"It's a good feeling knowing that the residents of Murrumbeena feel as strongly as Council does about keeping Murrumbeena just as it is - part of Caulfield and part of a rich heritage," said Cr Martens. "What is even more pleasing is that the petition was 'self driven' by the residents. They are proud to live in Caulfield and that's the way it should stay."

TWO local students have recently returned home from an exciting eight day homestay visit to Ogaki, Japan.

The students, Lindsay Mackay, 13 and David Biggs, 14 were successfully chosen by the Caulfield Friendly Cities Advisory Committee interview panel which consisted of Caulfield Mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold, Cr Veronika Martens and a community member/representative of the Friendly Cities Committee. In addition, Ms Wakako Hayashi, a native Japanese speaker was engaged to test the students on their fluency and proficiency of the Japanese language.

Council's senior administration officer, Mr Ian Robb accompanied the students on the tour. Mr Robb has provided administrative support since the Ogaki/Caulfield relationship was struck six years ago. He has organised homestay accommodation and programs on most Ogaki visits to Caulfield.

The tour included visits to Ogaki Castle, the Museum, the Ogaki Hachiman Shrine, Kyoto, Hikone Castle, Police Station and the Municipal Hospital. The students also attended the Ogaki Seiwa Junior High School. Activities included Cherry Blossom viewing at night, cooking a Japanese-style lunch, a Japanese conversation lesson, tea ceremony, flower arrangement and calligraphy.

David Biggs said the best part of the tour was meeting people.

"Whenever we met a group of people, whether it be our homestay family, the Mayor or school groups, we had to introduce ourselves and speak of our country, in Japanese," said David. "It was challenging but fun."


This introduction exercise gives students a chance to develop language skills and confidence - the very basis for the Friendly Cities program.

### New insurance cover for cyclists

**BICYCLE Victoria has identi**fied 800 cyclists hospitalised each year in bicycle only crashes, who are not covered by the Transport **Accident Commission (TAC)** or WorkCover.

Bicycle Victoria have recently completed a report, Cyclist Trauma 1994: The Facts, showing that 80% of cyclists who are treated in a hospital have had an accident that does not involve a motor vehicle 'in the act of driving' and therefore cannot receive compensation from

In response to this problem, Bicycle Victoria has secured a low cost insurance package for its members that provides income replacement, lump sum payouts on permanent disablement and other forms of assist-


Mr Harry Barber, campaigns manager for Bicycle Victoria, said "The package also gives members a \$2 million third party and property cover so if they crash into a Rolls Royce, they won't go broke paying for the damage."

Government inconsistency In 1993, a court ruled that a cyclist who broke her collar bone when a driver opened his door into her path, was not covered by the TAC.

"If you are hit by a moving car you get walloping payouts from the TAC, but if the same driver opens their door in front of you, you could end up with nothing, until now," said Mr Barber.

In 1992, the State Government chopped 'cyclists on their way to work' out of WorkCover. Cyclists are now banding together to do the job that the Government won't do. Bicycle Victoria has researched the problem, developed the insurance package as a solution and is promoting it to the cycling public.

"Cyclists aren't getting a fair go. Over 30,000 people cycle to work everyday. By riding a bike they reduce traffic congestion, help stop pollution and get fit as well. They deserve the same protection as other road users. said Mr Barber. "Our insurance package gives immediate coverage to anyone who joins Bicycle Victoria. It will give peace of

mind to riders on their way to work or out on the bike path, and to parents whose kids are riding to school. You'd be a mug to cycle without it."

Keen cyclist and Mayor of Caulfield, Cr Nicholas Gold is just one of thousands of cyclists who can now have peace of mind while out cycling.

"For just \$35 a year, I can now be assured of round the clock cover," said Cr Gold. "So many cycling residents tell me that a major disincentive to riding a bike, is the risk of accident not covered by insurance; now that risk can be properly dealt with," said Cr Gold.

Safer cycling

Even bike paths can be dangerous places. Many cyclists have crashes on poorly designed bike paths or when they crash into bollards. This insurance package covers members 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The good news is bicycle riding is getting safer all the time.

Deaths and injuries are down while the number of people riding is increasing. Cycling is still one of the safest activities around; it is no more hazardous to commute by bike than by car.

### Salvos need new recruits

THE annual Salvation Army fundraising drive culminates on Doorknock Day, Sunday, May 22. But local goals will not be met unless volunteer doorknockers can be found.

### Professor receives prestige award

PROFESSOR Paul Zimmet, director of the International Diabetes Institute and one of Australia's most eminent experts in diabetes, has been named as the recipient of the 1994 Eli Lilly Lecture.


The Eli Lilly Lecture is regarded as one of the most prestigious awards in the field of diabetes worldwide, and is one of the highlights of the triennial International Diabetes Federation (IDF) Congress to be held in Kobe, Japan in November this year.

The Lilly Lecture is the only award at the Congress open to international competition, with others being regionally or country based.

Professor Zimmet, who received the Order of Australia (OAM) for his services to diabetes in the 1993 New Years Honours list, will address the Congress on the causes of diabetes (NIDDM), based on leading edge research he has carried out in collaboration with other colleagues in Melbourne and the US.

In his lecture, Professor Zimmet will describe pioneering new research discoveries which have contributed to a better understanding of the causes of NIDDM, as well as the insulin-dependent form.

"The modernisation, or Coca-Colonisation of lifestyles has directly contributed to what virtually amounts to a pandemic incidence of NIDDM among Australian aboriginals, as well as among Pacific Island nations and our Asian neighbours," he

With a research breakthrough in form of a new blood test developed with Monash University colleagues, Merrill Rowley and Ian Mackay, Prof. Zimmet has provided new insights into early detection of insulin-dependent diabetes in both children and adults.






