Multi unit panel visits Caulfield

Council expresses resident's growing concerns

VICCODE 2 Review Panel chairman Helen Gibson and fellow panel member Tony James visited Caulfield recently for a tour of the City and to discuss Caulfield's concerns about VicCode 2.

The Panel was set up by the State Government to review the application of the Code which was introduced last year to:

- increase housing densities
- speed up the approval proc-

Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett said the visit involved a lengthy discussion with the panel and a tour of the City to show that Caulfield already has a large percentage of medium density housing - 49% in fact.

"We advised the panel that Council strives for well designed multi-dwellings that are compatible to their location. We are concerned that Caulfield is now being saturated by unit development," said Cr Barrett.

"Council has a policy of enticing families into Caulfield and VicCode 2, in its current form, deters this to some extent," said Cr Barrett. "Council is now saying enough is enough."

The State Government support for the Code stressed the importance of good design in multi dwelling housing. The Council, however, believes that the present Code does not, in fact, achieve this desirable ob-

Some developers are prepared to sacrifice design and streetscape character issues to maximise their yield - ie: maximum number of dwellings per lot. In such cases the prescriptive Performance Measures (PM'S) of the Code become minimum standards. In Council's view, VicCode 2s PM'S are too low for Caulfield. A good example of this is open space provision. For much of Caulfield, VicCode 2 only requires 25m2 of open space per dwelling. Caulfield's own policy requires more than double this at 60m2. You simply cannot plant signifi-

cant trees in 25m2 of open

VicCode 2 puts Caulfield's contribution to The Garden State at risk," said Cr Barrett.

Councillors were satisfied that their concerns were understood by the panel.

Council's manager planning, Jeff Akehurst said that whilst Melbourne may only have 17% of medium density housing, it is difficult to argue a shortage in Caulfield where 49% of housing is medium density.

Library service gets \$80,000 boost

CAULFIELD Council will increase its 1994/95 book purchase allocation by \$80,000.

This increased allocation is the result of a number of factors including a survey by Reark Research, which asked residents how they rated the Caulfield Library Service.

The Reark report indicated that most residents were very positive about the library service, library stock however, was identified as a concern. The community were more than happy with the wonderfully new and renovated Carnegie and Caulfield Library Branches, however, a library is also about borrowing books and the Caulfield Library Service simply did not appear to carry the range expected by the local community.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett, said Council, with financial assistance from the Unemployment Capital Works Program, had invested a great deal of money in providing new and upgraded library services for the residents of Caulfield.

Make sure your property is numbered correctly

RESIDENTS are asked to ensure that their properties are clearly and correctly numbered.

Services such as Australia Post, Police, Fire Brigade and Ambulance etc. depend on proper identification of houses, flats and shops.

The Local Government Act places the responsibility for the property numbering system with local councils.

This means Caulfield Council allocates all initial numbers and looks after the re-numbering which can occur after develop-

Property owners can be fined up to \$1000 if they don't number their premises correctly. Numbers must be able to be read easily from a vehicle in the

Caulfield Council also has the power to affix a number and recover the cost from the owner.

However, this can be avoided if ratepayers and residents ensure their properties are correctly numbered.

Koornang/Lord Park

The function hall at Koornang Park is available for community hire from 9am-4pm Monday-Friday. Any interested person/group should call 524 3287.

"Council's policy is community consultation," said Cr Barrett. "We've completed the survey and the results show that more stock is needed so that's what we'll provide. The increase of \$80,000 will bring the 1994/ 95 book purchase allocation to over \$300,000," he said.

Caulfield's chief librarian, Trish Smyth also commented on Caulfield's introduction of a new accounting approach which monitors the value of library stock. This showed that not enough money was being spent at Caulfield to maintain stock levels.

"Council has continued to focus on the management of the City's assets and for the library books are a major asset," said Ms Smyth. "Once the Councillors looked over the figures they saw that funds were lacking in the area of stock."

"I believe the Councillors really value the library service and have shown this once again by upgrading the stock in response to community concerns," she

Engineering update

Vehicle crossings

A PROPERLY constructed vehicle crossing is required for vehicles to travel from the road pavement across naturestrip and footpath into private property.

The provision of a vehicle crossing and its maintenance is the responsibility of the property owner. Owners should be aware that an accident to a member of the public caused by a poorly maintained vehicle crossing could make them liable for financial compensation.

The vehicle crossing extends from the kerb and channel to the fence line and includes the section of the footpath it crosses.

A proper vehicle crossing must be constructed to a standard approved by Council and may include construction in a variety of materials including asphalt, brick or bluestone pitchers but is usually of concrete, with a minimum thickness of 100mm. Remember that a Crossing Permit is required from Council's building department prior to commencement of work.

Where the development of a property is undertaken which renders an existing vehicle crossing unnecessary, it is the owners responsibility to remove the crossing and reinstate the naturestrip and kerb to match the balance of the street construction.

Council endeavours to limit the width of a crossing to the minimum necessary for vehicle use. This is done to reduce the extent of paving in a street and improve the landscape appearance. When a proposed crossing exceeds 3.6 metres in width, special approval is required from the Council prior to construction.

Balmoral Crt/Sidwell Ave easement drain

COUNCIL'S engineering department has recently com-

pleted a drainage design for upgrading of the easement drain bounded by Sidewell Ave, Sidwell Crt, Inkerman Rd, Balaclava Rd and Balmoral

This project is necessary due to flooding of properties within the vicinity of this drainage

It will be carried out in two stages with the first stage to be completed as part of the 1993-94 Drainage Upgrading Program.

This stage requires about 60 linear metres of 300mm diameter PVC and Fibre Reinforced Concrete pipe. It will involve working near brick garages, under paling fences, near buildings and within patterned or brick paved areas.

Council is in the process of obtaining quotes for stage one. When a contractor has been selected, the construction work will proceed with prior notice given to effected residents.

Stormwater drainage

DURING the winter and spring seasons, residents find that their stormwater drainage becomes blocked with tree roots and debris accumulated over

Residents are responsible for the maintenance of the internal stormwater drainage within their property and the drainage leading to their legal point of discharge.

The majority of stormwater drainage discharges either to a Council drain located within the roadway or naturestrip, or directly to the kerb and chan-

Residents should be aware that in the above cases, the stormwater drainage leading to these legal points of discharge is still the responsibility of the owner and steps should be taken to keep the drainage clear of obstructions. thus preventing flooding of their property.

Caulfield's heritage advisory service

CAULFIELD'S Heritage Advisory Service was introduced in May this year. Andrew Ward, architect and Council's heritage advisor is available twice a month, afternoons and early evenings to speak with members of the community about renovations and restoration works to their homes. This service is free and already enquiries have been received from owners of Victorian, Edwardian and Inter-war houses throughout the municipality.

Andrew Ward not only assists when it comes to issues of architectural style, but he also offers technical advice on maintenance. When it comes to 'style', there is often the temptation to add features from a period which is not suited to the period of the house or building undergoing renovations.

For example, picket fences are often chosen for Californian

Bungalows and other inter-war styles when they really belong to the Victorian and Edwardian homes. Crimped wire fences or low brick fences are more suited to inter-war houses, although it is true that there are many other options to consider before converting to the good old picket fence.

Inside the house, it is a good idea to pick the right style of fireplace for the era of the building. Victorian mantelpieces for example, are quite different to Edwardian and post Edwardian designs.

Maintenance is just as important as style. If cracks are appearing in a wall, it is usually because of poor maintenance, not poor design. Check to see if rainwater is being discharged to the base of the building or if tree roots are interferring with the footings. Call in the heritage advisor if you are unsure. Appointments can be made by contacting Council's town planning department on 524 3337.

What's new in town planning?

Developers risk\$10,000 fine

DEVELOPERS risk fines of up to \$10,000 if they breach endorsed planning permit plans.

These enforcement and offence provisions are part of the Planning and Environment Act.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett said Council had not seen the need to enforce the hefty fine in Caulfield until recently.

"Council has been concerned that a relatively small number of developers have 'developed' contrary to approved plans, and retrospectively sought permission to make their buildings and works legal," said Cr Barrett.

"We can't impress upon our developers enough the importance of gaining approval for amended plans prior to development. With the knowledge of this rather hefty fine now in place, hopefully we can eliminate these problems," he said.

Council has also introduced a \$40 fee for processing amended plans.

"The submission of amending plans is a common occurrence intown planning procedures and there is no concern when amendments are requested before development commences," said Cr Barrett. "However, Council will, from October 1, 1994 introduce a \$40 fee to cover the administrative costs of expeditiously considering amended plans."

Council streamlines planning approval

CAULFIELD Council has agreed to increase its delegation for

planning approvals to the DACC (Development Approvals Coordinating Committee), and in some cases, individual officers, in an effort to streamline decision making.

Subject to the Mayor and town planning committee chairman, only those applications where there is significant departure from policy or significant objection will now be referred to Council's monthly town planning committee.

Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett, said developers and concerned residents will still be able to air their concerns.

"We will structure the DACC to enable developers and the community to have input and

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it's our intent that the committee meet on a regular weekly basis," said Cr Barrett.

"Council believes that these changes will greatly improve the speed and efficiency of decision making without reducing stakeholder's rights and expectations to be heard," he said.

"These wide ranging delegated responsibilities put Caulfield at the forefront of Local Government self administered planning reform," said Cr Barrett. "Councillors will now be able to more fully concentrate on formulating broad policy initiatives to ensure Caulfield remains a desirable and vital residential community," he said.

Council farewells dedicated Op Shop team

AT a special dinner held prior to the August Council meeting, Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett paid tribute to the ladies from the Carnegie Elderly Citizens' Opportunity Shop.

After over 33 years of operation, the need for costly renovations and difficulty in attracting new volunteers to take over from the existing volunteers (some of whom are in their 80s), has left

the ladies with no choice but to close the Shop on September 2, 1994.

During over 33 years, with the support of the Council and many volunteers, the Carnegie Op Shop raised over \$316,000.

Beneficiaries include:

● Caulfield General Medical Centre - \$1000 was donated to their Geriatric Ward Appeal, 1971:

- Ash Wednesday Bushfires
- following the disastrous fires, \$2500 was donated, 1983;
- Heathlands Hostel \$70,000 for the development of the Hostel, 1976;
- Rosstown Court \$25,000 for the construction of Hostel which followed by a further \$5000, 1980;
- Belsize Avenue Flats over \$4000 was donated for carpets;
- Spurway Nursing Home \$209,000 has been donated to date to assist with construction and costs to which will be added, the remaining funds from the shop when it closes.

"All the volunteers who have assisted over the years would have great satisfaction knowing that their efforts have assisted with not only the provision of wide range of facilities for the older residents of Caulfield, but also the help that they have given to those people who were victims of natural disasters such as the Ash Wednesday Bushfires," said Cr Barrett.

Junior Science festival comes to Caulfield

How does your car rate in a crash?

VICROADS have just released the second stage of the **Driver Protection Ratings** which are presented in an easy to follow brochure to let people know how safe passenger cars are in crash situations.

While all cars have to comply with common minimum safety standards (the Australian Design Rules), the Driver Protection Ratings have shown that some cars perform much better than others in protecting their drivers when a road crash actually occurs.

The Driver Protection Ratings - How does your car rate in a crash brochure includes information on cars, station wagons, vans and four wheel drives made from 1982-1992

Gray Scott, senior engineer of the Vehicle Safety Branch VicRoads said that it was VicRoads' aim to produce the

publication annually.

"People choose to buy one car in preference to another for a variety of reasons including cost, style, comfort, space, performance, fuel consumption and color. Safety is also very important, but until recently very little information on how cars perform in actual crashes has been available to consumers. We hope that people will read our brochure and use it as a very important guide when purchasing their next vehicle," said Mr Scott.

The Driver Protection Ratings have been calculated based on data from 220,000 crashes provided by the Police and the Roads and Traffic Authority in NSW and the Transport Accident Commission in Victoria.

Alzheimers...you're not alone!

ABOUT 30,000 people in Victoria are known to be suffering from Alzheimers disease or a related disorder. This figure is expected to double in the next 20 years as the population ages. People most affected by the disease are those over 70.


"You are not alone" was the theme of this year's National Alzheimers Week (September 4-10).

Various activities and promotions were organised by the Alzheimers Society to alert the community and carers to the range of support and information services available.

Alzheimers Disease is a progressive, degenerative disease affecting the brain cells and nerve pathways. Early symptoms include memory loss, limited problem solving skills, disorientation and personality change. As the disease progresses, sufferers experience more severe memory problems, they may not recognise friends and family, and have difficulty performing routine tasks.

As a result, sufferers become more dependent on their carers who may be struggling to cope with the physical and emotional demands made on them. Some sufferers experience sleep disturbances, paranoia and obsessive aggressive behaviour as the disease affects different parts of the brain. Eventually the disease leads to loss of control of all bodily functions as well as a major loss of cognitive functioning and memory.

Alzheimers Disease can be exhausting and devastating. The Alzheimers Society was established to support carers in their vital role by providing community education programs, individual counselling, library and advisory services, telephone information and referral services, research and advocacy. In addition, the Society has de-

veloped a network of over 100 self help and support groups throughout Victoria. These groups provide practical information and allow carers to share their emotions and experience with others in a similar situation.

The Caulfield Carer's Group was formed eight years ago and is facilitated by various health

and welfare professionals. The group meets at the Gladys Machin Senior Citizens Centre on the second Thursday of each month from 2-4pm.

Food hygiene...now you'll know

POINTS TABLE

FOR the first time Caulfield residents will be given information about hygiene standards in local food outlets.

On September 1, Caulfield Council introduced a new Food Hygiene Audit to assess hygiene standards and food handling practices in all local food outlets.

Council will award certificates to shopkeepers for public display which will highlight the standard the shop has reached following the audit. The best grade (four stars) will be awarded to those shops which reach the highest standard.

According to Caulfield Mayor, Cr James Barrett, this will be the first time that consumers and residents have been given any hygiene information about local food outlets.

"The intent of this program is to assess public health risks," said Cr Barrett. "It will give consumers knowledge of which food outlets are the most hygienic and will give local food businesses the opportunity to be more competitive."

"We want to encourage the best food handling practices by using the competitive resources

that already exist in the marketplace rather than regulations," said Cr Barrett. "Certificates detailing the standard a particular shop has achieved following the audit will be issued and we hope that those who achieve good results will display them for consumers to see - those who don't, probably won't."

Council's environmental health services coordinator, Victor Di Paola said that it would take 12 months for all shops to be audited. However, residents will be able to ring the Environmental Health Department to find out if their local shop has

"We will be happy to provide information on shops that have reached a three or four star standard," said Mr Di Paola. "We are keen to publicise those businesses that are doing well

The Food Hygiene Audit has

been developed to use market forces to increase hygiene standards in Caulfield food outlets.

"Residents are vital to be success of the Audit program," said Mr Di Paola. "We hope people will prefer to shop in outlets that have attained a three or four star standard."

"As audits are to be conducted annually, we rely on residents letting us know if they have problems with any food they buy. If we are able to verify complaints these will be taken into account when the next audit is conducted," he said.

Monthly articles will appear in Contact Monthly listing every food outlet that has achieved a three or four star standard with a feature on the best shop for that month.

Council hopes residents will use this information to help them decide where to shop. "We are also hopeful that shopkeepers will strive to have their businesses included," said Cr

An annual award will be presented to the best food outlet for the year.

Diabetes Institute spreads the healthy message

THE International Diabetes Institute (IDI) has received the 1994 Excellence in Sponsorship Award from the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation (VicHealth) in acknowledgment of its community health promotion initiatives.

The award, presented by the Victorian Health Minister, Marie Tehan, was in recognition of the IDI's health promotional campaign of the 1993 Mazda Montsalvat Jazz Festival.

Sunshades and fridge magnets carrying the slogan "Prevent adult-onset diabetes with Health Food and Exercise" were handed out at the Jazz Festival, and numerous signs displayed the preventative health message. The IDI's healthy catering guidelines were distributed to all the Festival food outlets at Montsalvat.

IDI Director, Professor Paul Zimmet said the Institute highly valued opportunities to educate the community about the prevention of diabetes.

"If people are over 40, overweight and don't exercise, they place themselves at high risk of developing adult-onset diabetes." said Professor Zimmet.

"Due to lifestyle factors, the prevalence of adult-onset diabetes is on the rise. Unless current trends can be reversed, by the year 2000, it is expected over 700,000 Australians will have diabetes - a disease which is incurable and leads to life-threatening complications," he said.

The IDI has been promoting its health message at Victorian sporting, art and cultural events since 1987.




