

Meet Caulfield's new mayor

CR James Barrett is Caulfield's new Mayor.

Elected to represent the south ward in 1987, Cr Barrett is one of the longest serving councillors currently standing on Caulfield Council.

In accepting his mayorship at last week's statutory meeting, Cr Barrett said it was a great honour to be the Mayor of Caulfield - a City he has had a close association with since his childhood.

"Having spent most of my school holidays in Caulfield and then moving here following a career transfer in 1970, I have gained great admiration for the City and its citizens," said Cr Barrett. "I am aware that my term as

Mayor is going to be difficult and extremely demanding with the review of local government boundaries being the most important issue to hit local government in over 100 years, however, I will endeavour to do my best to ensure Caulfield gets the best possible outcome," he said. A number of family members attended the statutory meeting to see Cr Barrett take the mayorship - one was his cousin, Geoffrey Youl - a Councillor with the Shire of Belfast. Cr Barrett's family, including Geoffrey Youl, have notched up 74 years of continual service to local government between them.

"The dedication that the rest of my family has given to local government has played an enormous part in my wish to become a councillor and now a Mayor," said Cr Barrett.

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Recycling scheme expands

CAULFIELD Council is committed to providing recycling services. Two reliable contractors conduct residential kerbside collections as follows:

Weekly (same day as garbage collection using the plastic recycling bag)

- all glass containers
- all aluminium cans

 large plastic containers, one litre and over PET soft drink bottles, HDPE milk bottles and PVC drink bottles.

Monthly (according to calendar provided, must be stacked on naturestrip and weighed down)

 old newspapers and magazines
cardboard containers flattened and kept separate from newspapers (not commercial

quantities)

Council's manager engineering services, Peter Onley announced today that additional materials have now been included in Council's recycling contract.


"Residents can now include the following new items in their weekly collection using the recycling bag," said Mr Onley. • all steel (tin) cans used for foods

 all liquid paperboard cartons Steel cans excluded are paint and other similar chemical containers. Liquid paperboard cartons generally contain milk or fruit juices and should be rinsed, flattened and folded for collection. Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett, said "We urge residents to continue supporting Council's recycling services. However, we do also urge residents to ensure containment of the materials placed for collection to minimise litter generation by loose windblown materials," he said.

Recycling proposition for flats and units

An acknowledged, inadequacy of the container collection is the use of the plastic recycling bag. These tend to wear out, blow away or move between households. FOLLOWING sweeping reforms to the building permit system, Caulfield Council's building department must now compete with private enterprise when providing most building control services.

The approval of building permits and inspections previously dealt with by local councils exclusively, has now been replaced with the new Building Act 1993, which gives builders, architects, draftspeople, ratepayers and anyone who wants to do any building work, the freedom of obtaining permits from the pri-

ing industry. Caulfield clearly has the expertise and experience to compete with the private sector. The new system will mean Council's building department will function similarly to that of a private organisation." "The legislation will result in a streamlined, efficient building permit process with greater cost

savings to the building industry through reduced delays and bureaucratic red tape," said Mr Wootten.

Council's manager building, Geoff Milner, said "Under the new system Council has the ability to set its fee structure to recover costs and to compete in the open market for business."

"Council's building department staff are only too eager to assist and advise people with building permit documentation. Council can now offer the service of issuing a building permit anywhere in Victoria," said Mr Milner

Council carefully considers each request and changes are made to the existing lighting standard only where exceptional circumstances exist.

Engineering update

The street lighting is attached to the power supply poles located on one side of the road. This lighting is not installed as security lighting to private properties or vehicles parked in residential streets, but to provide an adequate level of illumination for pedestrian and vehicular traffic.

In most cases, the lighting falls within Council's policy for public street lighting, but in certain cases, there is a need to alter the standard and a request is sent to the SEC to either alter the existing bracket length or install an additional light at a cost to Council.

It has been noted that certain private properties have large trees planted adjacent to the street boundary fence and branches from these trees are obscuring the existing lighting. Council strongly urges these property owners to arrange for the pruning of these branches so that interference to the existing lighting standard is reduced.

Balaclava Junction footpath works

IN association with Council's ongoing program of shopping centre beautification works, the existing concrete footpath along Hawthorn Rd from Cromwell St to Halstead St will be replaced with brick paving to match the recent paving completed last year. Incorporated in the footpath works will be the installation of street seats and the planting of street trees, together with the painting of existing street signs which will improve the general appearance of the shopping centre.

Former mayor reflects a difficult year

FOLLOWING the appointment of Cr Barrett as the new mayor of Caulfield at last week's statutory meeting, it's farewell to outgoing mayor, Cr Nicholas Gold.

Cr Gold reflects on his mayoral term as difficult but extremely rewarding.

"Obviously the most notable memory I have of my term as Mayor of Caulfield is the issue of local government reform," said Cr Gold

"Together with my colleagues and Council's senior officers, I have endeavoured to ensure that Caulfield continues to provide its community with high quality living standards both now and in the future," he said.

"The outcome of Caulfield's future is not likely to be known until October/November this year, however I feel confident that the choice made by the residents, which was unanimously supported by the Council, will be given careful consideration when planning the new City."

"Although I have stepped down as mayor, I am still a councillor and a resident of Caulfield, and I will continue to let the voice of

Highlights of Cr Gold's mayoral term include: the opening of the New Caulfield Library, launch of the Municipal Public Health Plan, implementation of the Main Street Program, opening of the extension to the Food Services Kitchen, playing an integral part in ensuring that VicCode 2 - the Government's planning regulations are not enforced upon Council to the extent originally sought by the State Government and the donation of \$2500 to the Victorian Aids Council, Gay Men's Health Centre.



Music taught the 'logic' way

LOCAL music teacher, Phillip Dean, claims that a revolutionary music teaching method called *Music Logic*, has people understanding, reading and playing music up to 10 times faster than conventional methods.

Originally from Perth, Phillip studied music the conventional way for a number of years while a teenager, and has dabbled in music off and on since then.

"So often, people struggle with their music lessons - they feel like they've failed, but it's the teaching system that has failed them," he said.

Phillip moved to Caulfield with his wife Carolyn and daughter Ellie in August last year to set up a *Music Logic* studio in this area. The studio is situated at 10 Brooklyn Avenue, Caulfield South.

Phillip learnt about John Barton, the Melbourne-born creator of *Music Logic* through John Barton's sister, Frances.

"John describes music lessons as the one blot on his childhood," says Phillip. "In his said. John Barton is now establishing the method in the U.S.A., where it is fast gaining recognition. In Australia it is being piloted in government institutions and schools, and there are 15 studios in Victoria and Western Australia.





Pulses: (Beans, Peas and Lentils): 2 serves (175g) cooked or canned pulses daily or 2 serves (60g) nuts or 2 eggs, or any combination of the above. Vegetables and Fruit: 4 serves daily.

Milk, Yoghurt and Cheese: 3 serves daily. 1 serve = 200ml milk, 30g cheese, 200g yoghurt. Fats/Oils: 1 tablespoon (20g) daily. These quantities should be increased, depending on your age and activity level. Types of vegetarians

Liquid paperboard cartons generally contain milk or fruit juices and should be rinsed, flattened and folded for collecto continue supporting Council's recycling services. However, we do also urge residents to ensure containment of the materials placed for collection to minimise litter generation by loose windblown materials," he said.

Recycling proposition for flats and units

An acknowledged, inadequacy of the container collection is the use of the plastic recycling bag. These tend to wear out, blow away or move between households. Other solid box-type containers are still being investigated but for cost and other reasons have not yet been introduced at most councils. The problem is more procontents
